# L'Shanah Tovah

Approaching the High Holy Days, we listen for the divine call from Psalm 90 that beckons us from beyond: "Shuvu, b'nei adam – come back, dear one – give Me another chance...and I'll give you one as well." Though we may receive this invitation with a certain pastoral calm, an opportunity to come from the cold confines of exile to the warmth of embrace, almost a "truce" between two parties, this call was originally a call of heavenly urgency. We were to be given one last chance to "turn back from your evil ways, you people! Stop sinning! Stop pretending! Stop wasting time! Stop...fooling yourselves."

But implicit in the above command, I hear a more subtle, gentle message: "Come back to your senses. Come back to your roots. Come back to essential goodness. Come home."

Teshuvah – repentance – is our charge to confront our errors, to tap into our potential for goodness, to correct the wrongs we've done to others, and to realize how far we have journeyed from being sacred beings, being a little lower than the angels. We have the opportunity to take a long, hard look at how another year around the sun has impacted us and can make changes to be better. We don't have to be perfect; we don't have to be great; we just have to desire and take the necessary steps to be better.

There is another word that shares a root with teshuvah, and that word is shuvu – return. By looking at our year that has passed, we return to a place devoid of flaws and start fresh. We recall the mistakes...so that we can own what we have forgotten, or confront what we have moved beyond. We return to the moral compass we each possess and which, at our best, guides us back to the sacred and guides us back home.



This Selichot, we will return home to our sanctuary after a summer away. In addition to the logistical return, I pray that each of us returns home to our very essence, our own wholeness, and our own holiness.

# Parking for the High Holy Days

At Temple Sinai we continue to strive for accessibility and inclusivity for all who wish to participate in High Holy Day services. As such, we make on-site parking available to those members in need of extra assistance: those who use a wheelchair or walker or who have a state-issued handicap parking pass or who have significant mobility issues. If you would like to request a parking pass, please complete the form online or on page 14 by August 26. We appreciate your cooperation and adherence to our parking guidelines.

As in recent years, the following guidelines will still apply.

## Parking in the Temple Sinai Lot – Parking Permit and Drop Off/Pick Up Only

- There is no open parking in the Sinai lot. Parking permits must be requested in advance and are available for those who meet the above criteria (see page 14 for the request form).
- All permits will be distributed in advance of the Holy Days and must be visible at all times through your windshield when you enter the driveway and while your car is parked on our lot.
- A parking attendant will park and retrieve cars for all individuals with a parking permit; please pull up to the main entrance upon arrival.
- There will be a dedicated drop off/pick up location for congregants/guests and can be used for any ride-sharing service. We strongly encourage the use of carpools, Uber or Lyft.

## Satellite Parking

- All congregants/guests without a Parking Permit and who are not dropping off individuals should proceed directly to a satellite lot for parking (see page 15 for the available lots for each service).
- Buses will be available at the satellite lots beginning 90 minutes before each service to bring congregants to Temple Sinai.
- **Please allow sufficient time to park, board a bus, and travel to Sinai prior to the start of each service.**
- Buses will unload/load on the side of the building to ease congestion. Upon departing Temple Sinai, please be sure to follow the directional signage to the line for your parking lot.

## Guest Tickets

Guest tickets are available for purchase, \$200 per ticket, for the following individuals only: Non-member adult children, parents, grandchildren, grandparents, fiancés, out-of-town relatives and out-of-town family friends.

One ticket per each adult Associate Member is available for purchase.

Adults who are members in good standing of an **out-of-town** congregation are eligible to receive a complimentary guest ticket to worship with us by requesting a reciprocal form or letter from their congregation. College students and military personnel with proper identification will be admitted as our guests and do not need a ticket.

To purchase tickets, please complete the Guest Ticket Form online or on page 13. If purchased by August 9, tickets will be mailed to you. If purchased after August 9, please pick up your tickets at the temple office.

*Please note: Due to space limitations, we are unable to sell guest tickets to in-town friends or in-town family members other than those specified above. **However the following services are open to the community and tickets are not needed: Erev Rosh HaShanah, Second Day Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur Yizkor and Neilah.***

## Guidelines Regarding Saving of Seats for High Holy Day Services

In an effort to continue to enhance the High Holy Day experience for each and every member of our Sinai family; we ask that you please follow our guidelines regarding the saving of seats. So that all service attendees are treated fairly and equitably, we are asking our Shammashim to assist with the implementation of these guidelines:

- All service attendees will be able to save a seat for himself/herself, one additional adult and any of their children under 18 years of age.
- Congregants wishing to reserve seats for additional family members, friends, and other adults will need to ensure that there is one adult present for every two seats.
- Shammashim will be instructed to pick up tallitot laid down to save rows.
- The High Holy Day Machzor will be pre-set on all seats. Should you need to hold a seat using the guidelines stated above, you may use your High Holy Day ticket.

We share the sincere wish that our Holy Days will be meaningful for congregants and Shammashim alike, and we appreciate your understanding and adherence to these guidelines.

### Family Room

A Family Room will be available for babies and their parents during all High Holy Day services. A video of the service will be streamed in to the family room. Please note: children 12 months and older can be registered for babysitting or for the Youth Program. See page 10 for details.

Headsets may be checked out at the Will Call table in the lobby prior to each service. ## Teen High Holy Day Experiences | Grades 6 - 12 .....

We are often asked if there is a service for teens on the High Holy Days. The answer is: Yes, the main congregational service! We value our teens (Grades 6-12) participating in our congregational services and believe that the insight, inspiration and wisdom they will derive from the liturgy, sermons and spiritual experience of our services is important. We invite you to sit with your teens during services, encourage them to read the passages and poetry in the Machzor (prayer book), discuss the sermons following the service, and celebrate the fact that they are a part of our larger community! Encouraging their participation in the congregational service will provide our teens with a deeper and stronger spiritual vocabulary and grounding as they continue to mature.

### 6th-7th Grades: Machzor Companions

Attention pre and current B'nei Mitzvah students! As you join your parents for services, be sure you have our specially developed **Machzor Companion activity packet** that includes games as well as thoughtful questions about the themes of the worship service and add to your overall High Holy Day experience. **"TAG" credit**, under the "Avodah" section of the B'nei Mitzvah requirements, will be given to those who participate. 
