How many more times can I talk about throwing a shoe? For over two and half years, a small group of Dorshei Emet members have been gathering most Fridays at noon to study Daf Yomi, a page of Talmud, making our way over the course of seven and a half years to study the entirety of this holy book. This complicated and fascinating text is arguably one of the most important books in Judaism, in some ways even more important than the Torah since it is the basis for all of the traditions and rituals of Jewish life. And what do the Talmudic rabbis discuss? They talk about everything! And even more, they get off on tangents like you wouldn't believe!

What might start as a question about a story in the Torah leads to a discussion about relationships. Then one rabbi comes in with a herbal remedy his friend gave him, which leads to a discussion about some strong opinions about the behavior of one's mother-in-law, and then a discussion about the intricate details of whether you can move an object on Shabbat. There are fascinating and enlightening discussions, and

The High Holiday Committee has been hard at work for the last several months. At this time, our focus is on in-house services although we will be offering a streaming alternative for those people unable to attend.

We are in the process of purchasing a camera to be installed under the balcony in the sanctuary. This will eliminate the computer on the bimah as well as the TV screen on the floor. Hopefully, this new installation will improve the quality of the audio and video of the streaming. We plan on testing this new equipment at several Shabbat services prior to the High Holidays.

Some of our favourite members are back and will be leading parts of the service with familiar niguns on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Our choir will sing on Erev Yom Kippur with one of our own members chanting Kol Nidre. This being the case, our Rabbi will be free to spend some quality time at the Children's Program.

The Children's Program is being planned by our new Director of Youth Programming, Miles Taffert, and will cater to different age groups. We are pleased so far with the direction it is going.

Our office staff is busy working out details for membership renewal which always includes High Holiday seats. In-house guest passes will be available for \$250.00 (reduced prices are available for children and teens) and passes for streamed services are \$108.00. As always, High Holiday tickets are included for members at no charge.

This being said, we are aware that the Covid situation is still an unknown. We feel confident that, should we need to make any adjustments, the transition will be very easy.

Looking forward to seeing and welcoming you to our High Holiday services.



Dorshei Emet Ukrainian Support Working Group in Action

The Working Group has continued to be quite active in raising funds for humanitarian aid in Ukraine and in providing support to Ukrainians who have arrived in Montreal in collaboration with our Ukrainian Canadian Congress and Ometz partners.

Largely through the efforts of Ukrainian Support Working Group member Carmela Aigen, supported by very generous DE donors, around \$5,000 as well as donations of camping goods were collected to provide supplies for several Ukrainian Jewish teenagers going to Camp Bnai Brith this summer. With the help of Peggi Cohen Rabinovitch, Carmela shopped for the extensive list of items needed. At Schreter's they stocked up on duffel bags, overnight bags, hats, flashlights and other camping essentials. A large tip of the hat to Steve Schreter who totaled up the mountain of goods and then donated it all, free of charge! At a department store, they got everything from shampoo to sheets, water goggles

to water bottles. Those teens are now fully outfitted thanks to everyone who contributed to this project. Mission accomplished for these teens - but Ometz subsequently identified more Ukrainian teenagers waiting to go to camp so the fundraising continued.

In collaboration with the Ukrainian Canadian Congress (UCC) Task Force aiding newly arrived Ukrainians, Ukrainian Support Working Group member Debbie Carroll is working on integrating music therapy into the psychosocial support workshops currently being set up for newly arrived Ukrainian mothers and children who need mental health support.

We are also trying to identify DE members or their colleagues who are licensed mental health professionals to provide mental health support to Ukrainians and their families who have fled the war and recently arrived in Montreal through a program of the McGill Psychology Clinic. The clinic is looking for psychologists, psychotherapists, clinical social workers,

and counselors willing to contribute at least one hour per week of individual or family therapy/counseling with clients or to provide clinical supervision to eligible student volunteers. For more details see: www.mcgill.ca/psychology/clinic/ukrainian-aid-initiative.

Susan Stock represented our Working Group at a Ukraine Round Table held June 14, 2022, organised by Ometz for agencies and individuals providing services to newly arrived Jewish Ukrainians.

In the Shadow of Dorshei

Having lived close by the shul for the past 30 years, "In the Shadow of Dorshei" is an occasional column about the people I've met and the experiences I've had during my daily walk around the neighbourhood.

Ch. 1 - A matter of orthodoxy

One recent Shabbat, I ran into Simon, a former neighbour of modern orthodox persuasion, on Aldred, at the corner of Netherwood, who was returning from services at the Adath Israel, nearby on Harrow. We chat as we walk together. I ask, how is it that *frum* kids (their *kipot* and *tzitzit* on proud display) can play basketball on Shabbat? He tells me there's an *eruv* all

around Hampstead - has been for 50 years - so moms pushing a stroller, kids making like LeBron on Shabbat, is kosher. "They're kids: let them have fun!" He says the *eruv* has to be inspected regularly, though, to make sure it's still intact (e.g., that it hasn't fallen down during a blizzard) and, actually, is checked before every Shabbat! We part company at his home and I head for a pedestrian path connecting Aldred to Cleve. At Cleve, I run into a senior member of the Montreal Torah Centre (MTC), whom I've occasionally met and chatted with on my walks whose name, I think, is Yitzhak. He lives in the neighbourhood too and is known to be an erudite biblical and Talmudic scholar. I ask him his opinion on kids shooting hoops within the *eruv* on Shabbat. He kind of shrugs but doesn't answer the question directly (though my impression is he isn't an enthusiastic supporter of the practice). I ask him, then, whether somebody can move furniture from one place to another within the *eruv* on Saturday. He says, emphatically, "No. It's not in the spirit of Shabbat", which leaves me wondering why one activity merits the *hechsher*, so to speak, but the other not. Before I can ask him this, he starts to leave, but says, on departing, "Come to the MTC. You'll get all the answers". I tell him I already pass it twice a day (outgoing and incoming on my daily constitutional). He says, "That's not enough. You have to come *inside*. That's where your body and your *neshamah* will join." He brings his palms together, intertwining his fingers. I nod and smile and we then continue on our respective journeys.

some difficult and even horrific ones. Sometimes it feels like you are sitting in on the most scatterbrained mess of a conversation you have ever heard; to study the Talmud definitely involves a strong focus and sometimes more than a few notes and charts. Amazingly, in Talmudic discussions, it is very common to ask a question and, after many pages of discussions, tangents and stories, the rabbis move on to a new topic before the question is even answered!

And what is the point of this strange structure? On a practical level, we could argue that it was simply the reality of trying to record too many complicated ideas from a group of opinionated Jews and there is bound to be a little bit of rambling. Yet on a deeper level, the Talmud is telling us something very important about life. Everything is connected. Faith, identity, food, love, history, work, swimming,

weather, sex, justice, prayers, women, men, gender, mathematics, the intricate details of a Hebrew letter and the deepest questions of human interactions. It is all a shimmering web of connection and mystery. These creators of Jewish life as we know it wanted us to see these connections in everything, to know in the deepest possible way that Judaism is not just about believing in a God, or connecting with our past, but it is about finding holiness in all parts of life and questioning everything we do. If everything is connected and worth examining in detail the way the Talmudic rabbis do, then every word, every experience and truly every moment is a blessing, an exercise deserving of examination and an adventure waiting to be had.

It is during these strange times, with Covid, environmental challenges, political strife and so much else that we are

confronted with each day, that the model of Daf Yomi is one thing that actually makes sense in this broken world. This most unique of Jewish rituals reminds us to stay committed to each other, no matter what the world throws at us, while also never giving up on the past or a vision for a better future. But above all we can be reminded to stay curious and that, no matter how difficult the challenge, know that we are obligated to work to find an answer. It is not an easy task but we never know what wisdom we will find on each new page that we uncover.

I look forward to exploring the next chapter of our community with you and wish you a Shana Tova and a sweet new year!

The Greening of Dorshei Emet

Dorshei Emet's Social Justice Committee has embarked on a "Greening the Shul" project to do our part in addressing the climate crisis by reducing the synagogue's carbon footprint in a cost-effective manner.

Our subcommittee is looking at the many aspects of the shul that impact the environment such as:

- a) energy usage including heating, lighting, kitchen appliances.
- b) water usage.
- c) office equipment.
- d) cleaning products.
- e) dishes and cutlery.

In June, we were accompanied by our Executive Director for a building walkthrough that familiarized us with the building's current state. A side benefit of this walkthrough was to finally meet in person after having met only on Zoom since we formed the subcommittee in February 2022.

Once we've completed our information gathering and have a good sense of what's in the building, our plan is to call upon the services of a professional energy auditor to

conduct a virtual audit. During the audit, the auditor will make recommendations as to what changes we could make to help reduce our carbon footprint. We have chosen to work with an energy auditor from *Faith & the Common Good*, a national interfaith charitable network dedicated to assisting and inspiring religious congregations of all backgrounds to take action in creating a more sustainable environment.

We are also in the process of contacting resources that subsidize "greening projects" such as city, provincial, and federal government programs that we could tap into to help reduce costs involved in implementing improvements.

After we have conducted the virtual audit and have identified applicable subsidy programs, we will present our findings to the DE Board and the House Committee and, in collaboration with them, prioritize improvements and prepare an implementation plan.

As chair of this subcommittee, I look forward to continuing to work with the team to realize our goal to reduce Dorshei Emet's carbon footprint and possibly have our shul serve as a model for other synagogues that wish to green their space.

Some programs and services naturally lend themselves to the in-person format, where body language and proximity elevate the experience, along with singing and dancing in unison. Others lend themselves better to the Zoom format, enhanced by up-close (and unmasked) facial expressions and instantaneous side chats. Hybrid events, while philosophically ideal, especially as the first step of transition, are losing favor in many domains, as it is challenging to cater to two different audiences and give them each the full attention that they deserve, as well as to minimize distractions.

We are exploring that delicate balance, offering some events only in-person, others only on Zoom. Hybrid events will

sometimes be fully participatory and sometimes more of a live stream, but services will allow for the mentioning of a loved one for a *yahrzeit* or a *refuah shlema* in some format. Not all events will be hybrid. Our choices will be thought-through and we will communicate the format in advance - in our advertising of the event as well as timely messages, such as Rabbi Boris' message about transitioning away from screens in the sanctuary this past July. Logistics will play a role. For example, a walking tour will be in-person but an out-of-town speaker will be on Zoom. We are working on improving our technology to match this transition so that when we do have hybrid or fully remote events, the sound and

video quality will be improved on both sides of the screen.

We are approaching this transition with the nostalgia of all the creativity that we discovered and accomplished during the height of the restrictions and with the anticipation of the next chapter of our communal life.

From my family to yours, we wish you a *Shana tovah, G'mar chatimah tovah* and *Chag Sukkot sameach!*

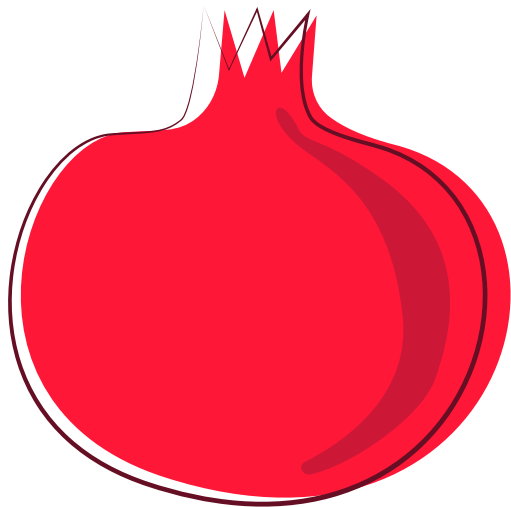

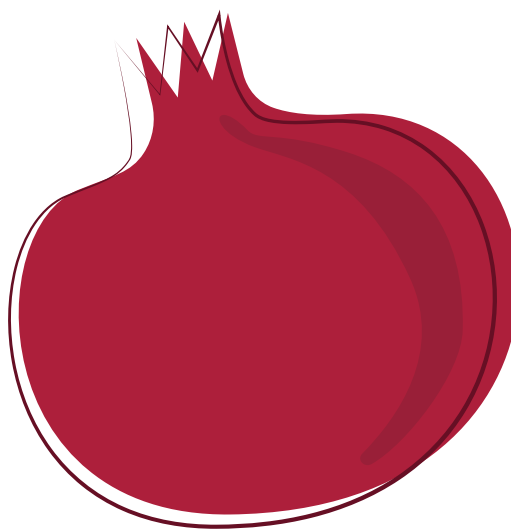
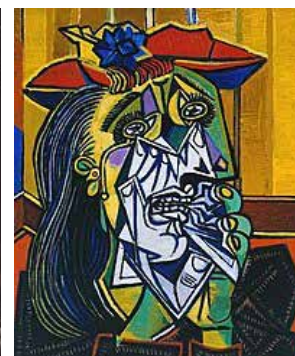
Jeanette Singerman has taken many of her classes, and this is what she has to say:

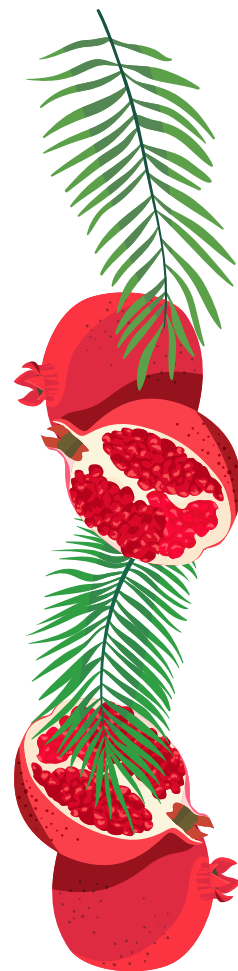

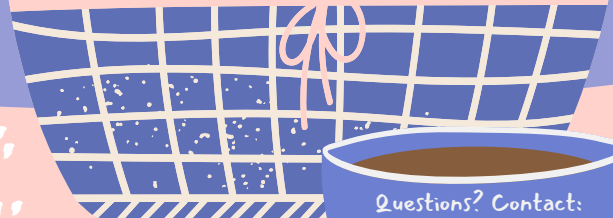
