THE KING OF THE SEASON

Like many Canadians, I watched with somewhat detached curiosity as the king of England, Charles III, was crowned this past May. Always a fan of fancy rituals, I appreciated the costumes and the music, and found a genuine power in the formality of the entire affair. From the speeches to the parades and the beautiful music, there was more than enough pomp and circumstance to last me for weeks.

And being a rabbi, I couldn't help but make connections with this important event and Jewish tradition. While humility and simplicity may be a core value of Judaism, spectacle, pageantry, and of course the very concept of king are also important to Jewish life and ritual. We can start with the Temple in Jerusalem, whose beauty, architecture and size was meant to inspire awe. Or there was the royal clothing of the kohen gadol, the high priest who wore a sash made of "gold, the blue, purple, and crimson yarns, and the fine linen" (Shemot 28:4-5). Our ancestors even loved a good parade, as the mishnah describes the ritual of the bikkurim, the

PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

Ellayne Kaplan

I am very grateful to have the opportunity to serve this congregation - again. I have been a member of Dorshei Emet since 1976 and acted as President from 1999-2001. Belonging here has been an integral part of my adult life, and a profound experience for my husband, our children and our late parents.

When I became president in 1999, Dorshei Emet was facing unique challenges including a burgeoning membership and a crumbling building. Going into the two-year commitment, I never expected it to end with a major capital campaign and a unanimous decision to build this synagogue; two years saw many changes. Today, we are facing a smaller membership, for a multiplicity of reasons, and a building that seems to need more and more attention.

During the recent graduation ceremony of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College, President Rabbi Deborah Waxman talked about "being open to the inevitability of change". During one of my first speeches as president, twentyfour years ago, I read this quote from

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The Hill We Climb

The news that a Florida school was banning the poem "The Hill We Climb," recited by Amanda Gorman at President Biden's inauguration in 2021, reminded me of these lines in the poem:

Somehow we've weathered and witnessed

a nation that isn't broken,

but simply unfinished.

This idea of a broken world has been repeated in the past several years. Still, I prefer to look at things more optimistically, as outlined in the poem. If you have experienced a household appliance break in the last decade, you know that repair is often much more expensive than replacement. Broken is often a dead end.

Looking at an issue as unfinished instead of broken aligns with my role as Executive Director and with how I approach my personal life. I like to consider the Jewish tradition of tikkun olam, repairing the world, which emphasizes the action of making things better, not getting stuck on the diagnosis of every detail that is not perfect.

Many issues at Dorshei Emet still need to be finished, systems need to be put in place, policies should be adopted, improvements are required. It is easy to be overwhelmed by the to-do list. We are NOT broken, but change takes time and progress is often achieved slowly. I am the first to admit that I can get frustrated at the pace.

I have a sign in my office that says, "A goal without a plan is just a wish." Making those plans is where I come in. I enjoy the planning process and the implementation. Developing and managing these plans is my small part of repairing and improving what is unfinished here at the shul.

I am ambitious both for myself and for Dorshei Emet. Getting mired in the paralysis of brokenness is a trap. The declining membership of some shuls in Montreal and even North America does not temper my vision for Dorshei. Some shuls are thriving, and that should be us. The opportunity is to refrain from attempting to copy successful shuls and not to simply market what we currently have. The path requires us to critically evaluate what we are doing, define our goals and implement dynamic and exciting plans that meet the needs of the Montreal community today. It takes courage and discipline to examine yourself through a critical lens; it's not always easy to see yourself clearly.

The hill we climb at Dorshei is to continue to repair the world, our world. Contact me to discuss how you can be part of the process this year. The members of Dorshei Emet and our connection are the secret weapons!

On behalf of my family and the Dorshei Emet staff, I wish you all a Shana Tova. My wish is that 5784 is the year when we move together past brokenness and into the joy of repair.

Don has represented Indigenous concerns at many international conferences, including his recent attendance at the United Nation's General Assembly during the passing of the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

Don holds a Bachelor of Arts in Economics from UWO, a Bachelor of Laws from U of T, a Bachelor of Civil Law from McGill, and a Master of Laws from the University of Arizona James E. Rogers College of Law. Over the years, Don has taught treaty law and Indigenous rights at several American universities. He has lectured at McGill and has represented Indigenous interests around the world.







YIZKOR BOOK

This year, right after Passover, I lost one of my closest friends of many years. I first met Suzie when I was 14 years old and we had been friends since then. Though we didn't live in the same place, we had been in contact constantly, even before Facebook and emails. Suzie would write long letters, always starting with B'H in the top corner of the first page and ending with rows and rows of X's and O's on the last page. In between, she would provide limitless minutiae, brightening my day.

Suzie was the first of my friends to pass away, and it has made me feel vulnerable. By honouring her in the Dorshei Emet Yizkor Book, along with our parents and relatives, my wife Sandy and I have made the 5784 edition especially personal and meaningful.

This year, 88 members submitted 485 names to be honoured in the Yizkor Book. Overall, we raised about \$6,500 for the Cemetery Fund, giving us a total to date of over \$35,000. The Cemetery Committee is still looking at ways to beautify and improve our cemetery using these funds.

A few years ago, we launched the Dorshei Emet Memory Book, found on our website. We now have 40 memories on the site and, every time I look at the entries, including the three that I have submitted, a tear comes to my eye. I plan to upload a story about Suzie, and I encourage all of you to take a look at the site. If you have submitted names to be honoured this year, why not add their stories to the Memory Book?

giving of the first fruits: "An ox would go in front of them, his horns bedecked with gold and with an olive-crown on its head. The flute would play before them until they would draw close to Jerusalem" (Mishnah Bikkurim 3:3).

While the Temple may be gone and the parades are no more, the royalty of our faith holds strong especially as we enter the High Holiday season. The theme of kingship in a very real way commands this time of year, appearing in the liturgy and taking a key role in the spiritual themes of the holidays. From the Rosh Hashanah services of Malchuyot, to the haunting melody of Avinu Malkeinu, no matter what our theology may be, we are confronted again and again with the idea of kingship, power and faith.


The challenge and the blessing is that the "melech ha'olam", the heavenly king, has

no physical or earthly representation, and we can only know this power through our experience of the world and our spiritual lives. Yet it is on Rosh Hashanah, the start of the High Holiday season, that we are said to crown God as king, to celebrate with our own coronation and veneration. We sing, we offer speeches and we honor the holiness of the community and each other.

I am a proud Reconstructionist and I don't believe in a supernatural God beyond me who controls my life as a king would Moreover, the very gendered notion of this power is quite problematic. Yet I am willing to see the compelling symbolism of this grand idea. We celebrate kingship by honoring the powers beyond us and holding on to the mystery of our lives and we celebrate the beauty of our world through the experience of communal gathering. We accept the powers of

our existence that we can't control: the science of the cosmos, the weather, the environment and the strength and the fragility of our physical bodies. No political or earthly power can ever control the fullness of our existence in this way and, whatever we may choose to call it, this power deserves some respect.

In difficult times such as ours, we need a powerful and humble reminder that we do not control everything in our world. For our spiritual coronation season, we don't need any fancy clothes or long parades. We simply need to renew our commitment to living ethical lives, to fixing the brokenness in ourselves and the world, and to honour the reality that there will always be a mystery beyond us, always things we cannot control. King or not, that itself is a reminder we all need during this holiday season.

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

Tell Me More Art Appreciation with Audrey Berner
