
GUEST OF HONOR

Avigayil initially took an active role in Shul programming as an Eruv-checking volunteer, eventually becoming head of the Eruv Committee. In the summer of 2014, Avigayil became involved with security at MSJC. Security at Jewish institutions had precipitously become a heightened concern and Avigayil took it upon herself to inquire into existing programs and build upon the efforts already in place. Together with other members, Avigayil enhanced the safety and security measures within the Shul, including organizing emergency response systems, personally sponsoring CPR classes, expanding MSJC's relationship with the local police precinct, and establishing Shabbat security rotations. Outside of Shul activities, Avigayil works as an occupational therapist in New York Presbyterian Hospital's critical care department. She feels blessed to live in this vibrant community and take part in the diverse opportunities of MSJC life.
