# FROM RABBI RASKIN

"Jacob left Beersheva and set out for Haran..." (Genesis 28:10) This seemingly straightforward description of our patriarch Jacob's travels occasions a beautiful insight from the renowned commentator Rashi (Rabbi Shlomo ben Yitzhak, France, 1040-1105). Noticing the two verbs, Jacob "left" and "set out," Rashi teaches that this is not only informing us of the specifics of Jacob's travels, but also שַּיצִיאַת צַדִּיק מון הַמַּקוֹם עוֹשַׂה רֹשֵׁם that the departure of a holy person leaves a lasting impression upon that place. There is no doubt that Hazzan Ozur Bass's departure from Har Shalom after so many years of devoted service will leave us all with a trove of memories. emotions, and deep impact. The role of Hazzan in our tradition is an ancient one. The Talmud refers to a hazzan as a person in the synagogue who took care of many things: the Torah scrolls, the sacred implements, the physical premises. As Jewish liturgy developed and became more complex, Jews looked to hazzanim who possessed expertise in the various cantillations, melodies, and modes for different Shabbatot, holidays, and seasons on our calendar. Before the advent of the printing press, the hazzan was often the only person in the synagogue in possession of a siddur, and the hazzan literally served as emissary for the entire congregation in prayer. Sacred texts described the essential attributes of a hazzan: One who possesses a pleasing voice, an upstanding character, deep personal piety, a knowledge of Jewish law, particularly as pertains to ritual practice. Of course, Hazzan Ozur Bass has emulated all of these qualities, and more. His gentleness and humility have been a source of comfort to many at various stages of life. His genuine concern for every member of the congregation has been felt by many. He has been a beloved teacher, a caring pastoral presence, and a devoted prayer leader. As was the case with our patriarch Jacob, when Hazzan Ozur Bass moves on to pursue his passion for chaplaincy and pastoral care, the impact he leaves behind will be profound. I know you join me in wishing Hazzan Ozur Bass every blessing on the exciting professional path he is pursuing. Please stay tuned as plans develop for honoring the Hazzan and celebrating his tenure at Har Shalom in the near future.

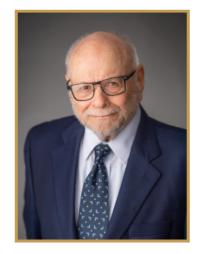

# FROM RABBI SIMMONS

What does home feel like to you?

When I think of home, a few different images and feelings come to mind.

On the one hand, when I think about "home" I might think about my home right now— about my townhouse with my two cuddly cats, my books, and my paintings. That is to say that one sense of home for me is a place where I can relax and let out a deep breath at the end of the day. This kind of home is a place I have designed for myself and my needs.

On the other hand, sometimes when I think about home I think about my parents' house growing up, where none of us actually live anymore. I think about the inside jokes that only my siblings and parents know about, about the stories I've heard my relatives tell over and over, about the meals that we ate when I was a kid. This sense of home feels nostalgic, like a space co-created by and belonging to other people, like a place that doesn't exist anymore except in our shared memories, but which is still important to all of us.

Both of these senses of home are important to who I am as a person and as a rabbi. And when I think about the connections that we nurture together here at Har Shalom and how I hope that each of you feels in relationship to our tradition and our community, I keep coming back to these two senses of "home" and how crucial they both are to maintaining a healthy, vibrant spiritual life.

So. How can we nurture a spiritual space, together, that helps us feel at home—in both of these ways?

Of course, one of the challenges when framing our goals in terms of "home" is that one person's concept of the familiar and the comfortable might be different from another person's. A favorite melody for *L'cha Dodi*, an inherited chicken soup recipe, or a specific haggadah or siddur might make all the difference.

And yet, as Jews we have so many things that bind us all together, that offer us a shared sense of home, and a shared vision for community. This means that if we make the choice to do so, we can intentionally build a sense of home together, as a community, and fill it with activities and practices that are meaningful both to each of us individually and to all of us collectively.

In March, <u>Hazzan</u> Ozur Bass and I will begin offering a series of Adult Ed classes geared towards families with preschool-aged kids. The goal of this series will be to provide guidance, inspiration, and community support while each family discerns what it means for them to nurture Jewish identity in their home. However, this topic is valuable for all of us, regardless of age or family make-up. Here are some suggestions for ways to deepen the connection between your Judaism and your sense of home:

- 1. Daily practices: Invite Judaism into your daily rhythms by reciting *Modeh Ani* upon waking and/or the *Shema* at bedtime, along with several deep breaths and intentionally saying "thank you" to God for the blessings of the day. Say a prayer after stretching or using the bathroom to thank God for our bodies. Bonus: develop a practice of saying daily prayers or affirmations with your kids and/or partner. Ask each other: what are you thankful for today? What was a challenge today? What brought you joy today?
- 2. Weekly practices: Connect spiritually with Jews around the world by lighting candles, making kiddush, and eating challah at Shabbat; eating something special in honor of Shabbat; attending one or both Shabbat services; celebrating Havdalah with spices and wine at the end of Shabbat; going around the Shabbat dinner table to share roses and thorns of our week. Attend kiddush lunch with community and make friends who also value Jewish life. Making relaxed, Shabbat-friendly plans with friends and family to do a puzzle, go on a walk, read together, or play a board game. Connect with relatives and loved ones on a weekly basis.
- **3. Year-round practices**: Build the pulse of the Jewish year into your secular year. Mark your annual calendar with the Jewish holidays for the next year and commit to doing at least one special family activity to honor each one. Go on a nature walk or scavenger hunt for *Tu B'shvat*, dress up for Purim, commit to a week of matzoh at Passover, check out themed books from the library, watch a documentary for *Yom HaShoah*, practice apologizing and forgiving those you love for Yom Kippur. Read books and watch movies and documentaries with Jewish themes.
- 4. Community practices: Live your Jewish values. Volunteer to lead services, help in the kitchen on Saturday mornings, and make soup for the hungry. Invite people over for Shabbat dinner or lunch who you'd like to get to know better. Get involved in community service projects. Take part in adult education classes in the evenings at Har Shalom, sign up for the Chesed committee to support those in need of healing support, and intentionally include Jewish organizations in your charitable giving and legacy planning.

It is never too late, or too early, to choose to make Judaism a core part of your sense of "home". Let's build our Jewish homes, together, in 2023.

# FROM THE HAZZAN

I'm writing this note right after you read the message from Har Shalom letting you know that I am not seeking a renewal of my contract. Of the many questions people have asked me, one of the most common is "what is a chaplain?" I would like to share with you more about chaplaincy and why it is a passion of mine.

There are many places where one can be employed as a chaplain, but the main ones are health care companies, continuing care companies, hospices, and correction facilities. The work of the chaplain is inherently interfaith, and tries to reach individuals of many different backgrounds. As a result of that ,a chaplain is less of a guide and more of a listener. A client in distress might need teaching, discussing one's theology, or even finding solutions to their suffering; those needs will most likely be provided by other professionals. The role of the chaplain is to listen without judgment, with unconditional positive regard for a human being in need.

A chaplain differs from other mental health professionals in one important way: our framework is spirituality. We listen in similar ways, but we focus on attributes such as compassion, acceptance, and gratitude, from a spiritual point of view. Theist chaplains, like myself, understand these attributes to be desirable because they emulate or respond to God's attributes. In addition to seeing our clients with unconditional positive regard, we also see them as created in the Divine image.

Chaplaincy is my passion, because each encounter is a prayer. It's a unique opportunity to be with clients at times of loss and celebration, times of suffering and joy. Each conversation has the potential to unlock something in the client's connection with the Holy One. In Pirkei Avot 3:2 we read that "Rabbi Hananiah ben Teradion said: 'When two sit together and there are no words of Torah between them, then this is a session of scorners; but if two sit together and there are words of Torah between them, then the Shekhinah (Divine Presence) abides among them". We know that God is everywhere; so Rabbi Hananiah could not suggest that God is only present when words of Torah are spoken! What he is teaching is that God is more noticeable in the room when that happens. One of the roles of the chaplain is to invite the client to notice.



to witness God's presence. That is why every encounter is a prayer. It is an intensely emotional and spiritual experience.

The main tool of chaplaincy is clarifying questions, not for the chaplain's sake, but for the client. A chaplain brings their ability to listen in order to help the client connect to their inner feelings, and witnesses in companionship while that person moves towards acceptance and trust, from struggle to compassion. It is an opportunity to accompany each other; not to teach, to offer advice or solutions. Parker Palmer said that, "The human soul doesn't want to be advised or fixed or saved. It simply wants to be witnessed — to be seen, heard and companioned exactly as it is". When chaplains listen to their clients, they invite that human soul to connect more deeply with the Source of Blessing.

Not every meeting can be that intense. Friends and family speak to each other casually; tutors and teachers dispense knowledge and wisdom; co-workers offer advice or counsel. There are walls and deflection, defenses and distractions; so a chaplain is trained to keep their ears and hearts open, bring challenge when needed and compassion, always.

I haven't yet concluded my studies to be a chaplain, nor have I found a posting. I'm positive that, in due time, that will happen. I'm sad to leave this congregation where my roots are, this place where my family grew, and the congregants whom I love dearly. I feel like I am stepping into the unknown. I am buoyed by your expressions of love and support, and I hope to continue helping people, one client at a time.

I am pleased to announce that Har Shalom was awarded a \$10,000 grant through the Montgomery County Nonprofit Security Grants program! The County informed us that they received twice the number of applicants for the grant, with requests exceeding available funding. This one-time grant will help to cover the costs of our off-duty Montgomery County Police Officers.

In addition to the grants we receive, Har Shalom's Security Committee works actively to strengthen the safety and security of our congregation. On March 12th at 4:00PM, I invite you to join one of our Security Committee Members, Herbie Epstein, on a situational awareness and security training. This is open to Har Shalom congregants and will focus on situational awareness and preparedness for Shabbats and other events in the building.

While we have not received any specific threats to our community, we want to implement best practices in order to maintain a safe and secure space for all.

Herbie Epstein served in the Israeli Defense Forces for two years. He then went on to earn a Masters in Counter Terrorism and Homeland Security. After realizing he wanted to serve his community, he became a police officer with the Metropolitan Police Department and then with the Arlington County Police Department. While with the ACPD, he served on the Civil Disturbance Unit and became an instructor in civilian response to active attacks. Herbie recently shifted gears and founded Blue River Security Consulting, which specializes in CPTED strategies as well as training civilians in active shooter response. Herbie and his wife Michelle have been members since 2019 and have 3 children – Levi, Ellie, and Charlie.

The service was okay, with a much shorter version of Kabbalat Shabbat, and I found I was missing the songs of Kabbalat Shabbat with my Potomac Har Shalom family.

January 2023 was a very busy month for me as I was practicing for my acting debut in *Cinderella*. I never knew how much time was involved in preparing for these productions. It is truly amazing how Director Shelly Horn in just over two months took a cast of seventeen actors to put on this amazing production of *Cinderella*. I also thank Stew Remer and Ken Lechter for producing the show and all the Har Shalom congregants who participated. #### **HOW TO KASHER** YOUR KITCHEN FOR **PESACH**

Some utensils and cookware that are used throughout the year may be kashered for Passover. If you have any questions that are not answered here, please contact Rabbi Raskin: rabbiraskin@harshalom.org or 240-687-7218.

**EARTHWARE** such as china or pottery cannot be kashered for Passover.

**METAL POTS, PANS & COOKWARE** that are wholly metal and used in fire (e.g. the broiler) must be

scrubbed and cleaned and made red hot. Fill up pots and boil water so that it overflows their rims. Silverware, after having been washed with soap and water, should be set aside for 24 hours then immersed completely in boiling water.

**OVEN RANGES** that come into direct contact with food should be cleaned thoroughly. The oven should then be heated on the highest possible temperature for 30 minutes, or programmed to selfclean. A microwave, after being cleaned, must have a cup of water placed inside the chamber and turned on until the water disappears. If the microwave has a browning element, it may not be kashered for Passover.

**GLASSWARE** such as drinking glasses (not Pyrex), should be washed thoroughly with soap and water or put through the dishwasher.

**ELECTRIC APPLIANCES** with removable parts should be kashered appropriately (e.g. for metal parts, follow #2 above). If the parts are not removable and they come into direct contact with food, the appliance may not be kashered for Passover.

**TABLES, CABINETS & COUNTERS** that come into contact with hametz should be thoroughly cleaned and covered. Granite countertops do not have to be covered after kashering.

KITCHEN SINKS that are metal may be kashered by pouring boiling water over the surfaces. Porcelain sinks must be well cleaned and a new sink rack or basin should be used during Passover.

**REFRIGERATORS & FREEZERS** should be washed well with soap and water. All hametz should be removed or sealed in a closed box or bag (and sold with other hametz).

**KITCHENWARE** that is not kosher for Passover should be separated and either covered or closed in a separate part of the kitchen.

#### **FAQs**

#### What is hametz?

The word הְּמֵיץ is translated as "leavened bread." This refers to foods prepared from any of five different types of grain (wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye) that has been allowed to rise. Ashkenazic custom adds rice, millet, corn, and legumes (referred to as 'kitniyot') to this list. In November 2015, the Rabbinical Assembly's committee on Jewish law and standards voted that the prohibition on kitniyot for Ashkenazic Jews is no longer necessary. Please note that not all Ashkenazic Jews or Conservative Jews have adapted this standard.

#### Why must we do such extensive cleaning in preparation for Passover?

The Torah prohibits Jews from consuming, owning, or deriving benefit from <u>hametz</u>. Before Passover begins, we engage in a thorough cleaning of our homes, offices, and cars to remove any traces of <u>hametz</u>. While it is preferable to consume or donate excess <u>hametz</u> foods prior to Passover, this is not always possible or economically feasible. In response, Rabbi Raskin will arrange a sale of <u>hametz</u> products to a non-Jew in the community, who will "own" these items throughout the duration of Passover. All <u>hametz</u> products, dishes, silverware, and pots that will remain in your home during Passover must be placed in cabinets or closets that remain closed and sealed throughout the week of Passover.

#### What is the Siyyum Ha'Bekhorim?

It is a *mitzvah* for firstborn Jews to fast on the day before Passover in remembrance of being spared the fate of the firstborn Egyptians. However, firstborns may be exempt from this fast if they participate in the celebration of a *siyyum* (the completion of a significant amount of Torah study). Every week, a dedicated group has been studying a complete tractate of the *Mishnah* in preparation for the *siyyum*. Even if you have not participated in this study group previously, you are encouraged to join us for morning minyan at 8:00 AM on Wednesday, April 5th, followed by the Siyyum.

#### What foods require Rabbinic certification during Passover?

Matzah, noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, processed cheeses, jam, jelly, relishes, wines, liquors, salad oils/dressings, vegetable gelatin, shortenings, vinegar.

#### Are there foods that do not require special labeling?

If unopened and purchased before Passover begins, the following products require no special certification: pure natural coffee, sugar (not confectioners or powdered), pure brown sugar, saccharin, tea, salt, pepper, frozen vegetables (without additives), frozen fruit juices (without additives), vegetables (string beans are permitted), honey, 100% pure safflower or soy bean oil, nuts (except legumes if you do not eat *kitniyot*), baking soda, detergents and scouring powders.

If purchased before or during Passover, the following products require no special certification: fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, fresh fish and meat.

If purchased during Passover, the following products require certification: all processed foods (canned, frozen, or bottled dairy products, juices).

#### Can any dishes or utensils be used during Passover?

It is preferable to have special dishes and cookware reserved exclusively for Passover use. Certain items, however, can be *kashered* for use during Passover. Earthenware, enamelware, or porcelain utensils used during the rest of the year may not be *kashered* or used during Passover.

#### What is Bedikat Hametz?

After our homes have been thoroughly cleaned for Passover, and  $\underline{h}$  ametz items are stored away, it is traditional to perform a 'search' by candle light, feather, and spoon symbolizing that all visible  $\underline{h}$  ametz has been removed. **Note:** this is a fun, memorable ritual for children to participate in; it is traditional to place a few crumbs to be 'found' during the search.

#### What is Bedikat Hametz?

After our homes have been thoroughly cleaned for Passover, and <u>hametz</u> items are stored away, it is traditional to perform a 'search' by candle light, feather, and spoon symbolizing that all visible <u>hametz</u> has been removed. **Note:** this is a fun, memorable ritual for children to participate in; it is traditional to place a few crumbs to be 'found' during the search. On the night before Passover, following the search, we recite the following formula renouncing our connection to any <u>hametz</u>:

בֶּל חֲמָרָא וַחֲמִיעָא דְּאָבָּא בִרְשׁוּתי דַּחֲמָתֵּה דְּבִעַרתֵּה וּדְלָא בִערְתֵּה לִבְמִיל וְלֶהֶנִי הֶפּקֵר בְּעַפְּרָא דְאַרְעָא.

Kol <u>h</u>amirah va-<u>h</u>ami'ah d'ika vir'shuti da-<u>h</u>amitei d'vi-artei u'd-la vi-artei liv'til v'lehevei hefker ke-afra de-ar'ah.

All manner of leaven in my possession which I have not seen or not removed is hereby annulled and considered as the dust of the earth.

#### What is Biyyur <u>H</u>ametz?

On the morning before Passover we burn the  $\underline{h}$ ametz found during the search on the previous night. If completing at home, this must be done by 11:02 AM on Wednesday, April 5<sup>th</sup>. The latest time to consume hametz on Wednesday, April 5<sup>th</sup>, is 10:02 AM.

I often have discussions with parents about what Religious School looked like "back in the day" and how HSRS is different. I thought I'd share a great example of what's happening in our classrooms.

In seventh grade, our students are preparing for their transition from being consumers of Jewish education, to early leaders in the field. Our fabulous teacher, Moreh Ben, has been infusing introductory lessons on experiential Jewish education into his Sunday classes, so his students get the opportunity to "peek behind the curtain" and "see how the secret sauce" is made. Taking the leap from student to teacher is a wonderful opportunity for our students to not just do a deep dive on a topic they are interested in, but to engage in a higher level hevruta study, a cornerstone of Jewish learning.

In the first part of the year students learned how to think of an effective hook for a lesson, plan fun activities, and write juicy questions to kick start class debates. This semester, they have put these ideas into action. So far...

- Ilana Marcus had students moving to different corners of the room based on whether they thought different events counted as miracles... these included biblical scenes like 90-year old Sarah having a baby boy and modern scenarios like getting an A on a test you didn't study for.
- Faye Kronisch broke students into groups to do a deep dive on different historical contexts where Jews experienced persecution (e.g. Dreyfus affair, Russian Pogroms, etc.) and used this to spark a debate about why Israel and selfdetermination is important.
- Jake Albert did a delicious class on the different kinds of Jewish foods. His Venn diagram on Deli/American Jewish food and Torah/Ancient food sparked some great conversations – and made us all hungry.

We have nine more student lead presentations on the horizon! These teens are total rockstars.

We engage in showing our students how Judaism is both learning about our past but also finding meaning and relevance in our lives now – that there is more to learn than reading textbooks, that we can <u>participate</u> in our Judaism, not be passive about it – those are the fundamentals that HSRS embraces. And have some fun while doing it!

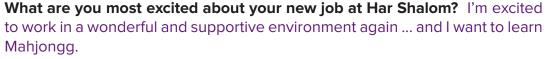

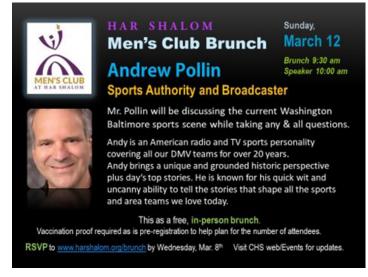

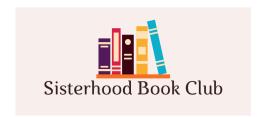
