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The Paradigm Has Shifted: **Innovating Jewish Schooling at the Goodman Center for Jewish Education**

A RECENT STUDY found that nationally. the average enrollment rates in congregational schools is down by 40%. However, at the Goodman Center for Jewish Education, we're seeing the opposite trend. With a reputation for creating a relevant, meaningful, joyful and personalized learning experience for each child, we welcomed more than 50 **new families** and **120 new students** this year-476 students in all-our highest enrollment rate in nearly 10 years.

Why are we in this position today?

We believe that we have shifted the paradigm to sustain a culture of innovation in many significant ways. By listening to our parents and students we have leveraged them, and our lay leaders, as partners in setting a new, more progressive course for the direction of the school and its programs.

Many of our parents have gotten into the driver's seat to plan and implement incredible Jewish family experiences like our annual Challah Bake or Mitzvah Fair. Behind the scenes, we have actively participated in growing JUF Education Department efforts, including extensive grant applications and additional planning.

Creating a Culture of Innovation

Nearly 12 years ago, Camp@NSCI-our nationally renowned program for 3rd and 4th graders—was launched to introduce a hands-on experiential approach to learning. Since then, we have made significant strides to uphold and evolve this approach.

100% of Machoniks, 88% of parents, and 76% of 5th/6th graders feel there is a teacher or staff member who cares about them or their child.



And it's working. As reflected in our most recent parent survey, 75% of respondents said that they would recommend the school to a friend or colleague.

More recently, on a tour of our program, a Kindergarten/1st grade parent commented, "The curriculum is a mile wide and an inch deep." This single comment put into motion a change process that led to the creation of our "Dig Deeper" curriculum including units such as: Exploring the Torah, Connecting with God and spreading kindness, Celebrating Shabbat, and so much more.

As we continue to move forward, we keep in mind the challenges facing our school and our larger community. These include:

Busy family schedules and diverse family needs: We have made a commitment to focus on constantly improving and adapting to the changes that occur outside of the


Sunday Morning School Action:

- K-2nd graders running, jumping, spinning to commands all in Hebrew
- 3rd and 4th graders filming movie scripts they wrote, dressed up in costumes and using props
- 5th and 6th graders participating in "Shark Tank," pitching wellresearched Israeli innovations to better people's lives, to a parent/ grandparent panel
- Some of our 80 Machoniks (7th-12th grade) tutoring students and helping with classroom projects

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NSCI walls. That means offering experiences like online mid-week Hebrew classes and collaborating with the Youth and Family Community Committee (YFCC) and staff members.

- Teacher shortages: In an effort to hire and retain teachers with the Jewish/
 Hebrew and educational knowledge needed, we invest in our teachers by providing financial resources and time to augment their professional learning and skills. In some cases, we go beyond the "routine" training by providing coaching, courses, "internlike" experiences, and support to turn individuals into the capable teachers needed for our classrooms.
- Integrating new families: Over the past two years we have welcomed 120 new families and 220 new students to the Goodman Center for Jewish Education. How do we help these families feel known in our school, engaged in all we are doing, and share their voices to help guide our future? How do we help them on their Jewish journey?

We aim to tackle these challenges by expanding beyond our walls with our volunteers—parents, lay leaders, grandparents and all NSCI congregants. While the school is at the core of our offering, through adult learning experiences (Coffee with the Clergy), family experiences (Challah Bake), Shabbat (Shabbat Family Experiences), and tikkun olam (Mitzvah Fair), we are propelling adults and children forward in finding their own unique Jewish connection and education; our volunteers lead the way.

The CORE and MORE

What we know is that the more families participate the more our parents find meaningful opportunities for themselves and the *stronger* and *richer* our students' experiences will be as they grow.

Through our collaboration with the Youth and Family Community Committee and its staff, we are approaching the school experience more holistically to reach children ages 0–22, before and after their formal *core* education here in the Goodman Center for Jewish Education.

As we look forward to the coming school year, we're excited to engage parents at the grade level, helping them get to know one another better through gradeparent representatives and expanding our Coffee with Clergy events by grade.

The Crown of Our Good Name

Our rabbis teach us that the "crown of a good name excels above all" (Pirkei Avot 4:17). The Goodman Center for Jewish Education has a "good name"—we are one of the crowns of NSCI, of Jewish congregational schooling locally, and nationally. You should be proud! We are grateful for the support of the entire congregation in being able to educate and impact the lives of so many!

Machoniks are high schoolers who assist in teaching and programming throughout the Goodman Center for Jewish Education. The program has been around for years and is consistently very popular. This past year, over 80 teenagers comprised the Machoniks, making the program NSCI's single most successful teen program. I assert that the sheer number of teenagers in the program is a testament

to the formulation and execution of a thoughtful, effective, and impactful strategy by NSCI's staff, teachers, administration, and Youth and Family Community Committee.

Further proof of the Goodman Center's success is the exciting news that they recently received a \$14,000 grant from the JUF Education **Department** that will support afternoon enrichment programs, professional development, and their Onward Hebrew program. Kol hakavod!

The entire congregation should be proud of these accomplishments and of NSCI's continued investment in religious education.

Rabbi Lisa S. Greene

IF YOU READ Rabbi Greene's article. "A Tap on the Shoulder," in the NSCI May/June monthly bulletin, you already know that connection and community are the watchwords of her rabbinate. The world has changed, she says, but how we connect through Judaism and to one another is still vitally at the core of who we are and what we do. We challenge ourselves to make individualized, meaningful choices and to engage with our community, which is, after all, the essence of Reform Judaism.

Lisa and her sister Jackie were raised in a loving home. Her father, Rabbi Barry H. Greene, was the rabbi of Congregation B'nai Jeshurun in Short Hills, New Jersev. He had an active Jewish life growing up at Central Synagogue in Manhattan where he was a youth leader, and subsequently, an early officer of NFTY (the Reform movement's National Federation of Temple Youth) and was mentored by Rabbi Jonah B. Wise (son of Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise, the founder of American Reform Judaism). Her mother. Betty (Greenstein) Greene, was, as her daughters describe her, a kindergarten teacher by profession and in life. Betty's active Jewish involvement came about in college through her involvement at UCLA Hillel and the Brandeis Bardin Institute.

Friday nights in the Greene household were sacred. Shabbat dinner at 5:30 pm before the family headed to synagogue. The phone was off the hook, the girls got along, and there were no interruptions. The Greene household was a private space of a close family, and it was also the site of synagogue doings that Lisa remembers fondly—wedding couples and conversion students coming to meet with their father, Shabbat dinners with guest scholars, and their parents' beautiful dinner parties for which the girls served, learning from their parents the "right" ways to entertain.

Lisa and Jackie grew up at B'nai Jeshurun formally through preschool,

religious school, and their Temple Youth Group (TYG), and informally by playing hide and seek at the temple and sneaking Oneg Shabbat cookies from the kitchen. Lisa was their youth group's songleader and co-led the TYG choir that sang at Shabbat services. At her temple high school graduation service she spoke about being a rabbi's kid, making it clear that she was not simply Rabbi Greene's daughter, as she was so often introduced; she had her own identity.

After studying finance at the University of Pennsylvania, and gathering work experience in investment banking, in 1990 Lisa made her way to rabbinical school at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. Ordained in 1995, Rabbi Greene moved to Chicago. For four years she served Temple Jeremiah in Northfield where she created a youth program, an annual Mitzvah Day, a women's seder, and an adult b'nei mitzvah program. As Jeremiah's then senior rabbi, Robert Schreibman, prepared to retire, she reached out to our senior rabbi, Steven Mason, to talk. The timing was fortuitous as a rabbinic position was just opening up at NSCI. The rest, as they say, is history—great history in fact! In July 1999, Rabbi Greene arrived at NSCI, thrilled to be joining the clergy team.

If you think, however, that the universe was finished giving us unforeseen connections among people in our NSCI leadership (see the articles on Rabbi Steve Mason, Cantor David Goldstein, and Rabbi Ryan Daniels), you would be wrong. On a trip home to New Jersey before she began at NSCI, Rabbi Greene sat down with her old camp trunk at the urging of her mother. Rabbi Greene found a trove of letters from her camper days at URJ Camp Harlam, including one of her father's typed letters asking, among other things, who her camp education counselor was. Could you have guessed that person was Patty Mason (Rabbi Mason's wife), then a graduate student in Jewish education at the Hebrew Union College?



Lisa and Patty had a good laugh in fact, many—as they partnered on innovative family education programs here for 15 years, Patty as our Family Educator, leading an incredible array of informal creative family programming. This informal learning is one of Rabbi Greene's great points of pride during her 24-year tenure at NSCI. Additionally, Rabbi Greene created and teaches our Adult B'nei Mitzvah program which she established in 2000; she guides and creates engaging women's programming—our Women's Seder and the Women's Retreat. Her love of creating new rituals is evidenced in the Alternative Yizkor service she has led for festivals, and through divorce rituals which she leads, writes, and speaks on.

As with our other clergy, Rabbi Greene treasures professional relationships and friendships with NSCI's rabbis and cantor, alongside the warmth, strength, and partnership with so many in our congregation who want to learn and create, rolling up their sleeves to bring ideas to fruition.

While Rabbi Greene feels blessed to be a part of NSCI, we, of course, are honored to have her as a wise and experienced member of our clergy team and to embrace the way she models active participation in connection and community.
