# LERGY CORNER

When people share with me that they would like to deepen their personal connection to Judaism, one of the first things I recommend is that they commit to a full year of truly embracing all of the observances of the Jewish calendar, from Simchat Torah to Tisha B'av to counting the Omer.

"For everything there is a season", teaches Ecclessiastes, "And a time and purpose under Heaven." Our calendar takes this charge to heart, including days dedicated to joy, to sorrow, to prayer, and to the natural world around us.

Especially right now, in the Winter months, the constant thrum of Jewish observance and celebration that accompanies us through the coldest and darkest months of the year is a true gift from our heritage. Consider the following:

In late November and December, as the first real cold temperatures set in and the longest nights of the year seem interminable, we Jews celebrated Hanukkah. We lit candles that cast dancing shadows on the walls, we sang songs and played dreidel, and we ate rich foods like donuts and latkes. The Festival of Lights helps remind us each year to reaffirm for ourselves and each other that no matter how dark the world might seem, there is always metaphorical light to be found if we are committed to embracing its warmth and energy.

Then, in January or February when the days have slowly started to get longer but the chill has set deep into our bones, we got to observe Tu B'shevat, the "Birthday of the Trees". In the Sherman ECC, the kids celebrated by planting parsley seeds to nurture until Pesach, when the fragrant green leaves will be dipped in salt water. We talked about how under the snow outside, there were hidden plants just waiting to spring forth and flourish as long as we were patient. Tu B'shevat reminds us that life is there, ready to burst out when the snow recedes, and offers us a beautiful metaphor for keeping faith and hope in unseen blessings through tough times.

Now, with Spring tantalizingly close, we are gearing up for the next holiday: Purim. Planning for Purim encourages us, on the one hand, to embrace silliness and communal joy. Yes, our tradition teaches us, we do indeed have to show up for each other in difficult moments of sickness and mourning; however, it's also incredibly important to laugh and dance together, to express love for each other with mishloach manot, and to serve the less fortunate together with matanot l'evyonim. Purim gives us the perfect opportunity to live out the values of gratitude, humility, and shared responsibility for one another.

At the same time, Purim challenges us to also ask ourselves difficult questions, like: are we truly standing up in the face of injustice, like Esther and Mordechai? Are we plowing ahead selfishly at the expense of others, like Haman? Or are we bystanders, like most of the courtiers, preferring the comfortable path instead of a path of justice?

One of the strengths of framing these deep and difficult questions through the lens of a familiar story is that it allows us to engage with painful topics safely. This makes Purim, like Passover after it, an excellent opportunity for all ages to start talking about the role each of us can--and must--play in making this world a better place, and how we are obligated as people and as Jews to do our part.


The Jewish calendar was outlined in the Torah. expounded upon in the Mishnah and Talmud, and has been added to for generations-- but it also belongs to each of us. If you or your family have been toying with the idea of finding new ways to strengthen your connection to Judaism, 5784 is the perfect year to dive deeper.

Each upcoming holiday has the potential to encourage growth and introspection, and your Har Shalom community is here to support you, celebrate with you, and wrestle with difficult questions together-- and to eat lots of yummy hamentaschen. Chag Purim Sameach!

# FROM THE PRESIDENT



FOR ALL YOU DO TO CREATE COMMUNITY - THANK YOU!

If you stay up late enough to watch Jimmy Fallon, you know that he sets aside time each week to write thank you notes. For this column, I am sending "thank you's" to the generous volunteers and donors that make Har Shalom a vibrant and welcoming community.

One thing I have come to appreciate during my term as President is that Har Shalom is so much more than a synagogue. We are a family that takes celebrating our simchot just as seriously as caring for one another during moments of personal set-backs, sickness and loss.

Everywhere I turn, volunteers are contributing their talents and time so we can learn together, cook together, nosh together, and, of course, daven together. Our full calendar, our creative use of every space, and our growing budget perfectly illustrate that Har Shalom members want to work together on committees and projects to make our community feel like home.

This is also a community of generous and compassionate donors. In our last Tablet, we shared that 49 new supporters contributed to our High Holy Days campaign in 2023 – and donations jumped by 25% compared to 2022. This is one of the revenue streams we depend on for our staff, programming, and some of our capital improvements.

Now, I am humbled and thrilled to share the results of our Share Your Blessings Campaign - the appeal to ensure that our home is open to any family or individual who wants to join Har Shalom, regardless of their ability to pay membership dues.

Compared to 2022-23, Share Your Blessings support increased by 18%. In total, you contributed \$124,817 to

ensure that we never turn away anyone who wants to be an active member of a Jewish community at Har Shalom.

Why is this important for our community? each of our membership units paid full dues, we would collect approximately \$1.7 million. In reality, our members pay approximately \$1.35 million in dues. This \$350,000 gap is a result of important policies that provide for introductorypriced memberships for our newest members, complimentary memberships for our staff, and complimentary memberships for congregants in assisted living facilities. And - importantly, to honor our commitment to keeping our doors open to all, we offer dues adjustments for families and individuals experiencing financial hardship or who cannot afford full membership - accounting for approximately \$100,000. Share Your Blessings is a critically important funding source that allows us to accommodate our members in need of temporary dues adjustments.

By donating funds and giving your time to Har Shalom, you are living the ideals in Parshat Kedoshim - loving the stranger as ourselves and removing stumbling blocks for the blind.

At a time when so many of us are finding comfort and community at Har Shalom, I am grateful for the commitment that so many of our members make to ensure the strength of our family and longevity of our shul.

# HOW TO KASHER YOUR KITCHEN FOR PESACH

Some utensils and cookware that are used throughout the year may be kashered for Passover. If you have any questions that are not answered here, please contact Rabbi Raskin: rabbiraskin@harshalom.org or 240-687-7218.

EARTHWARE

such as china or pottery cannot be kashered for Passover.

METAL POTS, PANS & COOKWARE

that are wholly metal and used in fire (e.g. the broiler) must be scrubbed and cleaned and made red hot. Fill up pots and boil water so that it overflows their rims. Silverware, after having been washed with soap and water, should be set aside for 24 hours then immersed completely in boiling water.

OVEN RANGES

that come into direct contact with food should be cleaned thoroughly. The oven should then be heated on the highest possible temperature for 30 minutes, or programmed to self-clean. A microwave, after being cleaned, must have a cup of water placed inside the chamber and turned on until the water disappears. If the microwave has a browning element, it may not be kashered for Passover.

GLASSWARE

such as drinking glasses (not Pyrex), should be washed thoroughly with soap and water or put through the dishwasher.

**ELECTRIC APPLIANCES** 

with removable parts should be kashered appropriately (e.g. for metal parts, follow #2 above). If the parts are not removable and they come into direct contact with food, the appliance may not be kashered for Passover.

TABLES, CABINETS & COUNTERS

that come into contact with hametz should be thoroughly cleaned and covered. Granite countertops do not have to be covered after kashering.

KITCHEN SINKS

that are metal may be kashered by pouring boiling water over the surfaces. Porcelain sinks must be well cleaned and a new sink rack or basin should be used during Passover.

REFRIGERATORS & FREEZERS

should be washed well with soap and water. All hametz should be removed or sealed in a closed box or bag (and sold with other hametz).

9 KITCHENWARE
that is not kosher for Passover should be separated and either
covered or closed in a separate part of the kitchen.

# **FAQs**

### What is hametz?

The word אָבְּילְי is translated as "leavened bread." This refers to foods prepared from any of five different types of grain (wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye) that has been allowed to rise. Ashkenazic custom adds rice, millet, corn, and legumes (referred to as 'kitniyot') to this list. In November 2015, the Rabbinical Assembly's committee on Jewish law and standards voted that the prohibition on kitniyot for Ashkenazic Jews is no longer necessary. Please note that not all Ashkenazic Jews or Conservative Jews have adapted this standard.

# Why must we do such extensive deaning in preparation for Passover?

The Torah prohibits Jews from consuming, owning, or deriving benefit from <u>hametz</u>. Before Passover begins, we engage in a thorough cleaning of our homes, offices, and cars to remove any traces of <u>hametz</u>. While it is preferable to consume or donate excess <u>hametz</u> foods prior to Passover, this is not always possible or economically feasible. In response, Rabbi Raskin will arrange a sale of <u>hametz</u> products to a non-Jew in the community, who will "own" these items throughout the duration of Passover. All <u>hametz</u> products, dishes, silverware, and pots that will remain in your home during Passover must be placed in cabinets or closets that remain closed and sealed throughout the week of Passover.

# What is the Siyyum Ha'Bekhorim?

It is a *mitzvah* for firstborn Jews to fast on the day before Passover in remembrance of being spared the fate of the firstborn Egyptians. However, firstborns may be exempt from this fast if they participate in the celebration of a *siyyum* (the completion of a significant amount of Torah study). Every week, a dedicated group has been studying a complete tractate of the *Mishnah* in preparation for the *siyyum*. Even if you have not participated in this study group previously, you are encouraged to join us for morning minyan at 8:00 AM on Monday, April 22nd, followed by the Siyyum and breakfast.

### What foods require Rabbinic certification during Passover?

Matzah, noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, processed cheeses, jam, jelly, relishes, wines, liquors, salad oils/dressings, vegetable gelatin, shortenings, vinegar.

### Are there foods that do not require special labeling?

If unopened and purchased before Passover begins, the following products require no special certification: pure natural coffee, sugar (not confectioners or powdered), pure brown sugar, saccharin, tea, salt, pepper, frozen vegetables (without additives), frozen fruit juices (without additives), vegetables, honey, 100% pure safflower or soy bean oil, nuts (except legumes if you do not eat *kitniyot*), baking soda, detergents and scouring powders.

If purchased before or during Passover, the following products require no special certification: fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, fresh fish and meat.

If purchased during Passover, the following products require certification: all processed foods (canned, frozen, or bottled dairy products, juices).

# Can any dishes or utensils be used during Passover?

It is preferable to have special dishes and cookware reserved exclusively for Passover use. Certain items, however, can be *kashered* for use during Passover. Earthenware, enamelware, or porcelain utensils used during the rest of the year may not be *kashered* or used during Passover.

### What is Bedikat Hametz?

After our homes have been thoroughly cleaned for Passover, and  $\underline{hametz}$  items are stored away, it is traditional to perform a 'search' by candle light, feather, and spoon symbolizing that all visible  $\underline{hametz}$  has been removed. **Note:** this is a fun, memorable ritual for children to participate in; it is traditional to place a few crumbs to be 'found' during the search. On the night before Passover, following the search, we recite the following formula renouncing our connection to any  $\underline{hametz}$ :

All manner of leaven in my possession which I have not seen or not removed is hereby annulled and considered as the dust of the earth.

# What is Biyyur Hametz?

On the morning before Passover we burn the  $\underline{h}$ ametz found during the search on the previous night. Chametz must be burned or sold before 11:59 AM on Monday, April 22nd. The latest time to consume  $\underline{h}$ ametz on Monday, April 22nd is 10:49 AM.

# INTRODUCING NICHUM AVEILIM: COMFORTING MOURNERS

For many years, Har Shalom's Hevra Kadisha Committee has performed the mitzvah of nichum aveilim (ניחום אבלים), which means comforting mourners. Congregants have done so — not only for friends and relatives, but also for members of our community whom they may not know personally. Depending on the family's wishes and needs, those efforts may include helping to prepare the shiva home during the funeral, assisting at the service if it is held at Har Shalom, arranging for the meal of condolence after the funeral, delivering prayerbooks, kippot, and mourners' chairs to the shiva house, and arranging for shiva minyan leaders. All of these Jewish actions of comfort and support hopefully help the mourners begin the healing process.

Traditionally, the term *Hevra Kadisha*, or holy society, describes a volunteer group that prepares the body of a Jew who has passed away for burial. Because our committee has a different role — comforting and supporting mourners — we have renamed our group the *Nichum Aveilim* Committee. Both such groups engage in uniquely Jewish sacred practices, and it is an honor to undertake those *mitzvot*.

# Har Shalom & St. Francis Episcopal Continue Support for Resettled Afghan Families

Volunteers from Har Shalom and St Francis Episcopal Church are continuing their collaborative aid efforts in support of two newly-arrived Afghan refugee families. Mansoor Sangeen his wife Balqis, and 13 mo old son Mohabat arrived in the US in December and moved into their White Oak apartment in January. They are from the Kunar Province in Afghanistan. Mansoor has a college degree in Literature but most recently was an instructor teaching pilots basic sciences and avionics. He is anxious to take on entry level jobs here in the US while he determines longer term employment strategies. Balqis wants to make learning English a top priority while perhaps taking in some sewing jobs for the many local Afghan families.

Riaz Jahangiri and wife Waheeda have a three-year-old daughter, Kayenat. They arrived about the same time as the Sangeens and wound up in the same apartment complex in White Oak. They both have university degrees and some experience in the legal field. Riaz wants to find a temporary entry level job while they both prepare to become paralegals.

Riaz worked in Afghanistan for US contractors involved with overseeing the judiciary system, and that's how he met Arsalah Wahdat and his family, the first Afghan refugee family that Har Shalom and St. Francis helped. Monsoor's brother was an acquaintance of Arsalah back in Afghanistan. They both have large families that remain back home.
