Perhaps you have heard some Jews laugh and brush off Hanukkah: "If only people knew how relatively minor and insignificant Hanukkah is," they say, "they would never make such a big deal of it." Have you ever heard this before: "It's not that Hanukkah isn't important—of course, it's an important holiday about a miraculous victory of the Maccabbees," they say. "It's just that, compared to major holidays like Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, and Pesach, Hanukkah can't—if you'll excuse the expression—hold a candle!" I grew up hearing this message about *Hanukkah*, that it's a nice, pretty holiday, but it's

not that important. And implied in this is the rather guilt-provoking message: You know, Jews of America, if you were more serious about your commitment to observance, you'd know that Hanukkah is getting more press than it deserves. And more than this, the secret that we Jews have to acknowledge

is that the only reason *Hanukkah* gets all the attention it does is because of Christmas. All the Jewish kids who were jealous of their Christian friends getting presents resulted in the mass marketing of *Hanukkah* right alongside Christmas. So we Jews get to feel guilty, not only because we're not observant enough, but also because we're just copying Christians. We can all feel guilty because, ironically, *Hanukkah*, the holiday that is all about resisting assimilation, has become the purest expression of American assimilation.

We have to acknowledge that there's some truth in all of this. But it's only partial truth. As time goes by, I see a deeper message in the American Jewish experience of *Hanukkah*. *Hanukkah* really is a beautiful holiday about miracles, about victory against all odds, about the triumph of the spirit, about lighting up the darkness. But for so many Jews today, *Hanukkah* has more nuances and layers of meaning. In more and more houses, you see *Hanukkah menorahs* proudly displayed next to Christmas trees. And I mean *proudly*. *Hanukkah*, more and more, is evolving a message that it didn't have in generations past: it's a way of affirming the meaning of Jewish identity in the uniquely accepting multiculturalism of 21st-century America.

Generations ago, in the old country, our ancestors proudly placed menorahs in their windows as an act of defiance and courage. The outside world, symbolized by the darkness of this time of year, was an unsafe and rejecting place of anti-Semitic violence and betrayal. The message was clear: We stood up for who we are, and despite the hatred of the surrounding nations, despite their overwhelming strength and numbers, we prevailed. But it's different now, here in America. The menorah now isn't so much shining out into the dark night as it is illuminating the home within. More and more Jews aren't observant. They might not believe in God. And yet, they will light that menorah. They will sing the *dreidel* songs with their children, they'll make the latkes. Why? Because being Jewish matters to most American Jews. It's something we're proud of. Even if Kashrut and Shabbat haven't found a way into the family's home observances, Hanukkah works! It is accessible, powerful, and beautiful. Its message can be seen clearly in both its particularist and universalist dimensions. Both conventional and intermarried families can fully access this wonderful way to celebrate Jewishness.

We're witnessing the evolution of Jewish observance in America. What's happening before our eyes, frankly, is what has happened with all Jewish holidays over the centuries: they

evolve. They take on new dimensions of meaning depending on the social and cultural conditions within which the Jews find themselves. And the new, American-Jewish dimension of *Hanuk-kah* is truly magnificent. Its message is: Here we are! We have made it in America! We're really an accepted, successful, beloved people in this wonderful blessing of a society that is America. Our lives are multifaceted. Our choices for who to be and how to be are infinitely more complex than those of our ancestors. We are Jewish, yes, but we are also secular in many ways. We have access to multiple belief systems that we hold in the cognitive dissonance of our identities. We're more and more intermarried. And yet, despite it all, the light of who we are as Jews has not gone out. To the contrary, it burns stronger and stronger. Our Jewish heritage, while so different now from what it was for our grandparents, is something we will proudly pass to our children.

In this day and age, in 2010—5771—Hanukkah truly is one of the most important holidays on the Jewish calendar. It is a cause for wild celebration. It is the shining light that reminds us that, despite dire predictions a generation ago, assimilation and intermarriage are not the death knell of the Jewish people. We are alive and well and proud to be who we are. It's just that who we are is different now from what we were before. And this evolution of our people is good. It is a miracle. So this year, enjoy Hanukkah. Celebrate the light no matter who you are, whether observant, or secular, or not even Jewish. And while you're celebrating, remember its message: that the spirit of this remarkable people is a light that burns brighter all the time, promising to be an ever-evolving blessing for generations to come. •



Enjoy a Delicious Hanukkah

Gateau de Hanukkah (Hanukkah Polish Apple Cake). Adapted from the new cookbook, *Quiches, Kugels, and Couscous: My Search for Jewish Cooking in France*, by Joan Nathan

5 apples (3 Fuji and 2 Granny Smith, or any combination of sweet and tart apples), peeled, cored, and cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch

pieces, about 6 cups of apples Grated zest and juice of 1 lemon 10 walnut halves, roughly chopped 1½ teaspoons cinnamon

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

⅓ teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons chopped almonds 1¼ cups plus 3 tablespoons sugar

4 large eggs

1 cup vegetable oil


¼ teaspoon almond extract

2 leeks, diced, washed, and sautéed

1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees, and grease a Bundt pan or 9-by-13-inch baking pan.

2. Toss the apples in a large bowl with the zest and inice of the lemon, the way

juice of the lemon, the walnuts, and the cinnamon.



4. Spoon half of the batter over the bottom of the pan. Scatter the apples on top, and cover them with the remaining batter. Sprinkle the top with the remaining sugar (you'll need less if using a Bundt pan).

5. Bake for 45 to 60 minutes or until golden and cooked through. Note: The cake will take less time to bake in the shallow rectangular pan than it will in the Bundt pan.

Yield: 8 to 10 servings

a Pulitzer Prize—winning member of the *Washington Post's* investigation unit. A reporter for the *Post* for 26 years, she has covered crime, homeland security, federal law enforcement, education, and social services. Horwitz received the 2002 Pulitzer Prize for Investigative Reporting for her examination of the deaths of children in the D.C. foster care system. She also co-wrote an investigation of D.C. police shootings that won the 1999 Pulitzer for Public Service and the 1999 Selden Ring Award.

In addition, Horwitz was a member of the team of reporters who won the 2008 Pulitzer Prize for Breaking News Reporting for the shooting rampage at Virginia Tech. She also co-authored the 2003 book about the Washington snipers, Sniper: Inside the Hunt for the Killers Who Terrorized the Nation. She and a colleague wrote a 13-part series about the botched police investigation into the murder of Chandra Levy and co-authored the recently published Finding Chandra: A True Washington Murder Mystery. Among Horwitz's other awards are the Robert F. Kennedy Journalism Award for reporting on the disadvantaged and the Investigative Reporters and Editors Medal.

She lives in Washington with her husband, William Schultz, and daughter, Rachael Schultz. Rachael attended the Gan, was an Adas *bat mitzvah*, and graduated from the Melvin Gelman Religious School. Bill was in the first Adas adult *bar mitzvah* class. •

Winter and Spring, 2010–2011 Adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah

Taught by Rabbi Charles Feinberg

Sunday Morning, December 5, 12, 19; January 23–April 10

It's still not too late to join the Adult *Bar* and *Bat Mitzvah* program! This four mini-mester adult education program taught by Rabbi Feinberg and *Hazzan* Greenberg will culminate in a group *bar/bat mitzvah* service on December 10, 2011, *Parashat Vayishlach*. The second unit of the Adult *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* program will focus on the Rabbinic commentary to the Bible, an introduction to the *Talmud*, and an intensive study of the *Siddur*. In addition, this semester will include a separate class on *Torah* trope taught by *Hazzan* Greenberg. The class will culminate with a final mini-mester in fall 2011.

Exploring Holidays in the *Mishnah*: A Social Science Perspective

Taught by Calvin Goldscheider Wednesday Night, January 19–March 16

The Mishnah is a third-century set of Jewish texts organized into six Divisions. The key theme we will review is the Mishnaic conception of religious holidays. We'll focus on the Division of "Moed" and will include selected texts associated with Shabbat, the Pilgrimage Festivals (Passover, Sukkot, and Shavuot); the High Holy Days (Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur); Hanukkah; Purim, Minor Fast Days; and some other religious holidays that are marked in the Mishnah. Our exploration will be guided by the simple questions: What was the Mishnaic conception of religious holidays? How are these holidays to be celebrated? What was the significance and meaning of the holidays as described in the texts of the Mishnah? Throughout we will study the Mishnah together, in Hebrew and English, to uncover core elements associated with the Sabbath and holidays. Our approach will emphasize how social science understands the social significance of public religious celebrations. (No prior knowledge of the Mishnah, Rabbinic literature, or Hebrew will be assumed.) Cost: \$100 for members; \$150 for non-members •



HONORING OUR LEADERS & VOLUNTEERS

Sit in on a meeting of Adas Israel's Board of Directors, and you'll almost certainly hear Stan Cohen's deep, slightly accented voice at some point. After serving on the board for nearly a quarter of a century, Stan, a native of Canada, isn't afraid to speak up and ask tough questions. His inquisitiveness should come as no surprise, given that he toiled as a journalist for some 15 years in Montreal. Beyond Stan's current service on the board—he's a lifetime member—and the Religious Practices Committee, he has been a near-constant presence at Adas Israel and other Washington-area Jewish organizations more than 30 years.

Stan works as the regulations quality officer at the U.S. Department of Education. He has three children with his late first wife, Barbara Abrams Cohen (z"/l), and a daughter, Hannah, with his second wife, Sue Ducat. Stan and Sue were married at Adas, as were his two older daughters—Rachel Cohen and Lissa Shorr—and his son, Norman, and Hannah celebrated their b'nai mitzvah at the synagogue.

Stan Cohen, interviewed by Manny Schiffres

M: Stan, what's behind your intense involvement with Adas Israel and other Jewish-related activities?

S: My Jewish identity, in all of its manifestations—ethnic, spiritual, historical, cultural, theological, traditional, celebratory—defines me as a person, not just in the Jewish world but in the general society. In every place where I have lived—Saint John, New Brunswick, Canada, where I was born and grew up; New York City; Montreal; and, for the last 33 years, Washington—I have been involved in Jewish communal life, organizations, and institutions. It all started when I was about 15 and became a member of the Young Judean executive committee in Saint John. By the time I was 16, I was on the regional executive committee. Then I went off to New York University and became student president of the Jewish Culture Foundation, the Jewish student organization there. So coming to Washington and finding a Jewish presence was not unusual for me. Adas Israel became one of the centers of my Jewish life in Washington. I always felt that I wanted to give back to the community because the community, in this case Adas Israel, has given something to me. And I became involved with committees, then became a member of the board. Later, I became involved with what was then the Jewish Community Council and is now the Jewish Community Relations Council, as well as with what was then called the Board of Jewish Education, with the Charles E. Smith Jewish Day School, the Jewish Primary Day School of the Nation's Capital, and the Jewish Federation.

M: Where did this powerful sense of Jewish identity come from?

5: I grew up in a city that had about 250 Jewish households. Being in such a small minority in a city that then had about 60,000 people defined one's identity. The synagogue became a center of life for most Jews, not just religiously, but socially and culturally. And, of course, my family, my Hebrew school, and Young Judea were also influential, as were the prejudice

and outright anti-Semitism I encountered from time to time. We also had a small country house in a community

where a number of Jews had country homes during the summer, so there was a heavy Jewish environmental influence. All of those factors shaped my identity and also my sense of social justice. I should also mention that I have been involved in all four branches of Judaism. I grew up in a community that had one synagogue, a traditional Orthodox synagogue. In Montreal, I became a board member and officer of Congregation Dorshei Emet, the Reconstructionist synagogue. In Washington, I became involved with Adas, a Conservative synagogue. And when my wife and I go to New York about once every six weeks, we love to *daven* at Stephen Wise Free Synagogue, the Reform synagogue in which my wife, Sue Ducat, grew up.

M: You said you want to give back to Adas Israel because it had given to you. In what sense?

S: When my late first wife was terminally ill, the synagogue really rallied around us. My late parents were always warmly greeted as visitors to Adas. And Hannah's arrival from the Russian Far East was cause for great celebration in the congregation. And although I had differences with the synagogue over the separation of the Jewish Primary Day School in the late 1990s, I never left the synagogue, even though others did. I retained friendships with a number of people who were on opposing sides of this issue. There were a few rough years, but we got through them and I'm still there.

M: Of all the activities that you have been involved in at Adas, from what do you derive the most pleasure?

5: I was involved in the first Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Weekend, with joint services with the Turner Memorial AME Church. Another very rewarding activity was that I was on the first committee for the Garden of the Righteous ceremony, for which I give Rabbi Wohlberg great credit. Also, about 25 years ago, Rabbi Chaim Listfield asked me to conduct a martyrology service, for victims of the Holocaust, on *Yom Kippur*. I have composed and conducted a martyrology service every year since then.

M: Do you ever lead services?

S: A number of people, many of them Adas members, take turns leading services at the Hyatt Classic residence in Chevy Chase. At Adas, I occasionally lead the *musaf* service on *Shabbat* during the summer and have led services in the *Havurah*. **M:** During the years I served with you on the board, I noticed that you never shied away from asking questions. You seem more willing than most to engage. Where does that come from?

S: Remember, I, too, was a journalist, and journalists ask ques-

From 1993 to 2001, Heumann worked in the Clinton administration as assistant secretary for the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services in the U.S. Department of Education.

and serving the Jewish community.

The Cohens are probably best known for founding the Jewish Foundation for Group Homes (JFGH), residential facilities for spe-

cial-needs individuals. The first house opened in 1982, and the organization has grown to 24 homes and 67 apartments in the DC area.

JFGH has set an example that people all over the world admire and emulate. It has established a protocol it willingly shares, and similar projects have opened in other cities, Philadelphia and Boston, to name just two.

While the Cohens were instrumental in raising the initial capital for the organization, the primary fundraising venue now is the annual JFGH Gala, which hosted 1,600 attendees this year. Bob credits Linda Yitzchak, program coordinator, for recently introducing residents to synagogue-oriented Judaism through the programs she has developed that bring them often to Adas Israel.

Among their other activities, Joy and Bob co-chaired the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington's Council for the Arts and the Smithsonian Institution's "Project Judaica, the Precious Legacy."

In addition, Bob has served as a board member of Adas Israel, the Hebrew Academy of Greater Washington, the Jewish Community Center, Jewish Institute of National Security

Affairs, and Jewish Social Service Agency, among others.

Joy has served in leadership roles in many community organizations, including as a member of the Cabinet of the Jewish Foundation of Greater Washington, Women's Division and as cochair of its first combined dinner. She also co-chaired the Wom-

en's Division for the State of Israel Bonds, which she also served as a board member for the National Executive Committee. She was also a vice president of the Hebrew Home of Greater Wash-

ington, Women's Auxiliary.

Both Bob and Joy have earned mtany honors over the years, including the Jewish Social Service Agency's Joseph Ottenstein Award, the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington's Benjamin Ourisman Award, and the B'nai B'rith Humanitarian Award. In 2006, they received the Abe Pollin Humanitarian of the Year Award from the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington.

Individually, Joy received an award for her leadership role in Women's Division for the State of Israel Bonds and, in 1984, the Aunt Minnie Goldsmith Award for Community Service.

Bob was named Washingtonian of the Year in 1986, and in 1989, he was listed among "Who's Who in the East," and was a finalist for Entrepreneur of the Year in the social responsibility category.

With all of their many accomplishments, the Cohens are most proud of their five sons and daughters-in-law and all of their grandchildren. Because he believes that even those with challenges need to work and earn an income, Bob employs many of his family members at his office supply business, Cosons, Inc.

We congratulate this wonderful couple on receiving the *Shem Tov* award.

Remembering Our 2004 Garden of Righteous Honoree



We note with sadness the death of Mrs. Giuliana Lestini, our 2004 Garden of the Righteous honoree, who passed away on September 30 in Italy.

Mrs. Lestini assisted her father in anti-fascist activities during World War II. Her father, Pietro

Lestini, recognized as "righteous" as well, worked during the Nazi occupation for the *Azione Cattolica* (Catholic Action), an organization that provided aid to evacuees, Italian draft dodgers (after September 8, 1943), Allied soldiers, and Jews.

Mr. Lestini, who occupied an office in St. Gioacchino's Church in Rome, had a "loft" built in the ceiling of the church and hid Jews there for seven months. Giuliana Lestini's book, *Roma-Israele-Roma*, published in Italian, discusses her experience. Mrs. Lestini said she was happy to have been in

the resistance and also happy about her friendship with the Jews, as they have become companions for life.

Mrs. Lestini's hope for future generations is that they would never see such terrible things. Her message for the future was one of peace and fraternity; that "peace must be achieved through fraternity, by respecting the rights of others."

Mrs. Lestini was interviewed by Yad Vashem in April 1998 when she traveled to Israel on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the founding of the State of Israel and provided a six-hour video testimony to the Survivors of the Shoah Visual History Foundation.

The congregation mourns the death of this outstanding woman, a true hero whose moral courage serves as an example to us all. *May her memory be a blessing*. •

tions. I was a reporter, an op-ed page writer, an editorial writer for the *Montreal Star* for 15 years. Even as a kid and as a student journalist, I asked a lot of questions. If someone says something that appears to be exaggerated or doesn't sound reasonable to me, I want to examine it further. If I think to myself, "How did he get from point A to point B?" I'll ask about it. I also feel that people who serve in organizations such as Adas Israel have to be accountable, and if they can't or won't answer questions, they shouldn't be in those positions. Of course, some people think I ask too many questions.


