The other day I caught myself thinking "I am so looking forward to the New Year. I just can't wait for the clock to turn and for this year to be finally over." But then i realized that the calendar change is just that, a subtle and circular development in time and space that follows the cycle of the sun. 
Let's invest in BHBE!

The Book of V. by Anna Solomon (2020) This propulsive historical novel intertwines the lives of the Bible's Queen Esther, a senator's wife in the 1970s, and a Brooklyn mother in 2016, whose stories trace surprising and moving parallels across

centuries. Lily is a mother and a daughter. And a second wife. And a writer, maybe? Or she was going to be, before she had children. Now, in her rented Brooklyn apartment she's grappling with her sexual and intellectual desires, while also trying to manage her roles as a mother and a wife in 2016. Vivian Barr seems to be the perfect political wife, dedicated to helping her charismatic and ambitious husband find success in Watergate-era Washington D.C. But one night he demands a humiliating favor, and her refusal to obey changes the course of her life—along with the lives of others. Esther is a fiercely independent young woman in ancient Persia, where she and her uncle's tribe live a tenuous existence outside the palace walls. When an innocent mistake results in devastating consequences for her people, she is offered up as a sacrifice to please the King, in the hopes that she will save them all. These three characters' riveting stories overlap and ultimately collide, illuminating how women's lives have and have not changed over thousands of years.

Ouser of Secrets

Queen of Secrets by Jenny Meyerhoff (2010) Fifteen-year-old Essie Green, an orphan who has been raised by her secular Jewish grandparents in Michigan, experiences conflicting loyalties and confusing emotions when her aunt, uncle

and cousin move back from New York, and her very religious cousin tries to fit in with the other football players at Essie's high school, one of whom is Essie's popular new boyfriend. Her cousin Micah is instantly branded a freak for praying during games, and Essie doesn't want anything to do with him. As the football team's teasing of Micah shifts

him. As the football team's teasing of Micah shifts into hazing, Essie is forced to make a choice between the boy she might love and the cousin she barely knows.



The Gilded Chamber: A Novel of Queen Esther by Rebecca Kohn (2004)

A retelling of the life of the great Jewish heroine follows the future queen from her youth as an orphan growing up in the home of her cousin, a high-ranking court official to

whom she is betrothed, her selection as the wife of powerful Persian king, and the sacrifices she makes in order to save her people from annihilation. For centuries Esther's name has been a byword for feminine beauty, guile, and wisdom. This sweeping, meticulously researched novel restores Esther to her full, complex humanity while reanimating the glittering Persian empire in which her story unfolded. Esther comes to that land as a terrified Jewish orphan betrothed to her cousin, a well-connected courtier. She finds a world racked by intrigue and unfathomable hatreds and realizes that the only way to survive is to win the heart of its king. Passionate, suspenseful, and historically authentic, The Gilded Chamber illuminates the dilemma of a woman torn between her heart and her sense of duty.



RAISEL'S RIDDLE Raisel's Riddle by Erica Silverman (1999, ages 5-9)

What's more precious than rubies, more lasting than gold? Raisel knows. She learned it from her grandfather, a poor

scholar who taught her. When he dies, Raisel finds work in the home of a rabbi. His jealous cook makes Raisel toil from sunup to sundown. And as the Jewish holiday of Purim approaches, Raisel works even harder. The rabbi's son presides over the Purim dinner, and Raisel listens closely when he responds to riddles posed by his guests. Is it possible that this young man can answer Raisel's riddle? Erica Silverman's lively retelling of the Cinderella story features a heroine for whom knowledge is as essential to happiness as love. In striking paintings, Susan Gaber captures all her beauty, external and internal.



The Mystery Bear: A Purim Story by Leone Adelson (2004, Preschool-age 7) When Little Bear wakes up from hibernation and goes off in search of something to eat, the smells of a delicious feast draw him to a nearby house. The people inside are having a wonderful time and are delighted

to welcome the stranger in a bear costume—after all, it's Purim, when lots of people dress up! Little Itzik suspects that the stranger might actually be a real bear, but everyone else is having too much fun to pay attention to his warnings. The comical story and Naomi Howland's bright, jolly illustrations capture the noisy and cheerful spirit of a favorite holiday.

The Families with Littles program is one of the key engagement structures for current BHBE families with children six or seven and under, and also one of our ways of bringing new families into our orbit. Rabbi Crane brought the

structure with him when he joined us over a year-and-a-half ago, and it has been very successful here. Nearly every month last year, either on a late Friday afternoon or on a Saturday evening, depending on the timing of Shabbat, around 100 people gathered in the Men's Club or SPAK for a pizza and pasta dinner, an art project, some delightful entertainment for young children, and wonderful schmoozing. For those programs on Saturday evenings, we would begin with havdalah led by the rabbi and cantor. For the ones on Friday late afternoon, we would begin with Shabbat songs. Last year's entertainment included things like an amazing bubble artist, an outstanding juggling performance, a magician, and more.

As we have not been able to gather in person this year, the program has been reformatted for a virtual environment. In the two events we've held so far, it has been successful and the modified structure has worked nicely. How have we converted it to this new temporary environment? First of all, we've kept all the components intact, from food through art through entertainment, simply shifting the form of their delivery. Families register in advance, letting us know how many people are going to be participating, how many slices of pizza they will be eating, and how many in their party will be having cookies. On the Friday of the event, families swing by the synagogue to pick up their pizza, cookies, and materials for the art project that will be done on the evening of the gathering. They're given full instructions on how to participate. Come show time, they heat up the pizza, take out the art project (although some families choose to do this in advance or afterwards), as we gather in a group on Zoom.

The secret to the format has been for families to have two windows in their browser open simultaneously, one with the Zoom link and one with the regular synagogue streaming link. Families gather on Zoom with the rabbi and schmooze and sing songs. They then shift to the streaming link where the cantor leads a beautiful havdalah ceremony from the sanctuary podium (so far our programs this year have been on Saturday evenings.)

The performer for the evening is set up in SPAK, with our excellent remote streaming company ready to pivot the cameras to capture both the video and the audio of the performance in professional fidelity. (The picture and sound quality of the stream is much higher than in Zoom, which adds to the richness for participant families. But by having the Zoom window open simultaneously, we don't lose the interactive community component.) Sometimes families can even chat with the performer using the Zoom chat feature while the performance is going on in the stream window. After the 20 or 30 minute performance, families return to the Zoom window to hang out, talk with the rabbi and with each other about how things are going, feel like they are part of a dynamic interactive community!

Generous donors have helped facilitate the program, including the Dr. Herbert and Elaine Loseff Cultural Center Fund. We thank them for their thoughtfulness! We look forward to continuing this program for the next few months in the current format, and hope and anticipate being back in person in the fall to continue them live!




