## CLERGY CORNER

There are certain moments in life when you sense that you are experiencing something historic; when you know that where you are standing and what you are doing will be remembered for a very long time to come. This is how I felt on Tuesday, November 14, 2023. I began that day before the sun rose, as I boarded the Metro in time to arrive in front of the White House at 6:00 AM. It was Rosh Hodesh Kisley, and a special minyan had been organized in that thoroughfare between the People's House and Lafayette Square. About a thousand Jews showed up with tallises draped around them and tefillin on their arms and heads, as we davened that the new month would bring light and hope to the Jewish people and the State of Israel, and that the Rally for Israel on the National Mall would be successful.

By the time I made my way to the Mall, two and a half hours before the official start of the rally, throngs of people had already converged there. I saw signs from communities all over the country...people who came in busloads and planeloads, people who drove in and took trains to D.C. There were many thousands of kids: from grade school to college age, and people of all walks of life, even non-Jews holding placards that read "Christians stand with Israel." It has been stated that this was the largest ever pro-Israel rally in American history. Being there reminded me of another history-making moment, when I came to Washington in 1987 to rally for Jews trapped behind the iron curtain in the Soviet Union. The keynote speaker at that rally 36 years ago appeared on the stage again. Natan Sharansky, the celebrated refusnik who inspired the Jewish world with his story and tenacity again came to the microphone to express his indefatigable hope for Israel and the Jewish people today. We heard bipartisan messages from political leaders, inspiring words from television and movie stars, stirring music from American and Israeli musical sensations, and heart wrenching appeals from parents of hostages still held in Hamas captivity. There were moments when I felt so uplifted, like when nearly 300,000 people sang *Hatikvah* in unison! And there were moments that were soul crushing, like listening to shell-shocked parents whose kids have been hostages for over a month, and who do not know if they are alive or dead. There were moments of profound patriotism, like listening to the leaders of both major American political parties declaring their support for Israel and making a moral case for American opposition to Hamas, and other agents of violence against Jews. There were also moments of pure exaltation, singing and dancing

along with Israeli artists, songs of peace and hope. Scanning the crowds that day, here is what I did not encounter:

- I did not see a single sign, placard, or poster expressing hate or defamation of Palestinians.
- I did not hear a single chant, urging people to harm or kill Arabs, Palestinians, or their supporters.
- I did not see a single person harmed, assaulted, pushed, punched, spat on, kicked, or tackled.
- I did not see a single flag of any nationality snatched, torn, burned, or desecrated.
- As far as I know there was not a single violent altercation or scuffle at this massive demonstration (though the white canvas tent set up to offer medical care to anyone at the rally was vandalized with spray-painted messages "Gaza will be free" and "Palestine will win").

This is so utterly different from the pro-Hamas rallies that have taken place all over the world, where protesters have explicitly called for violence and killing Jews, where American and Israeli flags have been burned, where people whip the crowd into an angry frenzy stoking hostility and aggression. I was so proud to be present at the Rally for Israel, so proud of the unity of the Jewish people who stood shoulder to shoulder, so empowered by the unquenchable hope and sense of responsibility the Jewish people have for one another. I was also thrilled by how many Har Shalom members showed up. As I stood at the meet-up point, I was so happy to see Har Shalom members pouring out of the Metro stop, and then to keep running into others inside the venue, and even to see pictures posted by those I was not even able to see at the rally itself. These are all good omens for the Jewish people and for the State of Israel. Many have said that it will get worse before it gets better. I certainly hope that between the time that I am writing this and the time it shows up in your mailbox that our hostages have been released and Hamas has been neutralized. Whatever may come, I know that the Jewish people and Israel are infused with an irrepressible commitment to life and selfdetermination. That was affirmed in so many ways at the history-making rally of November 14, 2023.

Hashem oz le'amo yitein, Hashem yivarech et amo va'shalom...May God give strength to the people; May God bless the Jewish people with peace.

## FROM THE HAZZAN



#### **Shabbat Shirah**

This year, Shabbat Shirah will be on January 26-27, 2024. We are blessed to host Tizmoret, Queens College Hillel's professional Jewish a cappella group.

Shabbat Shirah is the Shabbat when we read chapter 15 of the book of Exodus from the Torah. This includes the Song of the Sea, known in Hebrew as *Shirat haYam*, or simply Shirah (song). This is the song that Moses and Miriam sang after the people of Israel crossed the Sea of Reeds. It is a song of freedom, a song of victory. You are, likely, familiar with some of the verses in the Shirah: "Who is like you, Adonai, among the deities" (*Mi chamocha ba-elim Adonai*) and "Adonai will reign forever and ever" (*Adonai Yimlokh le'olam va'ed*). You might also have heard the chant *Ozi v'Zimrat Yah*, God is my strength and might, also a quote from the Shirah.

We use a special melody to chant this chapter from the Torah. The Song expresses our joy in attaining freedom and defeating Pharaoh, and the music reflects this with a special chant, which is also heard in other occasions: during Simchat Torah, when the Torah reader recites the six days of creation; anytime we chant the phrase "Next year in Jerusalem"; and after concluding each book of the Torah with the phrase "Be strong and we will strengthen ourselves". Sephardi Jews use a particularly captivating melody. We frequently use that melody when we chant the Shirah during morning services.

It is hard for me to imagine the Israelites breaking into a musical song and dance comparable to "La La Land" or Bollywood movies. Three million people, as attuned as they might be to God's inspiration, would have difficulty hearing Moses and Miriam chanting, let alone singing in unison. The word Shirah, in Hebrew, also translates as poetry. It is more likely that this poetry was recited by Moses and Miriam, with some call and response of better known verses. The Torah, probably, does not convey historical facts exactly the way they happened, and Shabbat Shirah is usually translated as "Shabbat of Song"; so it became traditional in Eastern Europe for the Hazzan to prepare a special musical program with the choir. Because of this, since 1999, I



have used the opportunity of Shabbat Shirah to invite choral and a capella groups to perform at Har Shalom. This year we are hosting Tizmoret.

I first had the opportunity to learn from Daniel Henkin, director of Tizmoret, during CAJE (Coalition for the Advancement of Jewish Education) conferences, in the 1990s. His arrangements and music were an inspiration for me. Along with Henkin, Tizmoret has produced eight albums and two EPs. They have performed at countless synagogues, college campuses, at Merkin Hall, Symphony Space, and various music festivals across the Eastern United States. Tizmoret won the Kol HaOlam (the national Jewish collegiate a cappella competition) in 2011, 2012, and 2015, and won the first annual Philadelphia Jewish Collegiate A Cappella Competition in 2017. They have even performed at the annual White House Hanukkah party in 2014.

I am really looking forward to this experience. I invite you to join Har Shalom and Tizmoret in singing and celebrating freedom on January 26-27, 2024, Shabbat Shirah.




## FROM THE SHERMAN ECC



We had a special opportunity to help three families from Israel who came to our area to temporarily escape the war. These families left Israel to give their children a sense of normalcy and peace. They left so their children could run on the playground, instead of to bomb shelters. They left so they could work and not worry about the safety of their children, and if they would make it in time to a safe place. So they could tuck their children into bed and talk about the squeals of laughter from school, not the shrieks of fear

Just recently two of the families left to go back to their home, our homeland. They shared with me that they were faced with guilt each day being far away and longing to get back to their homes, to Israel. They also shared there are no words to express their thanks to the Sherman ECC and Har Shalom for welcoming their children to attend with open arms and for free. The families know life will be different going back. One family shared that four families at their children's *Gan* (preschool) must have parents at school each day so that they have enough hands to get the children to the bomb shelters.

I made them books to help them transition to school here upon their arrival and another book to take back to Israel, filled with pictures from their time at the Sherman ECC, with their new friends and teachers. When they left, it was not goodbye but *l'hitraot*, until we meet again. Next time, G-d willing, in Israel!



## February 21, 2024 | WHERE LIFE BEGINS | Italy - 2022 - 100 minutes

When we commemorate the holiday of Sukkot, most of us do not know that Italy is a chief source of the citrons we use in our celebration. In WHERE LIFE BEGINS, a French ultra-orthodox Jewish family from Aix-les-Bains makes a yearly stay at a farm in Calabria to carry out the sacred mission of harvesting the citrons.

Elio, the reluctant inheritor of the farm, yearns for the freedom to pursue his own plan for life. Esther, the rabbi's daughter, chafes under the constraints imposed by her religion. Their relationship will affect each profoundly, but how?

## TUESDAY, JANUARY 16 | 7:00 PM | CONGREGATION HAR SHALOM

In November 1940, days after the Nazis sealed 450,000 Jews in the Warsaw Ghetto, a secret band of journalists, scholars and community leaders decided to fight back. Led by historian Emanuel Ringelblum and known by the code name Oyneg Shabes, this clandestine group vowed to defeat Nazi lies and propaganda not with guns or fists but with pen and paper. Now, for the first time, their story is told as a feature documentary. Written, produced, and directed by Roberta Grossman and executive produced by Nancy Spielberg, Who Will Write Our History mixes the writings of the Oyneg Shabes archive with new interviews, rarely seen footage and stunning dramatizations to transport us inside the Ghetto and the lives of these courageous resistance fighters. They defied their murderous enemy with the ultimate weapon – the truth – and risked everything so that their archive would survive the war, even if they did not.

## HAR SHALOM'S REFUGEE SHABBAT

Congregation Har Shalom is participating in HIAS' Sixth Annual Refugee Shabbat, taking place on February 2-3, 2024, to express our solidarity with the global Jewish movement for refugee protection and welcome. People seeking asylum are being turned away at borders around the world. The number of forcibly displaced people has grown to over 110 million. The growing impact of climate change exacerbates the effects of violence, conflict, and economic instability on already vulnerable populations. This is a critical moment for all of us to reaffirm and redouble our support for refugees, asylum seekers, and the forcibly displaced, and an opportunity to step back, reflect, and celebrate the work we have already done by supporting the assimilation of two families evacuated from Afghanistan in 2021.

As of this writing, we have several events planned for the Refugee Shabbat weekend. On Friday night, before Kabbalat Shabbat services, a speaker from HIAS will lead a discussion on the connections between the current refugee experience and the theme of Fiddler on the Roof, the Har Shalom Players production being performed that same weekend. At Saturday morning Shabbat services, Simon Babil will be sharing his refugee experience coming to the U.S. from Cuba.

Since Har Shalom is celebrating Refugee Shabbat during the same weekend as the Fiddler on the Roof performances, in conjunction with HIAS, we are providing 100 refugees in the DC, MD, VA area with free tickets to attend the performances. 

## Men's Club Brunch

Our Brunch Series continues February 4th with Judi Garrett-- Chief Operating Officer, Jewish Relief Network Ukraine (JRNU). Judi will speak about the work that JRNU has been doing in Ukraine throughout the war as well as their plans for the future. Almost two years since the invasion of Ukraine, the people continue to suffer unimaginable losses and trauma. JRNU provides lifesaving support to tens of thousands of men women and children—everything from food and medicine to schools and mental health counseling. JRNU was supporting the people long before the war



began, building more than 35 Jewish communities across Ukraine, and they will be there to build them back after the war ends. The long-standing relationships in the communities have allowed JRNU to provide humanitarian aid when others could not, including shipping supplies into Kherson from across the border in Russia when the city was cut off from Ukraine.

Judi Garrett has been leading organizations that help people for more than 30 years, first as a senior executive at the Department of Justice and now as the Chief Operating Officer of the Jewish Relief Network Ukraine. Judi spent several of her childhood years in Israel where she learned Hebrew and developed a deep love for the country and its people. She has a law degree from Washington University in St. Louis and a bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.
