Dear BHBE Community:

I have always enjoyed the month of December. It has always provided a bit of a slow-down from my kids' busy school schedules and activities, my husband's many nighttime events, and then, of course, there is Hanukkah and

all its at-home customs and pageantry.

My childhood home was adorned with decorations and we, as I am sure many of you, had our rituals. As each evening approached, we would always have dinner first, then light three menorahs—my brother and I would each light our own—and then Kevin and I would sprint to the fireplace downstairs where presents sat for us to shake, sort through and open. How blessed we were, and how blessed I am to have these amazing memories and to create new ones for my children. Phil and I kept my parents' fireplace ritual and decorate ours yearly with the childhood creations of our now three teenagers. From preschool Hanukkah cards and stained glass paper dreidels, to hand-tracings made into menorahs, I tape them to the mantle and down the sides. They are the perfect bridge to years past when my wide-eyed children also begged to open gifts before dinner.

We have also, throughout the years, reminded our children that getting begets giving. We have participated in Adopt-A -Family programs, for example, so they can understand the significance of helping others. If you and your family are looking for such a cause, there are several to choose from including Rush University Medical Center's Adopt-A-Family Program 2020 (https://www.rush.edu/about-us/rush-community/office-community-health-equity-and-engagement/adopt-family-program-20200, and Lurie Children's Hospital toy and gift donation program (https://www.luriechildrens.org/en/ways-to-help/Ways-to-Give/toy-gift-donations/).

As I write this in late October, however, with headlines blaring that we are entering, perhaps, the darkest days of the pandemic, it is hard to juxtapose this news with the Festival of Lights, but this is just what we need. In addition to giving tzedakah to others, I have also come across some wonderful new ways that we can both celebrate and reflect on our current public health crisis.

One that I particularly love is using each candle to represent a theme or reflection point, perhaps of this past year. You and your family can come up with these together. Perhaps, the first night is dedicated to ending anti-semitism; the second to eradicating famine; the third to Black Lives Matter, and so on. Celebrate your chosen theme each night with an additional reading, a service project, reflections, a discussion. In short, turn the beautiful lights of our menorahs in action.

May the lights of Hanukkah unite us with our loved ones everywhere and lead us to brighter days ahead.

A number of Midrashic and Talmudic interpretations tell us a story of Adam, the first man who shortly after he was created began to be afraid of darkness. It is said that this fear gripped Adam as he was observing the days getting shorter and the nights getting longer. At some point even the moon in the

sky was not seen at night and the day's light was also dim. Adam was even more afraid then but with God's help he made his own light and lit the dark night with it. After he did that, Adam's fear was gone and he was content.

This metaphorical interpretation has a very physical connection to both the solar and the lunar calendars and the ongoing cycles of the sun and the moon. According to the solar calendar, December 21 marks the winter solstice, the shortest day and the longest night of the year. Hanukkah that begins on the 25th of the Hebrew month of Kislev, brings us to the darkest night of the year with the moon not being visible at night towards the end of the month. It is thought what Adam has observed might have been the manifestation of the lunar cycle and the darkness-the end of a Jewish month shortly before the new moon.

Darkness is something that we as humans are often afraid off. Things are not clear to us in the dark. We feel vulnerable and not in control of our environment especially when we experience darkness in unfamiliar settings or in nature. Our immediate response to darkness is to find light and to light the way to regain sense of visibility and control. Physically and emotionally we are wired to do just that. Likewise, we are innately drawn to the concepts and ideas that take us out of the gloomy places in our souls and give us spiritual light and emotional uplift. We especially seek light at the times of darkness because it is exactly in those times that we feel the most urgent need to have it.

Hanukkah combines the wisdom of the Jewish calendar and the story of miracle and redemption where the miracle of light is a focal point. While the seasonal features of Kislev frame our Hanukkah celebrations in the way in which we transition from darkness to light, the story of Hanukkah makes the same transition much more pointing and complete.

This year, as we approach the Hanukkah season, our yearning for light is particularly strong for we find ourselves in the middle of the deadly pandemic and all the gloom and doom that it represents. Just like Adam before us we too are afraid of the darkness that seems to envelope our world. And just like the Maccabees, we hope for the miracles while fighting our way through the unknown.

And yet, it is particularly in these times that we must believe that we can dispel the darkness and light the candles of hope through our faith and our collective efforts for the brighter tomorrow. While we may not be in control of the universe around us we can still do our part to pave the way for God's miracles to come. To quote a Great Maharal, "Man should create light when God's light has dimmed."

So as we find ourselves in these challenging times and as we approach the holiday of Hanukkah we need to remember that even in darkness there is light. We also need to remember that even in the darkest of times the miracles can still take place as they did for those who came before us. And that is why we continue to hope and pray and also to work hard for the better tomorrow.

May a new light shine upon Zion and may we all swiftly merit its radiance. Amen



The BHBE Academy has gotten off to a solid start so far this year! We have had several live experiences in the parking lot, and our virtual experiences are substantial and varied.

Grades 2 - 7 meet virtually on Sunday mornings and Tuesday afternoons, joined by our 1st year class on Sunday mornings. We are using an integrated curriculum called Shalom Learning, which is designed to be done both live and virtually, and incorporates text study, videos, Jewish values, holidays, rituals and more! Each unit in grades 3 - 7 is based on one key Jewish value, and the lessons and experiences springboard from that core theme. Our classes have just completed the first unit, Teshuva, repentance (which correlates to the fall holidays), and have begun unit 2, Betzelem Elohim, made in the image of God. The 2nd grade curriculum is structured slightly differently. Each lesson is based on one core Jewish value and incorporates the work of a Jewish artist. In the picture above, our 2nd graders have created binoculars as part of their exploration of the value of *Hakarat Hatov* -- seeing the good in each other and in the world.

Every student in grades 3 - 7 is also being tutored in Hebrew twice a week for decoding, tefillah skill, pre-Bnai mitzvah work, vocabulary, conversational Hebrew, and more. Tutoring is done in pairs or individually, and there are two groups of 3 meeting as well. This tutoring is done by myself, Sarah Rodin, and Gal Spivak, with help by three madrikhim -- Zachary B, Adina T, and Sophia K, who provide the students with extra practice and attention.

Starting this coming Sunday, students in grades 6 and 7 will participate in biweekly Israel tours led by a live Israeli tour guide in Israel. First up -- climbing Masada! For many of these tours, families will be provided with physical materials from Israel that correspond with the location the students are visiting, such as Israeli mud from the Dead Sea, or Jerusalem stone.

Our 8th graders are meeting virtually with Sarah Pila (our former youth director). Using a curriculum called *Heart to Heart* from the Moving Traditions organization, they will be exploring issues of concern to teens through a Jewish lens, such as maintaining and forming friendships online and off, communicating with parents, racial justice, and challenging sexism.

Online and offline electives will be starting shortly, such as book groups with librarian Marcie Eskin and a debate club where students will debate as key Biblical characters. We have a number of high school students participating as Hebrew tutors, assistants to our teachers, video editors, and even facilitators of electives.

All in all, in spite of the complexity of the situation, students are engaged, connecting with each other and with their teachers, and growing in their Jewish knowledge and skill.

REPORT FROM FUNERAL/ CEMETERY COMMITTEE

There are two things that we can't avoid, death and taxes. This informative report is about the former. Several years ago the Funeral Subcommittee of the Midwest Region of the United

Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, of which I was a member, visited all the local Jewish Funeral Homes to institute a United Synagogue Funeral Plan. The purpose was to relieve the stress of choosing various components of the funeral for a departed one. The plan includes the picking up and transporting the body to the funeral home, providing a muslin shroud (tachrechim), a curved top, stained, wooden, kosher casket, service at the funeral home, transportation to the cemetery and earth from Israel to be placed on the casket. There is also the option of having the service in the Sanctuary of BHBE or graveside services. NOT included are a family limousine, ritual washing of the body, Tahara, death notices placed in the newspaper, Shomer, chairs and coat rack for Shiva and all cemetery expenses, which I shall get into later on. The services of the clergy are included in your dues however should you desire, contributions can be made to the discretionary funds of the clergy. Costs vary with each funeral home. BHBE does not endorse any Funeral Home. The choice is entirely yours. All that is needed is a phone call to the Funeral Home and tell them that you want a United Synagogue Funeral Package. It is also recommended that you pre-plan and make arrangements well in advance, so that when the time comes your wishes are already known.

As for the cemetery portion, many years ago, Beth Hillel and Bnai Emunah had sections in Shalom Memorial Park which have been completely sold out, A new BHBE section has been established at Shalom. The price of the graves is dependent on where within the section the lot(s) is (are) purchased. The cost of the lot(s) does NOT include the opening and closing of the grave, the concrete vault, required by the State Of Illinois, nor the bronze marker identifying who is in the grave. It does include perpetual care and the placement of the sod after the burial. Preneed lots can be purchased interest free and paid for over a period of three (3) to five (5) years.
