A 'VISION OF RENEWAL' FOR JUDAISM'S FUTURE

(Published in the Saturday, October 28, Washington Post) At Adas Israel, a large and storied

Conservative synagogue in Washington, D.C., we have launched a historic renovation project for our landmark mid-century building, led by renowned architect Hugh Hardy and H3 Collaboration Architecture. The transformation of four major worship and activity spaces and the creation of an innovative learning and engagement center called MakomDC (Place DC) is the keystone of Adas Israel's "Vision of Renewal." This Vision initiative will strengthen Adas's capacity to meet the diverse spiritual, intellectual and social needs of today's Jews and create a lived experience of the unique "technology" of Jewish living.

To revitalize the personal experience of Conservative Judaism, in an age where the

Bubes Family Selected for Shem Tov Award **Shabbat Dinner and** Service, January 18

Adas Israel Congregation will present its prestigious Shem Tov Award to the Bubes family, represented by David and Harriet Bubes and Alan and Nancy Bubes, on Friday evening, January 18, announced synagogue president Johanna Chanin, as part of a congregational Martin Luther King Jr. Weekend.

Established in 1963, the Adas Israel Shem Tov Award was created to recognize synagogue members who have contributed significantly to the betterment of our congregation and community. The inspiration for the award comes from the passage in Pirke Avot (Ethics of Our Ancestors) that reads: "There are three crowns within one's reach—that of Torah, that of priesthood, and that of royalty. The crown of a Good Name, a Shem Tov, however, excels them all."

Receiving the Shem Tov award is a very special event for any recipient, but this year's presentation to the Bubes family marks the first time a second and third generation of Adas

Conservative movement has seen sweeping reductions in membership and participation, it is vitally important that the religious community bravely creates warm, welcoming and innovative environments and tools for fostering Jewish identity. To create a space where our members, as well as the broader Jewish community, can come and be Jewish

in a way that's true and meaningful for them is what our "Vision" initiative is all about.

With that, I am enormously excited to reveal the creation of *MakomDC*, the innovative Jewish learning and engagement center and coffeehouse-style gathering place for the 21st Century. The center will be housed within the state-of-the-art Biran *Beit Midrash* (House of Study), currently being built as part of our historic renovation project.

MakomDC is a completely new kind of immersive experience and modern social magnet for contemporary Jewish life. It is a transformed and active study center, combining Jewish learning with the bustling energy of a modern coffee-house as well as a participatory speaker jam at a downtown open-mic night. Regularly scheduled programs, speakers and events will be announced in the coming year. Upon completion, it will be one of the only progressive, non-Orthodox and technologically equipped Jewish houses of study in the world.

MakomDC attempts to offer Jews the opportunity to do what Jews do best: ask big questions and seek out the answers together — in all aspects of life, not only in Judaism.

Upon entering our renovated building and *MakomDC*, guests will immediately encounter Jewish texts accessible everywhere in multimedia formats, from traditional books to modern computer and internet technology. They'll take in breathtaking Jewish art and imagery, groups of people in animated conversations, as well as young people busy surfing the Web on laptops. So Adas is now both a place to hang out and connect, as well as a place to learn and to pray, which is what a synagogue is all about. The new center will feature world-renowned speakers presenting a variety of *shiurim* (lessons) from all over the world, followed by individual *Havruta* (one-to-one) sessions exploring a wide variety of topics and ideas, using an array of intellectual sources ranging from ancient Jewish texts to modern scientific periodicals.

There is something for everyone and everyone is welcome. That's Judaism.

However, these types of major transformations must not be about bricks and mortar, but rather about people, programs and ideas. Yes, we are renovating the space. However, the physical changes are merely reflections of the energy we already find amongst a thriving community of engaged Jews.

Why Do We Celebrate Hanukkah?

The festival of Hanukkah commemorates the successful struggle for religious liberty, led by the priest Mattathias and later by his son, the brave Judah Maccabee, against the Syrian oppressors, in



the year 167 BCE. That effort culminated in victory for the Jewish people and in recapturing the Temple in Jerusalem. The Temple was cleansed and rededicated to the service of God with lights rekindled in the Sanctuary. The festival is known in Hebrew as *Hanukkah*, which literally means dedication. It is also called the Feast of Lights, because the Hanukkah candles are lit on each of eight successive nights. We celebrate the "miracle of the oil," the rededication of the Temple and the first rebellion for religious freedom.

When Is Hanukkah Observed?

Hanukkah begins on the 25th day of the Hebrew month, Kislev, the day on which the Temple was reconsecrated to the worship of God. The festival is observed for eight days. According to our tradition, the "day" officially begins the evening that precedes it. Hence the first candle is lit on the evening that ushers in the 25th day of Kislev. On each succeeding night of Hanukkah, an additional candle is lit, totaling eight in all. This year, Hanukkah begins on Saturday evening, Dec. 8. Candle lighting takes place in the evening.

Hanukkah Practices

Each Jewish home should have a Hanukkah menorah. The Ruth & Simon Albert Sisterhood Gift Shop has a wide range of hanukkiyot and other Hanukkah items available for purchase.

Place the Hanukkah menorah in a conspicuous place in your home. The lights should be kindled as soon as pos-

sible after nightfall with all members of the family present. Any members of the family, including children, may kindle the Hanukkah lights.

A famous symbol of *Hanukkah* is the dreidel, a four-faced top, with one Hebrew letter on each face. Each letter is the beginning of a Hebrew word—Nes Godol Haya Sham—"a Great Miracle Happened There." Various games can be played with the dreidel, and it is a custom among some to eat potato latkes at this time because they are fried in oil.

Besides being a "home" holiday, Hanukkah is celebrated in the synagogue as well. Hallel Psalms are recited, there is an additional Torah reading in honor of Hanukkah, and a special haftarah is chanted on Shabbat Hanukkah.

How to Light Hanukkah Lights

Light the shamash candle first. On the first evening of *Hanukkah*, one candle is lit, which is placed on the far right of the menorah, as you face it. Place a candle to its left on the second night of Hanukkah and continue placing the candles toward the left on each successive night. Always light the "new" candle for that night first, and then proceed to the right in the lighting process.

On Friday, the Hanukkah candles are kindled before lighting the Shabbat candles. On Saturday night, the Hanukkah candles are kindled after Havdalah, which marks the conclusion of Shabbat, has been recited.

The ceremony of the kindling of lights is the most significant aspect of the festival. The family should remain standing around the Hanukkah menorah as the shamash (the candle used to light the other candles) is lit. As the candle is held, the first blessing over the Hanukkah lights is chanted. See blessings in box below. •

Blessings for Lighting the Menorah





Sandy Relief Effort

Dear Friends:

We have all been stunned by the devastating impact of Hurricane Sandy on the communities in New Jersey, New York City, and Long Island.

I am sure we all in some way want to open our hearts and extend our hands to tens of thousands of people who have lost businesses, homes, all their personal effects, and their neighborhoods. We have been in contact with Jewish leaders in the New York and New Jersey, officials of the Red Cross, and others who have expertise in disaster relief. We have concluded that the best way we can help now is to write a check to support all the efforts to aid the victims. We recommend that you send a generous gift to the Hurricane Sandy Relief Fund set up by UJA Federation of New York, the Hurricane Sandy Relief Fund of Jewish Federation of Greater MetroWest New Jersey, or to the Hurricane Relief Fund of the American Red Cross. UJA Federation of New York has already allocated \$10 million for hurricane relief and I am sure they will be allocating more. Those funds go directly to different local community organizations to help those who are in great need. The American Red Cross along with FEMA is the agency that is responsible for coordinating relief efforts during times of major disasters. We have learned that the Red Cross Disaster Relief Fund is short of funds.

We have been instructed that the donation of material goods is not the most effective way to help as the recovery effort moves forward. People need cash now in order to buy the necessities of life and to replace what has been ruined or destroyed. There is a need for volunteers to help in the clean-up and to support the relief efforts. We are now looking into organizing a group to go to New York to volunteer. In order to do that, we need to figure out our logistics and make sure that we can help in a way that will be supportive and useful. We will be in touch once we have come up with workable plan for this effort.

Israel members are honored. In 1981, Nat Popick (z"l), Harriet's father and Alan's grandfather received this special award.

Harriet and Dave were married in 1951 by Rabbi Metz and Cantor Barkin, so their Adas roots go very deep. Harriet and Dave have four sons, Alan, Ron, Mark, and Ken, all of whom celebrated their *b'nai mitzvah* and confirmation at Adas. Each of the four sons has three children, making an even dozen grandchildren, all of whom, of course, have continued the family legacy and have become a *bar* or *bat mitzvah*.

David is a lifetime member of the Adas Israel Board of Directors and was chairman of the school and education committee for many years. He has also served on the Board of the Greater Washington Jewish Foundation and the Washington chapter of Technion and has devoted time and support to Jewish Foundation for Group Homes and various other organizations.

Harriet has also been very involved with Adas Israel, Hadassah, and the Bubes Family Foundation, which has supported many local Jewish charities here and in Florida. In addition, Harriet and Dave were honored by National Jewish Hospital. Their personal lives have been committed to their family, and they share their values with their children and grandchildren.

David served as president of Carter Service Industries, a well-known regional uniform company, where he worked with his father in-law, Nat Popick; brother in-law, Richard Block (z"/l); and his sons. After selling Carter, David purchased Linens of the Week in 1985, a local linen company he and his four boys turned into one of the largest linen supply com-

panies in the country.

The Popick, Bubes & Block Foundation has continued to support Adas in many ways, including sponsorship of the *Chronicle*. David and Alan has served as co-chairs of the *Kol Nidre* Appeal, and their family business, Linens of the Week, has donated the synagogue linens needs for many years.

Alan and Nancy are recognized as philanthropic leaders in our community in their own right. They are both very dedicated to various organizations in Washington, itself and are focused on the needs of kids and families in the city. Alan is on the board of First Tee, a program that offers inner-city kids after-school programs and lessons in golf, as well as Fields of Dreams and the Youth Baseball Academy, which do the same with baseball.

Alan and Nancy have also recently help to underwrite through Federation, the Peres Center for Peace, Arab Israeli Youth soccer program after their family's visit to Israel. They were the 2011 Yachad honorees for their work in rebuilding homes around the city. In October they were also honored by the Georgetown Ministry, a group of churches and synagogues that feeds the homeless, for their work with that organization.

Nancy was recognized by the Georgetown Citizens Association as Business Leader of the year in 2012 and was recently recognized recently by Rose Park and the Veterans Homeless Shelter in Southeast DC, where she rebuilt the kitchen this year and purchased a new flat screen for residents to watch the Super Bowl. She has served on the board of the

Lab School for many years and was its vice president for development.

Alan and Nancy are also major supporters of Landon, Lab, and St. Andrews schools, which their three children attended. In her spare time, Nancy sells a "few" houses in DC and is nationally recognized by the *Wall Street Journal* for her work.



Library Corner

The Aleppo Codex: Secret History of an Ancient Bible

As I write this, bloody street battles rage in the ancient city of Aleppo, as Syrian government and insurgent forces fight for dominance. Hard as it is to imagine, Aleppo was for centuries the peaceful dwelling place of a vibrant Jewish community and home to one of Judaism's greatest treasures, the oldest and most venerated Hebrew Bible, known grandly as the "Crown of Aleppo" or simply, the "Aleppo Codex."

The Aleppo Codex: A True Story of Obsession, Faith, and the Pursuit of an Ancient Bible by Israeli investigative journalist Matti Friedman brings to light the fascinating, extraordinary history of this preeminent Jewish book. Don't miss this real-life detective story, available in our library.

Early History

Nearly 1,100 years ago in Tiberias, two renowned scholar-scribes collaborated to write what would later be called the Aleppo Codex. (A codex is a handwritten bound book, in contrast to a scroll). Encompassing all 24 books of the bible, the Aleppo Codex was the crowning achievement of generations of work by Masoretes—sages dedicated to preserving ancient oral tradition regarding the meaning and vocalization of Judaism's sacred texts. Unlike Torah scrolls, the Aleppo Codex includes vowels, punctuation, trope marks, and marginal notes, indicating how the sacred words are to be understood, pronounced, and chanted.

Down the years, the fabled codex was captured by the Crusaders, ransomed by Egyptian Jews, relied on by Maimonides to write his great works of Jewish scholarship, and, in the 14th century, carried to Aleppo, Syria, where it remained for nearly six centuries and gained its name. The Aleppo Jews locked the codex in an iron safe within Aleppo's Great Synagogue, treasuring it like a priceless religious icon. Pregnant women and others in need would pray and light candles before the iron safe.

In November 1947, rioting mobs torched the Great Synagogue, raging at the UN resolution permitting a Jewish state in part of Palestine. Miraculously, the codex escaped the flames. For the next 10 years, the codex remained hidden in a storeroom in the Old City bazaar, until the local rabbis sadly concluded that Jewish life in Aleppo was over. They recruited a cheese merchant, Murad Faham, to smuggle the codex out of Syria by concealing it in a washing machine. Arriving in Israel, Faham entrusted the treasure to President Yitzhak Ben-Zvi, a scholar who had long sought the codex for his Ben-Zvi Institute for the Study of Jewish Communities in the Middle East.

Controversy and Mystery

In the secret records of a bitter lawsuit, Matti Friedman


discovered that the Aleppo Jews of Israel fought to regain the codex from the Ben-Zvi Institute. They declared that the codex belonged to the Aleppo community, not to the institute or the State of Israel, and that the courier, Faham, betrayed the rabbis' instructions. Crucial to the dispute was the question, who owned the treasures of the Jewish Diaspora? Many immigrant groups came to Israel bearing rare Jewish texts. The State saw these treasures as the patrimony of the entire Jewish people, insisting that those who safeguarded them while the Jews were in exile must relinquish them to the Jewish homeland. To the Syrian Jews, this reasoning was preposterous. Aleppo had been home, not a place of "exile," nor had they been mere "temporary quardians" of the precious codex.

The Institute retained custody of the codex, but, tragically, did not safeguard its treasure. Two hundred pages of the codex—including virtually all of the Torah—disappeared, possibly on the Institute's watch. On this mystery, too, Friedman sheds some light in his fast-paced, suspenseful book.

have received and the support of our community.

In the coming months, the Gewirz Beit Am will officially

open its doors with an entirely reenvisioned atmosphere and practical use of the space. The room will be expanded and saturated with natural light. It will emphasize the many ways the community gathers, having transformed into a vibrant environment used for worship, meals, celebrations, school programs, classes, meetings, and other activities. All events usually held in the Gewirz Hall have been relocated temporarily, including our daily senior lunch program, which now meets in the Youth Lounge.

During this phase of the renovation, a temporary wall has been erected isolating the Gewirz Hall from the rest of the building. A construction trailer and portable restroom have been placed on the Connecticut Avenue Plaza so workers will not need to be anywhere else in the building.

In mid-December through April, construction will shift to the Charles E. Smith Sanctuary, which will be sealed off by a temporary wall.

The final phase of construction, the lobby/Kogod Chapel/gift shop renovation, will begin in April. More information about the relocation of entrances, exits, and various activities will be released over the

coming months. During the winter months, we will also begin planning and designing the renewed Kay Hall and adjacent spaces.

So after a decade of dreaming, we are finally underway. We are enormously excited to have begun this historic initiative to give ourselves and our children the gift of renewal. Thank you for helping us to achieve the congregation's vision for the future. And please join us as we celebrate our accomplishments over the coming months. *B'Shalom*.

Remembering and Honoring the Memory of Captain John Wilner

End of an 18-Year Quest

French researcher Jean Paul Pitou ended an 18-year quest last month when he visited the gravesite of Capt. John Wilner at Adas Israel Cemetery in Anacostia. Pitou had been studying the 83rd Infantry Division and its role following the Normandy invasion in saving the town of Saint-Briac-sur-Mer in Brittany. Just months after

the town was liberated in August 1944, the people of St. Briac erected a large stone monument in memory of the three American soldiers who were killed there. Capt. John Wilner of Washington, DC, was among those listed, but Wilner's name was misspelled on the French monument as "Woelner," a mistake that went unnoticed until 1994,

when an American veteran, in town to commemorate the 50th anniversary of D-Day, noticed that the name Woelner did not appear in the historical records of the 83rd Division. It took years of searching before Pitou and fellow researchers Gille Billion and Antoine Nosier correctly identified the soldier who gave his life liberating St. Briac as Capt. John Wilner, the company commander of the 709th Tank Battalion that supported the 83rd Infantry. With that information in hand, they traced his burial place to the Adas Israel Cemetery in Anacostia.

The story began in Washington, DC, in 1897, when Joseph Wilner, a recent immigrant from Vilna, Poland, opened a tailor shop on 6th Street, NW. While his business prospered, he and wife Ida raised four sons:
Bernard, Morton, Paul, and
John. Joseph Wilner quickly
became a prominent leader in
the Jewish community, founding
the Jewish Community Center in the
1920s and serving as president of Adas
Israel Congregation for 25 years. When
World War II broke out, all four sons
left Washington to serve their country.
Just six weeks after Bernard died from
an illness, the Wilners were notified of
John's death in battle. Killed on August

15, 1944, while on a reconnaissance patrol in preparation for the attack to liberate the town, Capt. John Wilner posthumously received the Bronze Star for his actions.

As part of Pitou's plans to attend the 83rd Infantry Division's 66th Reunion in Nashville, TN, this past summer, he contacted Glenn Easton, executive director of Adas Israel Congregation, for information about Wilner's final resting place. Easton quickly reached out to the extended Wilner family. John Wilner's daughter, Cathy, who never met her father, made an emotional phone call to Pitou from her home in Switzerland. Neither she nor the rest of the Wilner family had known of the monument to her father or the town's

annual memorial service. Weeks later, Pitou and Easton joined Joel Wind of the Jewish Historical Society and other members of the Wilner family at the Adas Israel Cemetery on a warm July afternoon.

At the graveside, Pitou shared his

research into the battle's history and gave family members an engraved stone and some soil from St. Briac. Later, Pitou visited the archives of the Jewish Historical Society to view documents and photographs of the Wilner family.

And the story

will continue next year, when the village of St. Briac will correct the historical record by adding a plaque with Captain John Wilner's name to the monument on August 15, 2013.

These words from Capt. Wilner's letter to his daughter and his brother's children was found among his papers after his death: "More than anything, I value a cause, an ideal, which is decent and clean, representing relative happiness and insuring the validity of a few of the finer thing which life can offer. . . . I am willing to die fighting for these things; I am happy to fight for them . . .

Capt. Wilner's name is listed annually in the Ads Israel *Yizkor* Memorial Booklet, along with other synagogue members who have lost their lives in service to this country.
