

Voting is a sacred and powerful act. As Jews, we have a special obligation to go out and vote since we know what it feels like when the government tells us that we don't count.

This is even more important today. On the ballot this November, thanks to the hard work and dedication of the Second Chances Campaign and their partners, Floridians will be voting on Amendment 4, an historic state constitutional amendment that, if passed, will restore voting rights to over 1.4 million non-violent former felons. Florida is only one of four states in the entire country that does not automatically restore voting rights to non-violent former felons.

To register to vote, go to <https://registertovoteflorida.gov/en/Registration/Eligibility> and fill out the form. Please note that you will need your driver's license (or state ID card) on hand to register.
