The Pursuit of Happiness and the Happiness of Pursuit Message from Rabbi Schrier



of "The Pursuit Happiness." our nation's founding document tells us, is together with "life" and "liberty" an unalienable right that Creator the has endowed upon us all.

Jefferson's usage of the phrase in the Declaration of Independence is a subject of interest among scholars of American history and political theory alike; British philosopher and political theorist John Locke had previously used the phrase "Life, Liberty, and *Property*," in his *Two Treatises* of Government, and we don't know why Jefferson chose to change the last leg of the triad, or how he arrived at "the pursuit of happiness." (One interesting theory posits that Jefferson deliberately avoided the word "property" to skirt the question of *human* property, i.e. slavery, the great legal and moral conflict in the Colonies – and in Jefferson's own life – at the time.)

However Jefferson conjured the timeless words of the Declaration, I would suggest that the Torah and Halacha offer us a richer, and truer, foil. From the Torah's standpoint, the Creator does not just endow us with a right to pursue happiness; instead, He offers us the more important "happiness of pursuit."

The *Gemara Nedarim* 16B tells us that if one takes an oath that they will not derive benefit from a *Sukkah*, they are nonetheless permitted to dwell in a *Sukkah* to fulfill the *mitzvah*. Rava explains the ruling by paraphrasing a classic Talmudic dictum:

מצוות לאו ליהנות נתנו

The *mitzvot* were not given for us to derive benefit [from them]

The *Rishonim* debate the scope and parameters of this principle. (I intend to discuss that debate in shul over *Yom Tov.*) But the *Ritva* (Sukkah 31B) poses what is perhaps the most basic challenge to this rule: is it really true that we don't derive benefit from *mitzvot*? One of the central pillars of Jewish belief is that G-d rewards our meritorious actions. R' Yaakov, in *Pirkei Avot* 4:17, tells us that that reward far exceeds any fleeting pleasures or joys of this world. The few moments one spends in the *Sukkah* generate incalculable *sechar* in the *Olam Haba.* So how can we assert that there is no benefit?

The *Ritva* answers that an oath only prohibits *direct* benefit; non-direct benefit that comes externally from an Outside Source was never prohibited in the first place. In the case of the *Sukkah*, if one is not enjoying the shade and cool of the *Sukkah* directly, then he may sit inside it, even if he will ultimately be rewarded after 120 years. The deferred spiritual benefit of *mitzvah* performance, however great, never registers in the narrow Halachic question of violating *nedarim*.

But, if I may take the *Ritva*'s resolution a step further, I would suggest that the Torah is actually offering us a profound lesson in *mitzvah* performance, and in the nature of true happiness.

Yes, it is true that sitting in a *Sukkah*, like any *mitzvah*, offers great reward in the

World to Come. But that reward is never the *telos* or *goal* of the *mitzvah*. Or, in other words, we are never *pursuing* the happiness that comes from *mitzvah* reward; the happiness can, at most, be considered a fringe benefit of *mitzvah* performance, what the *Ritva* calls *hana'ah mi-makom acher*.

A Jew's true pursuit in life is not the pursuit of happiness, but the pursuit of even larger things: truth, wisdom, moral refinement, G-d. To be sure, there is much reward and happiness that comes along the way. But that happiness is a byproduct of the Jew's larger life pursuits, goals, and aspirations — indeed, the "happiness of pursuit" rather than the "pursuit of happiness."

And perhaps the greatest irony of this alternative life-perspective is that, in the end, the "happiness of pursuit" brings greater life contentment than the "pursuit of happiness." Our society pursues happiness relentlessly. It is widely desired, diligently sought after, and fiercely marketed. And yet, it is rarely attained.

Sukkot – Zman Simchateinu – reminds us that life's true happiness is not attained by chasing after it. It is only the offshoot happiness of life's truer and greater pursuits that offers true serenity and contentment in our lives.

Unveiling the Essence of Sukkos Message from Rabbi Zahtz



that a name conveys the essence of a concept. Thus, when trying to understand and appreciate the essence of something we often turn to the names assigned by the Torah. With this in

mind, let's explore the holiday of סוכות and its two distinctive names, חג and מוכות and האסיף.

is a matter סוכה the word אוכה is a matter of debate in the Gemara. R' Akiva explains that it refers to the actual huts, or סוכות, that Bnei Yisrael used for shelter during their sojourn in the desert while R' Eliezer suggests it symbolizes the shelter provided by Hashem in a supernatural fashion, through the ענגי הכבוד, the clouds of glory.

But here's the intriguing part. סוכות is not the only name that the Torah uses to refer to this דג הסוכות. While it is indeed called חג הסוכות in the books of דברים and ויקרא, in the book of , it is referred to differently as חג האסיף, it is referred to differently , שמות the holiday of gathering the crops into the house.

Which of these names truly represents the essence of סוכות? Can it really be both? It

The Maharal teaches seems unlikely that the Torah would choose factors beyond his control, like rain and one time of the year to celebrate two entirely distinct events. Just as we avoid bundling mitzvot together. אין עושין מצוות חבילות to show respect for each מצוה, it would make sense that a Yom Tov, too, should maintain its individual focus.

> That is unless these two names, and the concepts they represent, actually converge to reinforce a broader notion that guides our celebration.

> I believe that's the case here. The name π expresses our recognition that הסוכות throughout our journey in the desert, Hashem watched over us. Whether it refers to the clouds of glory or the actual סוכות, it symbolizes that we could not have survived in the desert alone. Hashem was constantly leading, protecting, and providing for us, from shelter to sustenance. סוכות prompts us to recognize Hashem's divine providence in our daily lives.


What about הג האסיף, the holiday of gathering crops? When a farmer brings in the harvest and sees the abundance, he might be tempted to think, "I have accomplished this through my hard work and skill." However, the Torah encourages the farmer to reflect differently. He must acknowledge that while he toiled, the ultimate success of the crop depends on

sunlight-gifts from Hashem. The act of gathering is an opportunity to recognize Hashem's unseen hand guiding him.

Both names of סוכות express a common theme, recognizing and appreciating Hashem's role in everything that happens in our lives and in the world. However, they illustrate two different ways in which God manifests His providence. Sometimes it's evident and miraculous, as in the desert with the ענני הכבוד. Other times, it operates quietly in the background, much like the unseen hand that guides the farmer's crop.

As we sit in the shade of the sukkah during סוכות, we have a unique opportunity to reflect on the blessings in our lives, to appreciate what we have been given, and to express gratitude to Hashem for His constant presence and providence.

with its dual names reminds us to see the divine in both the miraculous and the everyday. It encourages us to recognize that we are never truly alone, for Hashem's providence extends to every aspect of our lives. As we celebrate this joyous , may we find inspiration in both the visible and the invisible hand of God that guides us all and channel that to fill our שמחה and lives with שמחה.

The Glory Within Us Message from Rabbi Weinberger



Sukkos, among other things, is a commemoration of the געני הכבוד, the clouds of glory, that accompanied Bnei Yisrael throughout the forty years in the *midbar*. There is, however, a rather obvious question

that can be asked. Of course, the אנגי ארכבוד שנגי are worthy of our recognition, but we know that this was not the only miracle that took place in the *midbar*. We also had the מון and the מון (i.e., food and drink), as well. Three miracles in the merit of three leaders: Moshe, Aharon, and Miriam. So, why is there only a Yuntif for the ענגי הכבור Where is the מון celebrating the מון and מון

The Chidah, R' Chaim Yosef Dovid Azulai zt"l, suggests that the reason there's no Yuntif commemorating the מן and באר is because both of those miracles only came about after Bnei Yisrael complained. We complained about the lack of food, so we got the באר; we said there was no water, so we got the באר. Therefore, says the Chidah, we forgo recalling these miracles because doing so would come at the expense of the Klal Yisrael's honor.

The Shemen Ha'tov, Rabbi Bernard Weinberger zt"l, offers a different answer. He points out that whereas the מין and אראר שיר were absolutely necessary to our survival (forget 40 years- we wouldn't have lasted a week without them), the lasted a week without them), the we could have done without. It might not have been the smoothest journey, but it would've been doable. Thus, the איני הכבוד the personal escort by G-d Himself- represent an extra level of protection and honor.

And when you consider the $\forall uccentric vccentric vccent$

protection. R' Shlomo Wolbe, similarly, says the reason we refer to these clouds as the אנגי הכבוד is because of the glory that they imply is within us. There is an element of התרוממות - of elevation- for the protected. Not only the material benefits of being safe and secure, but of being worthy of that hashgacha; that watchful eye.

I would add that while the מן and באר came to an end when we crossed the Jordan River, the -ענגי הכבוד the Divine protection for the Jewish people- has never left us. As R' Yaakov Emden writes in the introduction to his Siddur: the miracle of our nation's survival throughout the galus is greater than all the miracles that took place during Yetzias Mitzrayim. Perhaps then, the reason we have a Yuntif dedicated to the miracle of the ענני הכבוד is because that miracle continues to manifest itself until this very day. A נס נגלה that reveals not only the greatness of Hashem, but highlights His glorious people and their worthiness of such Divine protection.

• Sukkos is called Zman Simchaseinu, the time of our happiness. As opposed to Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur, the yomim noraim (days of awe and introspection), which on a biblical level are only one day each, Sukkos lasts seven whole days, eight in the diaspora. Rav Hirsch (Vayikra 23:33-34) mentions that the length of the Sukkos is, in part, meant to emphasize what the standard emotional state of a Jew should be. Yes, it's true, we need to live lives of seriousness and even trepidation, yomim noraim, but taking this mentality to an extreme should only occur during momentary occasions throughout the year. In general, Jews are meant to strive to live lives of passion, joy, and duty-simchah.

Did you ever wonder why we celebrate Sukkos in Tishrei? Shouldn't we celebrate it in Nissan when HaShem took us out of Mitzrayim and protected us in physical or spiritual sukkos (Sukkah 11b)? The Tur famously asked this question and there are a plethora of potential answers. Bring an answer down to the CBY youth wing and win yourself a yummy yom tov treat!!!
