It's hard to believe that this is my last newsletter message as President. In some ways, the past two years have flown by, but when I think about all that has changed, I realize how much has filled that time.

During this time, we emerged from the most restrictive parts of the pandemic and slowly found our way from fully online life to in-person and hybrid community life. We strived to find the right balance for members who were ready to come back into the building and those we were, and are still, more comfortable at home.

When I took on this role, we were just about to resume in-person services for the first time, with strict guidelines and no kiddush. Board meetings were all on Zoom, as were all speakers and events, including for holidays. Many committees were dormant. The staff was working from home full-time.

Today, we have returned to mostly in-person life, but have adapted some practices both to incorporate

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The search for opportunities

Part of my role as Executive Director is keeping my eyes open for new opportunities for the shul, including new income streams. Over the last several years, I have successfully applied for many grants from Federation CJA and the federal government, resulting in over \$70,000 in new funding.

The funding from these grants has primarily gone toward programming. It is a great source of pride for me when I am asked by members of other synagogue boards and executive directors from other shuls how Dorshei Emet can afford to offer the wide array of programs that we have on the calendar. They are very impressed!

Applying for these grants is an enormous job. I feel privileged to work with Oria Lissak, our outstanding Program Director. Together we work on ideas and budgets for the proposals that we submit. Most planning must be complete for the proposal to be accepted. In many cases, we are working a year ahead. I also count on support and encouragement from Anthony Housefather, the member of parliament for the Mount Royal riding, and Abba Brodt from Federation CJA. They have both been very generous with their time and wonderful advice. These community relationships are invaluable.

I was recently notified that my application submitted under the **New Horizons for Seniors Program** from the Canadian government was approved for \$17,000.



This grant will fund our 2023 Sages of All Ages project. Dorshei Emet has offered this series for three years and we have many exciting plans in the works. The upcoming year will be our most ambitious one yet. Much to my chagrin, seniors under this program are defined as 50+, so I fall into this category!

The Annual Giving Campaign is another area of funding that I oversee. I would like to thank everyone who generously donated to our successful 5783 campaign. These funds help bridge the gap between membership dues and the actual cost of running the shul. They are essential to provide everything we all love about Dorshei. The markets might not be a sure thing these days, but your investment in Dorshei is sure to pay off!

Why do we ask you to register?

Since we have returned to in-person programs and services at Dorshei Emet, we have tried to impress upon all participants the importance of registering for programs, services, events, and kiddushes, even when there is no charge to attend. We want to explain why it is important that you register early and respect registration deadlines.

Everything requires planning and setup. A well-run program or kiddush requires time and attention at the planning stage. We use the number of registrants to guide us in this planning—lastminute registration results in hurried adjustments and last-minute purchases.

Knowing how many people are planning to attend a program or service allows us to avoid food waste and unused supplies. We also use the number of registrants to decide which room to use for programs and how many tables and chairs to set up. When the numbers are not accurate, we either have seating for too many or too few which results in not achieving the desired atmosphere.

We also use the number of registrants to review the success of programs and the number of participants at programs, services, or kiddush. We can review the breakdown of participants who are members and non-members, and follow up with targeted email invitations for future programs for similar events. Events do not end for us when you leave the building. We learn from the number and composition of participants to inform our future plans.

We sincerely wish to have the correct amount of food, supplies, and chairs at every event, program, and kiddush and to offer excellent programming every time. It is only with your registration that we can achieve this.

Please register every time and early on! Don't wait until the last minute and, if there is a deadline, please respect the deadline. If we work together, every service, kiddush, program, and event will be as good as we can make it and we will be able to afford more of them!

kind of wisdom that has surprised us with its power and the speed at which it has been improving. While it is clear that this is going to be an important part of our lives, as many people have warned over the past few months, it is a part of our lives that may have come too fast. Top scientists and researchers have warned us to be careful and to make sure our minds and our society can catch up to the reality of this new world of high-tech wisdom.

Jewish tradition gives us a helpful safety net for wisdom through the concept of Mesorah, the transmission of Jewish tradition. We are reminded through our religious and ethical texts that ideas are always rooted in something before us. The Talmud, the core text of our tradition, takes this so seriously that often before a new idea is even introduced, we read lines and lines of attribution: "Rabbi Shmuel said in the name of Rabbi Yosi, who had heard it from Rabbi Hillel, who once was told a story about his father's friend who knew this Torah from a rabbi who visited his village." While those who study Talmud can easily get tired of these long attributions, they serve a very important purpose. Any new piece of information, any bit of wisdom only truly serves its purpose if we know where it came from. If we can connect it to a real person with lived experience, feelings and a story of their own, then we know that the wisdom and information can more easily become part of us. Imagine the most creative story AI could create, voiced by a generated image and voice on your phone, and compare that to a story told by a grandparent around the Shabbat table. When you know the person who is passing down the wisdom, you are more willing to listen.

Wisdom works best in community. While AI may be able to answer questions and be creative, the deepest wisdom comes from those who know your story, who can look into your eyes and see what your needs and questions mean beyond the words and even the questions itself. As this technology improves, it may truly help us communicate better and maybe even fix some of the challenges we find in our society. Yet, the deepest wisdom can never be fit into an algorithm, and I hope human contact and relationships will continue to be the core of how we function as a community. We know that we will always be stronger if we honor the wisdom that we receive from each other.

All this being said, I was still worried just enough to check to make sure I am not replaceable. So I asked the chatbot if I have a future in my role as a rabbi. It answered back:

"While I can provide information and answer questions related to Judaism, I cannot replace the knowledge, experience, and personal relationships thatrabbishave with their congregations."

We should all know our limitations. Well, at least that is some wisdom I can hold on to!



The programming year for the Indigenous Learning Chevruta was incredibly rich and interesting. Our three main activities were the Indigenous Lives Speaker Series, museum visits and the Indigenous Canada Course developed by the University of Alberta.

The Indigenous Lives programs, Zoom discussions with Indigenous people in the Montreal region and elsewhere in Quebec, gave Dorshei Emet members and friends a casual and warm entrée into the lives and work of Indigenous neighbours.

Our first guest was Carole Brazeau, an Anishnabe from Kitigan Zibi, who works as a curriculum developer at Concordia University. She has had a fascinating career in many Indigenous organizations, including the Quebec Native Women's Association.

Our second guest was Nina Segalowitz, who is Inuvialuit/Chipewyan. She is a talented throat singer who currently works on community outreach at the Southern Quebec Inuit Association in Montreal. Among other topics, she spoke movingly about her connection to Judaism through her adoptive father.

Our third guest of the 2022-23 season was Betty Ann Forward, who is Eeyou/Eenou (Cree) and an educator in Quebec's Cree community.

We are looking forward to introducing more marvelous First Nations, Inuit and Métis guests in 2023-24!

Twenty synagogue members signed up for the 12-week **Indigenous Canada Course** to do some concrete learning about First Nations, Inuit and Métis people in Canada. Some of the subjects covered included Indigenous world views, contact with European settlers, education, treaties and the current experience and activism of these peoples in Canada. We established a WhatsApp group for exchanging comments and met after every three sessions to discuss what we had covered in the previous weeks.

Join us for more fascinating experiences as we explore Indigenous identity, history and culture!

Museum Visits

Along with the visit to the Canadian Centre for Architecture to see ⊲∿Ր⁵Ҁ⅃⊂ / Ruovttu Guvlui / Vers Chez Soi, we took part in a quided tour at the Musée des Beaux-arts. The exhibition Tusarnitut!, Music of the North, highlighted art born of the musical culture of northern communities. The two main types of music-making portrayed were drum dancing and throat singing. Both are considered friendly competitions, the first being largely performed by men and the latter by women. Along with videos, we saw beautiful drawings and sculptures by both traditional and contemporary Inuit artists, archival photographs and examples of the various instruments used in the north. We were blessed with an amazing docent, who shared her appreciation and enthusiasm with us. The exhibit also showed the melding of traditions as the inhabitants of the north come into contact with settlers and their music, similar to the Labrador Inuit brass band we saw in The Last Days of Okak; a sweet and touching moment we shared last year. We have also had a guided visit at the Museé des Beauxarts to see the works of Dempsey Bob, a carver of Tahltan and Tlingit descent.



Suzie was a survivor, having suffered through cancer for many, many years. And all that time, she continued to be

upbeat and be our sister. When the end came, we cried. She had left a hole in our hearts that won't heal for a long time.

By honouring Suzie, as well as our parents, grandparents and other family members, we are bringing them back, closer to us. Every time we open the Yizkor Book, be it for the Yizkor services, a yahrzeit, a shiva or just to find comfort in its prayers and readings, we turn to the page with the names we have honoured and recall our stories. We bring them closer. We don't forget. We honour them!

Again this year, Dorshei Emet will be publishing a new Yizkor Book, to be distributed for the first Yizkor service on Yom Kippur, September 25. This is YOUR opportunity to honour your friends and family who have passed

Shabbat Shira Concert: Lenka Lichtenberg's Thieves of Dreams: Songs of Theresienstadt's Secret Poetess

After a three-year hiatus, Dorshei Emet again presented our annual Shabbat Shira concert this February. We were so fortunate that Lenka Lichtenberg and her wonderful musicians from Toronto accepted to perform for us, on their way to winning a JUNO Award for Best Global Music Album of the Year!

The Shabbat Shira concert is a standout event for Dorshei Emet. It is a unique opportunity to highlight our congregation to the larger community. And that we truly did accomplish! The notable topic of the project garnered a ton of media attention and free publicity for Dorshei Emet. The Montreal Gazette had a full front-page story about Lenka and her project to coincide with International Holocaust Remembrance Day. Live interviews with Lenka were broadcast on CJAD Radio with Ken Connors and CBC-TV with Debra Arbec.

Artistically, the concert was a resounding success. In the words of Deborah Kraus: "Conceived and composed by Lichtenberg, the songs and interlude music were atmospheric, tightly woven and wonderfully performed... We were introduced to Lenka's amazing, beautiful Grandmother through poetry, songs, and photos. Lichtenberg drew us into the Czech world just before the war, the degradations and then deprivations that led to the concentration camp. Her grandmother's poetry helps us experience the feelings of a young, vibrant woman full of life and love. It was ninety minutes that flew by...The performance felt intimate, seamless, and focused on the very human emotions of betrayal, love and loss. Kudos to Lichtenberg and her musicians. Thank you for this moving experience."

Assessed by other metrics, the event fell short, particularly the attendance which was by far the smallest for any Shabbat Shira concert in the past ten years. In order to continue this concert series, we need the full support of our congregation and welcome your feedback and ideas.

It takes many helping hands to present a program like this. Immense thanks to Jonathan Halliday, the wonderful Dorshei office staff, and the many volunteers who helped make this concert possible. We would also like to thank our speaker, Dorshei member Judith Nemes Black, who has served as a Board member at the Montreal Holocaust Museum. She spoke to the important mission of keeping our collective memory of the Holocaust alive.

the best of what we learned and to be considerate of those who are not able to participate in in-person life. We have installed new camera technology to enhance the video and audio quality for those attending services online without obtrusive laptops and screens detracting too much from the experience for those in the sanctuary. Kiddushes have returned but in a more modest form and in ways that reduce some of the contact. Many speaker events and museum tours remain on Zoom but our celebrations (holidays and simchas) are in-person. Classes are offered in hybrid form. The Board meets in-person (with Zoom accommodations) but the Officers' meetings are on Zoom. The staff has returned to the office but with more flexibility for working from home in certain circumstances.

It has been wonderful to experience the "return" of many Dorshei Emet being traditions committees invigorated, the hiring of a new Youth Coordinator to bring our family and youth programming back to life, Shabbat Shira, Empty Bowls, a community seder, the welcoming of converts on Shavuot, bnei mitzvah in all their glory, etc. It has also been wonderful to see how some traditions have evolved, including a monthly rotation of what is included in services, the inclusion of more English during the reading of Megillat Esther, and the welcoming of more guests to our events, both in-person and online.

We continue to look at how to adapt and evolve our traditions, for this is at the core of our Reconstructionist roots. The pandemic just placed that approach in hyperdrive! The Board continues to look at membership, the use of our building and our place within the wider community on a regular basis. I know that the work on the Dorshei Emet vision which has begun over the past year or so will continue under the next President's mandate, because it is not the work or vision of one person or one group of people, but of the living organism that is Dorshei Emet.

I look forward to seeing you all at the Annual General Meeting.

A lot of people ask me why I do this. It's simple. My maternal grandparents were refugees. One of the ways my Zaidie solidified his "Canadianness" was learning to ski.

I have 1940s 16mm footage of my Bubby, Zaidie, uncle and mum skiing on Mount Royal with Park Avenue in the background. My mother taught me to ski before my second birthday.

When I became a journalist and spent the 1990s reporting out of Russia, I realized I'd won the lottery without having bought a ticket. I wished I could have thanked my grandparents for making such a great life for my cousins, brothers and me. *OuiCanski* has taught immigrants from 23 countries. It is my homage, my thank-you to my grandparents, for being the immigrants who took all the risks so I never had to.

OuiCanSki introduces immigrants and refugees to the wonders of winter and the joys of skiing

With Canadian pins on their sweaters and Canadian flags on the table, over 150 newlyarrived Canadians were introduced to cross-country and alpine skiing this winter.

In February, in conjunction with *Ometz*, 60 Ukrainian war refugees learned how to snowshoe and cross-country ski at *Camping Ste-Agathe* in the Laurentians. Some of the participants, who had never seen a snowshoe before, were enchanted by the floating sensation of walking atop snow. Others became giddy from learning to glide along the trails in the forest.

In March, *Ometz* and *OuiCanSki* were at it again. Eight-five more folks tried alpine skiing and learned how to pizza and french-fry their way down *Ski Montcalm* in Rawdon.

This program is about giving newcomers a whole new perspective on life in Canada.

"Most immigrants and refugees to Canada see winter as something they need to endure. They come to Canada and there is so much on their mind. They are just trying to survive. It never occurs to them that they can get out of the city and enjoy the mountains and the fresh air. It never occurs to them that winter and snow can be fun," said Kate Oursegova, *Ometz* Program Coordinator.

The new perspective that morning at Ski Montcalm? After two hours, almost everyone could make it up and down the magic carpet by themselves. The next step of their Quebec integration? Poutine. It was a culinary hit! Culture consumed, everyone headed back up the hill to perfect their newfound skills. By 4 pm, their transformation to full-fledged local was solidified with a celebratory shot of maple syrup and some *Félix and Norton* cookies.

Next year, *OuiCanSki* will do it again. If you work with an organization that would like to get involved, Oria and Cynthia know how to find me.


