

Beneath the menorah is the word "אָרָאָל" written in Hebrew.

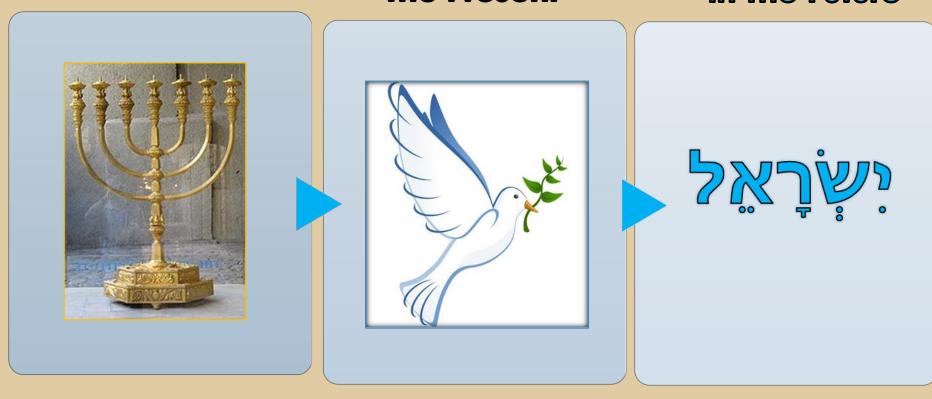


# The Emblem represents the heritage of the Jewish people:

The menorah stood at the Temple in Jerusalem; The ancient menorah had seven branches—one for each day of Creation, and the number of letters of the city Jerusalem in Hebrew

## יְרוּשֶׁלַיִם

The menorah attests to the link of the Jewish people with its glorious past in the homeland and the return of the state to its former luster (through the metaphor of the restoration of the menorah from the Arch of Titus to its place in Israel), and indirectly, the beginning of the end of the Diaspora.







### Mil iðin

The olive tree, which has been an important component of Jewish and Israeli culture throughout history, has become a symbol of many values in Jewish life.



The olive branch is a symbol of peace and is mentioned in the story of Noah and the flood from the book of Genesis.

Olives were also the source of the oil that was used to light the menorah in the temple.





The ultimate symbol of modern Israel, incorporating three simple elements – Menorah,
Olive branches,
and Israel –
adequately reflects both the grandeur of Jewish history and Herzl's dream of a contemporary



Jewish state.
