

# FROM THE RABBI





### The Conservative Movement Slate #6

Dear Friends,

Every five years representatives of the Jewish community from around the world gather in Israel for the World Zionist Congress. The first Congress was convened by none other than Theodor Herzl in Basel, Switzerland in 1897. That historic gathering laid the groundwork for the establishment of the State of Israel 51 years later. Today, the World Zionist Congress decides on the allocation of over \$1 billion to various organizations and agencies that support Jewish life in Israel. I am honored to have been selected as a delegate to the 2020 World Zionist Congress in October as part of the Mercaz slate, which is the official representation of the Conservative Movement. The size of our delegation will determine our influence over the allocation of those critical funds, as well as appointments to the boards of influential organizations like the Jewish National Fund which is why I am asking you to become a World Zionist Congress voter, and to vote for Mercaz!

The Conservative/Masorti movement is growing in Israel, as more and more Israelis are searching for religious alternatives to state-sponsored ultra-Orthodoxy, and the coercive power of the Chief Rabbinate. There are Masorti congregations all over the country, a very active youth movement called Noam, a Ramah Summer Camp, and numerous other Israeli educational initiatives sponsored by the Masorti Movement. However, there is much work to be done. Because of the disproportionate power of the Haredi-dominated Ministry of Religious Affairs, Conservative/Masorti rabbis and communities are deprived of needed resources and official recognition by the state. Our lifecycle events and conversions are repudiated, our rabbis are not accorded equal status, and sacred sites like the Kotel continue to be a battleground for egalitarianism and equal access. The funds that are to be dispersed by the World Zionist Congress can provide a critical edge for religious pluralism and the continued growth of Masorti Judaism in Israel. Please register to vote, and join the movement to guarantee religious freedom, democracy, and openness in Israeli society. Thank you so much for your support! # HOW TO KASHER YOUR KITCHEN FOR PASSOVER

Some utensils and cookware that are used throughout the year may be kashered for Passover. If you have any questions that are not answered here, please contact Rabbi Raskin: <a href="mailto:rabbiraskin@harshalom.org">rabbiraskin@harshalom.org</a> or 240-687-7218.

1 EARTHENWARE,

such as china or pottery cannot be kashered for Passover.

2 METAL POTS, PANS & COOKWARE

that are wholly metal and used in fire (e.g. the broiler) must be scrubbed and cleaned and made red hot. Fill up pots and boil water so that it overflows their rims. Silverware, after having been washed with soap and water, should be set aside for 24 hours then immersed completely in boiling water.

3 OVEN RANGES

that come into direct contact with food should be cleaned thoroughly. The oven should then be heated on the highest possible temperature for 30 minutes, or programmed to self-clean. A microwave, after being cleaned, must have a cup of water placed inside the chamber and turned on until the water disappears. If the microwave has a browning element, it may not be kashered for Passover.

4 GLASSWARE

such as drinking glasses (not Pyrex), should be washed thoroughly with soap and water or put through the dishwasher.

5 ELECTRIC APPLIANCES

with removable parts should be kashered appropriately (e.g. for metal parts, follow #2 above). If the parts are not removable and they come into direct contact with food, the appliance may not be kashered for Paccy or

6 TABLES, CABINETS, & COUNTERS

that come into contact with *hametz* should be thoroughly cleaned and covered.

7 KITCHEN SINKS

that are metal may be kashered by pouring boiling water over the surfaces. Porcelain sinks must be well cleaned and a new sink rack or basin should be used during Passover.

8 REFRIGERATORS AND FREEZERS

should be washed well with soap and water. All *hametz* should be removed or sealed in a closed box or bag (and sold with other *hametz*).

9 KITCHENWARE

that is not kosher for Passover should be separated and either covered or closed in a separate part of the kitchen.

### **FAQs**

### What is <u>h</u>ametz?

The word הְּבֵּמְיֹן is translated as "leavened bread." This refers to foods prepared from any of five different types of grain (wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye) that has been allowed to rise. Ashkenazic custom adds rice, millet, corn, and legumes (referred to as 'kitniyot') to this list. In November 2015, the Rabbinical Assembly's committee on Jewish law and standards voted that the prohibition on kitniyot for Ashkenazic Jews is no longer necessary. Please note that not all Ashkenazic Jews or Conservative Jews have adapted this standard.

### Why must we do such extensive cleaning in preparation for Passover?

The Torah prohibits Jews from consuming, owning, or deriving benefit from  $\underline{h}$  ametz. Before Passover begins, we engage in a thorough cleaning of our homes, offices, and cars to remove any traces of  $\underline{h}$  ametz. While it is preferable to consume or donate excess  $\underline{h}$  ametz foods prior to Passover, this is not always possible or economically feasible. In response, Rabbi Raskin will arrange a sale of  $\underline{h}$  ametz products to a non-Jew in the community, who will "own" these items throughout the duration of Passover. All  $\underline{h}$  ametz products, dishes, silverware, and pots that will remain in your home during Passover must be placed in cabinets or closets that remain closed and sealed throughout the week of Passover.

### What is the Siyyum Ha'Bekhorim?

It is a *mitzvah* for firstborn Jews to fast on the day before Passover in remembrance of being spared the fate of the firstborn Egyptians. However, firstborns may be exempt from this fast if they participate in the celebration of a *siyyum* (the completion of a significant amount of Torah study). Every week, a dedicated group has been studying a complete tractate of the *Mishnah* in preparation for the *siyyum*. Even if you have not participated in this study group previously, you are encouraged to join us for morning minyan at **6:45 AM** on **Wednesday**, **April 8<sup>th</sup>**, followed by the *siyyum* and breakfast.

### What foods require Rabbinic certification during Passover?

Matzah, noodles, candies, cakes, beverages, canned and processed foods, processed cheeses, jam, jelly, relishes, wines, liquors, salad oils/dressings, vegetable gelatin, shortenings, vinegar.

### Are there foods that do not require special labeling?

If unopened and purchased before Passover begins, the following products require no special certification: pure natural coffee, sugar (not confectioners or powdered), pure brown sugar, saccharin, tea, salt, pepper, frozen vegetables (without additives), frozen fruit juices (without additives), vegetables (string beans are permitted), honey, 100% pure safflower or soy bean oil, nuts (except legumes if you do not eat *kitniyot*), baking soda, detergents and scouring powders.

If purchased before or during Passover, the following products require no special certification: fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, fresh fish and meat.

If purchased during Passover, the following products require certification: all processed foods (canned, frozen, or bottled dairy products, juices).

### Can any dishes or utensils be used during Passover?

It is preferable to have special dishes and cookware reserved exclusively for Passover use. Certain items, however, can be kashered for use during Passover. Earthenware, enamelware, or porcelain utensils used during the rest of the year may not be kashered or used during Passover.

### What is Bedikat Hametz?

After our homes have been thoroughly cleaned for Passover, and hametz items are stored away, it is traditional to perform a 'search' by candle light, feather, and spoon symbolizing that all visible *hametz* has been removed. **Note:** this is a fun, memorable ritual for children to participate in; it is traditional to place a few crumbs to be 'found' during the search. On the night before Passover, following the search, we recite the following formula renouncing our connection to any *hametz*:

> All manner of leaven in my possession which I have not seen or not removed is hereby annulled and considered as the dust of the earth.

### What is Biyyur <u>H</u>ametz?

On the morning before Passover we burn the hametz found during the search on the previous night. If completing at home, this must be done by 11:59 AM on Wednesday, April 8th. The latest time to consume *hametz* on Wednesday, April 8th, is 10:59 AM.

# FROM THE HAZZAN

"All Prophetic Books and Sacred Writings will cease in the days of the Messiah, with the exception of the Megillah (of Esther). It will continue just like the Five Books of the Torah and the Oral Torah, which will never cease. Although ancient troubles will not be remembered, as it is written (in Isaiah 65:16): 'The troubles of the past are forgotten and hidden before my eyes', Purim will not be abolished, for it is written (in Esther 9:28): 'These days of Purim shall never be repealed among the Jews and the memory of them shall never cease from their descendants' (Rambam's Mishneh Torah, Laws of Megillah and Hanukah 2:18.). There will be a time when all troubles will be forgotten. There will be no hunger, no disease and no war. The time of the Messiah as foretold in our scriptures and interpreted by our sages. In that time - according to Rambam - we will no longer read from the haftarah every Saturday, as the books of the Prophets will 'cease'; there will be no more reading of Eicha (lamentations) on Tisha b'Av, Kohelet (Ecclesiastes) on Sukkot or even Shir haShirim (The Song of Songs) for Pesah. The only books to remain being studied are the Torah, the oral Torah and the Megillah.

It is easy to understand why the Torah and the Oral Torah: those are the sources of the majority of our laws, customs, and observances. Without them we would have no relationship with The Creator, as the source of that relationship is contained in those books. But the Megillah is a simple book, telling an innocent story of a woman turned queen, who endangers herself to save her people. It is a common story of good versus evil in which absolute good prevails. God is never mentioned by name in the Megillah; and the historical accuracy of the Megillah has been questioned. When so many other books of our cannon present us with deeper tales and philosophies, and laws much more important than those found in the Megillah, why is this book the one to be preserved?

"Our Masters taught: forty-eight prophets and seven prophetesses prophesied in Israel but they neither diminished from nor added to anything that is written in the Torah, other than the reading of the Megillah. How did they infer it? R. Hiyya bar Avin said in the name of R. Joshua ben Korhah: If we sing praises for being delivered from slavery to freedom, should we not do all the more so for being delivered from death to life?"



(Babylonian Talmud, Megillah 14a). The Megillah stands as the only text that adds mitzvot to the ones found in the Torah. Other Mitzvot are created later by the Rabbis – but they are not found in our cannon (e.g. Hanukah candles). Therefore, the Megillah will continue to be read in the future, in a time when we will forget many of our troubles.

Other books of the cannon are important: Shir HaShirim teaches us about love; Kohelet, about death. There are lessons about suffering in Eicha, and our Prophets teach us about loyalty. But mitzvot are the Rabbinic way to codify our relationship with The Holy One. Which is why the Megillah will be preserved in the times of the Messiah.

May we see the time when my Bat/Bar-Mitzvah students will no longer have to learn haftaroth, only Torah and Megillah. May it be speedily and in their days. Meanwhile, I look forward to dancing and singing with you as we read the Megillah on 3/9 in the evening and 3/10 in the morning. Please refer to the Purim schedule in this Tablet.

# FROM THE PRESIDENT

When you read this the shloshim (the thirty-day period of mourning) for the beloved Kirk Douglas will have just passed. From the roles he played, and in his visage and his bearing -handsome and strong -- he was a living challenge to the stereotypes of the way Jews supposedly look and behave. He was all-American and all-Jewish at the same time.

I never met Kirk Douglas but he was still my landsmen, not only a fellow Jew, but a fellow Jew from the same geographic region. As those who read The Ragman's Son, Douglas' autobiography, know, Douglas was the child of poor immigrants who settled in Amsterdam, NY -- a small, industrial city on the banks of the Mohawk River, 35 miles from my hometown of Albany. I spent some time in Amsterdam because it was the regional headquarters of USY. I became close to Eleanor Bloom, the regional director, and her husband Rabbi Samuel Bloom, who had served Amsterdam's Conservative shul, Congregation Sons of Israel, since 1949. Although that was well after Douglas had left, his family remained in Amsterdam. The Blooms told me that Douglas maintained warm relations with them and he continued to generously support the congregation.

One of Douglas' sisters, Betty, married a fellow from Albany and were members of my synagogue. They endowed a scholarship for

one high school student each year who had demonstrated superior commitment to Jewish life and Jewish education. Every Shavuot, they personally awarded the scholarship and, rumor had it, that in earlier years Douglas himself had attended Shavuot services to participate. While I don't know if that's true, I can personally attest that Betty shared with her brother the trait of the striking cleft chin.

So why do I share this information, aside from my inclination to bask in the glow of celebrity? Let me suggest that Kirk Douglas and his family were good dugmahs — role models — for those who have attained high levels of success, honor and prosperity to use their blessings to sustain synagogue-community life. We are so fortunate to have such people in our midst. Also, I bring up the story of my connection with Kirk Douglas to demonstrate one of the benefits of synagogue life -- the life-long feeling of connection and kinship with those from the same community, even those whom you never meet and become legends. May the memory of Kirk Douglas be for a blessing.





Men's Club Brunch and Speaker Series Sunday, March 1 with Dr. Guy Ziv



Brunch will be served beginning at 9:15. Dr. Ziv's presentation will begin at approximately 10:15. He will discuss the internal Israeli political environment in the context of U.S.-Israeli and Israeli-Palestinian relations, which is particularly timely since Israel will be in the midst of its third recent re-election campaign; the first two were inconclusive.

Dr. Ziv is an assistant professor in the School of International Service's U.S. Foreign Policy Program. He teaches a variety of undergraduate and graduate courses on U.S. foreign policy, the Middle East, and international negotiations. His current research focuses on foreign policy decision-making, the influence of think tanks in U.S. foreign policy, and the role of political elites in the Arab-Israeli conflict. His written works on the impact of Israel's nuclear policy on U.S.-Israel relations; Israel's strategic partnership with France in the 1950s; learning in foreign policy; and the role of leaders' personalities in foreign policy

change have been published in peer-reviewed, scholarly journals. His op-eds have appeared in both American and Israeli newspapers.

Dr. Ziv has appeared as a commentator in major media outlets. He has a background in policy, having worked at the U.S. Department of State, on Capitol Hill, and for leading non-profit organizations that promote American involvement in Israeli-Palestinian peacemaking.
