"It's the best club you can join!" Those are the words Laura and I heard over and over again in the months since our children, Benjamin and Emily, announced they were expecting their first child. The birth of our first grandchild in early March was unquestionably one of the most special moments we have ever experienced.

When we arrived at the hospital to meet our new grandson, we experienced an incredible rush of emotions. It may have been summed up best later that afternoon by our son, Aaron. As we left the hospital after the beaming aunt and uncles met their first nephew, he said quite simply, "Now I understand what it means to meet someone for the first time and feel completely in love!" Wow!

There was a quieter, yet equally powerful moment. It came as we met our grandson for the first time. As we approached, Benjamin asked, "Would you like to know his name?" What a question! "Of course," we replied in unison. "He's named Ian—for Grandpa Irving" (Laura's father, who died back in August). My heart skipped a beat, and then a wave of warmth flowed over me. We'd hoped that remembering Irv would be a factor. What I could not imagine before March 2 was the way in which hearing how that played out would be an important piece of healing in our grieving process.

Our Jewish tradition is filled with small and large ways in which we memorialize and honor our loved ones. To be sure, there are differences between Ashkenazic practice (naming for relatives who have died) and Sephardic practice (naming to honor living relatives). There are the *yahrzeit* candles we kindle on the anniversary of a loved one's death. And of course, there is *Yizkor*—the set of prayers we add to our communal worship observances so that we can draw the memories of loved ones close at special times. It's nearly universally known that *Yizkor* is recited on *Yom Kippur*, the

Day of Atonement, the holiest day of our Jewish year. It is quite unknown—or at least unobserved—that *Yizkor* is also recited on the final day of our fall holiday cycle, which in our Reform practice combines *Shmini Atzeret* and *Simchat Torah* at the end of *Sukkot*. *Yizkor* is also traditionally recited on the final day of *Pesach* (coming in the weeks ahead), as well as on *Shavuot* when we commemorate the giving of the Torah.

Many of us hold fond memories of our loved ones associated with holiday gatherings such as Break-fast on *Yom Kippur* and the Passover *Seder*. It has long mystified me why more of us don't pause to remember our loved ones—at the time of the *yahrzeit* or at our holidays. On a personal level, I always find recalling my grandparents, uncles, and other family members a source of comfort as well as continuity. Recalling them allows me to remember what I learned from them, as well as the sweet memories that flow in that pause.

In early March, I was reminded of how our Jewish memory practices and customs are powerful and important parts of our journey. As I hold my grandson, Ian, I feel a sense of his great-grandfather's presence simply because he carries a name intentionally chosen to call Irv to mind. It's not a new lesson for me. To be sure, I learned it as we named our children for other beloved family members. But with Ian's birth and the name he carries, I am reminded anew of the importance of memory as part of our Jewish tradition and journey.

As our festivals of *Pesach* and *Shavuot* approach, may your gatherings and celebrations with family and friends, and our gatherings as a community, be filled with sweet blessings and precious memories. From our home and family to yours, we send wishes for a *Chag Sameach*!

A couple of years ago, Forbes Magazine published a list of the 21 most creative corporate job titles. Despite their bland titles, the members who fill these positions share an extraordinary willingness to commit their time, energy, and ideas to the betterment of the temple, as well as a deep commitment to our central mission of continuing to make Temple Shalom an inclusive, welcoming community.

The brilliant Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks recently wrote: “The Hebrew word for life, *chayyim*, is in the plural as if to signify that life is essentially shared . . . Judaism is not so much a faith transacted in the privacy of the believer’s soul. It is a social faith. It is about networks of relationship. It is about families, communities, and ultimately a nation, in which each of us, great or small, has a role to play.”

Each of us at Temple Shalom has a role to play in our congregational life. For many, that role is obvious, or it is a function of an official title, or it’s been one that’s been served informally for years or even decades. For others, it’s less clear. The opportunities to participate in temple life are nearly endless. For some, all that has been lacking is an “ask,” a request to help, to participate in an event or even to attend a service. Celebrating David Carrier

David Carrier's first synagogue experience was playing at Temple Beth El Center every Shabbat for five years. At that time, David was Music Director of Second Church in Newton which had a strong relationship with Temple Shalom. One Sunday morning, Rabbi Murray Rothman z"l spoke at the church and he heard David play. David knew about both Rabbi Rothman and Rabbi David Whiman from singers in the Newton Choral Society, where he was also Music Director. Soon after, a member of Temple Shalom told a friend in the Society that Temple Shalom Music Director Richard Reynolds was about to retire. When they brought it to David's attention, he auditioned for the position and his 20-year history as Music Director of Temple Shalom began.

There was no cantor at that time; only a professional quartet who also sang for B'nai Mitzvah. David felt at home very quickly. Having taken over the role from Dick Reynolds, he continued to coordinate the music program with the rabbis. With the arrival of cantors and their lifelong focus on Jewish music, David's role shifted somewhat. His conversations about Jewish music and preparation for services now took place with the cantor.

When David first came to Temple Shalom, there was no regular congregational volunteer choir with its own scheduled rehearsals. A couple of times during the year, volunteers could join the pros for special music services. Cantor Renata Braun established Shir Shalom, at that time with a separate rehearsal pianist during the week. When David eventually came to those rehearsals too, it brought Shir Shalom to another level. Over time, he became the co-conductor of the choir and is extremely proud of its development over these years.

I remember my own audition at Temple Shalom. I had read about David Carrier but when we first made music, there was an instant connection. He was a good part of my desire to become your cantor.

David has a unique blend of consummate musicianship and a superb sense of humor, and he is a delight to be with. Along with elevating the quality of music at Temple Shalom, he has made many long-lasting friendships, and his following is broad and considerable. We look forward to celebrating David Carrier's 20 years with our Temple Shalom community at Shabbat services on **Friday, May 19 at 6:30 p.m.**

Building community. During the month of May, parents will organize our annual June end-of-the-year picnic to celebrate another good year together and to recognize our amazing, committed teaching staff. On **Friday May 19**, our families will participate in a short tot service and Shabbat dinner.

Program. Our garden mentor, Amy Gilman, will work with the children over the next two months on getting the raised beds ready and planting the seeds they had collected this past fall. During the celebration of Passover, the children and their parents will experience the story of Passover through song and movement, and will fulfill the *mitzvah* of *Maot Chittin* by giving *tzedakah* to enable families in need to celebrate Passover. Shortly after putting away our Passover materials, children will embark on a two-and-a-half week “pretend trip” to Israel in time to celebrate *Yom Ha-atzma’ut* and “tour” Kibbutz Lotan, Haifa, Jerusalem, Masada, the Dead Sea, beaches, and Caesarea. This year’s “pretend trip” will be further enriched by teacher Sabrina Burk’s recent educational trip to Israel and by parents who have lived in Israel.

Staff news. I am very excited to announce that staff members Colleen Troy, Jen Castro, Erin Borrás, and Glenna McPartland have achieved EEC MA (Early Education and Care—Massachusetts) State Teacher certification. Combined Jewish Philanthropies (CJP) has commissioned lead toddler teacher, Kat Horion, and me to present a nature workshop in our outdoor space on **Thursday afternoon, May 18** for area Jewish early childhood programs. In addition, CJP will underwrite our expenses to provide consulting on designing nature environments to some of these schools.

Many of our Kochavim families will also participate in “Discover SHACHARIT” on **Sunday, April 2 at 9:30 a.m.** to learn how they can continue to stay connected to the Temple Shalom community through involvement in the SHACHARIT program.

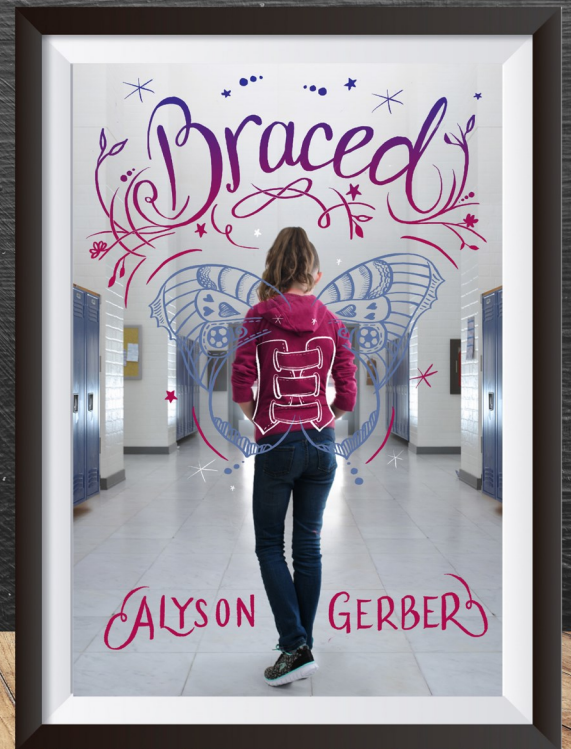

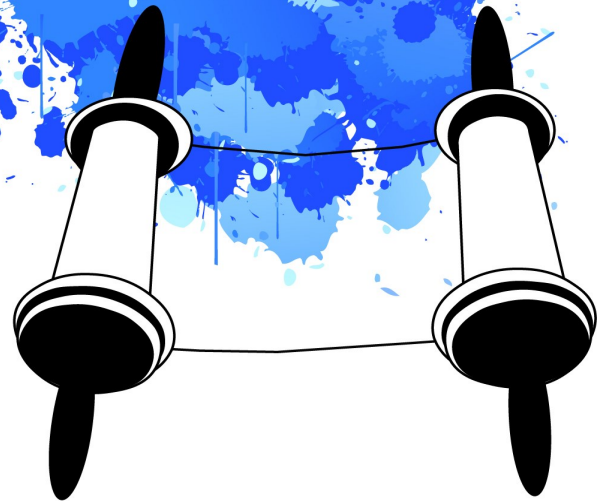

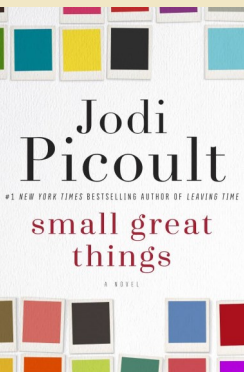
