With Gratitude

want to begin with gratitude. Gratitude to the Board of Trustees who granted this sabbatical in 2020 and those who continued to make it a priority as soon as it was able to happen. Gratitude to the entire Temple team who took on extra responsibilities this summer to allow me to be away for eight weeks. And gratitude to you, my Temple family, who enthusiastically sent me away on June 16th and generously gave time and space this summer.

Sabbatical comes from the idea of sabbath and rest. *Shmita* is the sabbatical year prescribed in the Torah that occurs every seven years. The land is commanded to lay fallow, to take in sunlight and renew itself in order to be ready to support and nourish the people for years to come. Similarly, this sabbatical was eight weeks to rest and renew, to be ready to continue my work as a rabbi serving our community. This has been a truly special time, a blessing for me and my family, and I am excited to share what I've gained and experienced to bring with me into the years to come.

The first goal for this sabbatical was to make this a summer of travel to remember. The three year delay was actually a benefit to accomplishing this goal. I wanted to see a new continent, Caleb loves penguins, Hadara wanted to see Norway, and Micah wanted to do something we couldn't do on a normal summer vacation. So, we embraced all of the opportunities to travel the world. We left June 18 for Australia (Melbourne and Sydney) and New Zealand (Auckland and Queenstown), we came back to Atlanta for a week and then went to Amsterdam for three days, followed by a cruise through the Norwegian Fjords. After another week at home, we split into three time zones as Hadara went to spend time with cousins, Micah and Caleb enjoyed a week of camp and work, and I traveled by myself for a week of meditation, yoga, and reflection. As you can imagine, we conclude this summer with countless photos, stories, souvenirs, and SkyMiles—truly a summer to remember for our family.

The second goal was to be curious for its own sake, not just with the intention to immediately apply it. From summer classes for my counseling degree to watching "A Small Light," learning about Maori and Aboriginal cultures as well as Vikings and ancient Norwegian myths, experiencing Ayurvedic treatment and attending crystal and astrology workshops at a retreat center, I took it all in. I enjoyed nature without a cell phone and lost track of how many books I read (including the new Daniel Silva book!). I end this summer incredibly aware of the threads of nature and humanity that connect us all over the world, an appreciation for the ancient traditions that support cultures and people, and a belief that curiosity is something to be cultivated at all ages. I didn't realize how much I was missing this!

The third and most important goal was to be present...whatever that meant each day. I had the opportunity to be in one place at a time—doctors' appointments without checking emails in the waiting room; vacation with the phone turned on "do not disturb"; talking with my kids in the car rather than dictating text messages; and deciding in the morning what the day would bring, not hesitating to prioritize rest or changing the plan because we had the flexibility to do so. I spent a summer without multi-tasking and bouncing between the spheres of my life, and discovered what I enjoy and miss in the balance of my many roles.

A few people asked before I left (jokingly, I assume) whether I was going to want to come back on August 14th. Much like my prior maternity leaves, that was never in question! Yet, I do not want to *return*, implying I simply pick up where I left off. Instead, I want to *turn*, to continue a new chapter with what I have gained in this time of renewal.

Elul, the month preceding Rosh Hashanah and this new year, is a time of self-reflection, apologies and repentance, and vowing to change where needed. As I conclude this sabbatical, I truly feel that I have enjoyed an extended Elul in many ways. I come back deeply committed to certain changes that I owe to you, to The Temple, to my family, and also to myself. In my personal week away, I found myself journaling on Hillel's famous line, and paraphrasing it thus:

"If I am not for myself, who will be for me?"

My body and soul have shown me that they depend upon my boundaries and my level of stress. My physical, spiritual, and emotional health depends upon digital boundaries, giving time for mindful meals and movement, and nourishing my passions (such as my counseling degree). If I care for myself, I will be better able to care for others.



Refaenu Renamed ShalomCare

Inspired by Rabbi Peter Berg's call to action during the High Holy Day services last fall, Temple members, clergy, staff, mental health practitioners, and board members came together with the goal of supporting mental health within our congregation. This initiative, originally referred to as Refaenu, is now well underway and is already evolving in a number of ways, including its name. The committee recently decided to change from Refaenu to a new name that would better encapsulate Jewish ideals and the mission, vision and values behind this initiative. Not to mention, our new name is also easier to say! We are delighted to share that ShalomCare: Supporting Mental Health at The Temple has now replaced Refaenu. It is hoped that ShalomCare will become a word that is synonymous with mental health support at The Temple that is reliable, trustworthy, innovative and meaningful. As noted in our mission statement, we believe deeply (and now more than ever!) that this initiative will strengthen the mental well-being of individuals within our synagogue as well as our congregation as a whole and will also have a ripple effect on the greater Atlanta community and beyond. ZPC is on a Mission

Temple friends and supporters of ZPC, thank you for helping us to serve our neighbors experiencing homelessness. As many of you know, we have served couples facing homelessness through our Residential Services program for close to 40



years. What you may not know is all of the new ways we are helping our community members facing homelessness. Here is what ZPC is up to at a glance.

Residential Services for Homeless Couples

This year-round service focuses on helping couples experiencing homelessness transition to permanent housing. We provide trauma-informed case management, housing navigation, and housing assistance. We also provide referrals to wraparound services and assist with reunification. From September 2022 to June 2023, we served 78 couples; 30 of which has positive housing or reunification outcomes.

Permanent Housing

This year-round, community-based service focuses on helping couples, families, and individuals with housing solutions that best meet their needs. Employed individuals can receive diversion services intended to provide immediate, short-term assistance such as rent deposits. Families and individuals needing long-term support (six months to one year) can receive rapid rehousing services that include employment and case management support. From July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023, we assisted 212 households with obtaining housing.

Day Services and Aftercare


This year-round service focuses on providing immediate, emergency assistance for individuals and families facing homelessness or past program participants needing additional assistance. These services are provided onsite three days a week from 10:00am to 2:00pm by appointment. Services include showers, laundry, Marta passes,

and light-touch case management. From July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2023, we assisted 129 households with day and aftercare services.
