## A Word from Our President

For those who felt 613 commandments were never enough, now comes good news. Archeologists from the Adelson Foundation and the Israel Institute recently discovered evidence of another 112 commandments on copper scrolls in caves overlooking Tel Aviv. That raises our total to 738, far more than any other religion. When it comes to commandments, we're # 1.

## FROM THE BIMA Rabbi Randall Mark

In adult education, we have been engaged in a program called “Makhloket Matters.” A makhloket is a rabbinic dispute. We have been having them for centuries and for the most part we do them well. We study, we debate, we argue, we contemplate and sometimes we convince the other of the validity of our position and sometimes we are convinced that we were wrong and sometimes it remains unsolved to which the rabbis reply, “Teku” which means let it stand. Some say that it is an acronym for the Hebrew phrase meaning Elijah, the Tishbite, will resolve all difficulties and inquires. This is because Elijah is the prophet who never died. He was taken to heaven alive in a whirlwind (II Kings 2) and has spent eternity studying with God, so he should know the answers to all the inquiries we cannot resolve. Elijah, when he finally comes, is going to be a very busy fellow.

In Pirkei Avot we learn that there are two types of makhloket, one for the sake of heaven and one that is not. Their example of bad makhloket is between the biblical character Korah and Moses. The two men were cousins and Korah challenged Moses leadership which the rabbis saw as for personal gain, not for the benefit of the people. So a dispute that is destructive in nature is not good, but a dispute for the sake of heaven is good. Their example of a good makhloket is the disputes between the famous rabbinic characters Hillel and Shammai, two great teachers whose disciples constantly disagreed with one another. However, they did so in a way that preserved the relationship with the goal of uncovering the truth of God’s will.

Throughout the Talmud there are hundreds of disputes all done in a constructive way, which is not to say that it always worked. We are told that once on the 9<sup>th</sup> of Adar the disputes between the schools of Hillel and Shammai escalated to the point of violence and many were killed, but it seems to be the exception to the normal process of rabbinic disputes.

Today we live in a world where people do not disagree constructively very often. Arguments easily escalate with anger and differing political positions are seen as irreconcilable hostile camps. We need to regain the ability to disagree constructively, to learn from those who see the world differently. Purim is coming soon. This is when we turn everything upside down, so let’s do it with our anger as well. The rabbis teach, “Be happy it’s Adar, Purim is coming.” Let’s all work on being happier and getting along with others.

## *A Word from our President Barry Blecherman*



Hi everyone – here’s hoping that by the time you’re all reading this the weather is warmer and spring has arrived.

The big news from the leadership of Shomrei Torah is actually from the membership of Shomrei Torah. By an overwhelming majority of those who came out to the special congregational meeting on January 28th, a motion was passed allowing our Board of Trustees to open our religious school to children in families that are not members of Shomrei Torah. Given that the Board has already expressed a desire to do this, it is likely that a proposal to make this happen will have passed between the time when I’m writing this and the day that this L’Chaim is distributed. So for the rest of you who couldn’t come to the meeting: why is this happening and why is it a good thing?

As our tagline says, we at ST respect tradition and embrace change. This is a tough balance to strike; it is almost self-contradictory. Tradition and change can be polar opposites. When the world around us is not changing this is not a challenge – we keep doing things the way we do them. This motto makes us stop and think when the world (Wayne, Judaism, Israel, New Jersey, the USA, etc.) shifts and makes us choose between what we’ve “always done in the past” and something new.

Liberal Judaism in the diaspora has changed. By “liberal,” I mean people like us who deeply value our faith and also are firmly established in the secular world. When I was a kid in the 1960s families joined synagogues. The only question that my parents and our Jewish neighbors needed to answer for themselves was whether their synagogue would be Conservative, Orthodox, or Reform. Those days are gone. Being nostalgic about that simple time in the past makes me smile but we cannot move forward while daydreaming. Study after study, across all religions in the US, has shown that young adults today are not “joiners.” This is not good or bad – this is simply something that is. Young singles, couples, and parents participate with enthusiasm in events and causes that are important to them. They donate their effort and their money. The things that get supported are ideals that motivate and not necessarily the organizations that promote these ideals.

The traditional model that we have followed is: 1. People join Shomrei Torah, then 2. People become involved in Shomrei Torah. Chabad has grown around the world in recent years because they have seen how young adults choose their causes: 1. People become involved in a cause, then 2. People join the organization behind the cause. Chabad makes things welcoming and makes participation easy for newcomers. We have always said, “Join our congregation! Pay dues! You’ll see – it is worth it!” Chabad has said, “Come see that we are worth your time! Later you can contribute financially to what we do that you support.” They are in tune with the times. It is time for us to change our approach and we have taken our first steps. We are going to go forward with this with much fanfare. 




