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FROM THE DESK OF RABBI RAVSKI

The Festivals: A Year of Celebration, Enrichment and Engagement (and lots of free stuff!)

In just a few months we will all gather together (God-willing) to celebrate the High Holidays, the holiest and most solemn days of the year. Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur stand out as three days that most Jews, no matter denomination or observance level, recognize as sacred days when we are drawn closer to God and our community.

The Torah also describes another set of holidays and together, describes them as *Shlosh HaRegalim*, three pilgrimage festivals. Each of these three holidays is tied to both a historical event in the Israelites journey from the Exodus to the Promised Land, and each is also connected to a seasonal harvest. Three times a year, the Torah tells us, we are commanded to make the pilgrimage to Jerusalem to appear before God and offer sacrifices in commemoration of our history and in gratitude for the harvest. The three seasonal festivals are: Passover (Spring), Shavuot (Summer) and Sukkot (Fall).

Each of the Festivals comes with its own set of observances, ritual objects, traditions, foods and so much more. Unlike the High Holidays, the Festivals are much more involved, more detailed and they tend to require more preparation, and sometimes even more effort, than Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur (not to mention Passover and Sukkot are much longer holidays at 8 and 7 days respectively). All the hard work that goes into them though also makes them more joyous and robust holidays, if you know how to make them so.

In this coming year of 5783, Synagogue Emanu-El is excited to present a year long program we are calling "The Festivals." The Festivals program, which is generously supported by a grant from the Charleston Jewish Federation, will help make each of the three holidays more accessible, inclusive, engaging and fun! A few weeks before each of the holidays we will hold a workshop, a morning or afternoon of learning about all the elements and rituals- how to shake a Lulav and Etrog (and what they actually are!), why we drink four cups of wine at the Seder (and how to lead one!), what's the best cheesecake to celebrate the Torah (chocolate, always chocolate)? We will also explore ways to make each of the holidays meaningful for every generation of your family, so that everyone can connect and celebrate the festival together without feeling like something must be sacrificed. It's a program for every generation and all ages.

Learning about the holidays is important, but for us its also not enough. The goal of this program isn't just to know more about each holiday, but to prepare you to celebrate each one and make it easier. This is why when we open the sign-up for the Sukkot program (which will be held on Sunday, September 18th) the first 10 households who register will receive a <u>free</u> 8x8 Sukkah from the Sukkah Project (which we will practice building). <u>Every</u> household that registers will get a <u>free</u> Lulav and Etrog (which we will practice shaking), and any household that wants can also choose to receive a subscription box from Days United containing Sukkot themed activities for kids. The Passover and Shavuot programs will likewise have great opportunities to learn about each holiday's traditions, *how* to celebrate them, and the gift of ritual items associated with each Festival as well.

There are so many more exciting elements and layers to talk about as we get closer to each of the holidays and workshops. At its core, what this entire program has been developed around is the idea of making each of these three Festivals more engaging and accessible to every member of our community. I look forward to seeing everyone at Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, and beyond that I am excited to see everyone throughout the year as we explore and celebrate The Festivals together throughout 5783!

SECURITY

CALLING/TEXTING 911

By Lisa Lambeth, <u>Concealed 360, LLC</u> Synagogue Emanu-El's Security Consultant

Charleston County Consolidated 911 Dispatch Center is where your call will go if calling from Synagogue Emanu-El. You will be greeted by a voice that will say: "911 What's your emergency?" It's important that you get the information that is most important out first. As noted in past articles: WORDS MATTER and now the ORDER OF THE WORDS MATTER.

First rule of thumb is to NOT assume someone else has dialed 911. Also, only call if it is safe to do so. If you need to remain silent, but it is safe to TEXT, you can text 911.

What to say:

- Name and phone number: In case you are disconnected or have to suddenly be silent.
- Location: Give the address "5 Windsor Dr., and/or Synagogue Emanu-El"

 Describe emergency: "Active Shooter inside Emanu-El." "Shots fired. Need help. Police and Ambulance."
- Number of attackers involved: "One shooter" "I don't know how many, but there's a lot of shots."
- Describe attackers: "White male with military style clothes."
- Number and type of weapons: Do not try to get specific by saying AR-15 or Glock. Say simply "Long gun." Or "Handgun/pistol."
- Describe security people: "Our security people are NOT in uniform. They will have a bright yellow banner across their body saying SECURITY."
- Nature of injury or illness: "There are people shot. I do not know how many, but I can see 4 on the floor."
- Number of injured: See above
- Number of people in building: "There were about 35 people in the service."
- Remember to stay on the line until help arrives, if possible



What to say when you call 911: "Active Shooter at 5 Windsor Dr., Charleston." Then just listen if you forget what else to say. The operator will do the rest.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL- CONFIRMATION SPEECH #2



Look for your Religious School Registration Packets in your email around the end of July!

Hi. My name is Sydney Delson. I'm graduating not just from high school, not just from religious school, but graduating into the next phase of my life. When I'm looking back at synagogue, I can honestly say I've spent my entire life here. We've been active members of the synagogue for as long as I can remember. I actually remember following the torah around with my mini torah and my big floppy pink hat because I wanted to be like my mom and feel like my mom did when I saw her pray. I look back at all of the memories, but what sticks out most isn't the memory per se, but the feelings I get from these memories. Maya Angelou (anjaloo) said "I've learned that people will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel." and that's synagogue Emanuel to me.

My bat mitzvah was of course a joyous occasion with a lot of hard studying and volunteerism, but it was actually a pretty sad time for me. My grandfather passed away a couple days before my bat mitzvah. I don't remember a lot of specifics, I was so stressed and so sad. But what I remember most about it, was how my synagogue family made me feel. I don't think I've ever felt so supported then I did at that time. The rabbi was so worried about me, Daphne checked on me daily, and I just remember the understanding and love that I got from my friends. I remember seeing a lot of familiar faces from the synagogue at my house, but I couldn't believe that they were all there. They didn't even know my grandfather. He didn't live in Charleston. I don't even remember who exactly was at my house. But what I remember, and what I want to convey, is the sense of family, love, and respect they all had for me, my grandmother, for my dad, and my grandfather. I will always take that with me. And it taught me that I will always have a family at my synagogue, not just to share in the happy times, but to support me in the times that I need to be lifted up.

What religious school has taught me, and what Daphne has taught me (sidenote, I'm lucky she's one of my mom's best friends) is how to transverse my secular life with my Jewish life, and how they are really one in the same. You're not supposed to separate your Judaism in any aspects of your life. It's interwoven within me, it's in my DNA, it's in my blood. I can look to the Torah and my lessons here to guide me if I'm ever at a point in my life where I don't know which way to go. My lessons have given me security that I will make the right choices, the choices that respect my Jewish heritage, my family, and myself.

Maybe I feel a little bit more pressure on me. As the granddaughter of a holocaust survivor, I know my choices don't just reflect me, but they also reflect those who perished before me. When I went to the Holocaust museum with my classmates, it solidified my understanding and obligation that is part of my birth right. But as I walked across the bridge at Selma, and as I saw the terrors of the Native Americans, I was reminded that we were not the only ones. Many people before me were marginalized, segregated against, and persecuted because of their beliefs, the color of their skin, their identity, ethnicity, and for being born at the wrong place at the wrong time. I am connected to these events, to these people, through my religion, but also through my humanity. I recognized through the teachings of religious school and the trips that we took that injustice didn't start at the holocaust, and it is still going on today.

I want to be the Jew who gets inspired by prayer, that follows the Torah, that learns from my mistakes, that questions everything, but accepts the truth. Religious school has helped give me the tools to understand how I can do those things. I have so much to learn, but I have so much that I can fall back on. This isn't the end, this is the new beginning of my Jewish adulthood. I am supported by the people sitting here today, who have helped me grow into the person that I am, and the person that I want to be, so thank you Daphne, thank you Lara, thank you Rabbi, thank you to my family, to my friends, and to all of you. Thank you all.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL- CONFIRMATION SPEECH #3

I am honestly not sure where to start. Emanu-El has taught me the basics, how to read Hebrew, how to lead services, the power of friendship and religion, and most importantly, that the synagogue had all the good snacks, you know, the ones my mom wouldn't buy us as kids. Besides all the great snacks and basic requirements, Emanu-El taught me how to be Jewish. I will be honest, I have had two instances in my life where I "lost religion" if you will. Once in 7th grade and once in 10th grade. In 7th grade I suffered from pretty bad depression and was experiencing feelings I had never had to deal with before, but worst of all, I was dealing with this alone, to nobody's fault but my own. Ironically this was also the year I had my bat mitzvah. So double the stress. The reason I lost religion was because i was struggling to understand why God would let me experience all these horrible | feelings, and come to find out I wasn't the only one was difficult. If my bat mitzvah taught me anything, it was how to get done what needed to be done, no matter what you're going through, and that I wasn't alone, because though it was hard work, I had a room full of people that supported me, and the relief I felt once I was finished was overwhelming. I actually didn't find God again until the shabbat after my bat mitzvah, where I read my first Aliyah as a Jewish adult. I can't describe why that brought me back to my religion, all I know was it felt like a weight had been lifted off of me.

Emanu-El and USY also taught me the power of leadership and community. I had never truly known what it meant to be part of a community until I joined USY. I had never met so many kids like me before, it was exhilarating to feel so in place somewhere, between being on kedima board, to being mem/kad to being chapter president, I have learned a lot, though there were many challenges with covid and what not, I would not give away the experiences for anything.

Emanu-El has had an extreme impact on my life and who I am today. As some may know, my career goal is to become a sex and relationship therapist that works with victims of assault and domestic violence. Though Emanu-El had nothing to do with that specific occupation, it did have something to do with why. Growing up I watched this synagogue not only help its own members but our entire society within Charleston and farther like Israel, whether that is spreading awareness, donations, fundraisers, grocery shopping or just simply being there for others. That is the type of person I want to be, if I cannot do something myself, I want to be able to have the power to spread awareness far enough that it reaches someone that CAN do something. I also hope to have the impact that this synagogue had on me, on someone else, not through religion but through the safety and comfort I felt here.

As I said early, I lost religion twice, and the second time was in 10th grade, as many of you know, I lost my grandfather two years ago, he was the one that helped me out of my struggles in 7th grade and was in fact one of my best friends. He taught me how to be Jewish as well, he had the same fascination with religion as I do, so when I lost him i was in pain for a very long time. At his funeral I didn't think it would be more than just my family, but there were people from this synagogue that I would have never expected there to be. And not only did they show up to the funeral, but on our way to sub regional convention, all my COSY friends stood in the Dunkin Donuts driveway and said Mourners kaddish with me, though some of them may not remember that moment, I do and it will be one that sticks with me forever. I am sure many of you expected me to say one of my best memories was something silly like, gossip chats in the kitchen, staying up til 3 during lock ins, my first convention, stealing snacks from the kitchen or all the times I got out of services because I was talking to Kenny, but no, it was that Dunkin' Donuts parking lot that was my best and favorite memory. I would also say a bunch of thank yous but I am pretty sure I am out of time. Either way there is not enough time in the world to show my graduate to each and everyone of you that have watched me grow up and taught me lessons I will never forget, so thank you from the bottom of my heart and Shabbat Shalom.


