A Small Chanukah Miracle

the past, I wrote to share with you information about the Jewish Future Pledge (Jewishfuturepledge.org). This is a brilliant opportunity for all of us to guarantee our Jewish *future*. If you haven't signed the pledge yet, please do! This Chauukkah, I write to share with you another pledge. This one will help us guarantee our Jewish *present*.

Generations of young people have been taught the meaning of the Hebrew value, "Tikkun Olam," literally, to repair the world. They have given tzedakah (donations of coins and dollar bills), collected food and clothing for underserved populations, and participated in various social action and bar/bat mitzvah projects. Then this generation of youths grew up and observed that the world they were helping wasn't closer to being repaired. In some ways, the world became more desperate. They weren't disillusioned by their lack of success, and they weren't fooled by their mentors or clergy, but they were made wiser by what they learned about the world around them and how real change can happen.

We often begin by speaking about giving charity, but "charity" is a word that doesn't exist in Hebrew. It isn't a Jewish value. At its root, charity comes from the Latin, to give from love. To give from love is to emulate God. Judaism doesn't disqualify a gift that's given from love, but it doesn't wait for God-like love. Judaism's word is the Hebrew word, "tzedakah," and it means justice. In places where there is hunger, homelessness, and poverty, there is no justice. Our acts of tzedakah make people whole by repairing the injustices in their lives. Tzedakah might be given with love or even in anonymity, as Maimonides taught in the 12th century, but the people who need relief can't wait. They needed it yesterday, not tomorrow.

A recent study suggests that the one value that most binds the Baby Boomer and Millennial generations is the desire for both to fix and repair because doing so is just. And that both generations care deeply about the plight of humanity and want to make a difference with limited time and resources.

This Chanukah, let's begin again to accomplish the goals that have long been at the heart of our Jewish effort to transform the world from what it is into the world that it ought to be. The Jewish Effective Giving Initiative, a project of the World Union for Progressive Judaism, was created "to inspire rabbis and Jewish leaders [new and familiar], to save lives by introducing their communities to effective giving." The initiative relies on rigorous research and the best available data to ensure that donations and support go to organizations that are "extremely efficient at saving and substantially improving lives around the world." The project points out that while there are hundreds of thousands of excellent charitable organizations in the world, there are a select few that can, with a large degree of certainty, save a life and prevent many cases of severe illness, mostly among children, for around \$3,000-5,000.

The Jewish Effective Giving initiative (jewisheffectivegiving.org) is an opportunity to spark this generation's interest by scaling their efforts

Peter Berg became the fifth senior rabbi of The Temple since 1895 in July 2008. He is thrilled to serve this diverse and multigenerational congregation as a spiritual leader. Rabbi Berg is passionate about Jewish learning and meaningful worship, and he is an advocate for social change. A native of Ocean Township, New Jersey, Rabbi Berg holds a degree in Education and Human Development, with a focus in human services, counseling and Judaic Studies from George Washington University in Washington, D.C. He earned his M.A. in Hebrew Literature and his rabbinic ordination from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York and Jerusalem. In 2013 Rabbi Berg was named by Newsweek and the Daily Beast as one of the most influential rabbis in the United States. In 2016, he was named by Georgia Trend as one of the 100 most influential Georgians and in 2019 and 2020 as one of Atlanta's most powerful leaders.



We praise You, Eternal God, Sovereign of the universe, for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.

The lighting of the Chanukiah, or menorah, takes place soon after nightfall, or as soon as the household is together. On friday night, the Chanukah candles are lit first, followed by the Shabbat candles, as traditionally fire is not created on the Sabbath itself. The lights should not be used for any practical purpose. They should last for at least half an hour, during which time no work should be done. The menorah is placed on a windowsill or table facing the street to publicize the two miracles of Chanukah: the miracle of the cruse of oil and the miracle of Jewish survival.



- **A.** The shamash, which on most menorahs is set apart from the other candles, is always lit first. It is then used to light all other candles.
- **B.** As you face the menorah, place the candles from right to left, starting with the first night, then two on the second, and so on. By the eighth night, you'll have a full menorah.
- C. Still facing the menorah, use the shamash to light the candles from left to right. This allows the current night's light to be lit first.

Chanukah begins on Sunday, December 18.



Changing temperatures, **Changing Programs**

As you may remember, Zaban Paradies Center officially changed to become a year-round homeless service agency in September. This pivot included emergency residential services, day resources,



aftercare services, homelessness diversion, and community outreach. Last year we served over 348 total households. We have grown so much.

Services Spotlight: Diversion

One of the services we now provide to the community experiencing financial instability is homelessness diversion. Our Diversion Service program provides limited year-round support to couples and families experiencing economic instability. Diversion seeks to assist couples experiencing homelessness by offering financial assistance to divert them from experiencing homelessness in the shelter system or in places not meant for human habitation.

The goal of Diversion Services is to link families with resources, community networks, and, when possible, emergency assistance. These services help homeless families and couples to access long-term housing solutions outside of emergency shelter. Services include support groups, computer lab access, and budget/credit counseling, limited financial assistance, as well as community referrals.

FINANCIAL REPORT



Temple Financial Condition

For the past fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, total revenues were \$6,681,873 and total expenses were \$6,600,055 resulting in a slight surplus for the year of \$81,818. Our lay and professional leaders continue to identify cost containment opportunities. This year's budget plan includes some increases in education, human resources, and other unavoidable increases in costs for facility support and other products and services. The Temple has also been affected by rising labor costs for teachers and security personnel. Thanks to the continued generosity of our members in supporting The Temple by paying membership and other fees, we are operating at break even for the eleventh straight year.

The Finance Committee chaired by Treasurer Sara Loft continues to set a path for The Temple to meet its day to day operating requirements. The Executive Committee and staff leadership continue to review in detail all expenses to ensure proper controls and efficiencies. Our congregation is grateful

for our members' annual support payments, which are the lifeblood of meeting our operating expenses.

Temple expenses in the security and insurance areas remain high and unavoidable. The safety and security for Temple members is a high priority. The security fee for regular members is \$250. Young Couples and Young Professionals over 32 pay an adjusted security fee of \$150 and \$100, respectively. We hope everyone continues to understand the necessity of funding this very necessary expense.

Annual support for 2023 will be \$2,600, a slight 2% increase over the previous support level, which has been in place since 2019 and throughout peak Covid times. Members who currently support The Temple at the basic level will be asked to consider raising their dues level to a Leadership Dues Circle such as the Double Chai Circle at \$3,600. Members who currently support our synagogue at leadership levels will be asked to consider moving to a higher level of generosity. Other

members will participate in the Dues Drive with increased support of either \$36 (double Chai) or \$54 (triple Chai) depending on their current level. We are pleased to report that many of you have already committed to increase beyond your current level of dues support. This generosity will go a long way to help us break even again this year.

The pie charts shown represent projected revenues and expenses for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2023. If there is any communication desired regarding Temple finances, please contact any Temple officer, Sara Loft, Treasurer, or Mark Jacobson, Executive Director.

Your timely payments and increasing your annual support, if possible, are critical to The Temple's meeting its operating needs. Our Temple family has always risen to the challenges it faces. The Temple Board is confident and most appreciative of The Temple family responding as it always does in meeting the needs of our membership and community.





Donation of Appreciated Stock and IRA Charitable **Rollover Provision**

Temple members will be receiving their Temple statements for the 2023 year during the month of December. The Temple membership year is the calendar year, January - December. Statements are mailed in advance of the calendar year to allow members to take advantage of a tax deduction, if appropriate, for the current 2022 year.

For members who have reached age 70 1/2, the IRA Charitable Rollover provision allows individuals to donate up to \$100,000 directly from their IRA without treating the distribution as taxable income.

Many members may wish to donate securities to fulfill their commitments. The donation of appreciated stock may be of considerable benefit. Consult your tax advisor. If you wish to transfer stock, your broker will require the following information: Charles Schwab & Co., DTC #164, Temple Account #8769-3467.

Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) of Individual Retirement Account (IRA) assets:

Whether itemizing deductions or claiming the standard deduction, individuals age 701/2 and older can direct up to \$100,000 per year tax-free from their IRAs to charities through OCDs.* By reducing the IRA balance, a QCD may also reduce the donor's taxable income in future vears, lower the donor's taxable estate, and limit IRA beneficiaries' tax liability.
