We all have stories of our own, or of our communities, our families, or our ancestors. After several years of limited contact, we don't know as much of each other's stories as we might. Let's connect by coming together to listen to each other and to enjoy the treasures that are found in the stories that make up our lives. The following prompts can be broadly interpreted:

What is a story that you've inherited, or one that gets retold? It might be from someone who came before you, or from your community. It could be a story that is told about shared events. It could be anything that gets passed down: a family immigration journey; a story of working for social justice; the story behind a special recipe; a surprising or unusual event; something that happened to you or those you know, and which has been shared over time.

What is the story of your journey with Judaism? What brought you to your current relationship with Judaism, and what were the stops along the way? Whether you identify as Jewish or not, how has Judaism touched your life?

Immigrant & Refugee Task Force

*Help Refugees from Afghanistan -
Support Our New Olympia Neighbors*

The TBH Immigrant & Refugee Task Force wants to pass along information about a new opportunity to help refugees in the Olympia community. Four men from Afghanistan are now set up in a temporary home (until the end of July). Their current need is for funds to support them as they take steps towards securing their first jobs here. These funds will help pay for their rent, utilities, groceries, and other daily living needs. Gift cards to Safeway or Haggens would also be useful and much appreciated. And any leads on employment opportunities or housing (minimum: 2-bedroom apartment) would be greatly appreciated. These men are ready and willing to take on all kinds of work, regardless of their technical backgrounds (two previous air force pilots and two air force communication officers). They have already provided landscaping work locally and are open to all opportunities to work so that they can transition to fully supporting themselves. (They all have federal Employment Authorization Document cards authorizing them to legally work in the U.S.) Checks may be made out to Woodard Lane Sponsor Circle. Homelessness Task Force

*CHESED + TZEDAKAH = MITZVAH SUCCESS
Monthly Donation Drives*

Thank you to everyone who dropped off household cleaning supplies in April for the Pesach drive and personal hygiene products for the May Lag B'Omer drive. You all made a huge difference in the lives of those who are homeless and unsheltered.

The Thurston County Food Bank, through the Other Bank also provides household cleaning and personal hygiene products to the local community who do not have enough resources to purchase these items. 50% of their customers are unhoused. They put together small kits for clients who need personal hygiene items.

In April we collected the following which was delivered to the Thurston County Other Bank:

- 13 containers of household cleaning products
- 4 containers of laundry detergent
- 26 bottles of dish soap
- 13 dish sponges, cloths, and brushes
- 6 misc items (gloves, trash bags)

In May we collected the following which was delivered to the Thurston County Other Bank:

- 22 toothbrushes
- 16 dental care products (floss and toothpaste)
- 18 deodorants
- 10 packages of personal care products (combs, brushes, shavers)
- 9 bars of soap and many travel size soaps
- 5 bottles shampoo
- 7 packages personal hygiene products (cleansing wipes, menstrual pads)
- 10 misc items (nail clippers, adhesive bandages, water bottles, etc)

Unity Commons Meals

The Homeless Task Force prepared our first dinner to be served at Unity Commons homeless shelter on April 24th. Six of us- Rabbi Seth, Jill and Bill Dole, Elizabeth Siegel and John Browning, prepared a meal for 60 people. Melinda Holman provided delicious deserts. It was a fun afternoon! The Task Force has decided that we are going to aim for monthly dinners on the 4th Sunday of each month. Our next date will be June 26. JEWISH FAMILY LIFE & LEARNING PROGRAMS (JANUARY - MARCH)



Over the past two years we haven't seen each other in person very often. It's been tough to be separated, and as we've tried to come together safely, it's been a dance of two steps forward, one step back. But in the fall, Family Life and Learning is committed to moving forward on

getting back together as much as we safely can. As we are moving towards doing all in person learning, we are officially declaring Beit Sefer dead and offering instead a new program called Darchei Noam. Looking at the titles alone gives you a clue as to what we are wanting and what we are ending. Beit Sefer translates to be a 'house of books.' It is static and focused on study. That's not necessarily a bad thing, but it's not the path many of our families are going with their children. Darchei Noam means 'pathways of pleasantness'. This title suggests a more varied, relationship driven course. This is not the Hebrew School of days past. Realizing that we are a beautifully diverse community, we want to create a learning community that honors families where they are and strives to support their Jewish journeys.

Rabbi Seth and I have spent quite a bit of time over the past years looking at where supplemental schools have fallen flat and have come together with a concept we think will work well. In our minds, the fundamental flaw of the Sunday School model boils down to two things: Sunday and School. Jewish education does not happen on Jewish time, so we are asking our families to come on non-Jewish time (Sundays) for Jewish engagement, creating inconsistency and separating Judaism from lived experiences. Since families are often overscheduled, families are often choosing Sundays instead of engaging with Judaism as a lived experience and we'd like to deter that practice. By creating a supplemental

school, we have taken spiritual formation and Jewish engagement and made it into a formal structure rather than something that is meaningful to living our lives. When families learn and experience Jewish moments together they create experiences that carry farther into their shared expressions of Jewish life. In addition, we believe that Judaism is something personal to each participant and must be woven into life experiences in order to become part of what we each carry forward.

In our Family Life and Learning programming this past year we have tried out pieces of Darchei Noam. Rabbi Seth and I presented our concept to families last year, at the Reconstructing Judaism conference in March of this year, and even to potential donors. We got a grant!!! Over the next few years, grant money will allow families to jump in, even as we work out the kinks without a monetary barrier to participation. Other pieces of the program include Shabbat events at Camp Solomon Schechter that include learning pieces for all age groups, 'home to shul' family education that will encourage families to prepare for holidays together to enrich their celebrations and even more short-term, elective programs to allow a deeper engagement with Israel, Jewish history and culture and looking at our lives through a Jewish lens. Over the summer we will be firming up the details for next year's program and Rabbi Seth and I will be doing a couple of orientation-type meetings, designed to clarify the concept for everyone interested. If you have kids anywhere from preschool through high school, this program will have a place for them. If you have no kids but are interested in supporting our community moving in this direction - there is a place for you as well. I hope you are as excited about this potential as I am.

Cemetery Bench Update



There is a new way to memorialize loved ones through the synagogue. The memorial in the main foyer of the temple building continues to serve that purpose and has space.

The new opportunity will soon be found on either side of the gates in the TBH Historic Cemetery. Many cemetery visitors use the space as a place of reflection, peace, and remembrance. Most people go to the cemetery to visit the grave of someone they have lost which brings to mind others buried elsewhere. However, there has been nowhere to sit for those wishing to spend some time in contemplation.

To this end, we purchased two marble benches through the Masonic Memorial Park with engraving and installation. Those already interred in the cemetery have a monument, but we found interest in memorializing loved ones buried elsewhere.

The benches have a memorial phase selected by the Rabbi with it in English on one bench and in Hebrew on the other. The inscriptions will be screened by the Rabbi. We have set the cost of engraving at \$250 per line which is in keeping with other memorials at TBH.

Design for Courtyard & Parking Lots Move Forward

On January 26, at a special Board meeting exclusively for this purpose, the Board unanimously approved the Master Concept Plan for the courtyard and parking lot improvements. It also approved funding and authorized the Board President to enter into a consultant contract for the next phase of design and permitting. During the next couple of months, the courtyard and parking lot design committee will be working on many design details and refining cost estimates. Later in the winter or early spring, drafts of design progress will be shared with the community and comments solicited. If you have any questions or concerns about the process or want to know how best to get your views heard, please contact either Gary Schneider or Daniel Farber.

With Board authorization to proceed with design of the courtyard expansion and renovation of the parking lot, the New Property Improvement Team has been systematically working through various design issues over the past couple of months.

The most significant question has been the appearance and functionality of the expanded courtyard's barrier. Design considerations included 1) visual connections between the street and courtyard interior (with some wanting view blockage and other participants wanting the opposite); 2) protection of the historic integrity of the site; 3) a number of aesthetic preferences for the fence and/or wall; and 4) consistency with the city's regulatory requirements.

As the NPIT did research, it concluded that at a practical level, it was unlikely that the city would authorize a view-blocking wall. Such a wall would also be less compatible with protection of the site's historic integrity. Conversations with historic professionals indicated that it is highly likely that the sanctuary building will meet eligibility criteria for listing on an historic register.

Finally, there was a question as to whether a simple all metal fence barrier was preferable to a metal fence connected regularly to masonry pilasters (posts). The latter approach was seen as more sensitive to the historic appearance of site and the cost did not appear to be a significant factor.

The NPIT is moving forward bi-weekly or more frequently with sessions devoted to fence height, capstone appearance, courtyard surfacing, landscape dimensions and plantings, lighting, camera locations, and many other considerations. It remains a hope that at least some elements of the project can begin construction by late summer or early fall of 2022.
