Imagine the Possible:

A Conversation about the 2020 Campaign with Rabbi Wendi Geffen and President Marilyn Perlman





WHAT HAS BEEN ESPECIALLY ON YOUR MIND AS WE APPROACH OUR **CENTENNIAL AND THIS CAMPAIGN?**

Rabbi Wendi Geffen: In today's siloed and tribal world, a world that elevates the sovereign-self over all else, the synagogue matters now more than ever. Our synagogue enables people across viewpoints, ages, and backgrounds to come together by shared belonging to this community. In any other context, these differences would keep us separated and at odds with each other, but here, we connect with each other through our shared community, history, Torah—all of which inspire us to be better people, better friends, better citizens, better Jews.

AS WE APPROACH OUR CENTENNIAL. **HOW DOES THE CAMPAIGN OPTIMIZE OPPORTUNITIES** FOR OUR NEXT CENTURY?

Marilyn Perlman: "Imagine the Possible: The Campaign for Our Centennial" will open space for collaboration, learning, enhanced programming, and modern technology. We will capitalize on opportunities to learn, engage, educate, and connect in ways that may not exist today. This campaign is the outcome of our commitment to manifesting our prudent, forward-looking plan to be resilient and poised to meet the challenges we know will come. I'm proud of our Board of Trustees for their dedication to taking on the big questions. It's bold! There's never been a better time to go for it.

HOW DID YOU DECIDE ON THE **GOALS OF THE CAMPAIGN?**

Marilyn Perlman: Previous Boards of Trustees have worked diligently to deeply and broadly understand where we have been, where we are now, and what is especially meaningful to our congregants to inform where we are going. With that in mind, combined with the opportunity of our Centennial, our Board of Trustees commissioned a study to assess the potential needs, interests, and goals for a major fundraising campaign. From there, we formed a Campaign Executive Committee to help vet the optimal approach.

WHAT IS THE FIRST PRIORITY OF THE CAMPAIGN?

Marilyn Perlman: This initial component of our campaign is the vital starting point for us to imagine the possible. The funds raised have been applied to essential building upgrades and critical infrastructure repairs already completed or underway. This component also provides for acquiring new technology and creating a substantial building reserve fund. Sustaining the **Synagogue** is not only the foundation of this campaign but the future of NSCI. With this investment to bring our facility to top grade condition, we arrive at the place of proactive care rather than reactive urgent fixes.

WHAT HAS INFLUENCED **DESIGNING THE NEXT PRIORITY** OF THE CAMPAIGN?

Rabbi Wendi Geffen: Our next priority addresses the most pressing challenge of 21st century synagogue life—security. As a rabbi, there is no way I can help spiritually elevate our congregants and community if people do not feel safe. have to be a concern, no less THE key concern of our efforts, however, this is the demand and reality of the era in which we live. At the very same time, we cannot let our fears govern all we do. That is why, at the very same time as we address our most critical safety issue, we will also double down on creating space and opportunity to gather and connect as a community.

Marilyn Perlman: Our goal is to create a A Welcoming Home for All. A new central entryway for monitored access will have upgraded security, a priority for every 21st century synagogue. The long glass arcade will be expanded and transformed into a gathering place with space for entertaining and connecting.

This component also includes reconfiguring the office suite to incorporate the Senior Rabbi's study with the clergy and staff together to promote efficiency and collaboration. The reception area will be redesigned to provide a secure, warm and welcoming area for congregants and visitors, including a more accessible WNSCI Gift Shop. Very exciting!

TOTAL CAMPAIGN GOAL: \$12,000,000



WHY DOES THE CAMPAIGN AIM TO MAKE CHANGES TO REBECCA K. CROWN SOCIAL HALL?

Rabbi Wendi Geffen: That's the third priority of the Campaign: A Community Resource for Celebration & **Programs**. The world in which we live is one where everything is changing. faster than it ever has before. The need for flexible, nimble environments that can adapt to a regularly shifting reality is more important than ever.

Marilyn Perlman: That's one of the major reasons we would like to renovate Rebecca K. Crown Social Hall where our congregants can look forward to coming together to engage, learn, and celebrate. Adding removable dividers will create a truly flexible, easily partitioned, multipurpose social hall. This component also includes a new "Meet the Moment Fund" available to our clergy for programming and guest experts in response to pressing, real-time events.

GROWING THE ENDOWMENT IS THE FOURTH AND FINAL **GOAL OF THE CAMPAIGN?**

Rabbi Wendi Geffen: NSCI is fortunate to have an endowment. an important and reliable source of revenue distributed annually to help support our congregation's ongoing operations. So, the fourth component is **Ensuring our Proud Legacy**. Although our annual endowment contribution to our operating budget covers only 6% of our total operating cost, building upon the existing endowment is an opportunity to support the synagogue

more significantly in perpetuity, something more and more valuable in our increasingly uncertain world.

WHAT DO YOU THINK THE BIGGEST **CHALLENGE IS FOR THIS CAMPAIGN?**

Rabbi Wendi Geffen: Like many challenges, they are also our greatest opportunities. The plans for this campaign including our ambitious fundraising goal are founded on inviting the entire congregation to join us. Spreading the word and engaging our congregation is one of those key challenges and an extraordinary opportunity.

Marilyn Perlman: This Campaign invites us all to invest in our community. It's not how much time you spend here, it is truly the relationship you have with NSCI and the community; not how much you "use" this place, but the place NSCI and synagogues have in our lives and for the continuity of the Jewish people. Whether you are here once a year for the High Holy Days or weekly for programs and worship; or you tend to connect only for lifecycle events weddings, b'nei mitzvah, and sadly but necessary, a funeral, we welcome it all and are grateful for the many facets that make up the beautiful prism of our total community. This is the greatest opportunity to pay it forward—to pass on to the next generation what we have been blessed to experience and receive.

Imagine if each person gave their best gift—whatever that may be. ■

Mission Moment

THE IMAGINE THE POSSIBLE **CAMPAIGN** for the future of NSCI spoke to me and my family right

away. When we first moved into the community, we came from a place where there were few Jews and even fewer choices of synagogues. We lived on a small Navy base in a rural part of Ventura County and drove 40 minutes to the closest Reform congregation. The idea that we would have a number of choices for a congregational home was both liberating and intimidating.

I originally thought NSCI was going to be too big. How does one find a niche in such a large environment? Can we really "belong"? Nevertheless, one Saturday morning, my daughters and I jumped in with both feet and unwittingly walked into the Shabbat Minyan Service at 9:15 am. After being welcomed by nearly everyone

in the room, we experienced the next few hours each from our own perspective. When we left after the Oneg, the girls were carrying art projects and I was carrying contact information for several new friends.

In the parking lot, my daughter Molly looked at me and said, "Do we really need to try anywhere else?" In that moment, I imagined a life at NSCI. The girls would engage with a peer group. Our family would celebrate b'nei mitzvah, weddings, baby namings. It was all so clear. So I looked at Molly and said, "I guess not." That was twenty years ago. We have experienced all of those wonderful things, and so many more the embrace of friendship and fellowship in times of celebration and despair, and myriad opportunities to learn, breathe and grow as a family and individuals.

In that moment in the parking lot, I was able to imagine the possible. What I cannot do in this moment is to imagine what my now adult daughters' "possible" will look like. I know they will continue to hold NSCI close to their hearts, but what do they need NSCI to become? The Imagine the Possible Campaign will allow us to preserve and sustain our physical structure, but also to adapt it to the needs of today and provide for its metamorphosis as the needs of our community change.

Our children, and theirs, should see NSCI as an anchor—not a burden—and as a springboard from which they can launch projects and visions and build a community which we can't even begin to visualize today. More than anything else, NSCI now and then will be a home for all of us, with every person as an individual partner and stakeholder. I hope you will join my family in ensuring our children and theirs can continue to imagine the possible secure in the knowledge that their community home will provide a base for the best and biggest aspirations of their hearts.



Our Immigration Stories: Fortunee Massuda

We continue to document the stories of our congregants who immigrated to the U.S. The following story about Fortunee Massuda and her family is compiled from an interview with Merle Branner on October 27, 2019 and subsequent conversation with Ellen Katz Block on November 15, 2019.

MOST OF US don't think of Jewish refugees as coming from Egypt but for Fortunee Massuda and her family, Cairo is the place from which they emigrated and, as for those who escaped Nazi Germany, leaving their home would not have been their choice.

Fortunee was born in Cairo, as was all of her family: her father, Lietto (Eliyahu), her mother, Rachel, her two older brothers, Jacob and Ben, an older sister, Donya and a younger sister, Sylvia. They were among the relatively small community of about 2,500 Jews segregated from the larger Cairo population of about 3.3 million people. As Jews, they were not allowed to have citizenship or a passport; they were not allowed to work for the government: their identification cards were stamped "Jewish." Within Jewish society, there were doctors, lawyers, independent entrepreneurs and a thriving community, self-contained and surrounded by life centered on the synagogue. The family, like many in the community, were Karaite¹ Jews, and married within their own religious group. Lietto owned a business manufacturing scales and weights. Rachel, like all Egyptian women, did not work; Jacob was in medical school; Ben was in engineering school; Fortunee and her sisters attended private school. During WWII, Rachel's father, Fortunee's grandfather, had purchased a passport and citizenship from Italy, thus the





family had documentation as Italian nationals, a happenstance which would save their lives.

The Six Day War began on Monday, June 5, 1967. Fortunee recalls vividly that by 11 am, the government began picking up Jewish men, nearly 600 in all, including her two brothers, Jacob and Ben, and taking them to the local police station where they were held. They did not return home and were not heard from. On Monday, Lietto went to work and was told by a friendly policeman to close his factory and go home. By 9 pm, with still no word from his sons, Lietto, with a shamas from the temple, went to the local police station. He and the shamas did not return home either and also were not heard from. On Tuesday, June 6, Rachel went to the Italian embassy, asserting her Italian citizenship and learned the whereabouts of the detained Jews. Of the hundreds of Jewish men who were imprisoned, about 40, in Fortunee's recollection, were

"Italian" men, destined to be deported. On Thursday, June 8, Lietto was released as the Egyptian government was not holding foreign nationals over 50 years old. The government did, however, confiscate his factory, his bank accounts and his home so the family had no possessions of value, no income and no way to earn a living. That night, a policeman came to the Massuda's door and told them that Jacob and Ben had been expelled from the country and taken, in handcuffs, to the port city of Alexandria where they were put aboard a ship bound for Italy.* He did not know exactly where the ship was going but he told them their sons had told him that if he went to their home and told their parents what had happened to them, the family would give him money.

About two weeks later, in mid-June, the family received a call from Jacob and Ben, who were in a refugee camp run by the Italian government. Donya, who was over 18, left to join her brothers.

Although Rachel and especially Lietto, did not want to leave Egypt, they knew they had no choice. Before they could do so, however, the Egyptian government demanded they pay taxes on the business which the government had already confiscated. Lietto used the last of his money to do so, leaving them with no money for passage on an Italian ship. In October 1967, they were able to depart (with one suitcase and five Egyptian dollars each) on a ship for which the Italian government paid. When they arrived in Italy, Jacob and Ben were at the port to meet them along with a representative from HIAS, all three of them telling the family not to get off the boat but to go straight to France because the United States quota for Italians was full. HIAS paid for the family to continue on by ship to Marseilles and then by train to Paris. They somehow arranged for Jacob, Ben and Donya to get to Paris as well, where they all lived in a hotel for 3 ½ months, paid for by HIAS.

The family now had a choice as to whether to emigrate to Israel or the U.S. Lietto was afraid that if they went to Israel, the boys would immediately be taken into the Israeli army and would not be able to finish their education. Rachel's mother and sister were living in Boston and with their help and that of HIAS, an apartment was waiting for the Massudas when they arrived there. HIAS further helped by getting Lietto a job as a mechanic at Beth Israel Hospital; they helped Rachel obtain a job as a typist; they helped Fortunee and Sylvia go to school. As all four of them spoke only Arabic and French, they all had to learn English, and all eventually became U.S. citizens. The Dean of Georgetown University, who was Jewish, gave Jacob a chance to enter the medical school there. He ultimately graduated from Georgetown and did his residency at Northwestern Memorial Hospital in Evanston. Ben finished his education at M.I.T. Donya married and settled down to raise a family which left Fortunee and Svlvia at home.

Fortunee finished her remaining 2½ years of high school, then went to

college, working various jobs to finance her education. She wanted to go to medical school, but her father did not think girls should become doctors so she became a pharmacist, as did Donya. Fortunee completed a five-year work/ study program at Northeastern College in Boston, living at home and saving every dollar she could, graduating as a pharmacist in 1975. She decided to go to Chicago and told her parents she would live with Jacob while he was doing his residency at Northwestern but instead, got her own apartment, working at Northwestern Memorial Hospital as a pharmacist and holding a side job at Osco. She discovered that she truly disliked being a pharmacist but, during this time, met a resident in podiatry who interested her in his field. She applied and was accepted to podiatry school at the Illinois College of Podiatric Medicine in Chicago, working night and weekend jobs and teaching pharmacology until she graduated at age 28. Following her surgical residency, Fortunee opened an office in a storefront in Hyde Park which grew into an enormously successful practice with 12 clinics, a staff of 65, and a surgery center in Hyde Park. She also managed a successful school of podiatry clinics for four years in a field in which women were not very visible.

In 1986, when she was 37, Fortunee met her husband, Charles Hannon, who was Catholic but converted, under Rabbi Mason's tutelage, to Judaism in 2001, 11 years after their marriage in 1990. Fortunee's parents, devout Jews, didn't want to come to her wedding and in fact, her brother, Ben, "disowned her" as his sibling. Her brother, Jacob, however, convinced her parents to come to the wedding for which she is extremely grateful. A few years ago, she and Ben began talking again.

The family still has strong attachments to Israel. Lietto wanted to be buried near his mother in the port city of Ashdod, a center for Karaite Jews. Ben sold his very successful engineering business, emigrated to Israel and lived there for 22 years, only recently returning to be nearer to his children.

Rachel lived in Israel with Ben for the last few years of her life and is buried there as well.

Fortunee, now retired, completed Adult B'nei Mitvah at NSCI in 2018, finally having some time in her life to do so. Because girls in Egypt were groomed only for housewife tasks and were not allowed to learn music, play sports or study Hebrew, exploring her Jewish roots and being part of the Jewish community was and is extremely important to Fortunee. She is very empathetic to the plight of immigrants, recalling her own overwhelming feelings of being "lost" and "ungrounded" when the family had to move abruptly and says that the U.S. gave her "everything"—unlimited opportunities as a Jew and as a woman. She believes we need to help people establish a stable life in their own countries so as to prevent the discombobulation and up-rootedness of emigration though she recognizes this may not always be possible. She believes in legal definitely not illegal—immigration and that the U.S. should open its doors even more than it does at present to welcome hard-working immigrants who, like her, can make a great contribution to their communities.

*The Massuda family was lucky. Many Jews who didn't have a foreign nationality were sent to the Abu-Zaabal prison, a notoriously brutal military facility outside of Cairo, where they were held sometimes for three years or more. The Red Cross came to the rescue with the aid and support of the French and Spanish governments which provided passports to help liberate those imprisoned.
