bled. Vestiges of the practice remain in the modern state of Israel, where various rabbinic and political dignitaries have, over the decades, publicly read the relevant Torah portion at the Kotel plaza in the post-*shemitta* year.

The Torah is very specific in delineating who is to come to this ceremony, demanding that all men, women, and infants be present for the event. The list of participants perplexes the rabbis of the *Talmud* who wonder what value there would be in bringing children too young to listen to such an event. The answer they provide is perhaps more perplexing than the question, as the rabbis tell us, "Men come to study, women to listen, and infants in order to grant reward to those who bring them."

In essence, the Torah seems to be giving a needless command, just to reward us for then carrying out that commandment. We certainly have no shortage of *mitzvos* from which to draw reward, and adding another for no other purpose seems quite superfluous.

The *Chiddushei Ha'Rim* offers an intriguing perspective that speaks volumes about the relationship between G-d, the Jewish people, and the Torah. As he explains, once there is an obligation for each and every adult male in the entire country to travel to Jerusalem to be present for this event, who will be left behind to babysit the young children? It is inevitable that all young children be brought along, for there is simply no other option. If so, why must the Torah bother to instruct us to bring the very young, when there is no choice but to bring them?

That is the great insight of the *Chiddushei Ha'Rim*. Without the explicit instruction in the Torah to bring the children, we would have done so anyway, but there would have been no *mitzvah* to do so and therefore no reward for it. G-d, wishing to shower his beneficence on the People of Israel made the inevitable into a *mitzvah* in order to grant us reward for that which we would have done in any event.

While this phenomenon is unique to the *mitzvah* of *hakhel*, the underlying sentiment is not. The purpose of the entirety of the Torah is to bring reward and benefit to its adherents. We often lose sight of the forest of reward for the trees of the Torah's restrictions. This *mitzvah* helps reframe our perspective.

As Rabi Chanania *ben Akashia* reminds us in the final chapter of *Makkos*, "G-d desired to grant benefit to Israel. That is why he gave them a plentitude of Torah and commandments." The ultimate goal of Torah and *mitzvos* is not restriction, pain, suffering, or asceticism. The Torah and all its commandments are G-d's way of bringing reward to all who follow its precepts.

That is a vital perspective in these Days of Awe. While we rightly stand in trepidation in this most vital time period, we should not lose sight of the fact that G-d, Himself, is rooting for our success. His desire is to shower us with blessing and bounty. Our task is to help G-d to reach that goal by removing anything that might stand in the way.
