F. Scott Fitzgerald wrote *The* Great Gatsby in 1925 as a poignant commentary on the excesses of the pre-Great Depression jazz era. And now, in 2013, Baz Luhrmann has brought it, once again, to the silver screen a gaudy and beautiful rendering in a moment of economic recovery and rebounding housing markets. We watch this movie in an America hoping to return to dreaming big.

I have long appreciated Fitzgerald's novel as a commentary on the limits of the American Dream that we all hold sacred. Dreams and fantasies, the pursuit of wealth and fame and success—these vanities have been lifted to the highest levels of respect and hope and yearning over the past century. For many, they replace core values. They

replace real connection and contentment with the pursuit of praise, which is a false kind of love. When we have achieved fame and power and wealth, we are validated, appreciated, fawned-over. Jay Gatsby could readily dismiss his outward success as empty of meaning. But his tragedy was that he

could never acknowledge that the object of his desire—Daisy was now a dream as empty as any garish party he threw. Her approval could never be made into real love.

My favorite character in the novel is not Gatsby, but Nick, the narrator. The love that Nick feels for Gatsby is real love, not ersatz fantasy love. Nick loved his friend Gatsby because he could see through his futile pursuit of dreams. In essence, Nick could see into his friend's neshamah, his soul. And what he found was a greatness that lived not just in Gatsby, but potentially in us all: a drive never to give up on the possibility of finding real love.

It strikes me as a funny moment in our society for this picture to roll out. After all, with its hip-hop score and beautiful young cast, it's geared toward the lucrative teen market, and also to the host of twenty-somethings who are struggling to find work, but who are maybe a bit more hopeful nowadays. The movie is a big money-maker, full of visions of what money can and can't buy. Do the Millennials watching this movie identify with their counterparts of a century ago? Or are they much wiser and worldweary, unlikely to fall for illusions the way that Gatsby did?

Dreams and fantasy may capture our yearning, but they can never, in the end, replace reality. That's a hard lesson to learn. When the housing market crashed in 2008, I was hopeful that a silver lining of this recession was the possibility of a spiritual return to reality—to its curses, but also to its blessings. We may lose our jobs, even our houses, but when it's all said and done, we have each other. Real love is the final reality that nothing can take away. But do we have the courage to let go of the fantasy priorities of material success that our society has long exulted?

There are real signs that our economy is doing better. Are we going to breathe a sigh of relief that our interruption on the way to success is now ending? Will that be all that recession meant to us? Will we be able to see past the cool music, the gorgeous costumes, and attractive stars of the movie, and really take in the core message of Fitzgerald's great novel?

As an American who is also committed to the values and wisdom of Judaism, I relish the feeling of infinite possibility in America. But I also am grateful to be grounded in an ancient tradition that demonstrates time and again that nothing can replace the bonds of community, the connection between generations of families, and the power of an authentic spiritual life. I pray for our economy to recover, for jobs to emerge, and for prosperity to reign once again. But I pray with equal fervor that as our Millennials get jobs and build beautiful lives for themselves, those lives will be based on the solid ground of wisdom and not just dreams of external success. I pray that they be more like Nick, and less like Gatsby—cutting through vanity, artifice, and arrogance, and remembering instead that the measure of a life welllived is not the love that we can buy or achieve, but rather the love that we can give. •

Feet on the Ground

Summer is a fine time to think about goals for the shul. Some goals are lofty. Purely operational goals can seem mundane, but they certainly are important. Other goals are immediate: selecting new executive and education directors and assuring smooth transitions. It's a good time to have both feet on the ground.

Before laying out goals though, let's review Vision of Renewal construction. We have devoted years to designing, fundraising, and now constructing renewed physical space. This endeavor (steered with extraordinary dedication) is nearly complete, with the opening of new spaces expected in mid-August. The next phase will be renewal of Kay Hall and adjacent spaces. Barbara and Jack Kay (z"l) generously funded that renewal, and we look forward to beginning work in 2015. Our education facilities also need work, but that, too, is not imminent. Instead, it's time to take a construction breath and renew in other ways.

I think about the shul in three broad categories: first, membership and educational experiences; second, operational management; and, third, Adas Israel in the context of contemporary Judaism. Here are my thoughts about each.

The value of the membership experience should be foremost in our thinking. Renewal is for all of our generations. We do much for young adults with Young Professionals, membership discounts, and programs. The young indeed are the future, and encouraging young members to participate in a synagogue is an important mission. Yet, senior and veteran members also are our present. We should renew joyful respect for these congregants—for their wisdom, for their experience, and for all our sakes. Older members bring us life stories and extraordinary personal histories, some shaped in the crucible. Just as honoring our fathers and mothers is a mitzvah, there is joy in experiencing, venerating, and loving every person in the shul, in all generations.

Now let's look more broadly. We can renew goals to forge deeper relationships among members and with clergy and staff. We can foster feelings that coming to *shul* is coming home. This kind of engagement, whether through a renewed Adas in Your Neighborhood, local learning, or meeting with a rabbi or our cantor in an office or home, should be a significant aspect of the Adas experience. With support from our clergy, staff, and others, Vice President for Membership Steve Rabinowitz takes the lead in renewing initiatives to enhance fulfillment for existing members and to enhance membership growth.

Tisha B'Av

For 20 centuries, *Tisha B'Av*, the ninth of Av, has been the saddest day in the Jewish calendar. *Yom Kippur* is known as the White Fast, *Tisha B'Av* is called the Black Fast. It commemorates

the destruction of both Temples in Jerusalem, the death of Bar Kochba, and the last rebellion against Rome in 135 CE, as well as the expulsion of Jews from Spain in 1492.

When they could, Jews would come to the area near the *Kotel* (the Western Wall) to read *Eicha* (the Book of Lamentations) and to weep. Most Jews, of course, could not come to Jerusa-

lem, and during many periods, the *Kotel* area could not be approached.

In modern times, the establishment of the State of Israel caused some to question whether *Tisha B'Av* was necessary any

longer. This debate continues, although those who observe the day recognize its symbolic power and emphasize that we still lament the destruction of the Temples, which ruptured the sense of connectedness to God.

Our observance of *Tisha B'Av* at Adas Israel is exceedingly touching, a moving experience in which we gather as the sun sets to quietly chant the Book of Lamentations in a subdued atmosphere, by candlelight, using the traditional melody. The evening service on Monday, July 15, begins with *Mincha* at 6:00

pm and *Maariv* and *Eicha* at 9:00 pm. The scroll is chanted again as part of the morning service on Tuesday, July 16,

at 7:30 am service (*Shacharit* and *Eicha*) and *Mincha* at 6:00 pm. Join us in this annual beautiful experience as we connect with tradition and history. •

Sisterhood Year in Review

5773 was an exciting and event-filled year for Sisterhood. We kicked off with *sukkah* decorating, Sisterhood's gift of service to the congregation each fall. This year we worked in conjunction with Ezra Pantry and the Gan to gather nonperishable food. The bounty graced the *bimah* during the holiday, and was then donated to the Capital Area Food Bank. Next, we welcomed Cantor Ari Brown to Sisterhood and the Adas community with a lovely reception, followed by her fabulous recital of Jewish music. As winter approached, Sisterhood staffed the annual Politics & Prose Gift Wrap to benefit the Washington Literacy Council. Then we enjoyed our second annual Sisterhood "Night at the Movies" as part of the Washington Jewish Film Festival. Sisterhood also had the opportunity to collaborate again with Cantor Brown by hosting her musical group, Ashira, which delivered a wonderful concert to the community.

February saw Sisterhood Shabbat, which began with a delicious Friday night potluck (Esther costumes optional) and culminated in a beautiful and thought-provoking Shabbat service, complete with a flash choir. A tasty kiddush followed—compliments of Donald Saltz, our Sisterhood "angel." In the spring, from our fabulous Sisterhood Gift Shop's proceeds, we donated to the synagogue a check for \$15,000 in unrestricted funds, which was received with enthusiasm and gratitude from the Adas Israel Board. Next up, Sisterhood, in conjunction with the Hesed Committee and Membership Committee participated in the Purim Mitzvah Project that prepared and delivered dozens of mishloach manot to members of the Adas community. In April, Sisterhood sponsored a day trip to Philadelphia with the Foundation for Jewish Studies for a stimulating tour of the National Museum of American Jewish History. The month of May found Sisterhood

members biking to Old Town for a historical tour of Jewish Old Town Alexandria.

Throughout the year, Sisterhood co-hosted frequent book chats with the Library Committee and studied Torah with Rabbi Steinlauf's monthly Taste of *Tanach* classes. In addition, we twice hosted the morning *minyan* with Women of the Wall and helped support the Senior Lunch program, where several sisters volunteer. For our final event of the year in June, we learned how to recover our "wow" factor from coach and author Diane Horn, participated in lively Israeli dancing with Lisah Bernstein, and inducted a new Board. Mikvah attendants guide people through profound moments of personal and spiritual transition and facilitate a connection to the holy through Jewish ritual. They offer themselves as

to do. As we introduce new approaches to some services, we should also guard against alienating members or creating concern that Judaism itself is changing. In truth, change has been mostly additive, displacing little. Our daily *minyanim* and Saturday services are quite traditional, though our clergy have been working with new approaches in the Charles E. Smith Sanctuary service. Even so, we can better explain the reasons for new elements and educate about their historical contexts. We learn as we go, and Ricki Gerger, vice president for religious practices and Adult Education, will help guide us collaboratively with our clergy and an experienced Religious Practices Committee.

Educational programs receive constant attention. Our Gan HaYeled Nursery School has successfully initiated a full-day program. Our Religious School has flourished under Josh Bender, but, alas, Josh is departing. As we involve a new director, we will consider how our schools and Education Department can even better meet the diverse needs of a growing student population. Debby Joseph, vice president for education and youth, spearheads much of this effort with strong, involved support from the school steering committees, the Youth Caucus, and many caring and thoughtful parents.

Our second category, operational management, is very broad, so I'll discuss just some aspects. We recently renewed contracts with Rabbi Steinlauf (five years) and Rabbi Feinberg (two years). Glenn Easton's departure in the fall will require a significant transition. The strong staff Glenn developed gives us a leg up. Smooth transition will be a high priority, but not the sole priority.

With an eye toward improving our finances, we can advance an even more successful annual campaign and sustained endowment growth. Although our staffing is prudent, like most synagogues, our dues contributions do not fund total operational costs. We turn to annual giving and endowment earnings to close the gap. This year we already see a stronger annual Adas Fund campaign, with Meredith and Michael Cymerman as chairs. Long-term endowment and capital fund development will also need planning and attention. Vice president for development Pamela Reeves, with a dedicated group of members, has principal responsibility for these development challenges.

We manage our finances well, particularly with fine efforts by Glenn, our controller Lesley Brinton, and other staff. We can strengthen financial management through more integration and planning of our endowment, capital, and operating funds, and raising awareness of needs and giving opportunities. Centralizing and integrating financial management falls to Jeff Goodell, treasurer, and Alexandra Horowitz, assistant treasurer, as well as vice president for administration Herlene Nagler and Pamela Reeves.

The third category seems aspirational, but is essential and pressing. Sustaining Adas Israel over the long term depends on the vitality of Conservative Judaism, Masorti, and religious pluralism. If egalitarian Judaism is to be available outside the United States, we should strengthen our support for Masorti and pluralism in Israel. Closer to home, Adas Israel has not been shy in its criticism of the United Synagogue for Conservative Judaism. The criticism is valid, but we might achieve more by working within USCJ and eventually participating in its leadership. As a large metropolitan congregation, we have that opportunity if not that duty.

Categories and challenges are merely ways of explaining what we undertake. Through officers mentioned above, and together with secretary Laurie Aladjem, assistant secretary Brian Schwalb, and immediate past president Johanna Chanin, we have a committed and experienced Executive Committee. The Board, drawn from across generations and activities within the shul, has the final say. Our committees, often unsung, do much of the work. With so many involved in governance, our actions generally reflect membership preferences. Collectively, well over a hundred members participate in managing the shul, each bringing the benefit of his or her learning and experience. With such a strong collaborative effort, the next two years should bring us excitement and continued success. But for now, let's all have a relaxing and restorative summer.

HONORING OUR LEADERS & VOLUNTEERS

Will the Real Glenn Easton Please Stand Up?

An interview with Stephen Lachter

We've all seen his bio—if you haven't, look at the Adas website. Glenn's achievements are quite impressive. Last month we officially learned of his departure from his resignation letter and the president's reply. Most of us know about Glenn's 22-year career as executive director of Adas Israel. This month, we want to recognize him for his service to the synagogue, the congregation, the Jewish community, and our city, as our *Mah Tovu* honoree.

This interview will not go over old ground, however. Instead, it will attempt to focus on Glenn in a personal way, as a man who always was there when we needed him and who will be loved and missed by all of us.

S: I would be remiss if I did not start out with the \$64,000 question: How did you get here, why are you leaving, and why are you leaving now?

G: After working for several years as a synagogue youth director and executive director of synagogues in California and Rockville, I decided to take a one-year break to pursue my interest in the use of technology in nonprofit organizations. I developed a computer newsletter with 15,000 subscribers; published *The Soft*ware Bible: A Guide to Nonprofit Computing; consulted for synagogues, churches, and other nonprofit organizations; and designed Bulletin Board Systems (before the Internet) for national organizations. In 1991, I was invited to lunch by Bern Segerman and Stu Fidler (z"l), who knew me from my work at B'nai Israel, to give them some guidance on their upcoming search for a new executive director. They wanted to discuss what Adas should look for and what skills were the most important for an executive director. I shared my thoughts, and they asked me when I could start. I later

learned that their intention was not to solicit my thoughts but to solicit me for the position.

Ironically, a similar thing happened with my next congregation, Chizuk Amuno, in Baltimore. After a conversation with its senior rabbi whom I knew from our youth in California, their challenges and my interests led us both to believe that I may have something to contribute to their synagogue as their new executive director. Chizuk Amuno reminds me of Adas Israel 22 years ago and could benefit from many approaches and improvements that our lay leaders and staff have implemented. After so many wonderful years at Adas, I thought the time was right for a change and that I could take much of what I've learned here and apply it there.

S: We know you have a lengthy job description, but what was your most meaningful role as executive director at Adas?

G: I take pride in our ability to make the synagogue part of people's lives. The more we are part of our congregants' lives, the more successful we will be. They're called "life-cycle" events for a reason. We are not here just to rent out our space; we're here to create relationships. It is not about programs; it is about people. Membership at Adas is a relationship, not a financial transaction. It's about creating community and having that community available and responsible when people are in pain and it's about sharing in celebrations. It is meaningful and fulfilling to be helpful to families during difficult times and for family s'machot. The burial of a child, a hospital visit to a sick congregant, the death of a young mother, and the work of our Bereavement Committee are profound events that we all share. A special-needs bar mitzvah, deliver-



ing food to the home with a new baby, helping a young couple get married, are all times that our community steps up to the task.

Our relationships as a staff, that family feeling and the remarkable longevity of many current and former staff members make Adas Israel special. Our approach to staff benefits and equality, support of professional development, enjoyable and food-infused working environment (except during this construction), supportive lay leaders, continued support of Jimmy Young, fun staff mystery bus rides, and holiday luncheons are some reasons why we were voted "Best Nonprofit to Work For" by the *Nonprofit Times*.

S: How were you able to accomplish these goals?

G: The underpinning of our success is the clergy, staff, and lay leader partnership working together to create the necessary administrative and financial foundation for the synagogue to thrive. I have worked with 10 different rabbis and cantor, 10 different presidents, and innumerable officers, committee chairs and members. Their leadership, combined with the participation of our wonderful members and the generosity of our donors, enables the congregation to excel, experiment, and "celebrate Conservative Judaism at its best," as coined by the

We are pleased to welcome Gail Mattison to Adas Israel as our new event coordinator.


As part of our staff reorganization to better serve our members and streamline our administrative functions, we have consolidated tasks currently performed by three people into this new portfolio.



late Charles Lerner (z"l). Our budget is balanced, our endowment fund is significant, policies and practices are in place, and our construction is fully pledged (and may even finish on time). I feel I am leaving Adas in a sound, solid condition. S: Can you think of a moment in your early years that made you feel really part of the synagogue and community? G: The day before the Bar/Bat Mitzvah Family Retreat in 1996, Rabbi Wohlberg's father died, and I was called upon to pitch in and run the retreat along with the b'nai mitzvah families. Most of the families did not know me well. Between the services, singing, and discussions I was able to develop a bond with the parents and kids who began to see me in a different light from the administrative guy sitting in the office.

Similarly, every year when I have the honor of leading *Havdalah* at the end of *Yom Kippur*, I feel that unique bond with our members. (I hope I can get through my last *Havdalah* at Adas this Yom Kippur without tears.)

S: Can you recount a particularly challenging moment?

G: You know I'm going to talk about "Kol

Nidre Without Power." As you probably remember, the morning of *Erev Yom Kippur* in 2004, the transformer that feeds the synagogue blew out. Little did I know when I dashed out of the house in shorts and a baseball cap (and without breakfast) that I would be on site (and fasting) for 36 hours. I spent the entire day working to get the power back on, trying to find alternative space for services, calling a congregant on the PEPCO board to get the problem fixed. Indeed, things were moving forward, but not quickly enough. A backup transformer was on its way, but the driver got lost. The new transformer arrived at 6 pm, and the power was restored by 10 pm, but in the interim we had a crane on working on Quebec Street and emergency lights in place. When the fire department trucks arrived, we thought they would shut us down. Instead, they brought in portable lights, and somehow services went on as scheduled. Most members remember it as their most memorable and spiritual Kol Nidre, notwithstanding the heat.

S: Final thoughts?

G: I could fill the entire *Chronicle* with remembrances of special times and events

during the last 22 years. Hosting the National Memorial Service for Yitzhak Rabin, being accompanied to Israel by my rabbi and three past presidents to see me installed at NAASE president, Florida reunions with pioneer members, the b'not mitzvah of our daughters, our 125th Anniversary Gala, and the many special friendships are just a few that come to mind. But I know you are particularly interested in interfaith outreach—Keruv.

Early in my tenure, I realized that we were not responsive to and respectful of our dual-faith families and our gay and lesbian members. With the support of clergy and lay leaders, we no longer ignored a non-Jewish spouse, we recognized "nontraditional" households, and we created a culture where no one is denied membership, education, or participation due to financial hardship. We are, after all, a synagogue, not a business.

I leave with a touch of sadness for the friends I will not see regularly, but I'm moving on to a new challenge where I hope to bring fresh ideas and a new vision to another wonderful congregation.
