

What's the Rabbi have to say?

Some thoughts from our Rabbi, Hannah Orden.

Rosh Hashanah is a time of new beginnings. This year is clearly a new beginning for me and for Congregation Beth Hatikvah. My husband Don and I are living in a new home, a new town, a new state. I saw a T-shirt recently that said: "Welcome to New Jersey, the greatest country in the world." So maybe we are even living in a new country!

As I begin a new relationship with this congregation, you are also beginning a new relationship with me as your rabbi.

Anyone who has traveled knows the benefit of being in a new place. We open our eyes and see things in new ways. Change wakes us up and requires us to pay attention. In a new place, we are not sure where we are going or how to get there. We have to pay more attention to our surroundings, learn to recognize new guideposts. And when we make new relationships, we are challenged by perceptions, ideas, and ways of doing things that are different from our own. All of this helps us to grow and learn.

It is exciting and invigorating when a big change shakes up our lives. But we don't need to move to a new place, start a new job, or hire a new rabbi to experience the power of new beginnings. The beauty of Jewish tradition is that each year we are reminded to renew our lives.

In a book called *The Rosh Hashana Yom Kippur Survival Guide*, Rabbi Shimon Apisdorf writes: "If you have been to Paris but have missed the Louvre, you haven't been to Paris. If you participate in a Jewish holiday and you are not different as a result, you have missed the whole point of the holiday." He continues: "Rosh Hashanah is a time to look again at ourselves as growers. To remember that as long as there is life there is opportunity. Within us all lie worlds of potential new life that are waiting to be nourished and cultivated. When the shofar sounds it is meant to rouse us, to focus our attention on the fact that today is a brand-new beginning."

Rosh Hashanah reminds us of the possibility of change. It is not meant to be a one time occurrence or even a once a year occurrence. The Sefat Emet, one of the Hasidic masters, says: "Each day has its own unique song. The renewal of each day brings forth a new song. No day is exactly like another, since the creation of the world." Sometimes we forget that each day has its own unique song. Sometimes we feel that our days are all pretty much the same. Sometimes, when someone asks how things are going, we respond: "Same old, same old." But the truth is, there is no such thing as "same old, same old."

As we approach the new year, let us celebrate the excitement of our new relationship as rabbi and congregation. Let us keep our minds and hearts open to new experiences, to learning from each other, trying out new ideas, taking risks, and learning from our mistakes.

And let us also celebrate the possibility of change and growth that is present in our lives every day. Let us nourish opportunities for renewal throughout the year. And perhaps, most important of all, let us celebrate the unique song of each new day.

Yom Kippur is about asking forgiveness from God, but before we are permitted to ask God for forgiveness, we are required to ask forgiveness from other people. We will explore the importance of forgiving each other and ourselves as we approach the Days of Awe.

Please note a couple of important aspects of programming for this year:

Babysitting and children's programming will begin immediately following the service so that those parents who wish can attend services.
- The **regular morning services** will begin at 9:45 a.m.

- We are planning some **programming for Yom Kippur afternoon** that will keep you interested and entertained between the services (and keep your mind off the growling in your stomach). Stay tuned for more details.
