## *Words From Our President*

Recently one of our congregants, Lauryn Tuchman, met with Rabbi Mark, Judy Jaffe and another congregant, Marisa Smith, to discuss ideas and plans for next year. Lauryn shared some thoughts after the meeting that were so insightful and thought provoking. I'd like to share them with you:

*"I had some more time to really reflect on what we discussed yesterday and it really got me thinking while I was trying to answer some of the questions we were addressing regarding the topic of: Why Be A Member of a Shomrei or any Shul? And it's amazing how different pieces of a day can so nicely meet up to create an entirely different picture.*

*I found myself thinking more about the answers we give our friends who are on the fence about the price tag of membership at our exclusive club. For me, I always knew I would join--we would make it work--it was how I was raised. But when I dug deeper, I found myself thinking about the story Judy Jaffe shared about a recent lesson in Tarboot (at Camp Veritans)--"what is the difference between a prayer and a wish?"--and I found myself recalling the response she received—that my son, Daniel had shared: 'A wish is something you want and a prayer is something you need'. And I realized that thankfully for most of our congregants--our children, we don't know from need--at least not yet and so the concept of needing prayer can be foreign. Like many don't develop coping skills in life until they actually need something to use to cope with something challenging or painful. So we pay for membership--and air, and a roof and community and professionals. But I think we're missing the boat a little--it's more. It's exposure for us--for our children to develop a sense of comfort, familiarity and safety in a shul. Kind of like learning how to swim. Not everyone learns how to swim well, but if you're in a sinking boat, you're going to need prayer--you're going to need to know how to swim to survive or if you're at a pool party you're going to want to be able to join in. I think about times I needed prayer--and for me, I have never been a regular service goer, but after 9/11 and a painful family crisis, I found myself wandering back into services, praying for clarity, relief and even doing some wishing. And I found such comfort in two different temples. I knew the road in, I was comfortable enough to go and found such comfort and peace by doing so. I know I want this for my boys. I knew how to swim. I wondered if others ever think about this.*

*So when our friends ask us what we are we paying for--its community and all the good stuff when we only have wishes on our mind, but it's making sure our children have a place to go, the language to ask for help in a spiritual way and the knowledge and skill set to enter a synagogue, albeit Shomrei or anywhere else--when they need to pray."*

Lauren's framing and analogy made so much sense to me and validated my own journey to Shomrei Torah. It is my hope that all of you find comfort and community here at Shomrei Torah and know that we are here whenever you need us.

# CONGREGATIONAL LEARNING

Everything at Shomrei Torah Religious School got off to a very exciting start on Sept 10<sup>th</sup>.

Many families took advantage of participating in the *Meet and Greet* on the first day, Sept. 10<sup>th</sup>, and learned about their children's teachers and what they will be learning all year within the walls of the beautifully redecorated halls. Throughout the year, Shomrei Torah will be offering opportunities for grownups to learn about what we do in Religious School – *Tashlich* on Sept 24<sup>th</sup> at noon will be the second opportunity. Please try to attend.

Our weekly Tuesday *Mitzvah* Projects help our students understand and find meaning in our rich Jewish legacy : helping victims of the hurricane in Houston, making Rosh Hashanah Cards for Lone Soldiers in the Israel Defense Forces, and packing Breakfast Bags for CUMAC were just the beginning. With 32 Tuesdays, we have much more in store.

Renting the “Traveling Suitcase” from the National Museum of Jewish American History was the next best thing to visiting Philadelphia. Reproductions of personal artifacts were presented to 6<sup>th</sup>/*Vav* and 7<sup>th</sup>/*Zayin* to introduce the American immigration unit and learn about our beginnings on these shores. To make things personal, our suitcase belonged to a teenage girl who now has 3 grandchildren living in the Philadelphia area and one grandson, Rabbi Kravitz, living in Minnesota. Rabbi Mark knows him and they are distantly related. This instructional artifact impacted our group in significant ways.

Starting last month, we will mark the new month in an additional way and chant *Hallel* as a school. This is a new and very exciting initiative.

Our 3s and 4s group, Hooray for Holidays, which meets monthly, expanded. At this point we have 7 students and are looking to hire an assistant. The children are enthusiastic and love being at Shomrei Torah.

Moving forward....

Our 6<sup>th</sup>/*Vav* and 7<sup>th</sup>/*Zayin* will be making a personalized *Yad*/Torah pointer as part of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah journey. If you see gorgeous silver pointers in the sanctuary, kindly ask our students about them.

Last year I participated in 3 professional developments and saw the *Torah Godly Play*. I was dazzled and decided to bring it to Shomrei Torah. *Torah Godly Play* is a new approach to our Jewish stories. It is a quiet moment of engagement that allows children to “hear” the presence of God in a story. Using simple, unadorned objects, facilitator Deborah Cadel will present a *Torah Godly Play* story. She told me that she finds it continually rewarding to see how captivated children are with the process, the connections children make between *Torah Godly Play* and the Torah, and by the wisdom they bring to their participation.

Religious school will be held on Oct 31<sup>st</sup> but there will be nothing regular about our school that day. We will explore the wonderful rich history of Jewish folklore. *Yes, Jews have ghosts and goblins too*, and seldom in our limited time at Shomrei Torah do we explore this. In addition we will challenge our students to a fierce game of Jewish Jeopardy, with edible prizes.

While we encourage our students to attend religious school in everyday attire, we prefer to see our children at Shomrei Torah that day than not, so if costumes are the sticking point, send them in costume. Our goal is to learn something Jewish, instill our attending students with a strong Jewish identity and have **FUN**, recognizing and not ignoring the broader culture we are a part of!

Our amazing USYers decided unanimously to merge with KADIMA and create a strong Wayne presence. Kindly RSVP whether your 5<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grader plans to help decorate the Sukkah and schmooze on Oct 1<sup>st</sup> at 12:30 – 2:00 pm and join us for *Pizza in the Hut* on Tues, Oct 10<sup>th</sup> from 6:00 – 7:30 pm.

# FROM THE GARDEN


You've heard this story before: spirited amateurs oppose forces of Mother Nature. Nature wins. Amateurs retreat and regroup.

And so it was when Shomrei Torah garden volunteers confronted the wily groundhog who burrowed under our 6' high deer fence to nibble a tomato here, an eggplant there. We took countermeasures, buried plastic fencing, dug in boards and filled in his holes, all in an attempt to continue providing the synagogue and two food banks with our nutritious produce, which by now is probably near a total of 100 pounds.

But faster than we could say "Got you now, you wascally wabbit," our furry friend dug a hole in a new location. Eric Weis got us the loan of a have-a-heart-trap, but so far all we've snagged is squirrels. And something has figured out how to eat the bait (Smuckers all natural chunky peanut butter on whole wheat) without springing the trap. If and when we score a capture, the critter will be relocated to some distant locale in Lincoln Park or Towaco. That is, providing none of the volunteers falls in love with the little guy and decides to adopt it. Those irresistible warm brown eyes, that shiny wet nose, those sparkling white teeth! Does anybody know how hard it is to housebreak a groundhog?

Meanwhile Shomrei Torah was awarded a second grant of \$1,000 (bringing total grants received to \$3,500) from DigIn! City Green, an NGO working with the Passaic County Board of Freeholders. Pictured above (left to right) accepting the award on behalf of the synagogue are volunteers Lisa Zevin and Henry Ramer, Passaic County Freeholder T.J. Best and DigIn Coordinator Erin Maguire. No synagogue funds have so far been expended on the garden. All our vegetables are grown without chemical fertilizers or pesticides.







## SYRIAN REFUGEES AND JEWS

Yes, there are some Syrian refugee families living in Paterson, Newark, Jersey City and some other areas of NJ.

On Sunday, August 13<sup>th</sup>, some volunteers from Shomrei Torah gathered with volunteers from five other local congregations for a picnic at Garrett Mountain to help some local Syrian Refugees have a better day. The weather was beautiful, the people were friendly and appreciative and all the children had a great time playing soccer, blowing bubbles, playing frisbee – everything children should be doing on a nice day outside (not running from bombs and bullets).

Volunteers from Family Promise have now formed a new organization, **North Jersey Interfaith Cares, Inc.** As a whole, NJIC donated 65 backpacks filled with school supplies for the children to begin their school year. The volunteers from Shomrei Torah provided 13 of those backpacks and Dassy Mark was able to provide every child with their own book to read. Shomrei Torah Sisterhood donated two air conditioners for the families! As you can imagine, the families escaped Syria with their lives and not much else. It's no small task for the newcomers, who faced war and turmoil in their native country, to build a new life here, as they try to learn English, find jobs and become acclimated to a new culture.

Various non-profits and religious groups have played a large role in delivering support and supplies to the refugees. Resettlement agencies get limited money for their work, so they rely on churches, synagogues and mosques for donations and volunteer tasks.

I am so proud to be a part of the volunteers from Shomrei Torah who realize how important it is to participate with all the Wayne congregations in giving a helping hand to others – no matter their religion. Shomrei Torah has a great reputation with the churches in Wayne for always stepping up and helping to take care of our own. It is something to be proud of! Donating food and money to the Wayne Interfaith Network is a major way that we continually help our community.

Thank you to all the families that donated money and supplies and time to enable us to donate the filled backpacks to the children.

- Jobs (yes, some of them do speak English and others are now going to ESL classes)
- Refrigerators
- 4 cars
- 8 laptops
- 3 TVs
- 1 iPad
- toys for 3 children: toddler and 4 and 7 year olds
- a carpet
- a blanket
- sewing supplies





