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FROM THE Rabbi.

Dear Friends.

If I could "re-do" any single part of my life, it would absolutely be my college years...but not for the reasons you might expect. While I loved the entire college experience, in retrospect, I rushed through it too guickly. I was the unusual college student who knew exactly what I wanted to major in, and exactly what I wanted to do. I was hyperfocused on my academic and career goals, and I never stopped to consider other routes to the same destination. Before I even graduated, I was taking the Graduate Record Exam at a special Sunday sitting. A Seventh Day Adventist and I sat in the basement of an Orthodox synagogue taking a standardized test that would launch us into the next chapter in our higher education. I moved directly from my college campus in Columbus, OH to New York City. where I enrolled in the Rabbinical School of the Jewish Theological Seminary. If I could have done it over, I might have majored in a different field...now that I know that there was not only one undergraduate major that is relevant to being a rabbi. But more than anything, I would have taken a gap year. I wish I would have slowed down, and gone abroad, between my undergraduate and graduate education. When I started college, almost 30 years ago, very few people went on gap year programs. I

My daughter Mia graduated high school in the Spring of 2019, and, rather than going right to college, is spending a year of study of sacred texts, educational travel, and internships in Israel. She is living in an apartment in Jerusalem, shopping at the shuk, interacting on a daily basis with Israeli culture and society. She is also learning about Judaism on her own terms, rather than according to a graded curriculum in her day school. And she is loving every minute of it! When she told me that one of the schools she is considering for undergrad would give her credit for her year in Israel, thus reducing her undergraduate study to three years instead of four, my initial reaction was "What's the rush?!" Our kids are going to work for most of their adult lives. One additional year of learning and personal growth...either before college, before graduate school, etc. can only serve to enrich their lives.

When we dropped off Mia at Newark Airport, the departure hall was teeming with hundreds of kids embarking on year-in-Israel programs. The diversity and breadth of programs is staggering... from traditional yeshiva/seminary programs like Mia's, to programs connected to Israeli universities and cultural institutions, to service projects, to teaching English, and the list goes on and on (check out options at www.masaisrael.org). The Conservative movement runs a remarkable program called Nativ, where high school graduates live and study in Jerusalem (choosing from the

Conservative Yeshiva, Hebrew University, or Ulpan/Community Service). The second semester involves intensive volunteering in small Israeli communities in a variety of social services. All the while participants masayon learn and grow Jewishly, and develop deep

connections with Israel.

Among the greatest advantages of a gap year in Israel is the opportunity for soon to be college students to enter their campuses with a stronger Jewish identity, and a deeper awareness of the realities of the State of Israel. Not only will they be stronger advocates for Israel on campus, they will be equipped to make meaningful Jewish choices in college. Hopefully this will lead to a lifetime of Jewish commitment and leadership. It's not too late to start thinking about gap year programs. If you have a high school junior or senior at home (or if you know one), please tell them about the Gap Year Fair Tour on November 13th from 6:30-8:30 PM at the JDS Upper School Campus. A number of programs will have representatives there, and there will even be a raffle for a free ticket to Israel! If you have any questions, please speak to Yael or to me any time.

FROM THE President

It was on one of those frigid and cloudless winter evenings in December a number of years ago, as I drove the empty streets on some errand, that I heard on the radio a folk tune, sung with that distinct Americana twang. I listened with half an ear until it dawned on me that the song's subject was none other than *Hanukkah*, our beloved Festival of Lights.

The song was "The Many and the Few" and its composer was the great folk troubadour Woody Guthrie who, among other things, was responsible for "This Land is Your Land." According to Wikipedia, Guthrie's second wife was Marjorie Greenblatt and her mother, Aliza Greenblatt, was a well-known Yiddish poet, with whom Guthrie established a creative and collaborative relationship. Guthrie found great inspiration in Jewish history and culture and wrote numerous Jewish lyrics (including other songs for *Hanukkah*).

Each stanza of "The Many and the Few" assumes the perspective of the famous characters of the Hannukah story. The fourth from last stanza speaks from the perspective of Jerusalem itself:

My name is Jerusalem where Judah came back
To build up my Temple once more
To cut down the weeds and thorny brush
That grows 'round my windows and doors

For its last three stanzas, the song switches its perspective to that of the Jews themselves:

Whole stones, whole stones, we'll build and pray
To God as a wholehearted Jew
God's love the hateful many did place
In the hands of a God loving few

We found in our temple a little oil jug
Just enough for the lamps for one night
That one little jug burned eight whole days
And it kept our new temple in light

Eight candles we'll burn and a Ninth one too
Every New Year that comes and goes
We'll think of the many in the hands of the few
And thank God we are seeds of the Jews

Understanding your indulgence thus far, I make the following strained, yet heartfelt, comparison, as we enter *Hannukah* season: our Cahan Sanctuary is a rededication not unlike that of our ancestors of the Temple, albeit in a much smaller way. We did not cut down "weeds and thorny brush" but we did put in a new



carpet, painted the walls, installed a retractable wall, and purchased handsome and comfortable chairs, which many of us have dedicated to the memory or in honor of a loved one. Go to: www.harshalom.org/chair to dedicate a chair. In that rededicated sanctuary, we pray as proud "wholehearted Jews" thankful to God for the continued miracle of Jewish life flourishing among the few amidst the many. We did not find a "little oil jug," but we did find community, which allows each one of us to shine more brightly and for longer than we could ever do alone. We should take great pride in our rededication of this sacred space. Stay tuned for information on the upcoming rededication ceremony of the Cahan Sanctuary.

Our rededication of our synagogue is not limited, however, to its physical space. We are full of people at Har Shalom who figuratively move "whole stones" with their dedication to enhancing our communal and spiritual life. For example, there is our newly reinvigorated social action committee that plans during the November/December period to host several community meetings to share information about potential social action and community support activities. Be on the lookout for a flyer and a Shabbat Shalom weekly email for more information, or contact Marj Klein or Stew Remer. Also rekindled are our hesed efforts – assuring that we provide each other with the necessary acts of lovingkindness, which are at the core of our mission. Please contact Beth Ann Katz, Craig Ginsburg or Wes Kaplow for more information if you wish to join in this important project.

There are many, many other volunteers among us, but as January approaches, I must acknowledge our singers, actors, musicians, producers and designers who work so hard to organize and perform our yearly musical illuminating the dark winter evenings with joy. Maybe this year they can throw in a little Woody Guthrie? From my family to yours, I wish you a happy and joyous *Hanukkah*!

Becoming Eve: My Journey from Ultra-Orthodox Rabbi to Transgender Woman

Abby Stein is a Jewish educator, author, speaker, and activist. She was born and raised in a Hasidic family of rabbinic descent, and is a direct descendent of the Baal Shem Tov, the founder of Hasidic Judaism. Abby attended Yeshiva, completing a rabbinical degree in 2011. In 2012, she left the Hasidic world to explore a self-determined life. In 2015 Abby came out as a woman of trans experience. Since coming out, she has been working to raise support and awareness for trans rights and those leaving Ultra-Orthodoxy.

Her story has been covered in the New York Times, New York Post, Wall Street Journal, New York Magazine, Jewish Daily Forward, Daily Mail, NBC, Vogue, Instyle, and more, as well as live appearances on CNN, Fox News, HuffPost Live, ShowTime, NowThis, PopSugar and internationally. In 2016, Abby was named by The Jewish Week as one of the "36 Under 36" young Jews who are inspiring change in the world. In 2018 she was awarded the Pride Award by the Brooklyn Borough President. She studied gender studies and political science at Columbia University in New York City. Her book *Becoming Eve: My Journey from Ultra-Orthodox Rabbi to Transgender Woman*, will be published by Seal Press (Hachette) in November 2019. Rabbi Raskin met Abby for the first time in Jerusalem this summer and invited her to be our scholar-in-residence in 2020.

In order for children to read, they must be developmentally ready. The skills needed aren't found in workbooks or computer programs. There are many factors that influence reading readiness and in this article I want to focus on brain maturation as well as rich experiences found in play! Why play? It is the foundation of learning. Children must be able to cross the mid-line which promotes the coordination and communication of the left and right hemispheres of the brain. They do this by reaching across the middle of the body with their arms and legs. It also involves psychomotor readiness, the development of sensory perceptual skills, muscles becoming strong, flexible and coordinated and then the development of fine motor skills. It's what Bloom's Taxonomy refers to as the "doing" domain of learning.

How do we develop these skills? Though hands-on experiences at home, school, and on the playground such as building, painting, jumping, cooking, digging, climbing, running, cutting, catching a ball, drawing, putting things together and taking them apart. Of course, reading to your child will give them a love of books, help them develop phonemic awareness and help them to be better readers but if they spend so much time on screens and do not move their bodies, they will not have the skills to be readers, even if they have read or listened to 1,000 books online. With the beautiful weather, I encourage you to engage in play with your children and grandchildren to create rich memories and also give them the right foundation for being a reader.







Hesed Committee Created and Starting to Plan

Hopefully, you have read President Steve Susswein's September/October Tablet article in which he spoke of the importance of <u>h</u>esed as a vital core value of our congregation. The response to Steve's call was overwhelming and I am happy to report that to realize his vision, we convened our first meeting of the <u>h</u>esed committee in September. With much lively and warm discussion, we decided to focus on five main areas:

- 1. The creation of a <u>H</u>esed Phone Team that will actively reach-out to congregants in their times of stress to provide support and identify needs.
- 2. The creation of a <u>H</u>esed Meal Team that, in addition to the Shabbat dinners that our Sisterhood, led by coordinator Millie Rumerman, sends to members upon a family loss or illness, will coordinate an ongoing "meal train" based on each congregant's needs.
 - 3. The creation of a <u>H</u>esed Visit Team that, in coordination with the clergy office, will visit congregants who are home-bound or in the hospital.
- 4. The creation of a *Simha* Team to reach out to families with newborns to assist with their needs and help celebrate their joy with our community.
- 5. The need to provide additional support to the <u>Hevra Kadisha</u> committee led by its dedicated chair Harvey Karch and the *kehilah* we serve, before, during, and after a funeral.

It is important to ensure that all contact, care, and comfort afforded to our congregational family is done with utmost compassion and discretion.

This committee is a work in progress, and we are just in the beginning stages of creating the teams. We need your help! 

November 3rd — Joel Rubin Let's Have a Real Talk about Anti-Semitism

Anti-Semitism is here, in our communities, and it doesn't appear to be fading away. What are the causes of today's anti-Semitism in America? Who's to blame? Does anti-Israel activity like BDS mirror white supremacist activity, or are they different, if so, how? Come hear Joel Rubin, a native Pittsburgher, whose family attends Tree of Life Synagogue (site of the attack in Pittsburgh); a Council Member in the town of Chevy Chase, a contributor to The Washington Jewish Week; and a former Obama Administration State Department official. Joel will talk about the current political debate on anti-Semitism and what it means for the future of the American Jewish community.

American Capitalism: Is it Sustainable? Is it Moral?

Americans have been told that in order to have a competitive economy, markets must be left largely unregulated and American businesses have to be ruthless profit maximizers. Not so, argues Washington Post Pulitzer-Prize winning economics and business columnist Steven Pearlstein in his new book, "Can American Capitalism Survive?" Market fundamentalism, he says, is based on four fallacies: (1) that greed is good; (2) that what matters is equality of opportunity, not equality of incomes; (3) that what people earn in the marketplace is an objective measure of their economic contribution; and (4) that having a fairer economy will make us all poorer. In his talk, Pearlstein will explain why each is false, and how a more inclusive economy could also be more prosperous.

Cathy has been a teacher at Life Time Athletic for more than 11 years. She loves what yoga focuses on: physical and spiritual strength, inner peace and appreciation for life.

Target Demographic

Everyone is welcome and would benefit from Cathy's classes, but especially those with overuse injuries, or the aging population that may be finding limitations in their movements, (like back pain) and just need to move slower and build proprioception. There is also more time spent warming up and preparing the body for more challenging movements. The class is moderately challenging and flows slower than the typical power vinyasa class. 

If you've ever driven east on Interstate 10 from Los Angeles to Phoenix, you've driven on the Sonny Bono Memorial Freeway also known as the Palm Springs Desert Valley Freeway. You can turn off on California Route 111 and head to Palm Springs, or continue on I-10 to Indio and to – other Desert Cities. Just which other desert cities is left for you to discover as you move down the highway.

Having ensconced themselves in the desert, away from big-city pressures and responsibilities of their earlier lives, Lyman and Polly Wyeth are settled in 2004 in a comfortable and perhaps insular existence. But, as often happens, life intervenes – first in the arrival of their daughter who has brought with her the manuscript of a memoir that threatens to uncover the cracks in the Wyeth's carefully constructed lifestyle. Second is the undercurrent of international events whose presence pervades much of the play. Mr. Baitz has said that "one of the reasons it's called *Other Desert Cities* is because [he is] thinking of . . . a war going on thousands of miles away in another desert.

Directed by Julie Janson, whom you may remember in her role as Annie in Peace Mountain's staging of *All My Sons* a few years ago, performances of *Other Desert Cities* will take place at Congregation Har Shalom at 8:00 p.m. on the evenings of December 5, 7, 12, and 14; matinee performances will be held Sunday December 8 and December 15 at 2:00 p.m. Matinee performances will be followed by Q&A sessions with the cast.
