

From where I sit, I see the profound impact of synagogue membership every single day: the children who sing and march up and down the halls to Shabbat melodies; the families who are cared for when they experience the loss of a loved one; the parents who bring their newborns to the bimah to be named and welcomed into the community of the Jewish people; the many members who undertake volunteer projects and

I welcome a conversation with anyone about ways to get more involved, to learn, and to grow Jewishly.

FROM THE President

Dear Congregants,

At the heart of the Jewish approach to life is Hesed. The prophet Micah reminded us that to love Hesed is one of the three things that the Lord requires of us. (Micah 6:8.) Our sages relate that G'milut Hasadim – acts of Hesed –are one of the three pillars on which the world stands. Pirke Avot 1:2. What exactly is *Hesed*? We often translate it as "lovingkindess" or "mercy" but it bears no direct translation into English. Traditional acts of Hesed include visiting and healing the sick, giving aid to the poor, and offering challenging times such as during bereavement, financial hardship, or when a family member is sick or absent. Hesed is keeping the lonely company or providing a listening ear to those who wish to talk. It includes assisting those among us who have physical limitations. Hesed may manifest itself through a meal, a card, a phone call, a visit, or a ride. It is the essence of Relational Judaism.

I am proud of the many wonderful acts of *Hesed* that Har Shalom provides, but we can always do better. In relaying a particular need and then understanding what is required in response. Inhibiting us also is the natural tendency to avoid the embarrassment in both asking for and giving help or of overstepping our bounds. In addition, there are issues of confidentiality and keeping up appearances and showing weakness. We are busy people. We all have problems. It is difficult enough to focus our emotional energy on the needs of those closest to us. Undoubtedly, Hesed is hard. However, if you have ever been a purvey of it, or a recipient of it, you know how sacred it is.

With the coming of the High Holy Days, and our petitioning Avinu Malkeinu to "deal with us with Hesed," the time is ripe to renew our commitment to our institutional approach to it. I believe that be strengthening our capacity to identify where Hesed is needed and how best to provide it, we may alleviate many of the inhibiting factors inherent in our current rather ad-hoc approach. Other synagogues have active Hesed committees. We can take inspiration and



guidance from them. I call on anyone who wants to assist in this holy effort to contact me, Rabbi Raskin, Hazzan Ozur Bass, or Vice Presidents, Craig Ginsburg and Beth Ann Katz, who I am working with on this endeavor. May the coming year be one of the great Hesed for all of us!

I had the opportunity to join Capital Camps staff as the 'Reich' Village leader (rising 6th and 7th graders) – managing 93 kids and 34 counselors.

They gave me so many ideas which I'm excited to bring back to HS.

Camp had lots of ups and downs (and a very literal big hill), but every step of the way our kids were there for me and I was there for them, ready to give them a big hug when needed and just remind them of home.

For our first Shabbat in camp I asked the parents of our campers to write a letter for their kid(s) which I gave them during Friday night dinner - it was a big surprise for them and I saw the excitement in their eyes. They definitely felt super special!

My biggest gift was to have in my Village two amazing HS counselors - Ryan Lewis & Lauren Snow – seeing them in the place they love the most, meeting their friends, giving their best to the campers and inspiring everyone around them - I am so proud of them! All of that reminded me why I came to camp everyday – to get to know our kids better and to create a strong feeling of community even when we are far away from home.

My next adventure is my second year of Shlichut, I can't wait to bring more of Israel to the community with verity of programs such as - new cooking program "Taste of Memories", Israeli movie festival, introductory Conversational Hebrew class for adults, Israeli newspaper and Shabbat table, Yom Ha'Shoah program - "Memory in the living room", Yom Ha'Zikaron and Yom Ha'Atzmaut and more holidays events.


CHEF LOUIS

Have you been thinking that you would like to participate more in Har Shalom community life?



We provide assistance with burial practices, the funeral, and the *shiva* period customs and practices. A Committee member, working with the clergy office, will provide whatever immediate assistance the family might need to help them get through a very difficult time.

The following forms of support are offered by the Committee, and are provided according to the family's wishes and needs. Members of the Committee are available to prepare the shiva home during the funeral, assist at the service if it is held at Har Shalom, arrange for the meal of condolence after the funeral, deliver prayer books, *kippot* and mourners' chairs to the *shiva* house, and arrange for fellow congregants to lead the *shvia minyanim*.



MEN'S CLUB Brunch









On Sunday Morning, September 8, the Men's Club is pleased to present Ambassador Stuart Eizenstat as its guest speaker; the Brunch will begin at 9:15 am, the speaker at 10:15 am. Mr. Eizenstat was a senior diplomat and advisor to Presidents Carter and Clinton. He is a noted author, lawyer and Jewish leader with a long and distinguished career in public service. His presentation is sure to be inightful and informative.

Mr. Eizenstat served as President Jimmy Carter's Chief Domestic Policy Adviser, and Executive Director of the White Policy Staff from 1981-1987. He was President Bill Clinton's Deputy Secretary of the Treasury 1999-2001, Under Secretary of State for Economic, Business and Agricultural Affairs 1997-1999, and served as the Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade at the International Trade Administration from 1996-1997. In 1998, he organized the Washington Conference on Holocaust Assets, resulting in the Washington Principles on Nazi-Confiscated Art. He served as the United States Ambassador to the European Union from 1993-1996 and as the United States Deputy Secretary of the Treasury from 1999-2001. For many years, and currently (as of 2018) he has served as a partner and Senior Counsel at the Washington, D.C.-based law firm Covington & Burling and as a senior strategist at APCO Worldwide.

In 2018, Mr. Eizenstat authored "President Carter: The White House Years". In it he argues that it is time to reevaluate President Carter's four years in the White House. Carter may seem like a transitional figure between scandaltarred Richard M. Nixon and venerated Reagan, but in the book Eizenstat makes the case that the 39th president changed the course of the country for the better. A signed copy of the book will be available for sale at the Brunch.

In 2012, Mr. Eizenstat authored the book: "The Future of the Jews: how global forces are impacting the Jewish people, Israel, and its relationship with the United States". Many of trends identified in his book have persisted to this day. In 2003 he published "Imperfect Justice: Looted Assets, Slave Labor and Unfinished Business of World War II".

Judith will discuss "Grit and Gusto: Farmerettes and Suffragettes on the Homefront in WWI". On the celebration of Centennial of America's entry into World War I, her presentation highlights how women in Maryland rallied to new involvement and activism during 1917-1918. In the rural areas of Maryland, including Montgomery County, farms suffered extreme shortages of workers as men left for the war. At the same time, America became the main food source not only for feeding people at home and for American soldiers abroad, but also for the people of Europe on the brink of starvation. Farm work became a patriotic crusade for women, and suffragettes encouraged a new kind of farm worker called the farmerette. Female grit and gusto made a difference in Maryland during the war. World War I led to the passage of the 19th Amendment, guaranteeing women the right to vote.
