On the night before Passover, we are encouraged to perform *bedikat hametz*, a search by candlelight, with spoon and feather in hand, for any leavened bread that might still be in the recesses of the home. Customarily ten pieces of bread are hidden around the house so that the

search is not in vain. My wife Rachel and I hide the pieces for our daughters, and as a team we play a game of family "hametz hide-and-seek."

What makes this task so challenging, and fun, is that the search is done by candlelight with all of the house lights turned off. So we ask, if we were really interested in removing every possible piece of hametz, shouldn't we turn on the lights? Or even better, search during the day with all of the windows open? But tradition deliberately teaches that we search by a dim light. If we have done the search, we have fulfilled our duty.

The great symbolism of Passover is often connected to the holiday's primary delicacy, namely matzah. Or, *Ha Lachma Anya - the bread of our affliction* as the Haggadah names this religious classification of food. Throughout the popular familial and communal ritual observance of the seder, we relive imaginatively the experience of the servitude and Exodus that the Israelites in Egypt experienced as an agonizing reality.

Our ancestors' reality finds its symbol in our unleavened bread. The Torah teaches that eating of the matzah is not only a practical teaching tool, it is a commandment.

This day shall be one of remembrance; you shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord throughout the ages; you shall celebrate it as an institution for all times. Seven days you shall eat unleavened bread; on the very first day you shall remove leaven from your houses for whoever eats leaved bread from the first day to the seventh day, that person shall be cut off from Israel - Exodus 12:14-15

Why is it that eating this food and ridding all hametz in our homes is so essential to our worship and Jewish identity?

According to Rabbi Jacob Halevy, the 20th century American rabbi:

Jewish tradition has developed an explanation for the act of ridding our homes at Passover of hametz and substituting it with unleavened bread — matzo [outside of leaving in haste from Egyptian slavery]...foods that ferment are equated morally with the objectionable traits of vain pride and inhuman, swollen greed. We should search out such traits and turn instead to the simple virtues in which all can share equally, symbolized by the lowly matzo.

That is to say, in addition to reenacting the fleeing-Israelite diet, we purge hametz and substitute with matzah because that ritual encourages us to surpass ourselves as moral beings. Which in and of itself is an abstract thought, but we can be made to understand a thought when this is expressed in terms of a symbolic act in connection with simple objects.

To once again quote Halevy:

At Passover time, hametz and matzo are not merely things—they are things with a symbolic meaning. Through suppressing hametz and elevating matzo to a place of prominence...s/he expresses to him/herself and to the world the type of character we should try to develop: humility instead of swollen pride, simple purity of purpose instead of bloated desire. The stage for the enactment of this thought is every Jewish home. Both the players and the audience are one and the same—the Jewish people.

Our Passover symbols invite us to search out hametz far beyond the remnants of bread in our pantries, and instead to illuminate and find the hametz contained in the recesses of our hearts. May we all enjoy a Chag Kasher v'Sameach.

Academy Video Blog

As a regular part of the Academy program, approximately three times per year our students have been putting on presentations based on school themes. These presentations have incorporated drama performances, shadow puppets,

art exhibits, Israeli dance, circus acrobatics, and songs in Yiddish and Ladino! There was our multidimensional model Passover seder a couple of years ago. Last year presentations covered the Shtetl and Purim. So far this year we had a Hanukkah presentation that included two plays, an Israeli dance, a great song by our younger kids, plus circus representations of the cleansing of Temple and the lighting of the Menorah.

The one downside to the presentation model is that it only happens once! This means that if you're not there to see it, you don't see it! With that in mind, we are going to begin featuring video blogs in lieu of some of the live performances. The theme of our first Video Blog will be "gratitude." It will incorporate videos by our two drama groups, a linked tale told in five parts by our circus group, an art montage from our art group, and songs and dances by the younger kids! One of the advantages to the video model, is that students have the opportunity to craft projects that are more intricate, ones that can be molded gradually like a fine ceramic vase! Our theater specialist, Anne Fogarty, is assisted by two excellent madrakhim, both named Jacob! One of these Jacob's, Jacob Baim, wrote the script for one of the Hanukkah plays which was presented this fall. The other, Jacob Shternberg, is highly adept at video editing, and has been working hard to assemble the video components that the students have created, incorporating green screen, special effects and more! Stay tuned!

Singing Students on Shabbat

If you've been to Shabbat services over the last month or so, you might have been present to witness some significant participation by our BHBE kids! This past Saturday for Shabbat Shira, our first and second graders sang a great song with the cantor during the Torah service which he had practiced with them on Sunday mornings, and also earlier that day! We are aiming to have more of these concentrated Shabbat kid participation days going forward. On behalf of the BHBE Inclusion Committee I visited Anshe Emet synagogue's Inclusive Sunday School program. The students were truly engaged. Everyone with challenges as well as classmates without challenges are in the same classroom at ease with one another. Extra support for students with special needs was provided by Madrakhim assistants. The Madrakhim are teens who help in the classroom. The teens are woven into the fabric of the class as easily as the students. Training for teachers as well as the Madrakhim happens before the school year begins and continues at intervals throughout the year.

One message that was evident was that kids who are given encouragement understand, tolerate and accept other kids. Our Jewish values encourage bringing people together. I saw this for myself as I visited 5 classrooms. This program is a fine example of a way we here at BHBE can be Inclusive.

Each January, the Association of Jewish Libraries announces the winners of the Sydney Taylor Book Award (for the best Jewish children's literature) and the Jewish Fiction Award. Also announced in January are the National Jewish Book Awards. Here are a few of the recent winners of these awards:



On Division by Goldie Goldbloom (AJL Jewish Fiction Award) In *On Division*, Goldbloom writes about Surie, a newly-pregnant fifty-seven year old mother, grandmother, and almost great-grandmother living in the Chasidic community of Williamsburg, Brooklyn. Haunted by the death of her son Lipa, Surie

finds herself keeping this pregnancy a secret from everyone, including her beloved husband. The author, a member of the Chasidic community, writes with accuracy, authenticity, and respect – celebrating the positive aspects of the community with beauty, warmth, and love while also exposing negative, harmful, and shameful practices. The result is a multi-layered story of how secrets can shake even the most secure and close-knit families that is accessible to readers both familiar and unfamiliar with the insular world of ultra-Orthodox Jews. (Award Committee)



Fly Already: Stories by Etgar Keret, translated from the Hebrew (NJBA, Fiction) There's no one like Etgar Keret. His stories take place at the crossroads of the fantastical, searing, and hilarious. His characters grapple with parenthood and family, war and games,

marijuana and cake, memory and love. These stories never go to the expected place, but always surprise, entertain, and move. The thread that weaves these pieces together is our inability to communicate, to see so little of the world around us and to understand each other even less. Yet somehow, in these pages, through Etgar's deep love for humanity and our hapless existence, a bright light shines through and our universal connection to each other sparks alive. Someday We Will Fly by Rachel DeWoskin (STBA, Teen Readers Category, and National Jewish Book Award, Young Adult Literature) In this lushly written historical novel, Lillia and her father and sister flee Warsaw during the Holocaust and take refuge in Shanghai,

China. There, Lillia's need to support her family, her relationships with others, and her awareness of her privilege even as a refugee all contribute to her growth. (STBA Committee)



White Bird: A Wonder Story by R. J. Palacio (STBA, Older Readers Category)
This beautifully illustrated graphic novel connects the Holocaust to familiar contemporary characters, as Julian from the Wonder series learns his grandmother's

powerful story of rescue in Vichy-occupied France. (STBA Committee)



The Book Rescuer: How a Mensch from Massachusetts Saved Yiddish Literature for Generations to Come by Sue Macy, illustrated by Stacy Innerst (STBA, Younger Readers Category) The Book Rescuer celebrates the power of an individual to preserve history and

culture, while also exploring timely themes of identity and immigration. In a folksy voice, this biography tells the story of Yiddish Book Center founder Aaron Lansky's commitment to rescuing Yiddish language books and ensuring that despite all odds, Yiddish language and culture will stay alive for future generations. Gittel's Journey: An Ellis Island Story by Lesléa Newman, illustrated by Amy June Bates (NJBA, Children's Literature, and STBA Honor Book) Gittel and her mother were supposed to immigrate to America together, but when her mother is stopped by the health inspector, Gittel must make the

journey alone. Her mother writes her cousin's address in New York on a piece of paper. However, when Gittel arrives at Ellis Island, she discovers the ink has run and the address is illegible! How will she find her family? Both a heart-wrenching and heartwarming story, Gittel's Journey offers a fresh perspective on the immigration journey to Ellis Island. The book includes an author's note explaining how Gittel's story is based on the journey to America taken by Lesléa Newman's grandmother and family friend. (from the publisher)






