MACHZOR LEV SHALEM: A NEW PRAYERBOOK A NEW WAY INTO THE HIGH **HOLY DAYS**

For most American Jews today, the simple act of showing up at synagogue on the High Holy Days is the ritual. For so many, there is little expectation of anything beyond that. It's simply about getting through it. The High Holy Days hold the promise of a moving connection with our heritage. But somehow, there are often so many impediments to the experience. The service is almost entirely in Hebrew. The often incomprehensible prayers in the prayer book, the experience of standing and then sitting, and then standing again... it may seem that all the action is happening at the front the room, and the best we can do is to steel ourselves to face this twice-a-year experience. Hopefully, for most, the holidays will be punctuated by moments of

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meaning, by familiar melodies that evoke childhood and familial connections; we hope that the rabbi's sermons will be interesting. Those of us on the other side of the *bimah* understand what the majority of High Holy Day attendees go through during this time. If there's anything that all of us agree on,

it's the longing to make the High Holy Day experience more accessible and meaningful for everyone. A "fly on the wall" at the multiple Religious Practices Committee meetings devoted to the High Holy Days would hear long discussions about what we can do to help everyone have a better experience.

Through our long history, these holidays developed in many

ways as a culmination of a year of observance; they follow a month-long lead-up of intense introspection and preparation for the *Yamim Nora'im*, the Days of Awe. The choice of prayers, the liturgies and poems, the practices are all decidedly heavy and ponderous and difficult. When accessed in their traditional sense, one is called on to emerge from the holidays humbled, spiritual, purged, awe-struck, changed. The complexity, the ponderous solemnity, the difficulty accessing contextual meaning itself, can result in an alienating experience. The clergy, the Jewish professionals, and the lay leaders all know

this. We want to help, but for years, we have been hampered in many ways by the heavy nature of the holidays themselves. We have done a lot to address the challenges: we have trimmed down the services, played with the order of events, given out handouts, introduced compelling and moving melodies, created a welcoming atmosphere, added poetry and explanations and readings. It has all helped. I am proud of what we have been able to accomplish at Adas Israel on the High Holy Days, and I believe that together we have created something meaningful and engaging.


But of all the stumbling blocks to meaning on the holidays, the biggest has been the *machzorim*, the prayerbooks themselves. Think about it: everyone holds that book in his or her hands during the High Holy Day experience. Each page contains a treasure trove of beautiful, moving, and challenging prayers to get us to pour out our hearts. The brilliance and artistry of the prayers and liturgical poems are there to strip away the layers of our own self-denial and confusion, to get us truly, finally to bare our souls before God. But how many of us have been able to enter into those prayers fully? The problem is that our current prayerbooks lay out the prayers and translate them, but they don't give us more ways into the High Holy Day experience. The Silverman *Machzor*, which we have used for decades, presented a translation that was often in a Shakespearean English style—an attempt to capture the antiquated majesty of the prayers. The

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translations of the *Machzor Chadash*, our more recent *machzor*, are updated. There are really beautiful and moving readings in that *machzor* as well, even though it is edited and shortened. Adas Israel did a very good thing for the community in choosing this *machzor*, and it has helped us to improve dramatically the quality of the prayer experiences in the congregation.

But now there is, finally, a new *machzor* put out by the Rabbinical Assembly of the Conservative Movement. This *machzor* is not just the prayers and translations with supplemental prayers and readings; it is a game-changer. The brilliant editors of the *Machzor Lev Shalem* have finally figured out that the greatest tool for meaning-making on the High Holy Days is the prayerbook in each of our hands. They have finally figured out that all of us want to find our own way into this experience. They understand that the



Every page of the new *Machzor Lev Shalem* is not only a source for the traditional prayers. Every page also contains a rich array of teachings and insights and history and context for the prayers themselves. On one side of a page, you can find very practical texts (set in the margins, almost Talmud-like) explaining the background, significance, and function of the prayers and services. On the other side in the margins, you can find beautiful teachings and insights from rabbis, philosophers, journalists, comedians, and thinkers, offering "ways in" to the prayers. The perspectives range from the traditional to the cutting edge of how we approach these ideas in our generations. There are poems and new liturgies for those seeking new expressions of Judaism. The translations are also of our age: not only are they "updated," but they also strive not to gloss over troubling references and jarring phrases and rhythms in the words—they let you be the judge of the meaning, so that you can forge your relationship to the tradition itself. Translations are also gender-neutral, and they afford us the opportunity to choose more- and less-traditional renderings of prayers that have developed in the Conservative Jewish world over the past few decades. Throughout the *machzor*, transliterations of the prayers appear in red to indicate that the congregation joins together to sing—and the transliteration is really usable! There are notations for when to rise and bow, so everyone can have a sense of the flow and rhythms of the service without having to be told what to do (or to feel embarrassed if he or she is not sure what to

Tu B'Shevat 5771

Tu B'Shevat—the New Year for Trees—is a time when trees start drinking the New Year's rainwater and the sun renews itself. As the Jewish Arbor Day, Tu B'Shevat embodies a strong dedication to ecology, environmentalism, and conservation. This year, Tu B'Shevat (the 15th of Shevat) falls on Thursday, January 20.

On the third day of creation, God created "seed-bearing plants, fruit trees after their kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it" (*Genesis* 1:11). God then put Adam in the garden to "till it and tend it" (2:15), making humans stewards of the earth.

According to the Mishna, where it is first mentioned, *Tu B'Shevat*—the 15th day of the month of Shevat—is the date farmers used to calculate the year's crop yield and determine the tithe that the Bible requires. It also marks the beginning of the

first three years and the end of the four years of a tree's growth, during which eating its fruit is forbidden.

Celebrating *Tu B'Shevat* with a *seder* has become traditional for families and congregations around the world. During a *Tu B'Shevat seder*, seven species of fruits and grains from Israel are blessed and

eaten. The seven species are wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates (*Deuteronomy* 8:8). It is also customary to dance the *Mayim*, the Jewish dance for water, during a *Tu B'Shevat* seder. •

During the month of January, we're kicking off the New Year in a huge way!



Kol HaMayim (Voice of the Waters)

This story of a visitor to the Adas Israel Community mikvah illustrates the mikvah's role in marking transitions in the lives of people in our community.

Shampooing, combing, and sometimes blow-drying one's hair are all a part of the ritual of *mikvah*. This week, however, two women performed another ritual involving hair here. Chemotherapy had caused one woman's hair to start falling out, and as a gesture of devotion and care, her good friend created a hair-cutting ceremony to help her face the rest of her therapy with dignity.

They came early in the morning. As her friend lovingly cut her hair, and as her daughter watched, the woman continuously recited the *Shema* and focused on the one-ness of God. Then she took a shower and immersed privately in the *mikvah*, where she experienced overwhelming emotions. Afterward, although exhausted, she noted that the rituals evoked much more positivity than she had expected to feel.

Despite the shock of seeing herself without hair for the first time, this ritualized haircut revealed that she has a very pretty-shaped head. It also helped her refocus her attention to what grows on the inside, rather than the outside, of her head. •

Adult Bar/Bat Mitzvah

Taught by Rabbi Charles Feinberg Sunday Morning, January 23–April 10, 2011

It's not too late to join the Adult *Bar* and *Bat Mitzvah* program! This four mini-mester adult education program taught by Rabbi Feinberg and *Hazzan* Greenberg will culminate in a group *bar/bat mitzvah* service on December 10, 2011, *Parashat Vayishlach*. The second unit of the Adult *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* program will focus on the Rabbinic commentary to the Bible, an introduction to the *Talmud*, and an intensive study of the *Siddur*. In addition, this semester will include a separate class on *Torah* trope taught by *Hazzan* Greenberg. The class will culminate with a final mini-mester in fall 2011. *Cost: \$450, which includes all books and materials*

Exploring Holidays in the *Mishnah*: A Social Science Perspective

Taught by Calvin Goldscheider Wednesday Night, January 19–March 16, 2011

The Mishnah is a third-century set of Jewish texts organized into six Divisions. The key theme we will review is the Mishnaic conception of religious holidays. We'll focus on the Division of "Moed" and will include selected texts associated with Shabbat, the Pilgrimage Festivals (Passover, Sukkot, and Shavuot); the High Holy Days (Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur); Hanukkah; Purim, Minor Fast Days; and some other religious holidays that are marked in the Mishnah. Our exploration will be guided by the simple questions: What was the Mishnaic conception of religious holidays? How are these holidays to be celebrated? What was the significance and meaning of the holidays as described in the texts of the Mishnah? Throughout we will study the Mishnah together, in Hebrew and English, to uncover core elements associated with the Sabbath and holidays. Our approach will emphasize how social science understands the social significance of public religious celebrations. (No prior knowledge of the Mishnah, Rabbinic literature, or Hebrew will be assumed.) Cost: \$100 for members; \$150 for non-members

They have been married for 45 years, and their three sons, Dan, Jon, and Ben, all celebrated their *b'nai mitzvah* at Adas Israel.

While they are now retired, Arnie and Mary remain active and engaged in synagogue life, as organizers of the *Havurah* service. Arnie (a retired lawyer) is a life member of the Board, was treasurer and vice president of the congregation, chairman of the Building Renovation Completion Committee in 1990, co-chairman of the first family High Holy Day service, and chairman of the Library renovation. He is an active member of the Bereavement Committee and created a unique role for himself as a male *mikvah* volunteer. His community activities are substantial: Arnie is a board member and treasurer of the Foundation for Jewish Studies and a board member and chair of the Ethics Committee of the Hebrew Home of Greater Washington.

Mary is a career counselor, member of the Catering Committee, and an organizer of "carepools," an initiative to provide food and visits for long-term, seriously ill congregants that has morphed into the *Chesed* Project, under the guidance of Rabbi Feinberg. She has chaired the Membership Committee, co-chaired the Rabbi Avis Miller Anniversary Event, and led workshops on *Shabbat* observance and parenting skills. Mary is a member of the Human Resources Advisory Committee of the Jewish Foundation for Group Homes and voluntarily provides career counseling and outplacement assistance.


Arnie and Mary Hammer, interviewed by Steve Lachter

S: Since you live in Rockville, why did you join and remain members of Adas Israel?

A: "Adas is the best show in town." Just look at the people, resources, opportunities for study, diversity, the intellectual quality of the members of the congregation, and the *Yiddishkeit*. This is a place where members get intensely involved with their congregation and keep at it.

M: For me, our *Havurah* service at Adas Israel remains intimate, accommodating, and inclusive. Of course, our main focus is the *Havurah*, but the *Havurah* is not just "our" thing. It is available to all members of the congregation and, yes, while there are many regulars, it is also a place where many congregants pray, and visitors feel comfortable and welcome because the *Havurah* is a "community service" in the best sense of the term.

A: Adas Israel is a synagogue for life—not a "revolving door" institution.



Mary and Arnie Hammer **S:** What activities are the most meaningful and give you the most personal satisfaction?

M: I get the most satisfaction from working with people who have real needs. I enjoy the relationships I have developed in our study group and in the *Havurah*, but when I can use my talents and experience to facilitate workshops and coach people through difficult times, working, for example, with the supervisors of the Jewish Foundation for Group Homes, I am richer for the experience. The opportunities provided by our original "carepools," a program I organized to provide food and visit long-term seriously ill congregants and, recently, helping to develop the Chesed Program to contact elderly members of the congregation, have given me a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction. I have concern for longterm care of those with physical problems and end-of-life issues, and I want to engage people who really need help. S: Arnie, in addition to your work with groups and individuals, you seem to get a great deal of pleasure using your organizational abilities. Can you elaborate?

A: It is enormously satisfying to work with people, to make connections. My work as a Bereavement Committee *chaver* has provided me with rewarding and satisfying moments, as when I was able to connect with a young widow before a very difficult funeral because of a common connection to Cornell. When someone needs your help, you manage to overcome personal issues that could inhibit your response. You do what is needed. Sometimes, all that is necessary is to sit and listen to those who have experienced loss. I also really enjoy working at the Hebrew Home by organizing men's discussion groups that bring friendship and reality into the resident's lives. Becoming the "mikvah lady" for men undergoing conversion has also been incredibly rewarding and appreciated. The need was there, I had the time and interest, and the results have been gratifying.

Board of Directors Approves New Machzor for High Holy Days



Based on the recommendation of our Religious Practices Committee and clergy, the Adas Israel Board of Directors endorsed the purchase of *Lev Shalem*, the new *machzor* (High Holy Day prayer book) of the Conservative movement.

We look forward to using our new *machzorim* for the first time during the High Holy Days, 2011/5772. This new edition features improved English translations, transliterations, and commentary throughout (see

Rabbi Steinlauf's column on page 1 for additional details).

We are pleased to announce that a family foundation has challenged the congregation by creating a dollar-to-dollar match up to 50% of the funds needed to purchase the *machzorim* (\$92,000). The first matching gift is from the Charlotte & Hubert Schlosberg *Machzor* Fund, but we need an additional 833 books to be donated.


Yad Hakavod Award Nominations Sought

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Masorti's Bar/Bat Mitzvah Program for Children with Special Needs Honored

The Masorti movement's *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* Program for Children with Special Needs has been recognized by one of Israel's foremost national social service organizations working to support and highlight the needs of individuals with disabilities. This Masorti program—unique in Israel—has won the coveted

2010 Shalem Foundation Excellence Prize, awarded each year to a project, program, or staff benefiting this population. The Shalem Foundation was established in 1983 by the Center of Local Authority in collaboration with the Ministry of Welfare.

In accordance with the Shalem Foundation's vision to integrate those with cognitive challenges and disabilities into mainstream life, the Masorti program offers Israeli special-needs youngsters and their families an opportunity to be integrated into Jewish communal life to celebrate a Jewish life

cycle event and thus experience the joy of full acceptance. The Masorti program is the only nationwide effort of its kind in Israel.

The Shalem Foundation described the Masorti *Bar/Bat Mitz-vah* Program for Children with Special Needs as an innovative and breakthrough model, citing its role in pioneering the development and use of state-of-the-art alternative communications devices, such as computerized sound kits, sign language for Torah reading, and visual pedagogy. In addition to readying

youngsters for group b'nai mitzvah, which take place in Masorti kehillot, the program provides a course of Jewish enrichment, lasting three to six months, through the special-needs schools the children attend.

Leading up to the special day, youngsters learn about bless-

ings, Shabbat, festivals and customs, performing mitzvot, and other activities that reflect Jewish values. If possible, for example, they visit the elderly, care for animals, and help others in need as part of their commitment to Jewish life.

Eligible children—who have a variety of physical and developmental challenges, such as cerebral palsy, Down syndrome, ADD-AD-HD, autism, blindness, hearing impairments, and learning disabilities—are identified by their schools, and the Masorti movement provides all services, including teacher train-

ing, at no cost to the schools or to the families. The program welcomes children of every religious and ethnic background, many of them new immigrants.

What began as a partnership with one special-needs school has spread to 30 to 40 special-needs schools throughout Israel, making it possible each year for as many as 300 Israeli children with special needs to connect to Israel, Jewish values, and religious heritage. •

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
