MORE THAN TWO CENTURIES OF CONFIRMATION

Did you know that Confirmation originates in the Reform movement?

Scholars attribute the creation of confirmation to Israel Jacobson, a German businessman and influencer of early Reform Judaism. In 1810, Jacobson built a synagogue in

Seesen, Germany. He introduced radical reforms for the time, including a graduation ceremony for teen boys. The idea caught on, and in 1817, a synagogue in Berlin included girls in Confirmation. Finally, Rabbi Samuel Egers of Brunswick, Germany, connected Confirmation to Shavuot, the festival of the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. By 1846, the first recorded Confirmation was held at Anshe Chesed Congregation in New York.

You only have to view the years of Confirmation pictures upstairs in the learning wing to see that it was once very elaborate. When ties between Confirmation and Shavuot were strong, students wore robes, brought flower offerings to the bimah, and performed cantatas with dramatic readings and songs.

Today, Confirmation continues to evolve. There are variations in practice from an elaborate synagogue service to informal camp-like programs. Synagogues continue to develop programming and rituals to ensure that Confirmation is relevant to teens during their high school years.

At Suburban Temple-Kol Ami, our emphasis is on building meaningful community, understanding current events, Jewish values, social justice, and exploring Jewish identity. Students are co-creators in their service, writing personal interpretations to the prayers. They are also working to create a spiritually comfortable worship experience that feels welcoming-- just as they feel so at home at Suburban Temple-Kol Ami.

SEEING, HEARING AND FEELING IS BELIEVING

Beginning on the evening of May 25, we will celebrate *Shavuot*, which commemorates the Israelites receiving the Ten Commandments

from God through Moses. The scene the Torah sets is quite majestic. The entire Israelite community is gathered at the foot of Mount Sinai. I am sure their bodies were pressed close together, all trying to get as close to the mountain as they could, and the feeling of being one community was palpable. The Torah tells us there were the blasts of horns to get the people's attention and there was thunder and lightning. We read that Mount Sinai was covered in smoke and that God came down the mountain in fire. I cannot even begin to imagine the awe of this moment.

Each one of us experiences the world in different ways. Some of us are kinesthetic and we feel our way through the world, others are visual and we use our eyes to take in what is happening, and still others of us are auditory and we use our ears. 

Reproductive Freedom: A Jewish Value

The Reproductive Justice team of ST-KA's Tikkun Olam Committee is actively working to ensure passage of an amendment to Ohio's Constitution protecting reproductive freedom for all people. Members of the committee want to share their individual reasons why they are supportive and working on this campaign.

The letter below expresses the personal opinion of committee member Muriel Lederman.

L'dor vador... access to abortion was passed from my generation to my daughters'. But that chain is now broken. My granddaughters now live in fear of an ectopic pregnancy, for which an abortion would be necessary. These decisions are being made by men who tangentially know the emotional and physical consequences of suffering a miscarriage, or being told your fetus will die shortly after birth, or a healthy pregnancy.

The beliefs that restrict bodily autonomy overlook the thinking of the modern world. For example, look to Justice Alito's reference to eighteenth century laws in his opinion(s) on reproductive cases. Thus, women are denied the agency to plan one of the most basic aspects of their lives: if and when to bear children. Medical care is no longer entrusted to those with specialized knowledge and scientific expertise is subservient to political agendas. The religious strain to these claims means that the beliefs of some are foisted on all.

Judaism's stance on abortion is opposed to this view and supremely humane. Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg explains it beautifully: "life does not begin at conception... a fetus is not regarded as an independent being... it is part of the body of the person carrying it... abortion is not only *permitted* in Judaism but it's *required* in order to save the life of the pregnant person."

Would that these options were available to all who would desire them. In the meantime, as Ruttenberg says, "We must not remain idle while barriers to health care place any individual's health, well-being, autonomy, or economic security at risk."

The campaign for reproductive freedom tears down the barriers that are risking women's health. We have petitions to place an amendment codifying reproductive rights in Ohio's Constitution on the ballot to be voted on in November. Please sign and perhaps work to insure its passage.


