HALACHIC CORNER #1

ERUV TAVSHILIN

On the first day of Yom Tov we are not permitted to cook or to do any preparations for the next day of Yom Tov. Similarly, we are not permitted to cook on Yom Tov for Shabbos. By making an eruv tavshilin, Chazal, our Rabbis, permitted cooking on Yom Tov which falls on Erev Shabbos for that Shabbos. This year, it is necessary to make an eruv tavshilin on Wednesdays, September 24, October 8 and October 15, before the start of Yom Tov.

The eruv tavshilin consists of two types of food, one baked and one cooked. You should take a complete piece of matza or a challah and put it together with a cooked egg, piece of chicken or fish, and recite both the bracha and the text of the eruv. The text is recited in a language that one understands. (This can be found in all siddurim and machzorim, and in the Artscroll siddur on page 654.)

There is a minhag to use the matza or challah of the eruv for lechem mishna at the seudos Shabbos and to eat it at the seudah shlishis in order to do as many mitzvos with one item as possible. (One who does not eat seudah shlishis at home should eat the eruv tavshilin at the second meal.)

HALACHIC CORNER #2

FASTING EREV ROSH HASHANA

The Shulchan Orech states that there is a minhag to fast on Erev Rosh Hashana. Nowadays, many people (including boys over the age of 13 & girls over the age of 12) fast until chatzos on Erev Rosh Hashana, which is at 12:42 pm this year. Some people try to daven mincha one half hour after chatzos so that they will be able to say the tefilla of aneinu in shmoneh esrei. Therefore, besides the mincha minyanim at 1:30 & 6:30, we will also be having a minyan at 1:12 pm. Note: if a person fasts until chatzos but eats before davening mincha, aneinu may not be said.

HALACHIC CORNER #3

SHOFAR

The halacha states that a person should hear a minimum of 30 kolos (blows) of the shofar. During mussaf on Rosh Hashana, 30 kolos are blown before shmoneh esreh begins. 30 kolos are also blown towards the end of chazaras hashatz (in 3 separate groups of 10) and 40 kolos are blown after chazaras hashatz. Anyone hearing either one of these 3 groups has fulfilled the basic requirement of hearing the shofar on Rosh Hashana. Even if they did not hear the brachos on the shofar, they have still fulfilled the requirement. Note: the aforementioned is for people who, for one reason or another, are not able to be in shul throughout the entire mussaf. For everyone else, it is best to hear the brachos and the 100 kolos without any talking.

HALACHIC CORNER #4

EREV YOM KIPPUR

On erev Yom Kippur, besides the seudas hamafsek, which is eaten after mincha, another seuda is eaten in the morning, after shacharis. The reason is based on the gemara that says there is a mitzvah to eat on erev Yom Kippur. Therefore, in order to fulfill this mitzvah, there is a minhag, which many people observe, to eat two meals on erev Yom Kippur. Seforim say that these two meals take the place of the two Yom Tov seudos that are not eaten on Yom Kippur.

HALACHIC CORNER #5

CANDLELIGHTING

On both nights of Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur and every night of Sukkos, we recite shehechyanu following the bracha on the candles.

There is one exception to this rule. If you are going to drive to shul for Kol Nidre, DO NOT recite shehechyanu when lighting candles for Yom Kippur. Instead, light the candles at home with the appropriate bracha of lehadlik ner shel Yom Hakipurim. Have in mind while reciting the bracha that you intend to drive to shul. Because you plan to drive to shul, you are not yet accepting Yom Tov and therefore the bracha of shehechyanu cannot be recited. The appropriate time to say shehechyanu in this situation is in shul after Kol Nidrei, together with the rest of the congregation.
