STRONGER TOGETHER

In 1958 Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel addressed a group of American rabbis. Israel was just barely a decade into her existence. He focused on how American Jews can show support for the newly founded Jewish state from so far away.

In the address he outlines three ways to aid Israel. First, we can give money and political support. The second was to make aliyah, to immigrate to Israel. The third way to aid Israel was the true focus of his address. In his words, the third way is "to bring about an inner spiritual and cultural aliyah on the soil of America."

Since October 7th our eyes have been locked on Israel, with the occasional distraction of rising antisemitism here in America. The response to the October 7th massacre, the continued terror attacks by Hamas and the disturbing reports of antisemitism on American college campuses has been unprecedented. The Jewish community along with a team of allies has been working around the clock to offer support. This battle is far from over and these efforts must continue.

Heschel's insight from half a century ago remains important as well. We cannot only fight those who are against us, we must also gather together those among our people to help build a strong Jewish religious and cultural identity. If the last month has shown us anything it is that the Jewish people are deeply connected to each other. Israeli and American, Sephardic and Ashkenazic, Reform and Orthodox. We are connected to each other and we need each other. This is our greatest strength.

Heschel's charge to build a strong foundation in the diaspora was not self-serving. It was strategic. The stronger our foundation, the better we can hold up the parts of the Jewish world when they are attacked.

It is the time of year to turn our focus on Jewish camp. On November 17th we are excited to welcome two experienced camp song-leaders to help lead a special Shabbat service. We welcome all current and former Jewish camp alumni, from every Jewish camp to join us along with those who never had the chance to spend a summer in this special place.

This special Shabbat was planned long before October 7th. But I think Heschel would agree that there has been no place in America that has sparked such an "aliyah" to Jewish identity as has our Jewish camps. I hope he would say that this is precisely what we need in this moment.

The stronger we are together, the stronger we are when we face those who wish to break us apart.

The first committee meeting for Mitzvah Day 2024 will take place at Temple on December 6, 2023 starting at 7 PM. If you have an idea for a new project, would like to chair a project, or you would simply like to participate on the committee please join us for the meeting.

BACK TO THE FUTURE- New Emerging Leaders Program

I admit it has been difficult recently to fully concentrate on Temple Israel. Much of what we do can seem somewhat trivial now compared to the war in Israel and our continuing and increasing anguish about the situation. As President, I've felt my own concentration slip and start to lose focus at times. But, I came to the conclusion that one of the ways to help Israel and the Jewish community at large is to make sure our own Jewish community and synagogue are as strong as possible for future generations.

We can do this is by engaging new leaders so that Temple Israel is here for generations to come. To that end, we are once again encouraging Temple Israel members to participate in our second Emerging Leaders class to begin in early 2024.

Like in 2022, this program will consist of four in-person monthly modules on Sunday mornings to give congregants the tools to become potential new leaders on multiple levels in our synagogue. We will discuss emerging trends and issues of Reform synagogue leadership as well as learn from some of the congregants who have had an impact on our synagogue through their work at Temple Israel. Whether your interest lies in potentially leading a committee, a singular project, or membership on the Board of Trustees, we invite you to participate in this program. The class is limited to 10 participants. There is no commitment or obligation once you finish the course.

In our October Board of Trustees meeting we discussed a sermon given by Rabbi Robert Nosanchuk, Senior Rabbi of Ashe Chesed Fairmount Temple in Cleveland. This past Erev Rosh Hashana, Rabbi Nosanchuk spoke about the need across the years to change and modify the way we think. In perhaps his signature line of the sermon he said: "But tonight I'm going to say something that is tough on your ears: what got us here won't get us there." What I believe Rabbi Nosanchuk was telling us is that the thinking and methodology that got us to this point and brought us growth and a new building and a thriving Religious School and great clergy may not be the thinking that takes us into the future. To not just sustain but grow our Jewish community at Temple Israel we need new leaders who can and will take us to the next level. We are counting on so many of you to become those leaders.

LOOK TO THE LIGHT A Rockin' Ruach Hanukkah Celebration



Hanukkah, which means "dedication" in Hebrew, is an eight-day festival of light. It marks the rededication of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem in 165 B.C.E., when a small group of Jews led by Judah Maccabee and his brothers were victorious against great odds over the Syrian armies that sought to destroy the temple and the practice of Judaism.

We associate Hanukkah with miracles, not only because of the military victory of the Maccabees, but because of a later Talmudic story describing a single day's supply of oil lasting for a full eight nights—a miracle that enabled the Jews to replenish their oil supply during the rededication of the Holy Temple.

At Temple Israel, we find ways to bring in light where there is darkness. During the shorter days of winter and in times of hardship, we look to the light - the light of family, the light of friendship, and the light of hope. This Hanukkah, let us celebrate the miracle of light, the blessings we have in our lives, and the glow that comes when we can be together as a community in ruach (spirit) and in song.


The URJ operates 14 camps across North America including the specialty 6 Points Academies dedicated to Sports, Sci-Tech and the Creative Arts.



RECIPES FROM SISTERHOOD'S 1977 COOKBOOK

POTATO KUGEL (In muffin tins)

6 large potatoes

l large onion

2 whole eggs

½ tsp. baking powder

5 tbsps. flour

2 tsps. salt

Coarse black pepper

Grate potatoes and onion. Place plate on top of bowl, pour out liquid. Add rest of ingredients and mix thoroughly. Fill three well greased (with chicken fat) muffin pans less than ¾ full. Dot with chicken fat. Bake at 425° for fifteen minutes, then reduce heat to 350°, and bake for one hour.

SEVEN MINUTE PUMPKIN PIE

l baked 9" pie shell

l pkg. custard dessert mix, or vanilla pudding mix

2 tbsp. flour

¼ tsp. salt

½ cup (packed) brown sugar

l tbsp. pumpkin pie spice

1-2/3 cup (14 oz. can) evaporated

1½ cups canned pumpkin

34 cup chopped walnuts

In saucepan mix custard dessert, flour, salt, sugar and spice. Add milk and pumpkin. Cook, stirring, to a full boil. Remove from heat; cool about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the walnuts. Pour into pie shell. At serving time spoon on fluffs of whipped cream and arrange walnut halves on top. — Mrs. Donald Rosen.
