NACHSHON'S PLATE

In the midrash we are told that a man by the name of Nachshon was the first to step into the Sea of Reeds before it split, opening the Israelites' path to freedom. After the Israelites found their freedom the midrash explains that Nachson brought a gift for the new sanctuary. The gift was a silver plate. Nachshon explained that he wanted to give a circular gift to the sanctuary, symbolizing the circular world. But he brought a particular message. He hoped that the silver plate would remind the people how unruly and chaotic the sea can be, but also how we have the ability, with God's help, to move through the harshest of waters.

This story is just one of many origin stories of the seder plate we place on our tables every Spring. Passover is one of our most versatile holidays. The flexibility of the rituals calls out to us, not only asking us why this night is different from all other nights, but why this year is different from the previous year. Often we adjust what is on the Seder plate in order to reflect the concern of the year. This is why many have placed an orange on their seder plate for years, symbolizing women's rights and LGBTQ rights as society began to fight for them.

This year, underneath all of the symbology, new and old, perhaps we will notice the plate that has always been there. The plate that holds our story. The plate that Nachshon first gave to his people to remind them that the world is a dangerous place, but we, we have always found a way to walk through rough waters toward freedom.

For the first time since the pandemic, we will be hosting our communal second-night Seder at Temple Israel. It is a night filled with symbols and stories, but most importantly, as Passover has always been, it is a night to recall the challenging path of our people. Undoubtedly, this year, our hearts will be with the hostages, should they still be held in captivity. But as we open the door to Elijah and declare "Next Year in Jerusalem", we will once again proclaim, as Nachshon did, that we can weather the strongest storm, so long as we do so together.

TEMPLE SECURITY

With a rise in antisemitism, many of us feel a heightened awareness and vulnerability even in NE Ohio. As Chair of Temple's Security Committee, I am reaching out to fellow congregants to at the very least inform you of our existence and purpose and hopefully provide some reassurance. Our committee members represent a diversity of experiences at Temple. They are:

Linda Barr, Audrey Baker, Mike Butlein, Carol Friedman, Cem Ersahin, Don Leuchtag , Amy Stewart, Kevin Newman, Nat Weiner and Steven "Skip" Radwany – Chair

Increasing concerns in recent months force us to carefully reassess our current vulnerability and needs to assure the safety of our clergy, employees, congregants and guests. A brief outline of our recent efforts follows.

Throughout the month of October our committee met to complete the Ohio Nonprofit Security Grant application. This did not meet with success perhaps due to having previously received funding twice. Our committee hopes to apply for the federal nonprofit security grant if and when the funding for FEMA and Homeland Security are approved in the budget by Congress. Updates will follow.

Throughout the last several months we have been assessing the environment via local and national sources of information to adjust the need for a security presence. For larger attended events we are currently engaging two police officers plus a visible law enforcement car when available. Prior State grants have supplemented the Security Fee each member family pays to account for this increased presence. The cost for this valuable law enforcement presence, though, has recently increased so we are thankful to our member families for diligently paying their yearly security assessment.

Through these volunteer efforts much has been done and will continue to be done to assure your safety and peace of mind. The fundamental goal of these security efforts is that we all continue to gather, to worship, to learn and to celebrate with joy and without undue worry. 
