To Light Our Darkened World



ight is a powerful and important symbol in Judaism.

Hanging above the ark—where the Torah scrolls are kept—is our *ner tamid*, the everlasting light. Sometimes it is an electric light, other times it may be a flame fueled by oil, or even solar powered. Regardless of its design, there is one thing that every *ner tamid* has in common. It is a light to be kept going at all times. It is never to be allowed to go out.

As winter sets in we automatically turn to thoughts of Chanukah. How beautiful are the candles flickering in the menorah! On each night we add a candle, until the eight lights are kindled. In this way, we have an ever-brighter reminder of the strength of our history, the power of our present, and the hope of tomorrow.

And there is yet another symbol of light in Judaism. Rabbi Chaim Stern wrote, "Light is a metaphor for the Divine, for understanding, for 'enlightenment...'" We are responsible for bringing God's light into the world, we are as the prophet Isaiah said, to be "a light to all the nations." This is a universal message; each of us is responsible for bringing light into our world which feels so dark. Each of us is to be a "light to the nations," by offering the best of ourselves to those we love, to the members of our community and to the world around us.

When you walk into the sanctuary and see the *ner tamid*; when you light your Chanukah candles—these are reminders that the central light is that which is inside of us. It is the reminder that we have a responsibility to bring our Divine light into the world that so needs brightening.

Bring your Divine light into the world. You are a *ner tamid*, an eternal light, a light that will not go out. You are a menorah.

Together, we will dispel the darkness, bringing goodness and righteousness to the world.





Happy Chanukah!

We light the first candle on Sunday, December 2. Candles are placed in the *chanukiah* (the Hebrew word for a Chanukah menorah) from right to left, but the candles are lit from left to right. First, light the *shamash* (the "helper" candle that is higher or lower than the other eight), then use it to kindle the rest of the candles. On Shabbat during Chanukah, this year on December 7, kindle the Chanukah lights first and then the Shabbat candles. Below are the Chanukah blessings that are said or sung while lighting the *chanukiah*.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Chanukah lights.
