A Message from Rabbi Zahtz



The פרשת ויצא at the beginning of בעל הטורים notes that there is something unique about our פרשה, it is a bit of an anomaly. Unusually, our weekly פרשה is subdivided into sections that are marked off in the תורה with a certain amount of empty space and in our חומשים with the letter פ for פתוחה, an open section and the letter ס for סתומה

a closed unit. Our פרשה however, is one large unit with no subdivisions.

Why not? What depth does that express uniquely about פרשת ויצא?

The שמן הטוב suggests that it is to highlight that the entire journey יעקב experiences from the time he left his parents' home, learns in the בית מדרש of שם ועבר and travels to find a wife for himself was with one constant goal- to return home. He never wanted to leave, but circumstances dictated that he had to flee and ultimately spend many years away from his parents. But out of sight was not out of mind. Whatever יעקב did along the way was with the hope and goal of being able to return back home. So, the Torah leaves the whole story, from leaving יעקב באר שבע all the way back from the house of לבן as one unit, it was one constant mission and focus.

One of the benefits of being in a Rabbinc position is the opportunity to work together with lay leaders. It is inspiring to see people who volunteer their time, energy, emotion and talents for the greater good of the צבור. And it is constant. They may have many other things going on in their personal and/or professional lives and yet like יעקב אבינו who at times certainly had other important things going on, new the goal was one, to get home, so too there is a constant concern and goal that drives them each and every day to look out for how they can best serve and benefit the קהילה.

As we transition this week from one administration to the next I'd like to take a moment to recognize the selfless people who understood their roles were not about themselves but the greater good of the כלל and spent literally countless hours taking care of our Shul during this past term. At the helm our outgoing President, Ethan Keiser, who gave with every fiber of his being to the shul. His dedication, desire to make everyone happy and love for the Shul drove much of his decision process. We all owe him a tremendous amount of gratitude for tirelessly steering the shul, especially during the last few complicated months.

The earliest time for מנחה is 12:14 pm. מנחה should be completed by שקיעה at 4:29 pm.

מעריב and שבת ends at 5:14 pm. For those who wait for the זמן of רבנות it is 5:42 pm.

Davening protocols:

We continue to have beautiful minyanim both in Shul and outdoors on the Shul campus, please join and please remember your masks (both mouth and nose must be covered) and social distancing. In the Old Main Shul and in the Social Hall please only sit where the chairs have been set up. In the New Main Shul please only sit in the seats with blue tape on the back of them.

For those davening at home, the following parts of the תפילה are omitted: קדיש, מגן אבות, יקום פורקן, ברכו, בריך שמייה, יקום פורקן, מגן אבות, קדיש and אנעים זמירות.

We do recite צדקתך צדק and אב הרחמים this week.

The last time to recite קדוש לבנה is Sunday night (it may be recited any time that night).

I would also like to thank Rabbi Schachter for all his hard work for our teen minyan. Rabbi Schachter has somehow gotten my own sons to volunteer to learn. This past Saturday night our tent was as crowded as permitted by COVID guidelines with parents and grandparents learning with their kids and grandkids. CBY owes a great debt of gratitude to Henry Orlinsky for all the time he puts into the Manny Freed z"l Parent Child Learning program as well as the time he and Danny Saks and their entire committee have put into our Beis Medrash Program. Thank you also to Yossi Siev and the Adult Education Committee for providing so many wonderful opportunities for our members to continue to expand their horizons.

I would like to thank Yitzie Solomon and Estee Wolf for spending many hours putting together comprehensive youth leader guideline protocols. I would also like to thank Yitzie and Mike Roth with helping CBY to provide insurance to our entire staff and coverage of our shul. Additionally, a big thank you to Eric Melzer for his time and advice on a wide range of legal matters.

I would like to thank Sharon Kolb and Ronnie Aranoff for being in charge of seats for the high holidays for many of the past several years. As with many things this year, high holiday seating had to be addressed in different ways than in the past, and we appreciate their participation in this year's committee as well. Thank you to all our gabbaim and chazzanim who volunteer to ensure a pleasant and meaningful high holiday service.

I would like to thank Chaya Schwartz and the entire Bnot committee for all their hard work. Over the years, Bnot has been responsible for an unbelievable array of events that make our shul great.

We have so many wonderful and vital committees, so please forgive me for not mentioning them all.

It's been almost a year since the tragic car accident in front of our shul. I would like to thank the Teaneck Police Department and the Township for spending so much of their time and resources to improve the safety around the shul. May Micha Kaufman continue on his way to a complete recovery, and may the memory of Shelly Mermelstein, a"h, continue to be a blessing for his family, the Teaneck community and all of Klal Yisrael.

As the COVID-19 epidemic ripped through Bergen County, CBY was instrumental in bringing together all of our shuls, schools, the RCBC, and the Teaneck Health Department to meet on March 11th at CBY resulting in closing everything down. We will sorely miss Avi Aviner, Shalom Buchbinder, Deborah Nagler and Marvin Oppenheim. CBY will never be the same without them and may Hashem comfort their families among the mourners of Tzion and Yerushalayim. Of course, the entire kehillah owes a tremendous debt of gratitude to our Chevra Kadisha for the tremendous acts of chesed shel emes they displayed, not only during this harrowing time, but whenever they are needed.

In case any of you forgot, we had to deal with our Mara D'atra leaving, renewing Rabbi Zahtz's contract, and creating a much-needed position for Rabbi Weinberger.

Rabbi Pruzansky - It's unthinkable how much we all missed out because of the pandemic. We were all deprived of your sermons and Torah the last 5 months of your tenure. After 26 years of brilliantly leading our kehillah, it just doesn't seem right the way it ended. Thank you, personally, for guiding me through marriage, fatherhood and being the Jew I am today. We miss you terribly, but certainly hope Karen and you are enjoying your new life in Israel.

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CBY Covid Safety Protocols

As the weather gets cooler, CBY's Medical Committee has been discussing ways to ensure the safety of our members in the coming winter months. These recommendations and guidelines are formulated based on information and advice available as of October 2020. They also take into account recommendations disseminated by the OU, released just before the Yamim Noraim. All recommendations apply to both CBY members and non-members who enter shul.

As always, our shuls and communities should follow, at a minimum, the guidelines provided by local and national authorities, including the CDC and local health departments. By-and-large, our shul has been a model of compliance with public health recommendations during this crisis. This is profoundly inspiring and represents a true kiddush Hashem and affirmation of our choosing life. By working together and adhering to the following guidelines, we hope to ensure that our shul remains safe.

1. Health: No one with a fever or symptoms of COVID-19 may attend any event at CBY.
2. Masking: Masking is required at all indoor and outdoor minyanim. Masks should cover both nose and mouth. There are no exceptions.
3. Seating Plans: In addition to masking, we continue to urge social distancing, leaving six feet between seats occupied by non-family members. There are blue stickers in the New Main sanctuary which indicate where people should sit to ensure a safe environment. In other locations throughout the shul and outside chairs are spaced appropriately; please do not move or add seats in these locations. In the Ogden Tent we have put out chairs in groups of two to allow one chair for sitting and one for tallis/tefillin/chumash etc.
4. Adding Minyanim: Our shul administration, Rabbis and gabbaim have begun providing additional minyanim based on the increased need as the cold and rain necessitate. In addition to more indoor minyanim, plans for a second heated tent are in the works. Each minyan will have a captain who will determine if there is a need to add a simultaneous minyan elsewhere to avoid crowding.
5. Ventilation & Duration: Efforts, including consultation with HVAC experts, have been made to ensure proper ventilation of the space. Masking, distancing, and ventilation reduce risk but do not eliminate it. Every individual who chooses to daven inside must be aware of this risk and signs are posted to this effect. We do suggest N95 masks for those individuals at increased risk as they are proven to be safer in most studies.
6. Avoiding Crowding: While in shul, as well as while entering and exiting, congregants should maintain social distance.
7. Any individual returning from travel from a state defined as "impacted states" by the State of NJ (access up to date list [HERE](#)) may not attend any minyanim or events (whether indoors or outdoors) at Bnai Yeshurun for 2 weeks upon return. Additionally, any individual returning from international travel from a country listed as Level 2 (moderate) or Level 3 (high) risk, as defined by the CDC Travel Recommendation list (accessible [HERE](#)), may not attend any minyanim or events (whether indoors or outdoors) at Bnai Yeshurun for 2 weeks upon return. As of the writing of this email Israel is defined as Level 3 on the CDC listing. Please note that these lists may change daily and therefore must be checked upon return from travel for confirmation.
8. In the event that a member or non-member tests positive, we will send out a communication to the entire shul with that information. We will not identify the member or non-member by name but will attempt to report where (at which minyan) and when that person davened at CBY. Each individual in that minyan should then reach out to their doctor to discuss their individual need for quarantine. We request that any person who davens at a CBY minyan (either indoor or outdoor) communicate with the office (office@bnaiyeshurun.org or 201-836-8916 ext.5) in a timely manner in the event that they test positive for COVID.

We are trusting our members and other attendees to follow this practice. If you have any concerns related to a violation of this policy, please speak with the Gabbai of that minyan or please inform the shul office.

Teen Department – A Message from Rabbi Jonathan Schachter



A Mother's Gift, the Gift of Motherhood

Of the four *Imahos*, we know the least about *Leah*. Yet it was *Leah* whom *HaShem* determined should bear more children for *Am Yisrael* than any of the other *Imahos*, which in turn meant that *HaShem* deemed *Leah's* attributes as essential ingredients for the spiritual makeup of *Klal Yisrael*. Let's look into the little that we know of *Leah* and try to discover what exactly her lasting legacy for us was.

We know that *Leah* felt great pain when *Yaakov* chose *Rachel*, and not *Leah*, to be his prize for his seven years of servitude to *Lavan*. This pain only increased when *Yaakov* eventually married both of them, and *Leah* detected the nuanced differences of how *Yaakov* interacted with each of them, causing her to realize where she really stood. This deep pain could have sunk many people, but *Leah* had the strength to absorb it and utilize it for growth.

First, the pain made her turn to *HaShem* more passionately, as she began to daven and pour out her heart in *tefillah*. The names she chose for her children, along with her explanation for each, speak of this deep bond, formed from her pain. The name "*Reuven*" was given to her oldest because "*ra'ah HaShem b'anyi*" "*HaShem* saw my suffering" (29:32). *Shimon's* name was chosen because "*shama HaShem ki s'nuah anochi*" "*HaShem* heard that I was hated" (29:33). The name "*Yehuda*" comes from *Leah's* offering of gratitude to *HaShem* for yet another child, "*Ha'paam odeh es HaShem*" (29:35).

Beyond that, the pain made *Leah* more sensitive to the people around her and what they might be going through. The *Netziv* (1816-1893) points this out, in trying to understand why *Leah* offered *Zilpah* to *Yaakov* as a wife, and to have more children, even though *Leah* had already given birth to four children. He explains that *Leah* was not doing this so that she could have more children through *Zilpah*, the way that *Sara* offered *Hagar* and *Rachel* offered *Bilhah*. Rather, *Leah* noticed that *Zilpah* was experiencing pain, and it was a pain with which *Leah* was very familiar. The other three women in the house were all married to *Yaakov*, while *Zilpah* remained a *shifchah*, without children of her own. *Zilpah* was feeling unloved and unfulfilled. When *Leah* realized this, she gave *Zilpah* to *Yaakov* as a wife, and *Zilpah* was blessed with two sons of her own. It was in the merit of this sensitivity that *Leah* was able to have two additional children of her own. She named the first *Yissachar* because "*nassan Elokim s'chari al asher nasati shifchasi l'ishi*" "*God gave my reward on account of my giving my maidservant to my husband*" (30:18). This is true greatness, as *Leah* took the most trying times of her past to help her recognize another person's pain. The *gemara* (*Berachos* 60a) teaches us that she

was even able to apply this sensitivity to *Rachel*, of whom she was the most jealous earlier on. When *Leah* was pregnant with her last child, after she and the two *shefachos* already bore a total of ten boys, the child was supposed to be a male. But *Leah* realized that an eleventh boy would mean only one boy left to possibly come from *Rachel*, and this would put her in a lesser standing than even the *shefachos*. *Leah* davened, and pleaded with *HaShem* that this eleventh child be a girl, and out came *Dina*. Once again, *Leah* was able to take her familiarity with pain and use it to help others.

This is the great character trait which *HaShem* wanted us to have from *Leah*. In fact, this trait is so integral to a Jew's personality that it stands as one of the reasons why we had to endure so many years of suffering in Egypt. Our enslavement made us turn to *HaShem* in a more sincere way, and it sensitized us to the plights of all the oppressed people in society, since we too were once oppressed, "*ki geirim ha'yissem b'erez Mitzrayim*" (*Shemos* 22:20). We have this sensitivity from our mother *Leah*, as her lasting legacy to *Klal Yisrael*.

A Mini-Vort From the Szafranski Table to Yours!

In Yaakov's dream, HaShem introduced Himself as "Elokei Avraham Avicha, v'Elokei Yitzchak, the God of Avraham your father, and the God of Yitzchak." We use a similar line in the beginning of Shemoneh Erei, when we say "Elokei Avraham, Elokei Yitzchak, v'Elokei Yaakov, God of Avraham, God of Yitzchak, and God of Yaakov..." Why don't we simply say, "Elokei Avraham, Yitzchak, v'Yaakov?" Why do we have to mention HaShem's name before each of the Avot?

The holy Baal Shem Tov teaches us that we should never depend on our parents' relationship with HaShem. We must each cultivate our own personal relationships with Him. It's not enough that someone else davens, learns Torah, and performs mitzvot, rather, we must learn from our parents how to daven, how to learn, and how to do mitzvot ourselves! Elokei Avraham, Elokei Yitzchak, v'Elokei Yaakov, they each had rich relationships with HaShem, so should we... ("Korban H'Ani," Bechukotai)
