Applesauce and the Seasons

I'M TAKING OUT the Foley food mill today. It's a life-changing kitchen tool. Not high tech or fancy, but basic, even

clunky. This tool is amazing for making applesauce. You don't have to peel or core the apples; you dump the whole hot mixture of cooked fruit into the food mill and stir-several turns clockwise. and then one counter-clockwise. And then again. And again. What happens? The skin and pits of the fruit stay on top in the bowl of the food mill, and the cooked fruit drops down into the bowl below. Voilà—applesauce!

In late summer when apples begin to appear at the Evanston Farmers' Market, I buy pounds and pounds in preparation for Rosh Hashanah and Sukkot, and, of course, the countless portions of warm after-school snacks. The Foley food mill (has to be Foley, Mom says) then comes up from the basement, and we are off! This is the season—of apples, of holidays.

In Ecclesiastes we read that everything has a season, a time for every experience under heaven.

A categorized list follows:

a time for being born and a time for dying...a time for tearing down and a time for building up; a time for weeping and a time for laughing...a time for keeping and a time for discarding... a time for silence and a time for speaking...a time for loving and a time for hating...

In response, the modern poet Yehudah Amichai writes:

A man doesn't have time in his life to have time for everything. He doesn't have seasons enough to have a season for every purpose. Ecclesiastes was wrong about that. A man needs to love and to hate at the same moment. to laugh and cry with the same eyes...to make love in war and war in love. And to hate and forgive and remember and forget, to arrange and confuse, to eat and to digest what history takes years and years to do.

Here we are in Sukkot. The tradition is to read this text during the holiday. The biblical words ask us to consider the times in our lives and the purpose given to them by us and by the season. At the same time, we know from experience that Amichai's words, too, bear profound insight. He reminds us that there is no guarantee of the length of our days, and rarely do we have the chance to focus on one discrete task or feeling at a time.

Ecclesisastes gives a reminder to focus on the deed or emotion of the moment. Amichai carries a reminder that this is not so simple. Things are often mixed, even jumbled, and not everything comes in its own compartmentalized time. Both give us wisdom to carry with us.

We're amidst an intense season of holidays, each of which bears a rich complexity of meanings. Rosh Hashanah gives us a time to hear the shofar and focus on the sweetness of the new year. even as it calls us to engage in serious teshuvah. Yom Kippur calls us to repent and forgive, and stand in community as we confess privately to one another. Sukkot calls us out under the sky to recognize the fragility of life even as we offer gratitude for abundance and welcome guests. Simchat Torah will bring us to rejoice, at the same time as we conclude Torah with the story of Moses' death. As we mark each holiday in its season and purpose, we can recognize that the meanings and actions they bear can intermingle and, together, accompany us into the new year.

In the coming days we move from all of these holidays into a period that is remarkably empty of holidays. Perhaps that intermediate period can gives us time and pause to reflect: What do we take from each holiday? How do we enter the seasons of this new year with aspirations and with the practicality of life each day? It's basic, maybe a little clunky... and life-changing.

President's Letter



DEAR FRIENDS.

We have worshiped together for the High Holy Days, taking stock of our year and

engaging in teshuvah. We are blessed to have so many communities connected within our community. With that in mind, there is much to reflect on at NSCI.

At our Annual Meeting in June, I framed our past year in terms of the many collaborative opportunities NSCI has created and engaged. Now, more than ever, NSCI collaborates with other organizations, offering opportunities to serve our congregation and the community at large. We achieved meaningful new accomplishments with this strategic intention. I'd like to share a few highlights that mark this past fiscal year. NSCI creates and fosters many pathways to connect, worship, learn, and make a difference for ourselves and others.

FAMILIES WITH YOUNG AND SCHOOL-AGED CHILDREN

- We have a flourishing early engagement initiative for families with children 0-5 years that continues to fill a niche in our community. Our Shabbat Class held at the Glencoe Park District has resulted in families choosing to enroll in religious school and joining NSCI. Our religious school has continued developing innovative choices and paths for Jewish education. The newest addition to our thriving young families' community is "The Childrenz Center." An independent preschool leasing space within our school quarters. This is a great opportunity to be a resource to the community for young families.
- We celebrated our Youth Advisor Neil Rigler's long dedication to our teens followed by an exciting new achievement. NSCI was chosen as a full partner congregation for the URJ (Union for Reform Judaism) CLASP (Camp Leader and Synagogue Professional) Fellowship, allowing us to invest in a full-time staff member

- to meet the diverse needs of today's youth and teens. Mady Frischer, our new full-time Youth Engagement Coordinator, hit the ground running in August.
- In response to the tragedy at the Tree of Life Synagogue, NSCI offered opportunities to learn ageappropriate ways to talk with kids, gain support, and share concerns. Rabbi Wendi Geffen and Kathy Livingston, LCSW, Clinical Director of Family Service of Glencoe facilitated a conversation centered on "How do we talk to our kids about recent events in today's world?" And, Parenting in Anxious Times: Talking about Anti-Semitism featured Dr. Lara Trubowitz, ADL Education Director and Kathy Livingston, LCSW.

TIKKUN OLAM

- NSCI supported 17: NSCI's Refugee Resettlement Project in partnership with RefugeeOne, welcoming the Mohamad Ayub Family, a mother and her two teenage daughters and helping them transition from Malaysia to life here in Chicago.
- We participated with Family Promise, hosting families who are experiencing temporary homelessness to achieve independence.
- Feed the Homeless, the Adult Mitzvah Corps, and volunteering at the Beth Emet Soup Kitchen are longstanding impactful ways we help others.
- We partnered with "Faith in Place", to operate our Winter Farmers Market. This organization empowers the people of Illinois of all faiths to be leaders in caring for the earth, providing resources to educate. connect, and advocate for healthier communities.
- Operation Backpack is still going strong, providing, packing, and delivering school supplies to the Jordan Elementary Community School in Chicago.

MUSIC

- A variety of concerts throughout the year enhances our ability to engage a broad spectrum of our community.
- Our experience of music was expanded with the Bernstein Tribute Concert and collaborations with the Ravinia Steans Institute for post-

EXPANDING OUR CARING COMMUNITY

- · NSCI set an intention to reach and support individuals struggling with addiction and those in recovery. along with their friends and family.
- We host weekly meetings of Alateen, Families Anonymous, and Alcoholics Anonymous. We partnered with local synagogues to organize a Community Recovery Seder on the second night of Passover.
- The Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) selected the Community Recovery Seder to receive the 2019 Belin Award for Audacious Hospitality. NSCI is one of eight congregations in North America being honored for a program demonstrating a high level of inclusion, impact, and innovation. A very special thanks to Rabbi Ryan Daniels who led this effort with our congregants Margo and Mark Peters.

WNSCI & BROTHERHOOD

- WNSCI is a dynamic part of our congregation, contributing generously to our resources. Rabbi Lisa Greene led a trip, "A Jewish Taste of Philadelphia" to explore and learn about this fine city and the WNSCI Shabbat Retreat in Lake Geneva. The retreat explored what it means to spend Sacred Time through Shabbat Services Friday Night and Saturday morning.
- Our Brotherhood contributes support to NSCI programs such as Feed the Homeless and Early Childhood engagement. This past year, the Brotherhood softball team brought together a diverse group of men. They had a fun win this past year!



Facility Improvements 2018-2019

DEAR CONGREGANTS,

From our sanctuaries to our trees, I'm sure we can all agree that our building and grounds contribute to the overall experience at NSCI. Preserving and improving our facilities takes tremendous care, time, and resources. Here is a list of major repairs or improvements over the past fiscal year, supported in large part by your one-time Building Fund contributions. Thank you for helping to ensure that this treasure of a facility is properly maintained for this and future generations.

- Replaced lights in the Large Sanctuary with LEDs
- Extended the paging system from the religious school throughout the entire facility
- Replaced and reinforced storm drains in parking lot
- Replaced all steel hot water pipes with copper
- Installed locking mechanisms (security bolts) on the inside of doors throughout facility
- Installed new steel fire doors in religious school
- Installed new networking switches and Wi-Fi system throughout facility
- Installed new sound system in Large Sanctuary
- Installed technology to enable streaming of minyan services in the Perlman Sanctuary

- Replaced fire sprinkler piping
- Sealed cracks, coated and re-striped both parking lots
- Installed additional security cameras on facility perimeter
- Removed 15 dead trees throughout property. Pruned and planted additional trees.
- Partnered with Village of Glencoe to reinforce banks of ravine on south side of NSCI
- Installed protective safety film on windows throughout facility
- Replaced two air conditioning unit compressors
- Repaired cracked or crumbling areas of sidewalk

Mission-Driven Teen Engagement

ON HIS EXPERIENCE at NSCI, sophomore at Miami University, Max Nguyen, reflected, "[My involvement in youth group] was the first time in my high school career that I felt like I could be my true self, where there is no judgement from anyone and no one telling me to be someone that I'm not." Like so many teens, NSCI was home for Max throughout high school, and the relationships he built with peers and our staff in youth group and NSCI's Goodman Center for Jewish Education will last. Max cared, and continues to care deeply for this congregation, and he knows that our clergy, staff, and lay leadership genuinely care about him, cheering and supporting him along his way. That's the essence of NSCI's model for teen engagement, our strategy for how we welcome teens to remain connected post-b'nei mitzvah.

We realize youth engagement occurs one soul at a time. The engagement needs to be personal, relational, authentic, and meaningful. We strive to encourage and empower each teen on their journey, seeking purpose and fulfillment in their lives. Our focus is on the depth and significance of the

engagement and not merely numbers. We aim to provide a space where our youth find their own path by:

- Exploring real-life questions and situations that matter to them through a Jewish lens.
- Growing skills, knowledge, and leadership, contributing to personal growth and connection to our congregation, the Jewish community and the world.
- Developing competency and finding relevance in celebrating the daily, weekly, and yearly lifecycle.
- Creating an appetite for future discovery, advocacy, involvement, and action.

Our clergy and staff are so excited to welcome Mady Frischer to our full-time professional team. In her role as NSCI's Youth Engagement Coordinator, Mady will partner with our professional staff and lay leaders to steer a model of teen engagement that is guided by NSCI's mission and history of excellence. In collaboration with clergy and staff, she will revitalize long standing programs and launch new efforts to further engage youth approaching b'nei mitzvah and beyond.

We know what sufficient human resources, teamwork, and a long-

term commitment can do for our teen population. One of our best examples of teen engagement presently is Selah, our musical prayer and songleader program, which was created and is led by Cantor Goldstein and Alan Goodis. Selah builds community among 6th-12th graders—a feat given the age range. Selah successfully sparks the interests and talents of these teens, growing their skills, knowledge, and abilities, while connecting the teens more deeply to the NSCI community. Similarly, our Machonik teacher assistant program is the largest of our teen offerings, and it, too, provides opportunities for teens to grow as leaders and see the real impact they make while working in our religious school classrooms. An added incentive for 9th-12th graders who participate in the Machonik program is that they are paid for their work. For most, they view this leadership program as a chance to 'give back' to their school, stay connected with their beloved religious school teachers and mentor younger students.

We are proud, but not content. We recognize that there is potential for even more. And we set out into this New Year with that goal in mind, aspiring to build strong relationships with each teen at NSCI and creating as many diverse pathways for engagement as possible.





Our Immigration Stories: Ralph Samuel

We continue to document the stories of our congregants who immigrated to the U.S. The following story about Ralph Samuel and his family is compiled from an interview with Merle Branner on April 15, 2019 and Ralph's presentation talks for the Holocaust Museum.

RALPH SAMUEL'S immigration story is similar to others from our congregation but distinctively unique. What makes Ralph's story unique is the journey his parents, Hilda Zimack Samuel and Adolf Aron Samuel, took which led them to Shanghai, China, where Ralph was born, before they emigrated to the United States.


The Samuel family were well established in northern Germany. Several generations of Samuel families had a granary business, Samuel Brothers, in Rostock, Germany, for the early 1800s. The family sold seed on credit to farmers in the spring, then purchased and distributed the crop when it was harvested in the fall. Ralph's paternal grandfather had become very wealthy by 1900, though he downplayed his prosperity and his Judaism. When he died, the estate was divided among his five children, all of whom then became affluent themselves. Four of the five children, unhappy with what was happening in Germany in the early 1920s, left for other countries—three to London and one to Mexico. Adolf thus inherited the family business and stayed in Germany to help his mother run it. The business was dissolved in the 1930's as Hitler's noose tightened around the Jews. Along with other edicts, Hitler declared that all debts to Jews were cancelled. Since the business was run on credit, they were forced to close.

Hilda grew up as an only child in her family in Strelitz, Germany, where her family had a retail store selling dry goods. Her father died young and Hilda helped her mother run the small business. Along with growing inflation and an economic

depression, Nazis papered the windows of the Jewish shops and declared that non-Jews could not buy there, forcing the store to close. Hilda realized there was no future for her in Strelitz and was invited by friends to live in Rostock where she met and married Adolf. As the situation for Jews deteriorated in Germany, they still hoped people would come to their senses and that things would calm down.

In 1938, right after Kristallnacht, Hilda and Adolf decided they had to leave Rostock. They knew the Nazis were looking for Jewish men and taking them to detention centers. Though they had no specific plan, they tried to maintain a low profile, moving from town to town nearly every day. Tall, blond and blue-eyed, Adolf was able to pass as a non-Jew, once even having a "friendly" conversation with a Nazi SS Officer, and though Hilda appeared a little more Jewish, when she was with Adolf, no one questioned her. The two secretly phoned their mothers from time to time with a code established in advance, because the phone lines were being monitored. They never told their mothers where they were in order to protect them. They maintained communication with their mothers until October 1942 when it suddenly stopped. Later, they learned both of their mothers had been transported to concentration camps.

By happenstance, Hilda and Adolf were walking on the street in Hamburg, when they encountered a couple they knew who had four tickets on an ocean liner, The Victoria, which was sailing from Genoa, Italy to Shanghai, China. The couple had intended to take their parents, but the parents had decided they were too infirm to travel. They offered the tickets to Hilda and Adolf who immediately bought them. Eventually, they made their way by train from Berlin to Genoa and boarded the ship traveling in first class accommodations. Though they had money, they were so late in leaving Germany that the Nazi restrictions, which had previously been



more lenient, only allowed them to take \$4 apiece and their wedding rings. Their documentation—all legitimate—identified them as Jews with a big red "J".

The two-month sea journey followed a route across the Mediterranean, through the Suez Canal to the equator and then north to the hot and humid city of Shanghai. No visas, passports or entry papers were required for entry into Shanghai which had many foreign residents, including Americans, British, French, Russians and middle-Easterners. At the time of the Samuels' arrival, Shanghai was home to approximately 700 Sephardic Jews whose families had arrived from Iraq, comprising a very wealthy segment of the population. There were also several thousand Ashkenazi Jews, a far less affluent population, earning their living as small businessmen, who had fled to China from Russia following the Russian Revolution in 1917. About 17,000 refugees, like Hilda and Adolf, arrived in Shanghai fleeing persecution in Germany and Austria. HIAS—the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society—as well as the Committee for Assistance of European Jewish Refugees in Shanghai, formed by prominent local Jews, met the Jewish refugees as the ships arrived from Europe and transported them to the Heim, a reception center providing temporary shelter and basic necessities. Conditions were crowded and difficult. Since Ralph's parents had not been allowed to take money out of Germany, most of the Jewish refugees settled in the impoverished Hongkou neighborhood. It was here, on October 2, 1941, that Ralph was born. ■
