Mourner's Kaddish

Mourner's Kaddish is one of the last prayers we say in a service after Aleinu before a closing song like Oseh Shalom or Adon Olam.

It is a prayer said in honor of our loved ones who have passed away. The prayer itself does not mention the loss of a loved one. Instead, the blessing talks about faith and is supposed to be said on behalf of the person who has passed. This prayer was so important to the rabbis that it is said in Aramaic, the spoken language at the time it was written. That is why these words sound a little different than the rest of the prayers we say.
