## FROM RABBI RASKIN

A few weeks ago I had the remarkable opportunity to spend Shabbat in College Park, at the University of Maryland. That particular weekend was known as "Shabbam," or Shabbat Across Maryland. Students were encouraged to host each other for Shabbat dinner. After Kabbalat Shabbat services, hundreds of students gathered for meals...and I was so honored to be hosted by Har Shalom's very own Abby Elson. There were twenty-some college students crowded around a truly beautiful Shabbat table. While Abby and her roommates made the main courses (and homemade challah!), others brought everything from salads to side dishes. We sang Shalom Aleichem. recited kiddush and ha'motzi, enjoyed a scrumptious meal that was followed by a rousing Birkat Ha'Mazon. I marveled watching these kids lead all the davening on Friday night, read all the Torah portions and haftarah along with Shabbat morning services, and host big, traditional Shabbat meals really made my heart swell. This is the future of the Jewish people! I was beyond proud.

The experience also reminded me of the significance of the college years for my own Jewish growth and commitments. Last month, while attending the Rabbinical Assembly Convention in St. Louis, I had an opportunity to visit with my college roommate, who lives there. While having dinner at his house, with his wife and kids, we reminisced about how we decided in our senior year that we were going to have a kosher kitchen in our off-campus apartment. We aspired to host meals for Shabbat and holidays. though neither of us had culinary abilities even remotely close to those I experienced recently at the University of Maryland! However, it was then that we both learned what truly went into maintaining a kosher kitchen. It was during the college years that I began to take ownership of my Judaism. I went to services, enrolled in college-level Hebrew classes, traveled to Israel, became a Jewish leader on campus, and dabbled in rituals and observances that were sometimes different from what I grew up with. Today, my former roommate, a partner in a law firm, is also a religious Jew, an officer of his synagogue and children's day school boards of directors...and you know what happened to me!



Nowadays we sadly often associate Jews and the college campus with antisemitism or anti-Zionism, and while that is certainly a growing problem, college is also a very exciting time to be Jewish. I have seen remarkably thriving Jewish communities on both of my daughters' campuses, certainly at Maryland... and many other places as well. At Har Shalom, a number of parents have regrouped to launch our College Connection program, which, like many things, was depleted during the pandemic. I am so grateful to Jodi Chen, Diana Rabinowitz, Ellen Robin, Margie Swerdlow, and Marcie Wertlieb for helping us stay connected and engaged with our Har Shalom college students. At various times throughout the year, college students will receive gifts, messages, and support from our congregation and clergy. We want them to know that Har Shalom is always their shul, and that we love them! In the recently published "Official Hillel 2022 College Guide to Jewish Life on Campus," the editors (one a graduate student and the other an undergrad) wrote that there is a "global movement of Jewish students who are building their Jewish college experience." What a breathtaking statement. Thousands of Jews on hundreds of college campuses discovering for themselves the beauty, meaning, and power of Jewish identity. I look forward to being in touch with our Har Shalom college students when they are on campus, to welcoming them to shul when they are home, and to always being a resource to them wherever they are. May the beginning of the second semester bring them new opportunities for exciting Jewish growth. And may this be a good omen for the future of the Jewish people!



## FROM RABBI SIMMONS

A wise (albeit somewhat mopey) biblical character named Kohelet once said: "for everything there is a season, and a time and purpose under Heaven" (Kohelet 3:1).

Well, the chilliest season is here, and sometimes it can be a challenge to understand what its wintry time and purpose under Heaven could possibly be. After all, winter is the season with the fewest leaves. the least amount of sun, the most layers of coats and sweaters and mittens and hats separating us from each other and the outside world. The days are shorter, the nights longer and colder. The kids and dogs that filled my neighborhood with their laughter and games during the summer and fall months are staying indoors, bundled up against the

Adam and Eve didn't last long enough in the Garden of Eden for us to know whether or not there were mid-Atlantic-style seasons In The Beginning, but my impression of that idyllic scenario as portrayed in the Torah is that it probably wasn't initially designed with sleet, and sludge, and "forecasted wintery mix" in mind. (Especially because In The Beginning, Adam and Eve weren't wearing any clothes! That would have been uncomfortable indeed.) Though Genesis describes God's creation of seasons, the more extreme versions--the kind that contain hurricanes, blizzards, and droughts-- seem to be something that came into full existence post-Eden, post-Apple, post-snake.

I'm not trying to suggest that winter, then, is some kind of punishment for humanity-- a la the punishments God names for humans following Adam and Eve's banishment from the Garden. Of course not! How can winter be a punishment when it contains so many sources of joy: making snow angels, and drinking cocoa, and basking in the beautiful holiday lights. And each other season brings with it its own individual joys, too, like strolling on the beach in summer, going apple picking in the autumn, and revelling in the fresh smell of flowers in the spring.

But even a season-lover like myself sometimes loses sight of that seasonal beauty during the coldest and most secluded moments of winter, or during the hottest, muggiest days of a mid-Atlantic summer. And in those moments of Kohelet-style melancholy, I have to wonder:

Wouldn't it have been simpler to have it be spring everywhere all the time? Or at least for more places to be more temperate, like, say, Los Angeles, or Phoenix? What is the point of the never-ending cycle of the world? What can it teach us?

Perhaps there truly is a time and purpose for everything under Heaven, even for the existence of seasons themselves. The hypothesis I have to offer, in this coldest time of the year when new growth and warmth seem so far away, is a very simple one: that by requiring us to live in a world that is always changing, always developing, and always growing and dving at the same time. God has also required us to develop patience, and has gifted us with always having something to look forward to.

That is to say, God has given us a gateway into the experience of faith.

Because is there a more pure example of faith than simply believing that the roses will bloom again? That new buds will appear on trees, that pools will re-open and be filled with laughter and summer splashes? No matter what temperature it is outside. no matter our mood on any given day: We have faith that Spring will come again-- that dandelions will bloom and kids will come back outside to play. We have faith that even though we don't completely understand how the world works, it is working as best it can.

Furthermore, we can practice utilizing this reassuring and cyclical type of faith to remind ourselves that, though our lives have had moments of emotional darkness or cold, though we experience challenges. we can also believe that there will be brighter times again. The projects that consume our time will one day be in the rearview mirror. The arguments we want to win will, again, give way to laughter. The physical world's patterns are not the only ones we can rely on: no matter what we are feeling or going through, it can help to remember that this, too, shall pass.

Each part of this world has its time and purpose under Heaven, and we can have faith in that purpose, even in the depths of winter or in our own darkest moments.

## FROM THE HAZZAN

#### **SHABBAT SHIRAH**

This year, Shabbat Shirah will be on February 3-4, 2023. We are please to host Mezumenet, the treble Jewish a cappella group from University of Maryland. I know you will enjoy their musical offerings, and the spirit they will add to our shabbat.

Shabbat Shirah is the Saturday when we read parashat Beshalah, including Exodus XV from the Torah. This chapter of Exodus includes the Song of the Sea, also known in Hebrew as Shirat haYam, or simply Shirah (song). This is the song that Moses and Miriam sang after the people of Israel crossed the Sea of Reeds, on their way out of Egypt. It is a song of freedom, a song of victory. The words of the song are written in a brick-laying pattern, similar to a wall, because "the waters were a wall unto them on their right hand, and on their left" (Exodus 14: 22). Therefore, Shirat HaYam looks different than all the other columns in the Torah. Some of the most famous verses from this song are: "Who is like you, Adonai, among the deities" (Mi hamocha ba-elim Adonai) and "Adonai will reign forever and ever" (Adonai Yimlokh le'olam va'ed). These verses are also found on the Siddur, before the morning and evening Amidah (silent prayer).

We use a special melody to chant this chapter from the Torah. The Song expresses our joy on attaining freedom and defeating Pharaoh, and the music reflects this with a special chant. This special chant is heard also in other occasions: during Simhat Torah, when the Torah reader recites the six days of creation; anytime we chant the phrase "Next year in Jerusalem"; and after concluding each book of the Torah with the phrase "hazak, hazak, venithazek". Sephardi Jews use a particularly captivating melody, which we frequently chant during the morning service.

Because Shabbat Shirah can be translated as "Shabbat of Song", it became traditional in Eastern Europe for the <u>Hazzan</u> to prepare a special musical program with the choir. It is our custom, here at Har Shalom, to invite an a Capella group to perform for us during services. We are blessed, this year, to host Mezumenet, and they will be singing during our Friday night and Saturday services.

I look forward to seeing you there.

construction equipment, swing stages, and construction crews hanging from the sides of the building, know they are working hard on the façade to complete the work in March/April. We appreciate your patience if you notice noise during the day. The Ira and Maryjo Sherman Early Childhood Center and The Harbor School have enjoyed seeing all of the different equipment and processes at work – it is truly a STEAM learning opportunity. We have been working with both schools to ensure we are minimizing the disruption for our children during the day. The two roofs were completed in late November and no surprises were found – our very own construction miracle! We will begin work on the Burke Sanctuary and Art Gallery Hall Doors in the New Year thanks to the Federal Grant we received to help secure our facility.






## FROM THE HAR SHALOM PLAYERS

As this is one of the major Har Shalom fundraisers for the year, please consider being a Patron (\$100/adult; \$36/12 and under child) or Chai Patron (\$180). Patron tickets include reserved parking, assigned preferred seating, and listing in program. General seating tickets are \$22/adult and \$18/child (12 and under). 



## Amazing Programs Scheduled for Refugee Shabbat Weekend

During the weekend of February 11 and 12, Har Shalom has planned an informative Shabbat program on Saturday morning and an educational program for all of our members and their children in grades 5 - 12 following Religious School on Sunday.

During Shabbat morning services, we have invited Mariam Atahi, an individual with whom Har Shalom and St. Francis have a support relationship, to speak about her life in Afghanistan before the U.S. withdrawal of troops, her subsequent escape from Afghanistan and her life in the U.S. since her arrival in March 2022. In Afghanistan, working for UNICEF and Save the Children International, Mariam served as an advocacy expert for plights of women and children with broad experience in children's issues, in particular specific expertise in child and forced marriage, children on move and children at risk of exploitations. She is also an expert on social media strategy.

On Sunday, February 12, following Religious School, we have planned a program for our youth (grades 5 – 12) AND their families to raise awareness of what it means to be a refugee. We are inviting families from the Islamic Community Center of Potomac and St. Francis Episcopal Church to also join us for this program so we can all learn together. Our plan is to have program participants rotate through three stations. One will create an opportunity to meet one or more Afghan families supported by our interfaith group. Topics could include where families lived in Afghanistan, information about their lives in Afghanistan (jobs, home, etc.), introduction to each family member, names, ages, hobbies, etc., why did the families need to relocate, what relocation was like for them (the journey), what it was like arriving in the U.S, what happened when they got here and what they experienced. A second station would include a discussion focusing on what is a refugee, why do people become refugees, myths/facts about refugees, contributions refugees have made to history, and a child's perspective of being a refugee. The third station would provide basic information on Islam, how the Muslim faith is similar/different to Judaism and Christianity, and provide information about the Muslim calendar, holidays, and how/when they pray.

We hope you will attend Refugee Shabbat morning services and the Sunday program. Additional information about these activities will be forthcoming as we get closer to the Refugee Shabbat weekend.

## DAYTIMERS JEWISH FILM FESTIVAL



#### January 18, 2023: THE CAKEMAKER (Israel/Germany – 104 minutes)

Provocative and moving, this is as unusual a love story as you are likely to find. Thomas, a young German baker, has an affair with Oren, a married Israeli man who makes frequent trips to see Thomas in Germany. When Oren seemingly disappears, Thomas discovers that he has died in a car crash. Thomas then goes to Jerusalem to find answers about Oren's death. Using a false identity, Thomas seeks out Anat, Oren's widow. He becomes increasingly involved in her life and stretchess the lie about himself to a point of no return.

#### February 15 2023: THE TESTAMENT (Israel – 88 minutes)

Holocaust researcher Yoel is in a legal battle with powerful forces in Austria concerning a construction project in the village of Lensdorf at a location he believes is the site of a WWII massacre. Yoel suspects their real aim is to bury the atrocity. While examining classified testimonies of Holocaust survivors, he discovers one given by his own mother, which reveals a long-kept secret. His very sense of self is shaken and he finds himself up against dual walls of silence: The Austrian denial of the massacre and his mother's silence about her past.

Associate Professor Liz Suhay from American University Department of Government specializes in public opinion, political psychology, and political communications, mainly in the U.S. with substantive foci on economic and social inequality and the politicization of science.

Professor Suhay will talk about the roots of support for authoritarianism in general in the U.S. and for former President Trump specifically. She will also discuss two related topics: distrust in democracy/government and extremism.

Her current work on science and politics spans several topics, including public beliefs about genetics, public trust in science amidst the COVID pandemic, and communication between Congress and outside experts. Ms. Suhay has been published in several professional journals. She is currently working on a book manuscript (Debating the American Dream: How Beliefs about the Causes of Inequality Polarize U.S. Politics) that seeks to understand the connection between Americans causal attributions for socioeconomic inequality and their political attitudes.


