FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

That belongs in a museum! 1,100 year old Tanach sells at auction for \$38 million.

Don't worry. It is going to be in a museum in Tel Aviv.

A few weeks ago I went into Sotheby's auction house in Manhattan. Despite being very close to where I used to live and work, I had never been there before. I was in search of an old, a very old, Hebrew bible. I did not expect a combination luxury item / fine art museum.

Sotheby's is a really cool place. I would now highly recommend visiting it to anyone in the city. From famous artwork like a Rothko square to contemporary art so bizarre I shouldn't describe it in a Temple bulletin, from extremely fancy jewelry to a \$3 million blow up purple swan...it has a little bit of everything. But I was on a mission. I had a timed entry ticket to see the oldest, most complete Hebrew bible in the world.

Now, if that sounds like a pair of caveats, that is because it is. Remember, this is an auction house, so any way to make it "The Oldest" is going to be used to generate interest and raise the price. So what does the "oldest, most complete" mean?

Let's start with the phrase "most complete Hebrew bible." The phrase "most complete" means closest to a modern Tanach, aka Hebrew bible. This consists of the Torah, the Nivi'im (Prophetic books like Isaiah, Amos, and Jonah), and the Ketuvim (Writings, a catch all category including Proverbs, Lamentations, Psalms, Job, and others).

However, it took hundreds of years and a new world religion to create what we now call the Hebrew Bible, or Old Testament. From the proto-Israelite period (1100ish BCE) to the First Temple period (until 586 BCE), most of what is in the Tanach hadn't even happened, much less been written down. Much of the Torah likely existed in that time, but we don't know anything about how it compared to the Torah as we know it. After the Babylonian Exile started the Second Temple Period in 539 BCE. In the years that follow the Torah is set as we know it and translated into Greek (aka the Septuagent) in the 200s BCE. The Prophetic books and the Writings books are also written and circulated...but it is not "The Bible." It's more like The Torah already as a special stand-alone collection on the one hand, and on the other a collection of Hebrew religious books and texts including (now apocryphal) books like Enoch and Judith. Until...

Enter Christianity and the Gospels. In the early days of Christianity, when it was essentially just another sect of Judaism in the Roman empire, Greek books on the life of Jesus and his followers were circulated as equivalent to these sacred Hebrew books. Eventually, Jewish authorities organized to decide what was, and was not, going to part of "The Hebrew Bible," and Christianity became a truly new religion and canonized the New Testament. This is all over Hundreds of years and includes massive historical events like the destruction of the second temple, the founding of Rabbinic Judaism, and the Roman Empire adopted Christianity.

The only texts we have from these centuries are the famous Dead Sea Scrolls. And they are...weird. They include some books very similar to ours (like Isaiah), Zoroastrian like books that are totally unique (The Sons of Light and Dark), and a little bit of everything else. They span hundreds of years, are in a Hebrew script that is hard to read, and probably stem from an off-shoot Jewish sect, the Essenes.

But then something incredible happens, a watershed event in Judaism you may not know about: The Masoretic Text is established by Rabbinic Jewish academies in and around the land of Israel from 700 - 1000 CE. The previously most famous text from this period was the Aleppo Codex. The Sassoon Tanach is even more complete and from the same period, around 900 CE. The Masoretes / Masoretic period refers to a movement at that time to establish the full Hebrew down to every last letter, vowel, and cantilation mark (they come from this period). And this is the true birth of the Tanach as we know it. In fact, the most incredible thing about the Sassoon Hebrew Bible is if you put it in front of a B'nai Mitzvah student at their torah portion, they would be able to read the 1,100 year old book without issue (that is not true of the harder to read Dead Sea Scrolls).


Why this important scroll was overlooked for so long, and its journey over a millennium, can be fully explored at <u>Sotheby's website</u>. Thankfully, it was bought at auction by the exact right type of person. Instead of being privately held in an inaccessible billionaire's abode somewhere, it is immediately being donated by The American Friends of <u>ANU: Museum of the Jewish People</u>. It will be making its way to that museum. Make sure to go see it, and the rest of the newly redone and reopened museum, next time you are in Tel Aviv.

RAC'S POWER FOR PURPOSE CLIMATE JUSTICE CAMPAIGN

On May 10-11, Rabbi Jim and Nilene Evans participated in the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism's national campaign – Power for Purpose: The Reform Movement's 2023 Climate Justice Campaign. At the DC Day of Action, about 200 Reform Jews from across the nation gathered to call upon the White House and Congress to confront the existential threat posed by climate change and cut climate pollution in half by 2030. Over two days, we heard from speakers like LaTosha Brown, Co-founder of the Black Voters Matter Fund, and Ben Jealous, formerly of the NAACP and now Executive Director of the Sierra Club, on the intersection of racial and climate justice, met with and heard from Senator Rev. Raphael Warnock and directly made our case in lobby visits to elected officials and their staff to build Power for Purpose. As part of the NJ delegation, we spoke with aides of Senator Booker and Representative Gottheimer urging them to commit to fully funding the EPA and strong regulations to limit climate pollution. There are many opportunities to continue this climate justice work, some of which will be highlighted in future Tikkun Olam on Tuesday emails. VOTING INFORMATION

From The League of Women Voters of New Jersey:

Election season is never over in New Jersey! In 2023, all New Jersey State Senate and Assembly seats are on the ballot. Visit wwnj.org/vote for election dates and deadlines. In 2023, voters will be casting a ballot in the all-new legislative districts put in place following the 2020 redistricting cycle. Use the League's Fair Districts New Jersey district look-up tool by visiting FairDistrictsNJ.org and entering an address in the search box. Toggle between "Legislative" and "Congressional" to see how districts for both state and federal representatives have changed.

The district look-up tool includes an interactive map and a list of the towns that have been added and removed from each district, so voters can see in detail how their districts have changed. In addition, the tool provides up to date demographic information from the 2020 Census, showing how district and town demographics have changed over the past decade. New Jersey's population has grown increasingly diverse over the past decade; per the 2020 Census, over 48% of New Jersey residents are people of color.

The Ruth & Lawrence Shavelson Community Service Award is presented to a Temple member, or members, who over the course of many years have contributed their energy to helping make our collective spiritual home a place of which we can all be proud. This year, the award is being presented to Rich Lurie. Rich has been involved in our Temple since 1965, when he was in first grade in the Sunday School. He and his wife Mary joined the Temple in 1992, with their sons Joe and Sam. He was Brotherhood President from 1999-2002. During that time, he helped design the current Sukkah, for which he has supervised construction each year since. Rich is a Trustee on the Temple Avodat Shalom Board and serves on the Religious Activities Committee. He is also active in Tikkun Olam, Family Promise and Feeding the Hungry. He sings in the choir and has joyfully participated in several Purim Shpiels (remember the Cowardly Lion?). Rich is famous for the rum balls he makes when it has been his turn to lead the summer services over the past 20+ years. TAS is indeed fortunate to have Rich contribute his heart and his time to our community.

The **Barbara King Hineni Award**, established in 2008, is given at the discretion of our Awards Committee to a member, or members, whose service to our Temple community has gone "above and beyond." Hineni, a Hebrew word found in the Bible as a response to God by Abraham and Moses, translates as: Here I am; How can I help? This award is being presented this year to **Steve Berman**.

Since joining TAS in 1999 with his wife, Ellen, and daughter, Stephanie, Steve has dedicated countless hours to our Temple. He became President in July 2019, and basically held the synagogue together during his 3-year term, through the ongoing complications and stresses of Covid. He was able to work with past and present leaders and clergy to coordinate the ever-changing pieces of the Covid puzzle to keep our synagogue intact, such as streaming services, health protocols, security issues and more.

As President, Steve was directly involved in Federation's Synagogue Leadership Initiative, a program designed to get the lay leaders and clergy of the local synagogues to convene and discuss what the next 5-10 years of Reform Judaism in Bergen County will look like. Last year's Purim Across Bergen is a great example of the cooperation that was begun and continues going strong today.



PERSONAL ASSISTANCE SERVICES PROGRAM (PASP) FACT SHEET

What is the Personal Assistance Services Program?

The Personal Assistance Services Program, (PASP) provides routine, non-medical personal care assistance to adults with permanent physical disabilities, who are 18 years of age or older, who are employed, preparing for employment, attending school or involved in community volunteer work and who are able to self- direct and supervise their own services. The goal of this program is to support individuals with physical disability so that they may remain active participants in their community. The PASP offers participants choice, flexibility, control, and the opportunity to manage their own personal care services.

Here's how the PASP works:

A needs assessment is conducted to determine the number of hours a participant will receive. The hours are then converted to a monthly budget. With assistance from the County Coordinator, participants develop a cash management plan (CMP) outlining exactly how their monthly budgets will be spent. The CMP includes details such as who they will hire, what services will be provided and what rates each worker will be paid. A fiscal intermediary services organization then distributes the monthly budget to purchase services as identified in the CMP.

What are Personal Assistant Services and who provides them?

Personal assistants are individuals with training or related experience in providing in-home services, who directly assist a person with a disability in carrying out routine non-medical tasks. Such as bathing, dressing, transfer to a wheelchair, meal preparation, laundry, shopping, household management, and transportation. On the other hand, the PASP participants can choose to hire friends, neighbors, family, independent employees or agency services.

What is the financial eligibility criterion?

- Individuals who have Medicaid or who may qualify for Medicaid are not eligible for the PASP program.
- Individuals who qualify under the current Social Services Block Grant (SSBG) guidelines receive the services at no cost. Those with incomes in excess of those guidelines are expected to contribute toward the cost of their services based on a sliding scale (Cost-Share).

Eligible applicants must:

- Reside in New Jersey
- Have a permanent physical disability and require assistance with activities of daily living
- be 18 years of age or older
- live in the community
- be capable of directing and supervising their own services
- be employed, preparing for employment through a vocational training program, in school, or actively volunteering in the community for a minimum of 20 hours per month.

Who will administer this program?

The PASP for Bergen County and Hudson County is administered through the Bergen County Division of Disability with oversight and funding provided by the State of New Jersey Department of Human Services, Division of Disability Services.
