In our community, Purim will forever be a marker of this pandemic. I remember it well. Two years ago, we gathered together to celebrate the holiday just days before the world shut down. We were not yet wearing masks and didn't quite understand social distancing, but there was also a palpable and eerie sense that the world was about to change. By the next Shabbat, it did. Lockdowns, masks, hand washing, fear and separation. Months would pass before we could even begin to make sense of this new reality. That Purim became a strange farewell to normal.

Yet by the next Purim a year in, still stuck and confused, we had at least learned how to be creative. We had made the best of the situation and found ways to stay connected and respond to whatever the world threw at us day to day. Unable to gather in person, with no dancing, no food, and definitely no opportunity for in-person communal joy, we made it work. Community members read the story of Purim from home with passion and meaning. We saw close-ups of a doll house version of Shushan, where parents

"WON'T YOU JOIN MY COMMITTEE?"

In the Response and Renewal Survey circulated in January 2021, many members expressed interest in learning more about Dorshei Emet's committees and, especially, how to become involved. Since then, a serious push has been made to restore and re-energize committees. The effort continues, but its success depends on active participation from our wonderful members! Our community has a tremendous range of interests, talents and skills – let's put this power to work and enhance our shul as we enhance our own experience.

Our By-laws list a number of committees which are needed in order to ensure the efficient management as well as support the ethical underpinnings of Dorshei Emet's mission. These include:

- Finance
- Fundraising and Resource development
- Membership (Inreach & Outreach)
- House & Maintenance
- Cemetery
- Program
- MInhaq (Ritual Practices)
- Tikkun Olam/Social Justice
- Communications

While most of these committees are functioning smoothly, Fundraising and Communications are currently without leadership.

This is how Dorshei Emet committees are structured:

- A committee must have a Chair or Co-Chairs; the Chairs of the groups listed above are invited by the President. The Chair invites other synagogue members to participate. The Chair reports to the President and Board of Directors.
- A committee often branches out into subcommittees to work on smaller-scaled projects. The subcommittees report to the committee Chair.

Sound complicated? It's not. You don't need a degree or professional training to create magic! All it takes is willingness to get involved, to share ideas and to act. Some committees include engagement in activities, some focus on data-crunching and paperwork and others involve reaching out to members personally. Small tasks or big tasks, all contribute to the well-being of our community.

In November 2021 things were looking up, and the shul was planning live programming - two Chanukah parties (one indoor) and Shabbat Shira in January. I created a committee with Sheila Greenberg, Yael Acre and Joelle Dayan and we called 80 members to encourage them to attend both activities. We also wanted to make sure that they felt the shul was a safe place vis-à-vis Covid-related concerns they might have.

Our strategy was to do whatever possible to encourage members to continue our wonderful tradition of bringing people together in our Dorshei home.

Most members we called agreed that we were doing everything possible to prevent the spread of Covid. Some people had underlying health concerns, or simply did not want to be exposed to anyone indoors. However, since Covid was under relative control and most members felt comfortable with our protocols, Covid was not a huge impediment to attendance and many were looking forward to getting back to normal.

Unfortunately Omicron hit.....but we have high hopes to get moving again soon!

One of the most important raisons d'être of any synagogue is to provide burial rights to its members. Dorshei Emet's cemetery, located in Eternal Gardens in Beaconsfield, is the final resting place for many of the cherished members who have made our community what it is. Though the basics of cemetery management are handled by the shul office, other issues require ongoing reflection – Should we purchase more land to meet future needs? How do we deal with the burial of non-Jewish spouses? As Jewish life evolves, so do our members' needs.

The Cemetery Committee meets a few times a year to look at these issues as well as others. A committee member would have a good understanding of Jewish customs, as well as sensitivity to the needs of our membership.

Contributing to this effort is a way to make a vital and lasting contribution to your community.

I am the proud Chair of the Yizkor Book Committee since its inception over four years ago. This book has become a wonderful resource for shul members, giving us a chance to honour the loved ones we have lost. In the current edition we have added some wonderful readings in French, and recently the Memory Book was created and placed on the shul website. The YB Committee meets about four times each year during its "season" from early in the calendar year through its wrap-up meeting after the High Holidays. The Content Subcommittee, chaired by Rabbi Jonathan Cohen, meets a few times separately as well.

and kids hilariously acted out chapters of the story. We were invited into people's living rooms and dining rooms as theatrical (and sometimes wonderfully over-theatrical) readings made their way to our computer screens. We laughed, we smiled, we booed Haman's name. While it may not have been what we were used to, it was a moment of incredible pride and perseverance when we were able to show as individuals and as a community that we could make it through tough times.

There is an idea from the Musar ethical tradition, the value of miyut ta'anug, limiting pleasure, that can inform how we can encounter these times. Over the past few years, we have been forced, through no fault of our own, to limit our happiness. We have experienced loss, sadness, fear and all too much separation. So many people, places and events, the things that brought us joy, were taken from us, and we have had no choice but to find new ways to search out meaning and joy. Without the movies, the plays and the big and small social events that kept us feeling connected, we made the best of (and likely got tired of) connecting on Zoom or online. We met friends outside, we screamed from our porches and balconies. We found a way to make it work. Now two years in, we hopefully can gain strength from the fact that we made it this far, and that through it all we did somehow find a way to hold on. We found enjoyment from life, even amid the challenges.

We can learn from the new kind of joy we have found in these pandemic times.

In the story of the Exodus, it is often asked why, at the end of the journey of the Israelites, the Torah was given in the desert instead of in the Holy Land, the place of stability and comfort. One tradition points out that the Torah was given in the barren desert specifically because it was a place of limited physical pleasures. If we are less attached to the need for physical gratification, then there is less to prevent us from the inner calm and wisdom that leads to greater spiritual growth.

Although I acknowledge that it is not much relief during a pandemic to be thankful for a lack of overwhelming joy, the challenges may very well teach us to be happier with less, to feel more settled in a world that lacks access to easy convenient happiness. When confronted with a tough reality, we have no choice but to be creative and to dig deeper to find new sources of connection, light and hope.

Remember that a key theme of Purim is hiddenness. From Esther's name to the hidden power of God in a story that

doesn't mention God's name, this is the season for searching. Whether it is the celebration of Purim or another holiday, or all the ways that this pandemic has changed us, I think we will all leave this journey with a new commitment to creativity and perseverance in the face of the challenges that confront us. There is meaning and there is joy even when they are hard to find.

aliyot, no Haftarah reading) but when we felt that we were straying too far from our traditions, we reintroduced more consistent aliyot and a once-monthly Haftarah reading and full Torah reading. This will allow for a smoother transition back to larger in-person services and a return to "normalcy."

When we realized that too much time had passed since we'd had an active Social Justice Committee, one of the core tenets of our Vision, Mission, Values and Pillars, we poured our efforts into getting the committee re-energized. As you will read in this newsletter, while it maintains our core values, its mission has evolved with the times and will look at new ways of addressing injustice and food insecurity.

Similarly, when we endorsed the performance of interfaith weddings a few years ago, this was consistent with our tradition of being inclusive of non-Jewish spouses in our membership. At that time, we undertook to integrate those couples into our community. It is now time to envision how we will fulfill that undertaking. You will hear more about our participation in the Spark Montreal initiative.

These visions exemplify our mandate to continue evolving with our past in mind and to build for the future. I hope that each member finds his/her place, feels connected to our traditions and is excited for our future. I hope that each member finds a way to participate in this continuity, whether by joining committees, providing feedback to the Board or promoting the shul, and by supporting us financially. Chag Purim sameach & Chag Pesach sameach!



Dorshei Emet's Indigenous Chevruta was proud to present the film "The Last Days of Okak" last January 10.

The film tells the story of the Inuit village of Okak on the northern Labrador coast. In late 1918, a Moravian missionary ship brought the Spanish influenza to the community, killing 204 of its 263 inhabitants. Using a missionary's diary, old photos and interviews with four survivors, the film relates



the story of the epidemic, it's effect on the village and the relationship between lnuit and missionaries. The film's co-creator, Anne Budgell, presented the film and afterwards provided fascinating background information in a discussion with participants.

Though nowhere on earth was the flu more deadly than in isolated communities on the coast of Labrador, the story of Okak was a revelation to our audience. This tale of trauma and resilience and the insight provided by Anne inspired many comments: "Thought-provoking", "honest", "extraordinary".

Anne shared many anecdotes with us, including this one: At a conference on public health that Anne attended, Dr. Theresa Tam (current Chief Public Health Officer of Canada) mentioned during a panel that when it was released, in 1985, "The Last Days of Okak" opened her eyes to issues of culture-based discrimination in public health, and inspired the course of her education and career. For Anne, that moment was both humbling and proud, and she had the chance to discuss it further with Dr. Tam on this and other occasions.

Anne Budgell, co-director of the film, is a journalist who worked with CBC radio and television in Newfoundland and Labrador for over thirty years. Her mother was the daughter of a Labrador fur trapper and her father, the son of a Hudson's Bay Company factor. She is the author of "We All Expected to Die: Spanish Influenza in Labrador 1918-1919."

Meditation Minyan

The Meditation Minyan has been a constant at Dorshei Emet since its introduction by Rabbi Ron, z"l. Jewish meditation has a long history including "introspection, visualization, emotional insight, contemplation of divine names, and concentration on philosophical, ethical or mystical ideas".

The Meditation Minyan takes place Wednesday mornings at 7:30 AM. Since the pandemic, it has been a Zoom event. A teaching or reading is presented related to the coming Shabbat's parsha or to a current event in the Jewish world. This is followed by 20 minutes of meditation. The group is called back to consciousness by chanting the *shema* together. The group chant works well even though group singing on Zoom usually does not.

After meditation, the floor is open for comments by participants. The contributions vary from participants' reaction to the presentation or their own learnings or realizations during their meditation.

A sense of community has developed in a new way. Though we are not gathering together in a circle in the *parnass* section of the sanctuary, as with many of our pre-Covid experiences, the Meditation Minyan goes on to fulfill the need for introspection and togetherness.





Celebrating Chanukah at Dorshei Emet

YIZKOR BOOK

This will be the fifth year of the Dorshei Emet Yizkor Book. When we started this project, our objective was to create a booklet that would contain the prayers used during the Yizkor services and where members could inscribe the names of their loved ones to honour them.

Were we modest!

The 5782 edition of the Yizkor Book contains all those prayers as well as readings, poems and prayers in Hebrew, English, French and Yiddish (as well as transliterated from Hebrew to English) that can be used throughout the year to mark the occasions when we remember our departed loved ones. It has the names of over 500 individuals honoured by over 100 of our members. Over four years, the Yizkor Book project has raised almost \$24,000 that is being used to improve and enhance our cemetery.

It is our Book, developed by the members for our members.

In 5782, we also launched an online Memory Book where members who inscribed names in the Yizkor Book could share memories of their loved ones online with the members of Dorshei Emet. So far, 15 members have posted 32 stories. They are truly moving and well worth browsing. Bring a tissue.

And this year we will continue the effort. We will add more content, and we welcome your suggestions. We will shorten the solicitation period, from April 1 to June 30. We will again solicit stories for the Memory Book and will be exploring ways to make the Memory Book more visible and meaningful to our members.

We want your ideas, we need your help as a member of the Committee, and we encourage you to participate in both the Yizkor and Memory Books by submitting names and stories. PASSOVER WILL BE...

This year's Passover will...be. That's about all that I can say at this point, as I write this message in January heading out of the most recent shutdown. Two years of sitting at the seder table with too much food and not enough people, with two extra seats, one for Elijah and one for my laptop. We are ready to move on. No matter what these next few months bring, I know that we are all looking forward to a change for this year's seder.

Wherever we find ourselves this Passover, we know it will be a holiday filled with so much opportunity. Once again, we will tell the same story, the story of suffering, of wandering and of eventual freedom. We will make connections between the story and the pandemic experience, and will find a way to celebrate, and eat, even if it is not in the same way that we have before. We will sing, we will learn and we may argue a bit. And even if the experience is not quite what we expect, we can say shehecheyanu, reminding ourselves of the simple blessing of being able to celebrate another year of life.

I hope that the pandemic experience can inspire us to continue to improve Jewish life and to commit ourselves to the necessary task of making our Jewish experiences more creative, more relevant and more meaningful. Remember, part of the experience of Passover is to both follow a plan, using the "seder of the seder" (the "order"), but also to do what we can to make it our own. Those unique family traditions, those special recipes, those strange rituals; these were not part of the original Haggadah but the additions were what we were supposed to bring into the holiday. We make connections between the Passover story and current events and issues, and some even put additional items on the seder plate to symbolize these ideas in our lives. (I am not yet sure what symbol would be most reflective of the pandemic experience...a roll of toilet paper maybe?) Imagine the possibilities for so much more meaning and connections as we make our way out of the pandemic.

And as we reconstruct and reclaim our Judaism this Pesach, this holiday of freedom, I hope we can do the same for the rest of our lives. May we do all that we can to strengthen our relationships, to connect with community, to give back to others, and to make a better world for the next generation.
