Most of us are familiar with these words, and perhaps with the haunting melodies that we sing with these them as we put the Sefer Torah away on Shabbat and holidays. It's a powerful line that means "Renew our days as of old." When you think about it, this line expresses a kind of paradox. We're asking for renewal. In conventional terms, renewal is often about transcending past baggage and experiences, becoming "like new" again. But here, we want that renewal to be kakedem, "as of old!" This is the unique take that Judaism has on the idea of renewing ourselves. We renew, we evolve, we become better human beings only together with the past that has come before us. We don't leave the past behind. We integrate our past: our stories, our struggles, our tragedies, our joys into who we will become. This renewal as of old is the very

process that we call upon on *Rosh Hashanah*. In our cyclical calendar, renewing each year, we circle back to *Hayom Harat Olam*, the "birthday" of the world. We access, again and again, the moment of creation itself, and in that reconnection with the primordial past, we renew. The Jewish view of life is that it's

an ever-ascending spiral, circling back again and again, but with each pass-around, we're richer, renewing in ever more profound ways. In Judaism, we believe that we can always "re-create" our lives as long as we acknowledge and own our past stories and deeds. This re-creation is called t'shuvah, or "returning." We're never really lost in life with t'shuvah. We can always find the way forward by looking and seeing our own footsteps that have brought us to this moment. On the High Holy Days, we look back and we take an honest look at the whole spiraling journey we have been on. We see all the missteps, the moments when we slipped and fell, the moments when we walked with pride. In seeing that whole journey, we can discern with clarity how and where to take the next step. In our tradition, this process happens both on a communal level and on a personal level. As a people, we are ever-mindful of our sacred past, our mission as a people of God. When we sing that line about renewing our days as of old, we collectively hearken back to the ancient days of our ancestors, who felt the Divine Presence palpably in their day-to-day experience.

As individuals, we yearn for that kind of connection. To find it, we take stock. We face our demons. We draw strength from our accomplishments and joys. We find ways back to the sacred path of

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our people. We rediscover how we are, in fact, on our path to God.

At Adas Israel, we take the wisdom of *t'shuvah* very seriously in every aspect of our congregational life. This is a year of great transitions in our synagogue. We are searching for a new cantor, one who will bring a spirit of renewal—in the Jewish sense!—to our services and congregational life. Familiar faces on our staff will be playing new roles. New faces will be helping us to transition familiar roles: Sheri Brown, our wonderful Gan interim director, is hard at work creating a great experience for our Gan families. Cantor Abe Lubin, a seasoned *hazzan* with a magnificent voice, will anchor our services in the Charles E. Smith Sanctuary for the coming year. New positions and new faces will be appearing as well, as we seek to find innovative ways to address changing needs in our community.

We change as a congregation just as we change as individuals. We face the present and future by affirming what has been before us. Our goal is *chadesh yameinu kakedem*, to renew our congregation as of old: to provide the best possible ways for each and every one of us to discover a direct connection with each other, with our heritage, and with the Divine.

As we make our way from the New Year to Yom Kippur, we take a serious look at who we are. Some of us are young and have a lifetime ahead of us. Some of us are older, with limited years to look forward to. The infinite wisdom of t'shuvah teaches us that in every moment, who we have been, and who we are now is a gift. May the journey of t'shuvah that we share bring us to a New Year rich with possibilities and full of gratitude for all the ways that we are blessed.

Torah Lishma means learning for its own sake, and the greatest goal of our tradition is to provide opportunities to study, learn, and grow. We welcome Rabbi Irwin Kula, November 18–20, for a weekend of exploring the theme, "Leadership in Jewish Life." He will speak Friday night, Saturday morning, and after *kiddush* on Saturday, and he

will conduct a special learning session with Rabbi Gil Steinlauf on Sunday morning.

Rabbi Kula uses Jewish wisdom to speak to all aspects of modern life and relationships and inspire people across the globe. An engaged and thoughtful trader in the global marketplace of ideas, he led a Passover *seder* in Bhutan; consulted with government officials in Rwanda; helped build cultural and interfaith bridges in Qatar; and met with leaders as diverse as the Dalai Lama and Queen Noor to discuss compassionate leadership in the 21st century.

Fast Company magazine and Religion and Ethics Newsweekly (PBS) both named him one of the leaders shaping the American spiritual landscape, and he has been cited by Newsweek for many years as one of America's "Most Influential Rabbis." Rabbi Kula is the president of Clal—The National Jewish Center for Learning and Leadership, a leadership—training institute, think tank, and resource center in New York City.

High Holy Days

Home Observance of Rosh Hashanah, 5772 Rosh Hashanah at Home

The celebration of *Rosh Hashanah*, like all Jewish holidays, takes place both in the synagogue and at home. The mood of the holiday combines solemnity and joy. The commemoration of *Rosh Hashanah* at home can be enhanced by the following preparation and ceremonies: the table should be set in a festive manner, with a white cloth (symbolic of purity and joy), candlesticks, wine, apples and honey, and *challot* (usually round to symbolize a full, complete year). The family gathers for the lighting of the candles.

Rosh Hashanah begins on Wednesday evening, September 28, candles are lit, and the blessing is followed by the She-hecheeyanu:

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָּ אֱ-לֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶדְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשְׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתָיו, וְצִוְּנוּ לְהַדְלִיק וֵר שֶׁל יוֹם טוֹב.

Baruch ata Adonai Eloheinu melech ha-olam, asher kid-shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzeevanu l'hadleek ner shel Yom Tov. Praised are You, Lord our God, Master of the universe, who has sanctified us with Your commandments and commanded us to light the festival candles.

בַּרוּדְ אַתַּה יִיַ אֵ-לֹהֵינוּ מֵלֶדְ הַעוֹלַם, שֶׁהֶחֵינֵוּ וְקִיּמֵנוּ וְהָגִּיעֵנוּ לַזְּמַן הַזֶּה.

Baruch ata Adonai, Elohaynu melech ha-olam, she-hecheeyanu v'kee-y-manu v'higeeyanu laz'man hazeh. Praised are You, Lord our God, Master of the universe, who has kept us in life, sustained us, and enabled us to reach this season.

Blessing of the children: It is a beautiful tradition for parents to bless their children before reciting *kiddush*. Parents place their hands on each child's head and say the appropriate blessing.

For sons:

יִשְׂמִדְּ אֵ-לֹהִים כָּאֵפְרַיִם וְכִמְנַשֵּׁה.

Y'simcha Eloheem k' Efrayim v'chi Menashe. May God make you as Ephraim and Menashe For daughters:

יִשְׂמֵךְ אֱ-לֹהִים כְּשָׂרָה רְבְקָה רָחֵל וְלֵאָה. Y'simech Eloheem k' Sarah, Rivka, Rachel, v' Leah. May God make you as Sarah, e Rebecca, Rachel, and Leah.

For all children, continue with the Priestly Blessing:

Y'va-rekh'kha Adonai v'yish-m'-rekha. May the Lord bless you and keep you; Ya-er Adonai panav ele-kha vi-hu-neka. May the Lord's goodness shine on you and be gracious to you; Yisa Adonai panav ele-kha v'ya-sem l'kha shalom. May the Lord turn with favor to you and give you peace. Amen.

On the first night of *Rosh Hashanah*, it is traditional to dip apples in honey and recite the following prayer:

וִיהִי רָצוֹן מִלְּפָנֶיךּ, יְיָ אֱ-לֹהֵינוּ וֵא-לֹהֵי אֲבוֹתֵינוּ, שְׁתְּחַדֵּשׁ עָלֵינוּ שָׁנָה טוֹבָה וּמִתוּקַה.

Y'hee ratzon milfanecha, Adonai, Elohaynu v'elohay avotaynu, she'ti-chadesh aleynu shana tovah u'metukah. May it be Your will, Lord our God, and God of our ancestors, that the New Year be both good and sweet.

On the second night of *Rosh Hashanah*, it is customary to eat a new fruit (mango, pomegranate, etc.) so that the *She-hecheeyanu* may be recited. However, the *She-hecheeyanu* may be recited even without eating a new fruit.

The traditional greeting for Rosh Hashanah is:
בּתֵבּה טוֹבָה תַבָּה טוֹבָה הַנּבּה L'shanah Tova Tikatevu.... May you be inscribed for a good year.

election now only one year away, we cannot help but question the actual and proper role of religion in our culture, society, and country. Join two experts on the subject—acclaimed journalist and author E. J. Dionne and JTS Chancellor Arnold M. Eisen, a leading scholar of American Judaism, for a frank, wide-ranging discussion of several of the most controversial issues on the American public agenda today: Should faith make a difference in which candidates we support? Should Islam and other religions be held responsible for the evils done in their name—and in God's? Can we be both committed believers and respectful of believers who disagree with us?

E.J. Dionne Jr. is a nationally syndicated columnist with the Washington Post, a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution, and a professor at Georgetown University. His analysis of American politics and trends of public sentiment is recognized as among the best in the business. Author of Souled Out: Reclaiming Faith and Politics After the Religious Right, Why Americans Hate Politics—a National Book Award nominee—and other noted works, he is a regular political commentator on television and radio.



Arnold M. Eisen is the seventh chancellor of JTS. Since his appointment in 2007, he has increased JTS's impact on the communities it serves by transforming the education of religious leadership for Conservative Judaism; articulating a new vision for JTS; and develop-

ing innovative programs in synagogue arts and practices, adult education, pastoral care, Jewish thought, interreligious dialogue, and the arts.





Library CornerAbraham, Isaac, and Art

Dear Librarian:

Each Rosh Hashanah, my family hosts a festive meal. Others cook, but my job is to introduce a stimulating, holiday-themed discussion topic! This year, I plan to ask the guests for their reactions to the Akedah, that harrowing Torah story read during Rosh Hashanah,

in which Abraham nearly sacrifices Isaac to God. Was Abraham a hero or a dangerous, religious fanatic? If we feel horrified by Abraham's readiness to sacrifice his son, then why do we admire generations of Jews who remained faithful to Judaism, even when that choice endangered their children? Moreover, in the modern United States, don't we sacrifice young people for a "higher good" when we send them to die in wars? I am hoping that our library has some materials to help launch a discussion along these lines.

Dear Holiday Host:

One idea is to display famous art portraying the *Akedah* to stimulate discussion. You could also invite your guests to read aloud (and react to) the powerful anti-war poem by Wilfred Owen that plays off the Abraham and Isaac story (see below).

You will find printable images of *Akedah* paintings by Rembrandt, Caravaggio, and other artists on the Adas website, along with a not-to-be missed video of noted British actor Kenneth Branagh reading the Owen poem. Go to *adasisrael.org/library* and look for **Art for the High Holidays**. I've included some highlights below.

Painting

The story of Abraham's near sacrifice of Isaac has inspired many artists, perhaps because it invokes primal themes relating to parents and children, humans and God. Local rabbi Greg Harris of Congregation Beth El compares artists depicting biblical scenes to the rabbis who wrote *midrash* on biblical stories: both fill in

details that embellish the terse biblical narrative.

Rembrandt's Sacrifice of Isaac captures the dramatic moment when God's angel stops Abraham from slashing Isaac's throat (see illustration). In Rembrandt's portrayal, the angel not only calls out to Abraham, as in the biblical text, but also physically seizes his wrist, forcing Abraham to drop the knife. Isaac's face is hidden; Abraham's hand covers it completely. Perhaps Abraham wanted to ensure that he would not see his son's eyes as he killed him.

Poetry

Wilfred Owen, a World War I soldier and poet, analogized the readiness of European statesmen to sacrifice a generation of young men to Abraham's readiness to sacrifice Isaac. In Owen's poem, Isaac is bound with the belts and straps of a soldier's uniform. Unlike Abraham, however, the World War I leaders tragically forged ahead with the sacrifice:

Parable of the Old Man and the Young

So Abram rose, and clave the wood, and went, And took the fire with him, and a knife.

And as they sojourned both of them together, Isaac the first-born spake and said, My Father, Behold the preparations, fire and iron, But where the lamb for this burnt-offering? Then Abram bound the youth with belts and straps, and builded parapets and trenches there, And stretchèd forth the knife to slay his son. When Io! an angel called him out of heaven, Saying, Lay not thy hand upon the lad, Neither do anything to him. Behold, A ram, caught in a thicket by its horns; Offer the Ram of Pride instead of him. But the old man would not so, but slew his son, And half the seed of Europe, one by one.

HONORING OUR LEADERS & VOLUNTEERS

With this issue, our *Ma Tovu* feature begins its second year. The purpose of the column is to honor and acknowledge congregants who work tirelessly behind the scenes to enrich our Adas Israel experience. This month, with a mixture of affection, appreciation, and respect, we honor Hazzan Jenna Greenberg, our associate cantor, who is leaving us in October to join her family in Chicago, where her husband, Rabbi Joshua Ginsberg, has accepted a rabbi position at Shaare Tikvah B'nai Zion Congregation. Hazzan Greenberg is a graduate of the Miller Cantorial School at the Jewish Theological Seminary, where she received a master's degree in sacred music. She also earned a B.A. in music from Earlham College, studied choral music in Vienna, Austria, began her cantorial studies in Jerusalem, and was a member of the Zamir Chorale of New York.

Hazzan Greenberg has been with us for seven years, starting in July 2004 as our ritual director and becoming associate cantor in 2009. Her formal duties include organizing the daily minyan, serving as clergy at life-cycle events, teaching b'nai mitzvah students (somewhere in the neighborhood of 200 hundred during her tenure), presiding at services, reading Torah, teaching adult education and trop classes, and working with our auxiliary groups. She also has worked with individual members, as needed, teaching synagogue skills, davening, layning and the like.

More than just clergy, more than members, Jenna, Josh, and their children, Ranon (age 4) and Elior (age 20 months) literally have "grown up" at Adas Israel. Jenna's inspiring voice, her magnificent ritual skills (highlighted by her remarkable Torah skills), and her teaching

acumen will be missed. We are delighted to have given Jenna her professional start, and all of us wish the Greenberg/Ginsberg family success and happiness in Chicago.

Hazzan Jenna Greenberg was interviewed by Stephen Lachter.

S: Putting aside your formal duties and the requirements of your position as associate cantor, how would you describe your role at Adas Israel, and what has given you the most pleasure?

J: It is very rewarding to help congregants. It is an honor to organize the daily minyan and to help people through the mourning process. I have developed relationships with those who stay on as regulars in the minyan after their mourning period ends. Regular attendance creates a bond that I am lucky to share with other congregants. I also am in a position to feel the "pulse" of the synagogue; I connect to the various "factions"—no, not really "factions" but "micro-communities—within our larger institution. I make an effort to go to the different minyanim. Since becoming a mother, I have become even more involved in the Gan community. My individual study sessions with congregants learning new skills are very rewarding, to the point that one of my students calls me her "Torah therapist." Making time for individual sessions sometimes is challenging, but as full as my schedule has been, it is always rewarding to help people grow and feel empowered by their Jewish experiences. S: What will you remember most about your time with us?

J: Overall, the synagogue has been very supportive of my career and the twists

and turns my life has taken, specifically the time spent on maternity leave. The staff and congregation embraced my whole family and supported us, even when accommodations had to be made. As an infant, Ranon became the daily minyan's "mascot." There always has been a helping hand for both kids—never a problem finding someone to hold Elior during the service, even to this day. Everyone has been warm, friendly, and helpful.

S: What are your general observations or feelings about Adas Israel and the congregants you have been involved with?

J: I am proud to have served seven years at this significant, some would say "flagship" Conservative congregation. I have grown from a young employee to not only a senior member of the staff but also an engaged member of the community. I have been totally and unequivocally accepted as hazzan. This move is exciting but definitely "bittersweet" for us. Josh will leave at the end of August with Ranon; I will leave with Elior after Yom Kippur in October. I look forward to being with the Adas Israel community through the Yamim Noraim, and I wish everyone a Shana Tova u'Metuka!
