FROM THE DESK OF RABBI RAVSKI

While every holiday brings with it its own symbols, traditions and rituals there is something that stands out about Sukkot. On Sukkot, which is also known as Chag HaAseef, the Festival of Ingathering, we are not just asked to use the ritual objects of the holiday, the Lulav and Etrog, but unlike any other holiday, we are asked on Sukkot to physically build the Sukkah.

The Sukkah is meant to remind us of the portable huts that the Israelites lived in as they wandered through the desert. They are impermanent structures that are meant to expose us to the elements of nature and to remind us of the precariousness of life in that they may feel as though at any moment they could be blown over by a gust of wind. At the same time the Sukkah is a ritual object that pulls us back to the time of our ancestors, to the earliest times of our religion as it, and the Israelite Nation, was forming.

For the generation of the Exodus the Sukkah was their home, and for us, during the week of Sukkot that is exactly what it is supposed to become. We are commanded to fulfill the act of "Layshev BaSukkah" to dwell in the Sukkah. The Rabbis interpret this to mean that anything that we normally do in our homes, eat, sleep, read a book, talk to one another, should be done in the sukkah. For a week the Sukkah, the one room hut which stands often in the shadow of our much more elaborate dwellings, is meant to be our home.

In our The Festivals: Sukkot program, where 25 households gathered to learn about Sukkot, this more than anything was something that was emphasized. Sukkot is about our homes. The Sukkah becomes our home, and the rituals of the holiday are meant to be fulfilled in the home that we literally build for the purpose of bringing the holiday into. We decorate the home with symbols of the holiday and the season, we entertain and hold festive meals, we chant brachot, prayers, and we play games. For one week, weather permitting, we bring the home alive by gathering our family and friends into a hut for the purpose of being together, of dwelling together. The space, unlike our homes the other 51 weeks of the year, is solely about spending time with one another in the presence of God and in celebration of the season. This is what makes Sukkot unique among the home rituals of all the holidays, we do not simply open our homes and bring the holiday into them. Instead, we leave our homes, and as families and as a community build new homes, new spaces that gather us together in joy and celebration.

As we continue to celebrate the High Holidays, with Yom Kippur at the start of October, followed by Sukkot, Shmini Atzeret and then Simchat Torah, let us take this moment at the start of the New Year to think about the type of home you want to build this year. Whether your physical (permanent) home, your impermanent one in the form of a Sukkah, spiritual home at Emanu-El, or any other space that you help build, use this time of the High Holidays and Sukkot to dedicate yourself, your time your resources and help make every one of those spaces stronger, more vibrant, more holy in the coming year.

May we all be inscribed, and sealed, for a Happy, Healthy and Sweet New Year.

SUKKAH UPDATE



When the Rabbis established the laws of the Sukkah, they asked perhaps the most basic, yet important question of all: We are commanded to live in the Sukkah, but what if it rains? God commands us to live in this rickety, vulnerable structure for seven

days, and at the same time we bring praying for it to rain! By the end of their discussion the Rabbis come to the conclusion that when God makes it rain on Sukkot its equivalent to someone who asks their servant for a drink and when handed that drink immediately throws it in the servant's face. In other words, rain on Sukkot is a slap in our faces as we try to fulfill God's commandments.

This year, leading up to the High Holidays, we focused heavily on Sukkot, particularly with the Festivals Program. It makes sense then, that we would need to learn this midrash, because once the Men's Club and other volunteers built our Sukkah this year, it didn't just rain, a hurricane came through. Thankfully, for us here in Charleston, the storm was a small one as far as hurricanes go. Most of us suffered little damage, if any at all. The Synagogue Sukkah though was not so lucky. Despite pre-storm efforts to secure it, it was completely destroyed.

Now, we could rely on the midrash in the Talmud and not worry. We tried, we built the Sukkah, we prepared for the holiday and before it even began God threw wind gusts at us that truly felt like a slap across our faces. So, the responsibility is not on us, we fulfilled our obligation to try, and we heard God's message. What else are we supposed to do?

As the midrash raced through my head when I saw the destroyed Sukkah, the words of another great prophet came into my mind "Do or do not, there is no try." Thank you, Master Yoda. In this moment, to say that we tried but could not, would mean that many in our congregation who rely on the shul Sukkah to fulfill the mitzvah of dwelling in it would be unable too. It would mean that we would miss the opportunity at this time of year, when this year Sukkot falls later in the calendar to be outside in some cooler, less sweltering weather. It would mean that many of the Religious School students wouldn't have the opportunity to learn in the Sukkah, or that after services on the first days of the holiday or Shabbat Chol HaMoed there would be no noshing or l'chaims in the Sukkah either. In looking what it would mean to celebrate Sukkot without a Sukkah at the shul, all it looked like was missed opportunities, missed experiences to engage in Jewish ritual and tradition. Thinking of all this felt more like punch to the gut, than a slap to the face.

At the same time, we had another option. It's not yet Sukkot. Yes, time is very tight, but we have just enough of it. So shortly after the storm passed, discussions were had, calls were made, some money was spent, and the result is that we should be getting a Sukkah between Yom Kippur and Shabbat, with just enough time to set it up on Sunday morning before Sukkot begins. Its not the ideal sized Sukkah, its not nearly large enough for what we need, and we know that next year we will still need a better solution, but for this year it's a small Sukkot Miracle that that we will have one at all. Of course, it will mean that as a congregation and community we will have to work together to fulfill the mitzvah of 'dwelling' in the Sukkah. We will have to be kind and patient with each other as we use it for kiddush luncheons and l'chaims, and we will have to be understanding that some programs, like our FNL Sukkot Dinner will be hors d'oeuvres rather than a sit-down dinner. It also means that on Sunday morning at Religious School drop off, we will need your help to build the new Sukkah. But most of all, what it means is that we will still be able to celebrate Sukkot, in its fullness, together this year. May we all have a very happy, and dry, Sukkot. Chag Sameach!

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL— DAPHNE HUBARA

If you didn't get a chance to meet our classroom teachers – here's a small teaser about each one:

Kindergarten/ First Grade:

Hello! My name is Katie Hurwitz and I am the K-1 teacher this year. I am from Atlanta, Georgia, and am currently a sophomore at The College of Charleston. I am studying Psychology and Jewish Studies, with an end goal of doing something with mental and physical health and nutrition. I am so excited for this school year! Our curriculum is focused around The Synagogue and Jewish symbols. We'll learn about religious objects (both in the synagogue and at home) and their uses, the concept of and the names used for g-d, the Jewish holidays, and so much more. It is going to be a wonderful year with lots of fun-filled learning!!!

2nd/3rd Grade:

I'm really looking forward to working with your kids to understand how Judaism can shape our lives and push us to be the best versions of ourselves. In our classroom community, my students can expect both opportunities to challenge themselves to think outside the box as well as fun moments bonding as a group.
