FROM RABBI HAYON



The ability to curb one's own desires in order to enhance the well-being of those around us is at the heart of Jewish ethics; each of the holy days of our year invites us to exercise this spiritual muscle in new and productive ways.

One morning on our recent congregational trip to Morocco, I spent some time in conversation with Mohamed, our local guide who has lived in Morocco for his entire life. We were talking together about the factors that have made Morocco so unique in the Muslim and Arab worlds as a place of religious tolerance and political moderation.

Mohamed suggested that in Morocco, culture shapes policy, rather than the other way around. From his perspective, the monarchy has a long legacy of embracing modesty and humility as cherished social values. For this reason, the social culture tends to reward generosity and temperance rather than selfishness and unbridled ambition. "We have come to understand that our country has enough resources to fulfill everyone's need," he said, "but it cannot fulfill everyone's greed."

I find myself thinking a lot about Mohamed's insight as we approach this year's celebration of Passover. We are all familiar with the seder's proclamation: "Let all who are hungry come and eat." We open the door for Elijah, symbolically opening our homes to those who do not share our resources or our privileges. The seder is itself a symbolic invitation to those who hunger to find their

needs fulfilled by the generosity of our community's resources and the abundance of our own human hearts.

In the Torah's description of the very first Passover ritual, each Israelite household in Egypt is commanded to slaughter a lamb and share its meat with the members of its own family. But, keenly aware that not all families are blessed with equal resources, the text goes on to stipulate that every household should be prepared to share their food with a neighbor who may not have the means to purchase a lamb and provide a holiday meal for themselves. This is not merely a practical lesson about the observance of the holiday rituals, but a moral one: God's primary concern is that the Jewish community will govern itself with the values of modesty and restraint, in order to ensure that everyone's basic needs will be met.

Being willing to place limits on one's own appetites, to act with modesty and generosity, is an important spiritual practice. It can exert a powerful effect on the moral character of a community and even, as I learned in Morocco, on the culture of an entire nation. The ability to curb one's own desires in order to enhance the well-

being of those around us is at the heart of Jewish ethics; each of the holy days of our year invites us to exercise this spiritual muscle in new and productive ways.

I pray our celebrations of Passover – and all the days that follow – will bring us to a deeper appreciation of these religious values, and to a firmer commitment to humility and coexistence, and an abiding concern for the welfare of those around us.





At Emanu El, we take seriously the statement that "becoming B'nei Mitzvah is a celebration not only for the student and their family but for our whole congregation." For over 50 years, Dolores Wilkenfeld embodied

the spirit of that statement, working with every B'nei Mitzvah student as they practiced their speeches from the bimah, ensuring that they delivered their words of Torah with poise and precision.

In addition to the practical lessons about standing up straight and speaking slowly and clearly, students gained a deep sense of connection to the congregation through their work with Dolores, whose vast experience in congregational leadership was as important to her work with the students as was her knowledge of public speaking.

While Dolores retired from this work during the pandemic, we are extremely fortunate that she trained an "apprentice," Lisa Brooks, who worked alongside her for more than twelve years. We are grateful to Lisa for carrying the tradition forward singlehandedly in the years since Dolores' retirement – and even expanding the role to support with writing and editing.

As the size of our B'nei Mitzvah classes has grown, so has the need to find a fitting partner for Lisa in carrying on Dolores' legacy. We are absolutely delighted to announce that Rebecca Lunstroth has agreed to join our speech rehearsal team. Why Upper School

It's no secret that today's teens are busier and more scheduled than at any time in the past. The demands of school, sports and extracurricular activities have expanded to fill seemingly every hour of the day. And hanging over it all is a pervasive sense of anxiety that if they don't do All. The. Things. they won't be accepted into the "right" college. Given all that, why would they choose to spend one evening a week at Helfman Upper School at Congregation Emanu El?

For many of our students, especially the ones who attend public or private schools with very few (if any) other Jewish students, the quick answer is: "to be with my Jewish friends." For this couple of hours a week, their Judaism is a source of connection with their peers, not the thing that makes them different. They can come and share dinner and conversation about topics that matter to them, from a distinctly Jewish perspective, without need for explanation or justification. Upper School is also a safe place for students to discuss their experiences with anti-Semitism, anti-Zionism and other challenges of being Jewish in a secular society, and to receive support from peers and faculty.

Speaking of faculty, one of the most compelling reasons to attend Upper School is the unparalleled opportunity to build deep relationships with our clergy and senior education staff. Unlike in Jewish day schools or other community programs, Helfman Upper School classes are



taught by our rabbis and senior educators in partnership with lay teachers. The informal interactions made possible by sharing meals, class discussions, retreats and field trips create a deep sense of community and connection to our congregation and its leadership. Unlike the lower grades of Helfman Religious School, which are about "building a Jewish toolbox" of knowledge about holidays, customs, prayers, stories, Hebrew and other content-focused material, Helfman Upper School classes are about using that knowledge, guided by clergy and teachers, to build a personal sense of Jewish identity, to prepare students for adult Jewish life.

While connection to the Congregation Emanu El community is central to the Helfman Upper School experience, we also partner with the larger Houston Jewish community on a number of programs. Our students are able to travel (at no additional cost to families) on the community-wide 8th/9th grade Alternative Winter Break; to participate on the planning committees for J-Serve, Global Havdalah, and other teen-led events; and to attend Teen Nights at the JCC Book Fair, Reel Abilities and the JCC Jewish Film Festival alongside their friends from other congregations. Becca Schwartzberg, our Youth and Young Adult Engagement Coordinator, regularly attends meetings of area youth professionals to ensure that our teens have the opportunity to participate in a wide variety of programs and events throughout the Houston Jewish community.

To honor the commitment students make by attending Helfman Upper School, Congregation Emanu El offers a number of incentives. Upper School students may serve as role models to younger students by participating in our Teaching Assistant (TA) program on Sunday mornings. This incredibly popular program – with more than 75 participants this year – gives students the opportunity to earn service hours or a paycheck while preparing them to take their place as the next generation of Jewish educators after they graduate from high



school. Indeed, several of our current Helfman teachers are former TAs!

In 10th grade, Upper School students take part in a yearlong program of study and preparation, including a weekend retreat, led by Rabbi Hayon, which leads to the Confirmation ceremony. The long line of Confirmation photos on the walls of our administrative wing attest to the deep feelings of connection to family and community engendered by this tradition. Students' expression of personal connection to Congregation Emanu El reaches its peak during the 12th grade Graduation service, during which students share their own stories of Jewish growth and learning.

No discussion of Helfman Upper School would be complete without mentioning the greatest gift our congregation gives to its students: the Shirley Barish Memorial Israel Experience. Thanks to the incredible generosity of the Barish family and their dedication to Israel education, students who enroll in Helfman Upper School and commit to continuing through graduation receive a four-week trip to Poland and Israel, with all expenses paid, during the summer after 10th or 11th grade. Students return from this transformative experience deeply connected to Israel, to each other, to the clergy and staff, and to their Judaism. It is powerful and life-changing, and the peak experience of the robust Jewish learning that happens in Helfman Upper School.

Enrollment for Helfman Upper School opens April 1, with a \$75 Early Bird discount available through April 30. Current 7th graders will have two opportunities to try out our programs: "Bridge Night" on Wednesday, March 27 (during which they will attend classes with current 8th graders) and "TA For A Day" on Sunday, April 7 (during which they will have a meeting with Becca and spend some time in classrooms). 2024 Rabbi Robert I. Kahn Scholar in Residence: Rabbi Nancy Wiener April 26-28



Due to managed health care changes, all blood donations go into the general blood supply for all patients in the Texas Gulf Coast region.

Maintaining diversity in the blood supply is essential. Some blood types are quite rare and are likeliest to be found among people with shared ancestral origins. 




