The holiday of Chanukah is at its core the celebration of a story that asks us to be brave and stand tall as we confront the reality of our lives and our changing world. While it is the story of a unique moment in our Jewish history, it also gives us the space to reflect on our personal and communal stories. And above all, it asks us to do our best to step out and share our lives with others.

Chanukah was meant to be a public holiday. While, as a child, I always hoped that there were laws about how many donuts I should eat or how many presents must be given to children each night of the holiday, the primary rules in fact govern the lighting of the Chanukiah and the way it is "publicized". We are told that after we light each evening, we should ensure that the Chanukiah is visible to passersby, as it is preferably placed "near the public area on the outside of the entrance" to one's home. One reason for doing this is to make sure that everyone who walks past can see the miracle of Chanukah, that we have survived and are living with strength and bringing light into the world. Yet, there is also a psychological reason for doing this. Putting the candles outside gives us a little spiritual push as we are invited to step outside our comfort zone, moving from the familiar to the unknown. We are reminded even in this most personal and family-centered of holidays to not be afraid of what lies outside the comfort of our homes.

This Chanukah, as we begin to step back into the places which have been kept distant and separate from us over the past two years, we too need to step out proudly into the changed world that we may find. There may be some hesitation and maybe a bit of fear as we take these important steps. It might seem like the world has simply changed too fast for us and that, with everything we have seen over this challenging time, we are not sure what to expect. Yet, if we take the deeper meaning of the holiday of Chanukah as an example, it is especially during times of challenge that we need to step out into the cold, stand tall, and do all that we can to bring some much needed light into the world. I look forward to seeing you once again in person over the next few months as we move forward, step out, and continue this journey together!

A NEW DORSHEI EMET SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

Do you have an exciting social justice project you'd like to put into place? Do you want to participate in a project that addresses an important social issue through educational activities, advocacy and/or by providing direct service?

In June and July 2021 Dorshei Emet held two parlour meetings to explore the possibility of reviving its Social Justice Committee (SJC), after several years of it being dormant. Around 50 people attended these meetings; considerable interest was expressed and suggestions were proposed for quite a few social justice activities.

HOW WILL THE NEW SJC WORK?

The SJC will function with project-focused sub-committees. It will coordinate their activities, ensuring that the SJC mandate developed in 2014 is revised so that it is relevant to 2021 and consistent with the vision of the current membership. The committee will also identify criteria for reviewing projects.

Any member of Dorshei Emet who wants to chair or co-chair a new social justice project may propose it to SJC, describing its objectives and planned activities. Members of the "umbrella committee" may also participate in sub-committees.

As long as the project meets the criteria that have been agreed upon, the sub-committee may then carry out its project, providing regular updates to the SJC. If a budget is needed to achieve the goals, the sub-committee will develop and present a budget request to the SJC for discussion and feedback; once this has been done the request will be presented to the DE Board of Directors for approval.

MEET SUSAN STOCK, SJC CHAIR:

I am a public health and occupational medicine specialist. I've been a member of Dorshei Emet for over 25 years and I have been a member of previous synagogue social justice committees. I am quite enthusiastic and hope to foster a highly active SJC.

I am in the process of contacting everyone who expressed an interest in participating last summer and organising the first meeting of the committee to take place in November. If you haven't yet expressed your interest in participating in the new SJC, please ask the DE office to pass your name, email and phone number to me. I will be delighted to include you in the committee, to speak with you about your ideas and answer your questions.

But I believe that our essence of community still yearns for some physical togetherness and for connection to our shared house.

The Board and the staff have been giving a lot of thought to how to transition to more in-person events. We know that some members are not able to attend in person, for a variety of reasons. We will continue to have online and hybrid experiences for the foreseeable future—we have been able to include so many people within our community that we can't give that up. But for those who are going out to other public places but may be reluctant to head back into Dorshei Emet, please let us welcome you back.

I was hesitant the first time I attended in-person Shabbat Services this summer. I wasn't sure how to greet people and very carefully chose my seat. I sang self-consciously beneath my mask. I worried about potentially awkward moments. All of that lasted approximately 15 minutes. Once there, I was thrilled to be inside my beit knesset. I saw smiling eyes above masks and we joked about whether to elbow bump or air high-five. Everyone respectfully followed the rules. We sang together! We touched the Torah! We were a "live" community and it was joyful.

Our staff is once again filling the office with their collaborative energy. The Board has begun to meet in the Social Hall, benefitting from more natural discussion and body language. We hosted our first in-person program in October. As long as we are permitted, we will continue to gradually have more in-person events. We want to accompany you while you get reacquainted with in-person shul life. We want to welcome our community in the flesh.

I hope to see you soon; maybe at our Chanukkah party?

THE YIZKOR BOOK COMMITTEE

The 5782 Yizkor Book was a huge success. Eighteen new prayers/poems/readings were added to the content, including several French readings. Everyone on the Yizkor Book Committee worked extremely hard to make this edition the largest and most profitable yet, clearing close to \$8,000, with 543 names listed by 114 individuals.

This fall we launched the Memory Book, housed on the Dorshei Emet website, where members who submitted names to the Yizkor Book may post stories, poems, videos, oral histories and photos of those they honoured. To access the Memory Book, please login to your ShulCloud account and go to the member portal. Instructions for accessing your account are in the blue box at the end of every Weekly; if you need assistance please contact the shul office.

These memories are extremely touching - we encourage all members to access them. We are currently exploring other ways to enhance the Memory Book, and we invite your suggestions.

Here is a sample from the Memory Book, written by Dorshei Emet member Ruth Cooperstock about her husband Fred zl":

Fred learned to be self-sufficient at an early age. After numerous unappealing jobs, he began working during the summer for the CNR on the Winnipeg - Vancouver route. His title was Third Cook, in other words, Dishwasher. He later used this unpalatable experience as an excuse to avoid washing dishes in our home.

After earning a Ph.D in Physics from Brown University, he received a fellowship at the Dublin Institute for Advanced Studies. A year later, with his wife and baby Jeremy, he moved to Victoria to begin work in the university's Physics Department. A popular teacher, he transmitted his excitement of physics to his students. In research he wrote over 100 scientific papers and 2 books. He was a passionate devotee of Einstein, with enthusiasm that grew during his sabbatical year at the Technion in Israel, where he worked with Prof. Nathan Rosen, one of Einstein's collaborators.

Fred was a talented photographer, badminton player, essay writer and handyman. He was known by his students - and his family, for his sense of humour and his colourful sayings. These will not be forgotten, as they are used on a regular basis by his children and grandchildren.

Indigenous Learning Chevruta

The Dorshei Emet Indigenous Learning Chevruta was very grateful to be able to hold its first program, a KAIROS Blanket Exercise, on October 17, 2021.

The 25 members in attendance were guided through our shared history of Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples. Everyone was actively involved as we stepped onto blankets representing the land, assuming the roles of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples. Following this narrative, we engaged in a sharing circle in which each of us expressed reactions to the experience.

The impact on each participant was varied, containing a wide range of emotions and responses. In summary, there was a strong feeling of connectedness, enhanced being physically together in the social hall - a first since the pandemic began. There was a keen desire to keep learning and a readiness to act.

Two-part Workshop on Land Acknowledgements led by Lisa Byer de Wever and Tom Dearhouse Thursday December 9 7:30 PM on Zoom

Workshop One explores why land acknowledgements deserve thoughtful, intentional and personal consideration. It will look at the historical significance of the traditional lands upon which Dorshei Emet is situated, why land acknowledgements are important both individually and in relation to Indigenous Peoples, and where they can fall short.

Lisa Byer de Wever has served as the minister for Kahnawake United Church and is currently the Executive Director of Saint Columba House in Pointe-Saint-Charles. She is co-chair of the local chapter of Kairos and has been a social justice advocate for as long as she can remember.

Tom Dearhouse has a background in aboriginal social work from Carleton University in Ottawa, has diverse work experience - journalist, firefighter, ambulance technician, band council chief and support counselor, focusing on using First Nations methods in counseling and healing, and incorporating teachings into daily life.
