
MESSAGE FROM RABBI WEINBERG



From the Desk of Our Executive Director

How has it already been a year since I joined the Anshai Torah staff? I have been blown away by the warmth, passion, vision, and generosity of our clergy, staff, Board of Directors, and membership. I have used the past year to observe and learn from so many of you. I wanted to understand what makes Anshai unique as it continues to grow while the national trend in synagogue membership is moving in the opposite direction. I wanted to find out what we do well and what might need a little attention.

During my first few months I asked some of you to give me one word that best describes Anshai. The word that was continually repeated was "Heimish". When asked what Heimish means to you, I often heard… "it's hard to explain but it just fits us as a community; Heimish is what we are…".

It has been a year filled with committee meetings, staff meetings, High Holy Day prep, experiencing this building bursting at the seams during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. I have seen faces light up as friends gathered together in the Behringer Family Sanctuary on a Friday night or sat together in the Haymann Family Foyer for kiddush lunch. We've experienced laughter coming from Religious School classrooms and from members as they watched our Rabbis dressed up for a Purim shpiel. We've also watched as some shed tears during minyan services that were quickly met with hugs of support.

Heimish - it's a good word - it's the right word for a congregation who supports and celebrates one another, welcoming and inclusive to all who join this sacred community.

Heimish (היימיש: pronounced by HAY-mish or HY-mish): Based on the Yiddish word heim, which means "home," it describes things that are homey or familiar.

Make yourself at home: Going back to Abraham, the very first Jew, our people have always valued inviting others into our homes. This mitzvah is known as hachnasat orchim, "welcoming and bringing in guests."

- -Intergenerational practice is inclusive, building on the positive resources that the young and old have to offer each other and those around them.
- -Intentionally collaborating across age groups/boundaries is not just a nice, collegial thing to do, it helps us flourish.
- -Cohesion and empathy between the generations helps to develop a strong community spirit.
- -Children thrive with stories, attention, an extra lap, an extra person who can radiate warmth and joy.
- -The volunteer feels useful by providing a relaxed, unconditional and nonjudgmental presence to children seeking connection.

- -Residence Hall at the American Jewish University
- -JTS Quadrangle
- -JTS Library Bookshelves
- -Schechter Institute of Jewish Studies Garden

For the past several years, funds raised by Torah Fund have gone toward scholarships to all the schools. There are continuing opportunities for sisterhoods and individuals to provide support to all five institutions through Torah Fund. Resultantly, thousands of dedicated volunteers have contributed to the spiritual, aesthetic and material well being of these educational communities by supporting Torah Fund projects.

ELAINE LEVITT was born in Cape Town, South Africa and grew up living a very traditional Jewish life focusing on Jewish education and community service.



Receiving a Bachelor of Commerce degree from the University of Cape Town, Elaine worked in the accounting field for many years before changing careers and teaching in the Early Childhood Center at Levine Academy.

The Levitt family joined Anshai Torah back when services were being held in a building on Plano Parkway and Village Creek. Elaine's husband, Jeff jokes they joined Anshai when Big Bird was still small. Over seven years ago, Elaine took on the critical role of Hesed Committee Chair. It is very important to Elaine that regardless of how big Anshai becomes, congregants will never feel lost or invisible especially those who are in need. When asked what it was that drew Elaine to Hesed, she said, "I had been the recipient of a stranger's kindness when I was taking care of a family member in another state and a synagogue reached out to help. The support we received was invaluable, and I knew then that I wanted to do the same for others."

Elaine and her committee worked tirelessly to ensure those in need received whatever assistance was required. Then the pandemic hit and the world came to an almost complete stop; however, the pandemic didn't stop the mitzvah of Bikur Cholim (visiting the ill) nor did it stop the need for meal/grocery deliveries as well as checking on those most vulnerable. Elaine quickly came up with a plan and put together groups of volunteers who made calls to Anshai's more senior congregants to ensure they didn't feel alone and who made meals and/or purchased groceries to deliver to those in need. Elaine found the strength and courage to deal with the challenges of the pandemic from the depths of her soul: "I knew no matter the challenge there is always a way to take care of our Anshai family when needed, especially when I received the support of my volunteers. None of this is possible without our volunteers," said Elaine.

Strong/strength and courage/courageous – these words so beautifully encapsulate both Elaine's actions and who she is. Elaine found herself relying on her strength and found the courage to keep the mission of Hesed alive and well during the pandemic.

"Throughout Covid, I stayed steadfast to my mission of keeping connection with those who needed help, even if that meant masking up and entering a home to deliver food and groceries and making the necessary plans and getting authorization to pick up much-needed medication from the pharmacy for a congregant," Elaine said.

Continuing to expand her volunteer efforts is very important to Elaine. When she is not volunteering, Elaine loves to spend time with her family which includes Jeff, her husband of 36 years, son and daughter-in-law, Daniel and Rachel Levitt, and daughter and son-in-law, Carly and Alex Raff. Elaine also enjoys playing mahjong and kaluki with her friends.



WARREN RUBIN was born in Yuba City, CA and grew up in Long Island, NY. His family belonged to Temple Beth Sholom where Warren attended Hebrew School (his favorite teacher was Stanley Sobolovsky).

Morton Kula, their synagogue's cantor, was Warren's bar mitzvah coach. Thirty years after Warren's bar mitzvah, Cantor Kula gave Warren copies of the trop melody music sheets he had created when he was a student at JTS after World War II.

Warren served as the METNY ritual chairman of USY in both his junior and senior years of high school, then served in the United States Air Force and graduated from UT Dallas with a B.A. in Interdisciplinary Studies. He obtained his M. Ed. in Special Education in 2008 and his M. Ed. in Education Administration in 2010. He also attended Hebrew University in Jerusalem focusing on Jewish Education. Warren spent 28 years in the kitchen cabinet manufacturing industry, but in 2002 he moved into the education arena as a special education teacher and elementary school principal. He has been a b'nai mitzvah tutor/coach since 1985 – his very first student was his son, Stuart.

Warren and his wife of 55 years, Sherry Lynn, joined Anshai Emet in 1980 and have been part of the Anshai family for 42 years! Warren became a b'nai mitzvah tutor/educator at the encouragement of Harry Butensky, Anshai Emet's cantor in the early 1980s. Cantor Butensky encouraged Warren to learn

to read Torah and learn trop and the rest, as they say, is history.

Continuing his support and encouragement for his students, Warren had to help them navigate the new virtual world of learning. "I am first and foremost a cheerleader for my b'nai mitzvah students," he said. "I try to create a learner/teacher relationship that is very supportive and affirming. Students learn to be independent and responsible for their assignments. Parents are our first and most important teachers which lead me to cooperative relationships with moms and dads." Chazak v'Ematz (Be Strong and Courageous) describes Warren Rubin to a 'T'. In fact, there have been many instances where Warren has found the strength and courage to face challenges head on. On May 28, 1977 in Southgate, KY, Warren, along with family and friends, was a guest at a bar mitzvah reception at

the Beverly Hills Supper Club. A fire broke out in the room next to theirs, and Warren, along with his brother Ronald, were among the first to evacuate the building. All of their party escaped unscathed. Unfortunately, more than 164 people perished that night.

Warren said, "[Even] during my four years in the U.S. Air Force, I had not witnessed a disaster on this scale."

When not tutoring/educating Anshai students, Warren spends time with Sherry Lynn and their children Debra (Scott) Clamp, Stuart (Stephanie) Rubin and Michelle (Jay) Lewis as well as their grandchildren Chandler, Gabrielle, Spencer, Joshua, Finley and Sutton. Warren loves music and has been a part of the Plano Community Band since 1983 playing the bass clarinet (including being president 1985—1987). Warren also founded the Plano Clarinet Choir in 2002. In July 2022, they performed at the International Clarinet Association convention in Reno, NV. Warren also has an extensive audio system at home. Audio equipment and intense listening have been part of Warren's life since his teen years – Warren has a wonderful collection of both classical and jazz in LPs, tape cassettes and CD/DVDs – he even has a few rare vinyl LPs!



SHERRI MASSARELLA was born in Philadelphia and grew up with a family who celebrated all the Jewish holidays in their home. Sherri loved learning Hebrew, traditional songs and melodies along with Israeli dancing at the conservative synagogue they attended.

Earning a Bachelor of Science in Public Health Education at Temple University, Sherri's teaching career began in the New York school districts. In 1991, Sherri began teaching students Hebrew at the United Jewish Center in Danbury, CT, and then at Ohev Shalom in Richboro, PA.



After relocating to the Dallas area in 1995, Sherri continued teaching/tutoring both children and adults in Hebrew at various DFW synagogues. Sherri established the Adat Chaverim Hebrew School and created the program curriculum. Sherri also worked as a substitute teacher for two decades in Plano ISD.

Upon joining Anshai Torah in 1999, Sherri's love and passion for Judaism motivated her to continue teaching/tutoring children who wanted to learn Hebrew and more about Judaism. Teaching is deeply rewarding and fulfilling for Sherri who said, "I especially love teaching and inspiring children. Teaching the next generation of Jewish adults is a truly a blessing."

"My heart ached for them [students' families] because I knew how special it was for my own family to share with extended family and friends."

Sherri truly is the embodiment of Chazak v'Ematz (strong and courageous). In February 2020, Sherri's fourth-grade students were having fun and baking Hamantaschen at Anshai. Then came the lockdown and there was no returning to the classroom. Sherri and her family sadly experienced significant loss in 2020, including her father and two cousins. These were unprecedented times and traveling was not an option so they couldn't be with their extended family nor have any closure. They couldn't see their adult children, either, as everyone was quarantining at home.

To overcome the barriers of the lockdown, creativity became the 'name of the game' for teaching and tutoring. Sherri not only had to find new ways to tutor/teach students preparing for their b'nai mitzvahs but also had to help support them in their new learning environment: FaceTime and Zoom. There were a lot of challenges in the first weeks of virtual learning but Sherri, her students and their parents persevered, and they carried on. Sherri said, "Faith in G-d, tons of webinars, and teamwork helped us through that very difficult time. Students taught me while I taught them; we all learned and grew together!"

When not tutoring/teaching, Sherri spends time with Bob, her husband of 36 years, her children Josh and Rachel, son-in-law Daniel, granddaughter, Ava, mini dachshund, Angel and mini donkeys, Cinderella, Lucca, Kira and Rafael. Sherri also loves to walk, hike, bake, do yoga and spend time with her family and friends.

Rabbi Dr. Crane is the son of Kay and Garry, and brother to Daniel and Paul. The Crane family home, the one in which he was raised, and the one he has built with his wife Lindy Miller and their sons Nadav, Amitai and Rafi, have always been where Judaism was taken seriously, where attending synagogue was a regular part of life and where questioning and curiosity were encouraged.

"My father was an economist and my mother a librarian, so I grew up loving and revering books and always finding the learning and wisdom in the conversations around our table," he said. Raised at Temple Beth Am in Seattle, it was Rabbi Norman Hirsh and his commitment to social justice, by his sermons and his living example, and seven summers spent at the former URJ's Camp Swig, that touched the future Rabbi Dr. Jonathan Crane from a young age.

"Thinking 'Jewishly,' leadership and ethics have been engrained in my bones as a young person," said Rabbi Dr. Crane. "I studied what, and where, I thought I would best create a life to help bring peace to the world."

Worldly, an understatement, Rabbi Dr. Crane's degrees include a BA from Wheaton College in Massachusetts, his first year spent including service as international president of NFTY/North American Federation for Temple Youth, an MA in International Peace Studies from the University of Notre Dame in Indiana, and an MPhil in Gandhian Thought from Gujarat Vidyapith in Ahmedabad, India. As a Wexner Graduate Fellow, he received rabbinic ordination and a Master of Arts in Hebrew Letters from Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion.

The last 12 years I've spent at Emory have been a great fit, with a range of students from undergraduates to seasoned professionals looking for tools to take into their post-service lives," said Rabbi Dr. Crane. "Both urgent and longstanding questions and issues pique my interest as I study through older wisdom and resources and the newest of technology."

"In Rabbi Dr. Crane we have another incredible speaker. We are so very blessed and so fortunate to welcome this world-renowned scholar whose teaching influences across the ages and around the world," said Janice Sweet Weinberg. "We welcome him with open arms for what we know will be an exhilarating program." In the past, Anshai Torah's Scholar events have featured rabbis Bradley Artson, Sharon Brous, Ed Feinstein, Daniel Gordis, Yitz Greenberg, Donniel Hartman, Brad Hirschfield and Naomi Levy as well as academics and experts Yossi Klein Halevi, Yehuda Kurtzer, Dr. Deborah Lipstadt and David Makovsky.

Among his many publications, Rabbi Dr.

"Narratives and Jewish Bioethics," and
"Ahimsa: The Way to Peace." He is editor of
"Beastly Morality: Animals as Ethical Agents"
and "Judaism, Race, and Ethics: Conversations
and Questions" and, with Rabbi Elliott Dorff,
co-editor of "The Oxford Handbook of Jewish
Ethics and Morality. A former president of
the Society of Jewish Ethics, he founded and
continues to co-edit the "Journal of Jewish
Ethics."

Rabbi Dr. Crane will lead a discussion of "Sowing Doubt and Hiding Reasons," looking at how, in this age of uncertainty, questioning evidence, undermining truths, and casting aspersions are common. On Sunday morning during Religious School, Rabbi Dr. Crane will speak to students in grades five and six about how we decide what is important in life; and to those in grades seven to twelve, about how Judaism encourages thought and consideration about using social media. 
