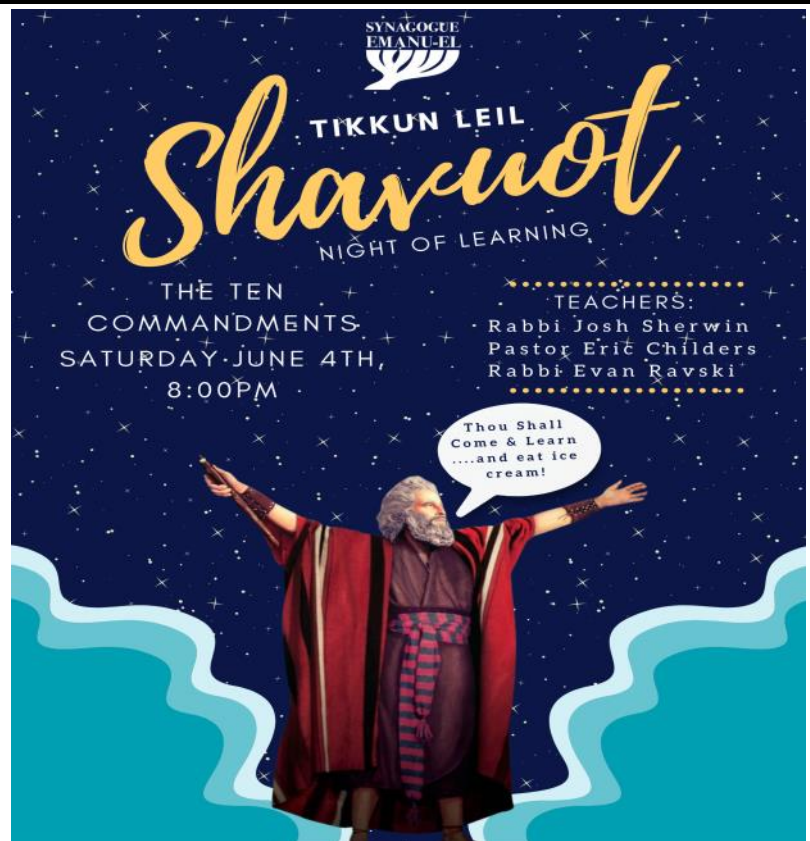

FROM THE DESK OF RABBI RAVSKI

I can distinctly remember the first question my grandfather would always ask whenever he came to visit us. My grandfather, who passed away in 2008, was a survivor of the Lodz Ghetto and Auschwitz, of his entire family only he and his brother survived the Holocaust. Every time he would walk into my parent's house, he would point to a pile of books in the corner of a room or on the shelves of the various bookcases, and ask me "have you read all of these yet?" For a few years I would always shamefully answer that no, I hadn't yet read most, or often any, of the books he was pointing too, because I didn't understand the real question he was asking. For my grandfather there was a single truth, it was that the Nazi's and the Holocaust had taken nearly everything from him and his brother, with one exception, their education. As often as he asked me about reading books, he would say that the one thing that can never be taken from you is what you have learned. It took me a long time to finally understand that what my grandfather meant when asking me about those books, was really if I was constantly learning about new things.

Shavuot marks the moment when we as a people, as a religion, received the greatest gift we still possess today, the Torah, a book that teaches us year after year how to connect to one another and to God. The Torah is a book of teaching. It teaches us about our history, it helps us to understand how to navigate life, how and when to perform rituals, how to live life to its best and its fullest. Most of all though, the Torah teaches us about who we are, as individuals and as a nation. Shavuot is not limited to just The Torah, the Five books of Moses or the TaNaKh, rather Shavuot celebrates all of the Texts our tradition has to offer, it celebrates learning and teachings of every age of our ancient culture.

Holidays have many rituals associated with them, some of those rituals are specific for the Synagogue and some are centered around the home. We will most certainly celebrate Shavuot together at Synagogue Emanu-El this year, we will gather together on Saturday night, June 4th, to learn together in anticipation of the next morning, and we will gather together and celebrate the holiday and the moment of Revelation. But what about home rituals? There is, of course the traditional holiday meals to be had, for Shavuot it is a custom to eat only dairy foods. But aside from eating what else? I would say learn together. Spend time engaging in education of any sort, whether reading a book together or telling family stories, reviewing homework or studying for an end of the year exam. Learning and teaching are not just something that is done in a school or a synagogue, there is always something new to learn, something we know and can teach to someone else. In every act of teaching and learning, no matter where you are or who you are with becomes a celebration of the Holiday. After all Shavuot is a celebration not just of receiving the gift of Wisdom, but what it is that we have done with that knowledge, that education throughout the generations.

SC HATE CRIMES BILL JOURNEY-

I once had a boss who espoused a mantra "Don't confuse activity with results." On the recent fate of the SC Hate Crimes Bill, I will respectfully differ with him.

As you likely know, the Senate opted not to debate and vote upon H.3620, the Rev. Clementa C. Pinckney Hate Crimes Act, this legislative session. After successfully passing the House, the hate crimes bill sat untouched in the Senate due to the objections of five Upstate Senators. Through inaction, the bill did not become law and SC remains one of two states not to have a hate crimes bill.

Like you, I am supremely disappointed. But, we should be heartened by the campaign we waged. In an unprecedented statewide coalition, non-profits, businesses, our Chambers of Commerce, LGBTQ and diverse faith communities came together. We never could have made the progress we achieved without Stamp Out Hate Coalition leadership. Many thanks to Charleston Jewish Federation (JCRC), specifically Brandon Fish.

Four Conservative congregations in SC (Charleston, Colombia, Greenville and Beaufort) formed a coalition to make our collective voice heard. Thank you to Craig Browdy for his energetic participation. Rabbi Ravski reached out to the other Rabbi's crafting an email sharing words of Torah. Most of all, thank you to so many in Emanu-El who contacted our local state Representatives and Senators. When asked you reached out to the recalcitrant Upstate Senators as well as Senate leadership.

We didn't need the reminder of the recent tragedy in Buffalo but unfortunately the terror continues. The result of no bill was far from what we worked for. But, we need to be heartened by the journey we took, the voices that were heard and the groups that came together. Stay tuned—We'll be back in the next session!

Synagogue Emanu-El: **CALLING 911** By Lisa Lambeth, [Concealed 360, LLC](#)
(Synagogue Emanu-El's Security Consultant)



“911, What’s your emergency”. This is usually the first sentence that you will hear, but before we get there, we need to pre-think how we can get there quickly and silently if needed. Below are some links and options for shortcuts to dialing 911.

SHORT CUTS

1. iPhone 8 or later: Press and hold the side button and one of the volume buttons until the Emergency SOS slider appears. Drag the Emergency SOS slider to call emergency services. If you continue to hold down the side button and volume button, instead of dragging the slider, a countdown begins and an alert sounds. If you hold down the buttons until the countdown ends, your iPhone automatically calls emergency services.
2. Android 12 or later: Press the power button 5 quick times for automatic call. You may get an alert warning you that you are calling 911.

PLEASE REMEMBER THAT IN CERTAIN EMERGENCIES YOU DO NOT WANT AN AUDIBLE ALERT SOUNDING AND DISCLOSING THE LOCATION OF WHERE YOU OR OTHERS ARE HIDING.

OTHER OPTIONS:

You may want to consider a Text to 911 in a situation where your phone and you need to be silent.

TEXT 911: This option IS available for Charleston County area and most other counties with larger population.

You can also EMAIL 911.

EMAIL 911: The email address is 911helpme.com. Putting this in your contacts may be helpful in a stressful emergency.

Do NOT post on Charleston County social media sites. It is not monitored 24/7 like 911 calls, text and emails.



Calling in our area: This is exactly what you will hear and why you hear an automated message in Charleston County.

Honi, Charlot, and the Power of Planting

The story of Honi the Circle Maker and the Carob tree is legend. The story goes something like this:

One day Honi was journeying on the road, and he saw a man planting a carob tree. He asked, "How long does it take [for this tree] to bear fruit?" The man replied: "Seventy years." Honi then further asked him: "Are you certain that you will live another seventy years?" The man replied: "I found [already grown] carob trees in the world; as my forefathers planted those for me, so I too plant these for my children."

There are many lessons within the story of Honi, but my immediate thoughts run to Charlot Karesh, Synagogue Emanu-El member and longtime leader. She is one of the founding members of the congregation who planted a seed 75 years ago, with a vision of a synagogue that would serve the growing Conservative community in Charleston. In the story of Honi, he awoke after 70 years of slumber to find his grandchildren benefiting from the Carob tree. In the coming year, 75 years later, Charlot will awaken daily to see the fruit of her labor as one of Emanu-El's founders. Every day we plant seeds which, whether we notice or not, leave a legacy for the future.

As most of you know, after two years serving as the Executive Director of Synagogue Emanu-El, I am stepping down later this month to explore new opportunities and adventure. My wife Cherie and I plan to travel around the country in our RV for a few months, working and exploring. In this instance, we will explore the many seeds planted in our National Park System over the past 150 years.

First, I want to express my gratitude to a tremendous set of lay leaders and colleagues at Emanu-El and throughout the Charleston community. As I imagine it was for Honi—and is still for Charlot Karesh—it is a joy for me to look back and relish the successes. We safely navigated a pandemic, held two wildly successful and savory kosher BBQ's, experienced rich musical programs like the Shir Ami Ensemble and Violins of Hope, strengthened our communications and technology infrastructure, and, most importantly, we nurtured relationships at a time of great need for human connection.

I would be remiss if I did not give a special shout-out to Craig Browdy, the "once-bearded" and always energetic president who helped Rabbi Ravski and the staff make some "good trouble" these past two years. There is not enough room in the *Scroll* for me to list the many lay leaders and congregants who stepped up to partner with me and the staff. Nurturing a synagogue is a team sport, and it was through our teamwork—staff and volunteers aligned—that so much good was accomplished. Cherie and I feel fortunate to be a part of such a warm community, and our plans are to remain in Charleston and enjoy connecting with the Jewish community here.

A Chinese proverb echoes the lessons of Honi and Charlot: "*The best time to plant a tree is 20 years ago. The next best? Today.*" It has been an honor to work and plant with each of you. I look forward to watching the congregation grow, like the Carob tree, remaining a fruitful and thriving Jewish presence in the Charleston community.
