Find Your Moment



If you wanted to choose the biggest-deal rabbi in the Talmud, you could do worse than 2nd Century Rabbi Shimon ben Azzai, commonly known simply as Ben Azzai. His stature as a giant of rabbinic studies was such that, when other rabbis were proud of their own scholarship, they would sometimes exclaim, "Look at me — I'm a Ben Azzai!"

Perhaps we can understand that he wasn't always the most modest guy. A midrash explains that he was once teaching, and his form was suddenly surrounded by fire. Asked about it by a concerned colleague, none other than Rabbi Akiva, he responded plainly, "I string together, like pearls, the words of the Torah with the Prophets and the Writings — therefore the words rejoice, just like the day when they were revealed in the flames of Sinai!"

And yet, Ben Azzai had great respect for all the members of his community. In the Talmudic text, *Pirkei Avot* — "The Sayings of the Ancestors" — Ben Azzai teaches, "There is no

person who doesn't have their moment."

Our theme this year is Machloket L'Shem Shamayim, "Argument for the Sake of Heaven." In this challenging moment, other times we think our words are the most important, and most powerful. We burn with the fire of passion. And sometimes, we feel incapable of the task of speaking up, estimating ourselves as unworthy of the moment. Ben Azzai teaches us to remember the power in the words of those who we might foolishly dismiss — whether that's others or ourselves.

Every soul has its moment. If we're blessed, numerous moments! During these Yamim Norai'm, these Days of Wonder, may you find yours. And may the moments we find be ones in which we kindle the fire within our souls, using our words not to destroy and consume, but to light a path to joy and justice, reconciliation and wonder.

Techniques for Prayer

Sourced from Rabbi Joseph Berman & Kavod Boston

Prayer is meant to be powerful, relevant, and meaningful. This is often easier said than done, especially if the language and words are unfamiliar. Here are some suggestions for where to start.

1. Linger with a phrase that moves you.

Don't rush- when a word or phase grabs your attention, stay with it. Focus on depth rather than volume. The goal is not to get through the prayer; the goal is for the prayer to get through you. You might find a pace that differs from those around you. That is OK. You can join us again later.

2. Focus on the words.

Focus on the words themselves. Take them seriously as having possible meaning for you in your life.

3. Interpret the prayers.

Try to interpret the meaning of a prayer as you go, the same way you might interpret poetry or a text from the Torah. We are taught: "There are 70 faces to Torah," which is to say, there are many, many ways to read and understand a text or prayer!

4. Skip what doesn't work and rewrite it in your head.

There may be words in the liturgy that don't work for you. They may be inaccessible, triggering, offensive, or perhaps just "off" in some other way. Sometimes this discomfort can be good, productive even, challenging us to examine our own beliefs or feelings. It might help us to see the world in a new light. At other times, this discomfort can be hurtful or get in the way of our connecting to prayer and to Spirit/God. In these moments, we invite you to skip the passage or rewrite the words for yourself.

5. Create your own prayers.

Have a one-on-one conversation with Spirit/ God or a dialogue between you and the world. Here are some prompts to get you going:

On this day, Hashem/Spirit/Life Force/Creator/God/Goddess/etcetera

- I feel...
- I am thankful for...
- Please...
- I want to...
- I allow...
- I honor...
- I offer...
- Insert your own words...

CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING @ CBH



It's not too late to register and join the fun! Our Sunday program meets from August 2023-May 2024, and offers our students a wealth of Jewish connection & learning.



WHAT MAKES OUR SCHOOL A TRUE FAMILY?

Though most of our classes are geared toward our children, parental involvement is a vital part of our educational environment. We seek to involve parents in every way we can, both as leaders and as learners as leaders because your involvement vastly increases our programming resources, and as learners because we believe that children value that which they see valued by the adults they respect. Throughout the year, there will be several opportunities for parents both to teach and to learn, and we very much hope you will take part—in fact, we depend on it!

WHAT DOES OUR KINDERGARTEN-6TH GRADE PROGRAM LOOK LIKE?

We begin each Sunday with a morning minyan geared toward families. This is a wonderful time for you to connect with your child(ren) before they head off to class. We use the dynamic ShalomLearning curriculum for both Judaics and Hebrew for grades K-6. This program is a progressive and inclusive, values-based curriculum which teaches on a variety of topics using a digital platform. Students will learn to decode Hebrew, develop prayer skills and build strong Jewish identities. The K-6 students are also able to dive into some of their passions through our Haverim Club electives program which includes Omanoot (art), Shirah (music), Teva (nature), Sport (you guessed it—sports) and Jewish Drama!





Changing the Way We Engage Teens at CBH

Teen years, including our Brit Mitzvah year, are a time of powerful discovery for our young people. In recognition of that special period of time in their journey, the CBH Community School has embarked on a process of focusing our 7th graders on age-relevant themes. With the Brit Mitzvah Breakfast Club that Rabbi Mike kicked off last year, our 7th and 8th grades already offer a focus on building lasting Jewish friendships with peers, fostering selfconfidence/leadership skills, and proactively engaging with the world around us. We have heard from both students and families that the program has been a great success. This year, we will be building on that success to expand the scope of the program.

7th Grade:

CBHCS is excited to collaborate with Rabbi Mike, Rebekka Goldsmith and Alisa Bouer as the leaders of our 7th grade programming.

Weekly sessions will incorporate the following areas of focus:

- Brit Mitzvah Breakfast Club with Rabbi Mike: For 7th graders preparing for a CBH Brit Mitzvah, Rabbi Mike's beloved monthly class for Brit Mitzvah students (and their grown-ups!) returns this year, exploring personal and communal Jewish identity.
- Jewish Leadership Skills with Alisa: Building self-esteem through a Jewish lens, while establishing themselves as leaders in our CBHCS community.
- Project Prayer with Rebekka: Dive more deeply into prayer to build both skills and confidence as students prepare for Brit Mitzvah.

8th Grade:

Each weekly meeting will rotate through the following

- Middot & Nature: Exploring nature while we explore Jewish values as they connect to themes in nature (7th graders will be with Rabbi Mike for BMBC on 8th grade nature outing Sundays)
- Jewish Leadership Skills: Building confidence & self-esteem, while establishing themselves as leaders in our CBHCS community
- Tikkun Olam Service Projects: Living our Jewish values by giving back to our local communities, and advocating for change to make our community more just

An Intentional Al Chet

Martin Buber tells the story of the great Hasidic Rabbi Zusya (Rabbi Zusya of Hanipol). On his deathbed he began to cry uncontrollably and his students and disciples tried hard to comfort him. They asked him, "Rabbi, why do you weep? You are almost as wise as Moses, you are almost as hospitable as Abraham, and surely heaven will judge you favourably."

Zusya answered them: "It is true. When I get to heaven, I won't worry so much if God asks me, 'Zusya, why were you not more like Abraham?' or 'Zusya, why were you not more like Moses?' I know I would be able to answer these questions. After all, I was not given the righteousness of Abraham or the faith of Moses but I tried to be both hospitable and thoughtful. But what will I say when God asks me, 'Zusya, why were you not more like Zusya?'

As the High Holidays approach, we are reminded that life is a process of becoming fully ourselves. Throughout the Days of Awe, we may ask ourselves if we have been true to that process, and if not, where we made less than life-affirming choices for ourselves and in our interpersonal relationships.

Between now and Kol Nidre, gently consider the ways in which you have sometimes chosen to do the wrong thing and then complete each card as described below. 
Finally, as we each seek forgiveness for these acts, let us remember the words of the Mishna:
